BOARD OF POLICE.

Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1896.

Police Department of the City of New York, New York, July 1, 1896.

Hon. William L. Strong, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—Pursuant to section 40, chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Police Department of the City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1896:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1896, the number of the members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons and probationary employees, was 4,119.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries, for the quarter, and the details thereof, are shown in the schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 10,530 days; sick time paid, 5,265 days; sick time unpaid, 5,265 days; total, 10,530 days. Total number of days' time of the force was 372,297; per cent. of sick to full time, 2.82; per cent. for preceding quarter, 3.94; amount paid for sick time, \$18,991.75; amount paid for preceding quarter, \$26,430.89; decrease, \$7,439.14.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police force during the quarter was-Males,

Number arrested for principal felonies was 1,531; number discharged without trial, 470; number acquitted, 117; number convicted, 248; number sent to other authorities, 32; number died, 5; number pending, 659; total, 1,531.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 685; females, 369; total, 1,054. Restored to parents and guardians, 245; brought to Central Office, 809; total, 1,054. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for Witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House April 1, 1896, 12; committed during April, 26; total, 38; discharged during April, 18. Remaining in House May 1, 1896, 20; committed during May, 21; total, 41; discharged during May, 29. Remaining in house June 1, 12; committed during June, 20; total, 41; discharged during June, 31. Remaining in House June 30, 1896, 10. The aggregate number of days' detention was 1,274\frac{3}{3}\days; number of meals, 3,824, at a cost of 25 cents each, \$956.
