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PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY ON THURSDAY, 3D APRIL, 1902.

There were present:

Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding.

John H. Starin, Vice-President, and Commissioners Charles Stewart Smith and John Claflin.

Commissioner Langdon sent word asking to be excused from attending by reason of illness in his family. Commissioner Jesup sent word that he would have been present but his notice of meeting did not reach him.

Edward M. Shepard and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel, William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the two preceding meetings, to wit, of March 20 and 29, 1902, were read and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—The President, Vice-President and Commissioners Smith and Claflin.

Nays—None.

Carried.

President Orr announced that just previous to the meeting he had had a telephone message from the Mayor, saying that he was very busy with the annual budget and would like to be excused from attending.

The Counsel reported that, pursuant to the direction of the Board given at the last meeting, they attended with the President before the Mayor upon his hearing of the so-called Pennsylvania bill, and presented to the Mayor views substantially the same as those which were presented by them to the Board at the last meeting and of which a synopsis had been entered in the minutes of that meeting. Prior to the hearing before the Mayor and also after it the President of the Board and its Counsel conferred with the president, vice-president and counsel of the Pennsylvania Railroad with respect to amendments of section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act; and finally the form of such amendments was approved by the officers and counsel of the Pennsylvania Railroad and by the President and Counsel of the Board. The representatives of the Pennsylvania Railroad stated that section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act as thus amended would, at the least, be as satisfactory to them for the purpose of carrying out their plan of establishing a terminal in The City of New York, and crossing The City of New York with their railroad, as would the proposed new section 78 of the New York Charter which had come to the Mayor for his consideration. The proposed amendments to section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act, as thus prepared, were submitted to the Mayor and Corporation Counsel and received their approval. The Mayor having concluded to approve the proposed new section 78 of the New York Charter, accompanied his approval with a letter to the Governor of the State pointing out the desirability of a modification of such proposed section 78, either by the enactment in its stead of the amendments to section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act or by a new act specifically intended to modify the proposed section 78 of the Greater New York Charter. The Mayor's communication to the Governor was accompanied by a proposed bill amending section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act as proposed, and also a proposed bill amending the proposed section 78 of the New York Charter. The Governor sent to the Legislature an emergency message in behalf of the immediate enactment of the bill amending section 32 of the Rapid Transit Act and that bill was passed by both houses of the Legislature and has since come to the Mayor for his consideration.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the Counsel appear before his Honor the Mayor on the following day in behalf of the bill authorizing the contractor to assign his contract to an operating company.

The President reported that the Mayor had informed him that no one had appeared at the hearing on the bill amending the Rapid Transit Act as to advertising in condemnation proceedings, and that he would approve the same if the bill before him corresponded with the one sent to Albany by the Rapid Transit Board.

The following letter of the Chief Engineer was read:

THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS,
CHIEF ENGINEER'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, April 3, 1902.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

MY DEAR SIR—The development of the Rapid Transit work has now reached a point where it is possible to forecast its completion.

Taken on the whole, the work of the general contractor has been entirely satisfactory so far as progress is concerned, but, as inevitable with a work which is necessarily divided among a number of sub-contractors, it is found that the rate of progress is not entirely uniform. The work of excavation on many of the sub-contracts will be completed during the present calendar year, and there is no reason why the work of excavation on the other sub-contracts should not be completed during the same time.

The contract provided "that work shall be prosecuted during the night only or during both the night and day; and at all points the Board shall have power to require the contractor to so conduct its work that it shall not remain open or obstruct traffic an unreasonable length of time;" and, furthermore, the contract provides that "all the work shall be prosecuted to reduce to the minimum any interference with the public travel."

Certain of the sub-contractors are not employing as large a force as, in my judgment, could be employed, or as is actually employed by other sub-contractors on adjoining sections. I would therefore suggest to the Board the propriety of issuing an order to the general contractor to so arrange his work that the excavation shall be completed during the present calendar year, and to this end, that he shall employ additional force and a night force where necessary, particular stress being laid upon Section 6-A and 6-B along Broadway, from Sixtieth street to One Hundred and Fourth street, where, in my judgment, two shifts of men should be made obligatory. Attention should also be devoted by the contractor looking to a decided increase in force on Sections 1, 2, 5-A and 11.

DEAR SIR—We are beginning to excavate for the power house at Fifty-ninth street,

and in order to properly protect the work and the public the sub-contractor has erected a fence between the curb-line and building-line on Fifty-ninth street, from Eleventh to Twelfth avenue. The policeman has demanded from our sub-contractor his permit for this fence, whereupon the sub-contractor applied to the Commissioner of Highways for a permit. He refused to give it unless plans for the building were approved by the Building Department.

May I ask whether it is necessary for me to apply to the Commissioner of Highways and Building Department for such permits, or will your Board furnish me with the necessary permit for the erection of this fence and the prosecution of this work?

MY DEAR SIR—Under the authority of the Rapid Transit Board, I have the honor to ask that you will kindly act as Consulting Engineer in the matter of the recent fall in the east tunnel under Park avenue, by which certain houses were damaged, to examine the entire subject of this catastrophe, including the responsibility for it, and to report to this Board thereon, and also to report as to what steps you would recommend to be taken in the future respecting the completion of this portion of our work.

The property-owners have appointed a committee, which committee is about to name an engineer or engineers to examine into these questions on behalf of the property-owners. I am writing the Chairman of the committee asking that investigation be made jointly by that committee and this Board, in which event you may conduct your investigation with the engineers representing the property-owners. In all these matters you will please confer fully with the Chief Engineer of this Board, who will co-operate with you.

This communication was referred to me for a report as to cost. Without these terminals it is going to be exceedingly difficult to successfully operate the east side line even with the existing number of tracks.

Hon. McDougall Hawkes, Commissioner of Docks:

SIR—I am in receipt of a letter from Mr. Russell Bleecker, the Secretary of your Department, in which he incloses a copy of a letter dated April 1, 1902, this last being a substitute for a previous letter written under that date. He desires me to consider the request of the Rapid Transit Commission that your Department should approve the plans and conclusions of the Rapid Transit Commission for the railroad connecting the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn; and that I should advise you whether or not any liability could be incurred by the city by reason of your consent.

The Rapid Transit Act (chapter 4, Laws 1891, as amended), following the constitution of the State, provides that before any rapid transit road can be constructed, the consent of the local authorities having control of that portion of a street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct or operate such railway, shall be first obtained. The proposed railway passes under bulkheads and possibly under piers that are within the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks. It may be doubtful whether, strictly speaking, the consent of your Department is necessary. But as a matter of precaution, and in order to avoid possible question, it has been thought better to obtain, if possible, the consent of the Dock Department as well as the consent of the Board of Aldermen, the Mayor and the Park Department. The consent of all the above authorities has been obtained except the consent of your Department. You state that you are advised by your Engineer-in-Chief that there can be no objection to the carrying out of the plans proposed. As this plan might involve the stability of piers and bulkheads, it seems to me eminently proper that your Department should consider the question and if as appears, you are satisfied that there is no objection to the plan being carried out, that you should give the formal consent requested.

The fact of your consent to the plan, cannot, in my judgment, impose any possible liability upon the city.

The form of consent proposed by the Rapid Transit Commission is not inclosed with Mr. Bleecker's letter, but if you object to the provision quoted in his letter whereby you are made to approve the "plans and conclusions" of the Commission, I would suggest that you should communicate with the Commission and inquire whether they regard these words as essential. I presume they do not. In my mind, the only important thing is that you should express your consent to the construction of the Rapid Transit railway, in accordance with the plans of the Commission, by some formal act.

I am sending a copy of this letter to the President of the Rapid Transit Commission for his information.

President Orr reported that he had sent a communication to Mr. F. W. Devoe, Chairman of the Committee of Park Avenue Property Owners, inclosing report of Counsel of Board to him in answer to the questions submitted by that committee to the Board, as follows:

9th April, 1902.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners: SIR—The undersigned, the Chief Engineer and the Counsel, have considered the questions addressed to the Board by the Committee of Park Avenue Property Owners and the following answers we considered to be correct:

1, 17, 18 and 20. The Rapid Transit Board has done everything within its power to prevent further injury to the buildings on the east side of Park avenue, between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets. All of these buildings are now in charge of the Building Department. The Board believes the tunnel underneath to be safe. For abundant caution all work has for some time been suspended except the construction of permanent masonry lining and the placing of additional temporary supports. The whole situation is being examined by engineering experts.

The Board did not learn of the accident until on Friday after it occurred. The Board is informed that late Wednesday night there was some disturbance of rock, which made the contractor think it prudent that heavy traffic should be suspended for a while, as it was early Thursday morning. But no suggestion that there was any real danger was communicated to the Chief Engineer of the Board until after the accident happened. Immediately after the first disturbance of rock on Wednesday night the sub-contractor concentrated his force and began putting in place timber props and supports to prevent any further fall of rock, and as a still further precaution shut off the heavy vehicular traffic as above stated. The temporary supporting of the ground was continued on Thursday, so that the sub-contractor believed that all danger of accident had been passed, when suddenly, without warning, a further fall of ground occurred, breaking the timbers previously put in place and making a hole that extended to the surface.

The distance from the inside of the easterly wall on Park avenue, between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, to the building line of the houses is 10 feet, twice the minimum distance generally allowed by the contract. East of this finished wall, rock, on the average of about 20 inches, is blasted out, but rock so removed is replaced by solid masonry, so that between the finished line of the tunnel and the building line of the houses there are 10 feet of either rock or masonry. This particular near approach to a position vertically under the foundations of buildings was not specifically known to or approved by the Rapid Transit Board and for the reason that it was one of a vast number of details with which it is quite impossible for the Board to deal, except by trusting them to high-class experts. The construction work has, of necessity, at very many other parts of the route, approached much nearer the front foundations of buildings than on Park avenue. It is proper to add, that in all the excavation along the many miles of crowded streets, with the traffic being carried and the tunnel constructed within a few feet of the line of the buildings, no sinking of any material part of a building has happened in any case except this.

The Rapid Transit Board has required from its Chief Engineer a report as to the catastrophe; and it is intended that that report shall cover the question of responsibility. Upon the Chief Engineer's request the Board has also appointed an independent engineer, Theodore Cooper, with instructions to specifically examine the entire subject of this catastrophe, including the responsibility for it, and to report to the Board. The Chief Engineer and the special engineering expert have both been instructed to co-operate with any engineer appointed by the property-owners in such manner as the latter may desire.

2, 3, 4 and 5. There has been no change in the routes or general plan, or of the contract between the city and the Rapid Transit contractor with respect to either division of the tunnel under Park avenue. The routes and plan and the contract allowed the Contractor and the Engineers reasonable latitude in determining the precise position of any part of the tunnel so that it might accord with the necessities of stations, curves and other local conditions. Among other local conditions on Park avenue is the ultimately anticipated connection of the Rapid Transit system with the Grand Central Station facilities which must, of course, be accomplished without grade crossings. This would include the anticipated extensions of the Rapid Transit system north to serve the section of the city lying east of Central Park. The positions originally given for the tunnel, or both of its sections, were typical and subject to reasonable variation as expressed above. The Contractor claims that the matter is largely one for engineering experts; and it is the clear opinion of the Contractor and his Engineers, as well as of the Engineer of the Board, that the easterly section of the tunnel substantially conforms with the original requirements. The same is true of the westerly section of the tunnel. No modification of the construction contract has been made; and in the opinion of the Engineers with whom, in the execution of the work, the determination of technical problems must naturally rest, both sections of the tunnel have been placed according to the fair requirements of the contract.

6. As the tunnel headings under Park avenue are now connected, very much smaller charges of dynamite will be possible, and orders were issued previous to the accident to reduce the amount used.

7. The charges heretofore used have, it is believed, not been too large for efficient conduct of the work. At present all blasting is suspended in accordance with the request of the property owners.

8, 9 and 10. The Rapid Transit contract between the City and Mr. McDonald has not been assigned, so far as the Board is advised. The consent of the Board is necessary to the validity of the assignments; and the Board has given no consent.

11. The Board is not informed as to the terms of the sub-contract between Mr. McDonald and Mr. Shaler. The only provisions of the Rapid Transit contract giving the Board any control of such sub-contract are as follows: "The Contractor shall, before taking any sub-contract for its work, in writing, state to the Board the name of such sub-contractor, the portion of the work which such sub-contractor is to do, or the materials which such sub-contractor is to furnish, the place of business of the sub-contractor, and such information as the Board may require to enable it to know whether such sub-contractor is able competently to do the work or provide the materials." (Contract, p. 59).

12. If the Rapid Transit Board had this contract in its possession it would make it public as all of its papers and records of its proceedings have always been and are open to the public.

13, 14 and 15. The Rapid Transit Board has not exacted any security from the sub-contractor; nor is the city in any way concerned with such security except only that the city has taken from its own contractor, Mr. McDonald, an assignment of all the sub-contractor's bonds as additional security to the city for the performance of the Rapid Transit contract. The Board, in behalf of the city, required from the contractor a bond for construction and equipment in the penal sum of \$5,000,000, and also a "continuing bond" in the penal sum of \$1,000,000. The condition of the latter bond is that the contractor shall "faithfully perform all the conditions, covenants and requirements" specified in the contract. The contractor has also deposited with the city the sum of \$1,000,000, which the contract provides shall be security "for the faithful performance by the contractor of all the covenants, conditions and requirements specified and provided for in the agreement for construction." These securities aggregate in amount \$7,000,000. In addition the contract provides that the city shall have a first lien upon the entire equipment of the railroad to be provided by the contractor, such lien to be "further security for the faithful performance by the contractor of the covenants, conditions and agreements" of the Rapid Transit contract. The contractor by such contract has covenanted with the city that the plans and specifications and other provisions of the contract, if the work be done without fault or negligence on the part of the contractor, do not involve any danger to the foundations, walls or other parts of adjacent buildings or structures. And the contractor further covenants that he will at his "own expense make good any damage that shall in the course of construction be done to any such foundations, walls or other parts of adjacent buildings or structures." This provision makes it clear in our opinion that the contractor is bound to make good all harm done to the buildings on Park avenue. The contract further provides that the contractor is bound to complete the entire work upon every section of the road "with the highest

regard to the safety of life and property." The contract further provides that "the sidewalks, curbs, areas and stoops along the line of the work must also be protected from any injury; but should any injury occur to any sidewalk, curb, area or stoop, the contractor shall fully restore the same to as good a condition as existed before the injury was done." The contract further provides that "in case any claim shall be made by any person or corporation against the city for loss or damage to person or property caused by any negligence, fault or default of the contractor, the Comptroller shall, upon the requirement of the Board, deduct from any moneys due or becoming due to the contractor the amount of the claim as security for its payment.

We have no reason to suppose that the contractor or sub-contractor will for a moment fail in willingness or readiness to make good the damage done to the Park avenue proprietors by the recent accident. But if the contractor or sub-contractor shall fail to make good such damage, the provisions of the contract, the securities mentioned above and the moneys which may be withheld by the city from the contractor, in our opinion assure beyond any possible doubt the payment of all proper claims.

16. The Rapid Transit Board has employed a Consulting Engineer. Indeed it has employed successive boards of Consulting Engineers made up of the most distinguished experts in the United States. The general plan of construction of the original Broadway route was submitted to a Board of Experts composed of the following gentlemen: Abram S. Hewitt, Thomas C. Clarke, Charles Sooy Smith, Octave Chanute, and William H. Burr. The details of the plan on the present route are in substance the same as were those of the Broadway route. The report of that Board was completely favorable. Later the present general routes and plan, and also the contract, drawings and specifications, were submitted to another board, consisting of George S. Morison and Howard A. Carson. Their report was completely favorable. When the execution of the work was begun, an engineering staff was appointed by the Rapid Transit Board. At its head is its own Chief Engineer. As his Chief Deputy was appointed George S. Rice. Mr. Rice is an engineer of special experience in tunnel matters. He was on the staff for the City of Boston on the construction of the tunnels for the Sudbury Aqueduct and the tunnels for the main drainage system of that city, aggregating nearly three miles in length. Among the other positions that he has held, he was a mining engineer in Colorado and Arizona for seven years, in charge of extensive mining operations; Deputy Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commission of New York, in which position he had charge of the Aqueduct Tunnel, a tunnel large enough for a train of cars, and thirty miles in length; was Chief Engineer of the First Boston Transit Commission, and Consulting Engineer on the Baltimore Tunnel.

Next in rank to Mr. Rice are the Division Engineers. Of these, the engineer who supervises the construction of the Murray Hill Tunnel is Mr. Albert Carr, who, previous to his engagement by the Rapid Transit Commission, was Deputy Chief Engineer of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and as such had constructed most of the lines of that railway in this city, and especially had charge of the reconstruction of their tunnel under Murray Hill. The other Division Engineers were Mr. Alfred Craven and Mr. Beverly R. Value, both of whom had been in charge of the heavy tunnel work of the Aqueduct Commission; Captain Eugene Klapp, formerly Chief Engineer of the South Side Elevated Railroad of Chicago, and Engineer and General Manager of the National Contracting Company in charge of the drainage work in the City of New Orleans; Mr. Calvin W. Hendrick, formerly City Engineer of the City of Macon, Ga., and other work; and Mr. St. John Clark as Chief Designer, formerly Chief Designer for Milliken Bros., and other firms, and who had charge of the erection of Washington and Macomb's Dam bridges. These gentlemen, in connection with the Chief Engineer, have formed a continuing Board to watch the work for the Rapid Transit Commission. This Board of Engineers was supplemented by a similar board on the part of the General Contractor under the management of Mr. S. L. F. Deyo as Chief Engineer. Mr. Deyo is an engineer of broad experience in heavy railroad construction, having had charge of the rebuilding of the lines of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company. On Mr. Deyo's staff, as Principal Assistant, is General H. T. Douglas, formerly Chief Engineer of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company, and under him a staff of highly competent and experienced Division Engineers corresponding to the Division Engineers of the Rapid Transit Commission.

The property-owners will, therefore, perceive that the statement that the tunnel has been constructed up to this time under the sole responsible charge of the Chief Engineer, is very far from the truth. The Chief Engineer has been and is of necessity in the chief direction of the engineering staff employed by the Board. Upon this staff, under the supervision of the Chief Engineer, the Rapid Transit Board relies for the protection of the interests of the City in the construction of the work.

19. The first cut was made in the rock along the centre line of the tunnel distant over 22 feet from the house lines. After this cut had been made it was then widened gradually toward the house lines, the rock each time being examined as to its condition. As a matter of fact, all of the blasting was in solid rock.

21. The Rapid Transit Board will gladly allow any engineer or engineers of the property-owners or any other representatives of the property-owners or the property-owners themselves or any citizen to examine all or any of its records relating to the portion of the work on Park avenue or any other portion of the work. All of the records of the Rapid Transit Board are and at all times have been public and open to all citizens upon reasonable notice.

The following letter from Mr. August Belmont, President Subway Realty Company, as to easement Forty-second street and Park avenue, was read:

SUBWAY REALTY COMPANY, No. 23 NASSAU STREET,
NEW YORK, April 7, 1902.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, City:

DEAR SIR—In acknowledging receipt of a copy of a resolution adopted by your Board at its meeting on Thursday, March 21, I beg to state that I understand that resolution to carry back the proposed agreement to that expressed by the resolution of your Board, adopted September 27, 1901, which by its terms imported into it the agreement outlined in the opinion of counsel of date July 23, 1901, viz., that \$140,000 be fixed as the price to be paid for the easement; that if within three months from the date of the deed, the City should grant to the Subway Realty Company a license to use for vault and area purposes the space colored red and blue upon the map submitted by Mr. Douglas Robinson with his letter, which is dated July 22, 1901, and printed upon pages 1254-5, upon the minutes of your Board, and should thereafter permit such use, the sum of \$25,000 should be reserved from the contract price above mentioned and should not become payable, unless and until the City should subsequently revoke such license; upon which such sum of \$25,000 should become payable without interest up to that date.

In the proposition, the terms of which are embodied in Mr. Robinson's letter referred to, nothing was said as to the charging of any price by the city for the use of the vault privileges specified. Mr. Robinson, in recommending this arrangement, says:

"The granting of the right to use such space will save the city a considerable sum of money, as I believe the amount usually charged by the city for vault privileges in a corresponding space would be much less than \$25,000."

This would seem to indicate that he assumed, and that your Board understood, that no further fee or charge would be made by the city for the vault privileges proposed to be granted—the \$25,000 above referred to being the compensation to be made to the city for such privilege.

On December 30, 1901, the Highway Department of The City of New York granted to the Subway Realty Company the vault privileges desired under the sidewalk adjacent to the building in question on Forty-first street and in Park avenue, upon the payment of \$15,005, being at the rate of \$1.50 per square foot for Forty-first street and Park avenue, and \$2 per square foot on Forty-second street; such payment being a single total charge and not an annual charge.

The Board of Aldermen by resolution adopted March 11, 1902, approved by the Mayor March 18, granted permission to the Subway Realty Company to construct and maintain vaults as designated in the map accompanying Mr. Douglas Robinson's letter above referred to "on payment of such fee as shall be deemed an adequate compensation by the Sinking Fund Commission, the work to be done at the expense of the Subway Realty Company or its assigns, under the direction of the President

of the Borough of Manhattan, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen."

The matter is now before the Sinking Fund Commission to fix the compensation to be made pursuant to such ordinance, and I am informed that the Comptroller's Engineer proposes to recommend to the Sinking Fund Commissioners that an annual charge of \$4,000 be imposed as a consideration for these privileges. This would be at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum upon \$100,000, and if the vault privileges, which are merely licenses subject to revocation at any time, are worth any such sum, then, of course, the perpetual easement to be granted by the Subway Realty Company to the city for the purposes of the Rapid Transit Railway, the value of which has been fixed by your Board at \$140,000, would be of far greater value. In my view the vault privileges are not worth any such sum, and the imposition of any charge whatever beyond the \$25,000 already proposed to be allowed under agreement with your Board would be unwarranted. The Subway Realty Company would make no objection to the payment of the usual fee charged for vault privileges, of, say, \$2 per square foot as one final payment, and not as an annual installment; but it will vigorously object to the imposition of any such sum as that above suggested. It is, of course, the intention of this company to protest to the Sinking Fund Commissioners against the imposition of any such charge; but I write now to ask the assistance of your Board in having the Sinking Fund Commissioners concur in carrying out the understanding with reference to the conveyance of the easement. Of course, if they should insist upon imposing any such exorbitant charge for the vault privileges as that above referred to, the whole subject of the sale of the easement will have to be reopened.

Letter from the Fire Commissioner, with copy of report of Chief of Fire Department and report of Mr. Parsons on the same, as to cutting of fire alarm cable at Broadway and One Hundred and Third street by workmen of Sub-Contractor William Bradley, were read, as follows:

April 8, 1902.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

SIR—I am in receipt of report from the Chief of Department under date of the 2d instant, a copy of which is herewith inclosed, setting forth the fact that the carelessness of the employees of William Bradley, sub-contractor for building the rapid transit railroad tunnel on Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, in allowing a heavy piece of timber, being placed in position for use as a derrick on the line of the work, Broadway and One Hundred and Third street, to fall upon the Department cable and that caused the severance thereof, with the resultant consequence of placing out of service, for a period of six hours, ten circuits, and 354 alarm boxes connecting 42 engine and hook and ladder companies with the fire alarm telegraph system at the headquarters of this Department.

Repeated instances of carelessness on the part of this same sub-contractor, which have resulted in the temporary derangement of our fire alarm telegraph system, with the liability of serious results in the way of preventing telegraph communication of alarms of fire, have been brought to the attention of your Commission by my predecessor and myself, but the protests of this Department have not proven effectual in preventing recurrence, as is evidenced by this latest incident.

These accidents have been of a character impossible to prevent by any supervision on our part, and the case as above stated is shown to have been caused by the recklessness of common laborers. Another instance has been the complete severing of one of our main cables with an axe, also the work of common laborers; and the third incident was the burning through of one of our cables by a fire lighted by the same class of men to warm their coffee.

It is plainly apparent that nothing but the placing of our lines in an enclosure of their own, entirely distinct from and inaccessible to Mr. Bradley's workmen will give our lines the safety which ordinary prudence and the requirements of the city demand. With this in view, a contract was made last December for the construction of a subway exclusively for the use of our lines throughout the distance covered by William Bradley's contract with your company. The cost of said subway was to be paid in three equal thirds, by Bradley, by Mr. McDonald, and by the Fire Department. The terms of the contract were that it should be constructed immediately. Bradley has entirely failed to comply with the provisions of that contract. It would have been a simple matter to have entirely completed this subway prior to the present time. We should have superintended the transfer of our lines into said subway, and the loss to the Department and the damage to the city which has occurred in the past three months would have been entirely avoided.

I have, therefore, the honor to again request that you urge upon Mr. Bradley the necessity for the completion immediately of his contract with this Department, dated December 24, 1901, "for moving fire alarm electrical conductors underground, from the centre to the east side of Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, and reconnecting the same with other portions of the fire alarm telegraph system of The City of New York," and enforce such requirement with all means in your power, and that meanwhile you will again caution him to see to it that his employees exercise the utmost care in the prosecution of their work, to the end that our fire alarm telegraph system may at all times be in condition to respond to the demands made upon it, and that the consequent risk of loss of life and property, as a result of this temporary derangement, through the carelessness of his employees, may be avoided.

Hon. THOMAS STURGIS, Fire Commissioner:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to report upon the very serious break of Department cable on Broadway at One Hundred and Third street, through the most reckless disregard of Department property by the contractor engaged in excavating for the Rapid Transit tunnel yesterday.

Through carelessness, workmen allowed a heavy piece of timber which was being placed in position for a derrick, to fall upon Department cable, breaking it and thus severing ten circuits connecting 42 engine and hook and ladder companies and 354 alarm boxes for a period of six hours. Engine and hook and ladder companies, however, were kept in communication with Headquarters after the first hour.

Temporary repairs were made at the break as rapidly as possible, and later on, all circuits were put in good working order.

In view of the above, I have the honor to recommend that the construction of the underground tunnel be stopped until such time as the telegraph system of this Department in the above locality be placed in subway underground, in accordance with contract executed December 24, 1901.

In re Damage to Fire Alarm Service.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—As directed by you, I report upon the communication of the Fire Commissioner, under date of April 8, complaining about the condition of the fire alarm service on Broadway.

I have had several communications with the Fire Commissioner on this subject. I took the matter up with Mr. McDonald, and on January 22 he wrote me, stating as follows:

"The new cable is now laid between Sixty-fourth and Seventy-fourth streets, and

if we have good weather it will be finished up to One Hundred and Fourth street in a little over a month from the present time."

The work at present stands as follows:

From Sixty-fourth to Seventy-second street the new cable is in service. From Seventy-second to Seventy-eighth street the blocks are not open, so that the old service is not disturbed. The 2-inch duct for the cable is laid from Seventy-eighth to Ninety-second street, excepting a few pipe lengths at the Eighty-sixth and Ninety-first street crossings. Connections are now being made with the lamp-posts where fire alarm boxes are to be placed. It is planned to complete the connections at Seventy-ninth and Ninety-fourth streets, and the sub-contractor expects to have this section in service in about two weeks, when the old pipe will be taken out and used for the section north of Ninety-fourth street. In other words, the service should be complete as far north as Ninety-fourth street in two weeks, and at the present rate I should say it will take another month to complete the system to the end of Bradley's work.

From the above you will see that it is nearly three months since Mr. McDonald wrote, and at the present rate another month is still required. In my judgment Bradley should be ordered to take this work up with both a night and a day force, and a new line should be laid complete from Seventy-fourth to One Hundred and Fourth street without waiting for the old material to be transferred.

McDonald, on or before the 30th day of this month (April, 1902) to complete the moving of the fire alarm electrical conductors underground from the centre to the east side of Broadway, between Sixty-fourth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, and reconnecting the same with other portions of the fire alarm telegraph system of The City of New York, and in case the Contractor shall not forthwith conform to such requirement the President is authorized to take proceedings against the Contractor for violation of contract.

The Chief Engineer reported that the Committee of Park avenue property-owners had selected Mr. V. G. Bogue, formerly with the Union Pacific Railroad and the Oregon Short Line; Professor Kemp, of Columbia University, and Mr. Albert L. Webster, a sanitary engineer, to represent the committee in the matter, and that a conference had been had in Mr. Parson's office, at which Mr. Theodore Cooper had also been present, at which a report had been agreed upon, as follows:

NEW YORK, April 10, 1902.

At a meeting of Messrs. Bogue and Webster, Engineers named by the Committee of certain Park avenue property-owners, and Messrs. Cooper, Parsons and Rice, Engineers named by the Rapid Transit Commission, it was agreed, after discussion, as follows:

West Tunnel.

In our opinion work can safely be resumed in the west tunnel under Park avenue by beginning the blasting only at the north and south end of the unfinished portions of the roof lying between Thirty-seventh and Fortieth streets. Moderate charges to be used throughout, especially moderate at the north end for the first 50 feet, and as long as and whenever there is any indication of defective rock. The Rapid Transit Commission to make, in advance of the excavation, diamond drill borings from the surface to within at least 6 feet of the neat line at the tunnel, provided the rock is sound, or deeper, if necessary, to show how much old rock there is above the neat line of the tunnel. Holes to be placed 75 feet apart, and as near as practicable following the centre line of the tunnel. The masonry lining and arching to be kept as close as possible to the face of each excavation.

East Tunnel.

No blasting to be done between Station 164 plus 50, near Thirty-seventh street, and Station 170, about 40 feet north of Thirty-ninth street, until the arching is completed up to the bench at the north end. At least one diamond drill hole to be driven north of Thirty-eighth street on the east side from the surface outside of the neat line of the tunnel, and in addition ten drill holes to be driven on each side from the top of the bench, between Stations 168 and 170, diagonally outward to the sub-grade, to determine the character of the rock. Before the work is allowed to proceed, if there are indications of bad rock, extra holes are to be put in to determine the quality of the rock. If this investigation indicates sufficient rock of suitable quality, the work of removing the same south to the centre line of Thirty-eighth street may proceed under the conditions and with the same precautions as indicated above for the west tunnel. The whole of the section of the east tunnel from which the roof has not yet been removed to be thoroughly timbered and braced during the progress of the work. Further consideration of the section between Stations 164 plus 50 and the centre line of Thirty-eighth street shall be postponed until the investigations as to the character of the rock shall be completed.

We reserve the right from time to time to make further suggestions, should the character of the work indicate such necessity. If the test borings or progress of the work at any point indicate defective rock of importance, such facts will be reported to us. All the work to be done under the direct supervision of a competent inspector.

Mr. Parsons called attention to the fact that no action had ever been taken by the Board in the matter of the proposed third track in The Bronx Borough.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That this Board hereby makes the following appointments to the staff of its Chief Engineer:

Affidavits were presented signed by William Stonebridge, John F. Dennerlein and Patrick Toher to the effect that said street was in use for twenty years. ARGUMENT.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH, MEDICAL SOCIETY OF THE COUNTY OF KINGS.

Indorsed by Brooklyn Medical Society; Kings County Medical Association; Long Island Medical Society; Homeopathic Society of Kings County; Associated Physicians of Long Island.

It is the consensus of opinion among sanitarians throughout the world that certain diseases, among which may be mentioned cholera, typhoid fever and certain forms of dysentery, are disseminated solely by means of contaminated food and drink. The manner of such contamination is the introduction of the discharges from patients suffering from these diseases. It is obvious that if the sewage of a community can gain access to a water supply, the discharges from patients suffering from typhoid fever in that community can also gain access to the water supply. A pure water supply is probably the greatest of all municipal necessities. Up to the year 1891 large cities, both here and abroad, continued to drink raw surface and river water because it was handy, cheap, and they were indifferent to its dangers. In 1892 there appeared an epidemic of cholera in Hamburg, which used the unfiltered water of the Elbe. This outbreak caused the death of 8,605 persons and did incalculable damage to the business interests of the city. The health authorities found the cause to be the polluted water supply. Filters were built and the plant was in operation in 1893. The death rate since the introduction of the filtered water has been lower than ever before in the history of the city. Now no city in the German empire is allowed to use surface or river water without filtration.

In Plymouth, Pa., in 1885, there were 1,104 cases of typhoid fever and 114 deaths in a population of 8,000, as the result of the discharge of the dejecta from a single patient into the water of a relatively small impounding reservoir. The cost of this epidemic was calculated with unusual care. The care of the sick cost in cash \$67,100.17, and the loss of wages for those who recovered amounted to \$30,020.08. The 114 persons who died were earning, before their sickness at the rate of \$18,419.52 annually.

The conditions which obtain on the Hempstead section of Brooklyn's watershed are absolutely certain to lead to its pollution. We are restricted by law to seek our supply from the most densely populated portion of the Long Island watershed. The principal feeder of the Hempstead reservoir, known as Horse Brook, starts north of the village of Hempstead, passes, uncovered, through that town and its suburbs, and, after being reinforced by numerous springs, reaches the reservoir. Hempstead is a village of 4,800 population, and Horse Brook, running through the most closely built and poorest section of the town, is lined on either side with houses whose outhouses are in many instances within fifty feet of the stream. Under these conditions, no amount of patrol or vigilance can prevent the pollution of the stream. In 1897 the Brooklyn Health Department removed two cases of typhoid fever from these houses to Brooklyn and treated them at the city expense rather than have them in such close proximity to the stream. If we cannot keep undesirable elements out of the water, the only alternative is to remove them before the water reaches the consumer, and to this end we wish to appeal to you in behalf of the Commissioner. Sand filtration as a means of water purification is no longer an experiment. As practiced both here and in Europe it removes promptly and certainly a very large proportion of the bacteria, probably under all proper conditions, over 99 per cent. The places using filtered water have, in general, extremely low death rates from water-borne diseases. As a concluding argument, we think we are

safe in the statement that sand filtration gives the maximum of efficiency with the minimum of cost.

MY DEAR MR. GROUT—Although the matter I have to mention refers to another Department, I think you will pardon my suggestion in view of its great interest to the one I represent. Commissioner Dougherty has included in his estimate an application for one hundred thousand dollars, I believe, for new hydrants for the city. This is a step greatly needed. New York is using, to a great extent, hydrants which were put in many years ago, and of a pattern now considered obsolete, while prominent cities around us which have been equipped more recently have those of a modern design. The proportion of our hydrants referred to are liable to constant freezing during the winter season, and a great deal of labor and expense of fuel, etc., is imposed upon the Fire Department by the necessity of thawing them out at short intervals throughout the entire winter. It is also a frequent occurrence that our men arrive at a hydrant on a winter's night to find that the same has frozen up since it was thawed during the daytime. The gradual installation of non-freezing hydrants is a pressing want of this Department, and I would earnestly ask that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will give as favorable consideration as possible to the above application of Commissioner Dougherty.

C., dated April 19, 1902, requesting information regarding the mode of securing a residence for voting purposes by himself (about to become of age) in New York City, where he resided before he left the city temporarily to engage in business elsewhere. Answered and filed. From H. C. Hagedorn, Cashier, Staten Island Savings Bank, dated April 18, 1902, reporting that the House Committee of the bank had consented to accept \$25 per month rent for the branch borough offices in their building, including an ad-

ditional room for storage of records, etc; also the janitor's charges for cleaning, and were willing to enter on a three years' lease of the premises at said rate.

The President thereupon offered the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Elections of The City of New York lease from the Staten Island Savings Bank, through the proper authorities, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, for the uses and purposes of a branch office in the Borough of Richmond, as provided for and authorized by chapter 95, section 11, sub-division 2, paragraph 1, Laws of 1901, for a term of three years from May 1, 1902, at a rental of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly, room No. 6, situate on the third floor of the Savings Bank building, corner of Beach and Water streets, Stapleton, Staten Island, said room being in size about eighteen feet wide and twenty-seven feet long and fronting on Water street, and also (for the storage of records, etc.) a room situate on the attic floor of said building (known as the tank room), being about twelve feet wide and fifteen feet deep and fronting on Beach street—the lessor to furnish all necessary light, heat, water, toilet and janitor service at his cost and expense, and keep the said rooms and appurtenances at all times in a cleanly and tenantable condition for the comfortable use and occupancy thereof by the lessee and its employees.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York be and hereby are requested to approve of the leasing of said premises for the purposes and on the terms and conditions above stated.

The following bill was approved and ordered to be forwarded to the Finance Department, viz.:

From Edward A. Dubey, of Brooklyn, dated April 2, 1902, for staining shelving and desks, varnishing floor of Room No. 408, lettering doors and windows, and painting, gilding and varnishing safe in rooms occupied by the Branch Office, Borough of Brooklyn, at No. 42 Court street, \$97.20.

On motion of the President, Mr. Max Lang was duly appointed Clerk of the Board, at a compensation at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, and assigned to the Branch Office, Borough of The Bronx, in the place of William Fox, resigned.

Messrs. Louis L. Jones, of No. 156 Broadway, Manhattan, and Albert Snoeck, of No. 245 Sixth avenue, Brooklyn, appeared before the Board informally and presented a pamphlet setting forth the requirements of a voting machine and also making comparisons between the way in which several voting machines already on the market had failed to meet the same, and the manner in which Mr. Snoeck's voting machine had been devised so as to fully comply with all the requirements that could be made, and invited the members of the Board to inspect a model of said machine now on exhibition at No. 47 Barclay street, New York City.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY given that the Committee on Buildings of the Board of Aldermen will hold a public hearing in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, Manhattan, on May 9, 1902, to consider and discuss the following proposed ordinances, viz.:

At 1 O'clock P. M.—An ordinance to compel owners or lessees of buildings to affix numbers to the buildings owned or leased by them, the numbers to be at least two inches high, on a plate located to the right of the entrance, where practicable, and to be readily discernable night and day, etc.

At 2 O'clock P. M.—An ordinance to provide for the issuing of permits for the erection of Bay Windows, Show Windows, Oriol Windows, etc., requiring the payment of a fee for the privilege of erecting same, at the rate of two dollars (\$2.00) per square foot, per floor, for the Borough of Manhattan, one and one-half dollars (\$1.50) for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, and one dollar (\$1.00) for the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens. Also restricting the projections in certain portions of the City, and requiring the consent of adjoining property owners before a permit shall be issued, etc.

At 3 O'clock P. M.—An ordinance to amend Section 96 of the Building Code in regard to the enclosing walls of elevator shafts, allowing the use of fire-proof partitions in all non-fireproof buildings in place of brick walls, except in non-fireproof warehouses and factories over five stories high.
