Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—Pursuant to the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments submit the following report of the operations and action of this Department for the three months ending December 31, 1900.

During the period for which this report is made the work of the Department was mainly confined to the assessing of real and personal property for the year 1901, which was begun by the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under the direction of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, on the first Monday of September last, as required by section 899 of the Charter. The work was practically completed at the end of the term for which this report is made, and the preparation of the books of "Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estate for the Year 1901," was in such state of progress as to enable them being opened for revision and correction at the time designated by law.

The following real estate recapitulation comprises a comparative statement of the tentative figures on real estate for 1901, as completed and sworn to, subject to reduction on application filed, with the final assessments for 1900:

THE PERSONAL BUREAU.

The Personal Bureau has been fully occupied, during the term for which this report is made, preparing the annual assessment-roll of personal property of individuals, estates and corporations, and we look to a material increase in the amounts to be finally held as a result of its painstaking and efficient labors.

A detailed statement of its work will be given, as heretofore, in the Departmental report of July next.

SURVEYOR'S BUREAU.

During the quarter just passed, Block Tax Assessment Maps for Sections 1, 2 and 3 of Brooklyn have been practically finished and will be used for the tax levy of 1902; duplicate maps of the Thirtieth and Thirty-first Wards of Brooklyn are still in progress. There were alterations on sewer maps of the Twenty-ninth Ward, Brooklyn, and other lot alterations, to the number of 12,328, including duplicates. Areas of parks and cemeteries in all the boroughs were furnished for the United States Census Bureau; also surveys in street opening proceedings.

THE INFORMATION BUREAU.

The Information Bureau continues to be an invaluable adjunct of the Department, securing and distributing necessary and otherwise unavailable information to the several bureaus for their varied needs and then properly recording and caring for the same.

New York, July 10, 1901.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 1.30 o'clock P. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.
