BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

The City of New York, December 8, 1902.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 11.30 o'clock a. m. at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Copies of the minutes of the meeting held November 3, 1902, were presented to the Board by the Secretary, and they were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Communications were received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund transmitting resolutions of concurrence as follows: (1) Authorizing the payment of three months' rent of premises Nos. 334-340 West Forty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, occupied by the First Battery; (2) Authorizing the lease of premises No. 255 Sixth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for the Second Naval Battalion; (3) Authorizing the Comptroller to pay the bill of the D. & M. Chauncey Real Estate Company for appraising thirty-six lots on Bedford avenue, and of date November 29, 1902, concurring in the resolution adopted by the Armory Board on November 26, requesting the Comptroller to pay to Captain Wilson the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), being the amount of rentals paid by him.

Ordered filed.

The Secretary reported that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have suggested an amendment to the following resolution of the Armory Board, and have transmitted the same for the consideration of the Board, as follows:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held November 3, 1902, authorizing and requesting the Comptroller to pay from the appropriation in the Budget for the year 1902, for rents of armories, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), as per bills of disbursements by Captain Wilson, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and requested to pay from the appropriation for the year 1902, entitled "Rents," the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), as per bills of disbursements by Captain Wilson hereto attached, for rent of premises at Nos. 455 Fourth avenue, Borough of Manhattan, and East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, near Washington avenue, Borough of The Bronx, occupied by the Second Battery, N. G. N. Y., extending from February 22, 1902, to October 20, 1902, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to concur in the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Communications were received from the Deputy Comptroller, of date November 10, 1902, transmitting the claim of J. L. Moriarty & Co. for \$169.03, due to them for materials furnished and work done for the Armory Board, and of date November 10, 1902, transmitting the claim of Charles Wall for the sum of \$590.37 and asking for such information as the Armory Board can give concerning such claims.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to reply to the communications from the Comptroller and furnish any information in regard to the claims in the possession of the Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application and affidavit from Solomon Bassel for payment in full for his contract for material and labor required for repairs and alterations to the armory of the Twelfth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Manhattan, which were duly certified by the Inspector and by the Colonel of the organization.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Solomon Bassel, contractor, the sum of six hundred and fifty dollars (\$650), in full for his contract for material and labor required in the completion of the repairs and alterations to the armory of the Twelfth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application and affidavit from Ambrose E. Barnes & Brother for payment in full for their contract for material and labor required for repairs and alterations to the armory of the Forty-seventh Regiment, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn, which were duly certified by the Inspector.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Ambrose E. Barnes & Brother, contractors, the sum of five hundred and seventy-four dollars (\$574), in full for their contract for material and labor required in the completion of the repairs and alterations to the armory of the Forty-seventh Regiment, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from Colonel Dyer, commanding the Twelfth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., of date November 3, 1902, making requisition on the Armory Board for an addition to the armory building of his organization.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories in Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from the Associate Superintendent of the Board of Education, asking the consideration of the Board for the use of space in the armory of the Forty-seventh Regiment, in the Borough of Brooklyn, at Marcy avenue and Heyward street, as a public school.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories in Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary reported that the architects invited to compete with designs for the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, had acknowledged and accepted the appointment, with the exception of Schickel & Ditmars, who had declined, and that by the direction of the Chairman and members of the Board Messrs. Israels & Harder were notified of their appointment, and their acceptance had been received.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the action of the members of the Board in appointing Messrs. Israels & Harder to the scheme of competition for a plan for an armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is hereby approved.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary reported the receipt of a continuance of a lien filed against Luke A. Burke, contractor, for the First Battery Armory, made by the Rock Plaster Company of New York and New Jersey.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

A communication was received from Captain John F. Klein, of the Seventeenth Sparate Company, in the Borough of Queens, making requisition for a new and suitable armory for his organization.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary reported that in accordance with the provisions of resolution adopted at the last meeting of this Board the certificate on the bills for repairs and supplies to armories has been amended so as to read: "I hereby certify that the materials and services enumerated in this bill have been properly delivered and rendered, and that the bill is a reasonable and proper one and is hereby approved."

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented a communication from the Corporation Counsel, of date November 12, 1902, stating that the Commissioners of Estimate appointed by the Court in the matter of acquiring a site for an armory for Troop "C" on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union street, fixed the value at \$56,000; that the property owners objected to this award as too low, and that the City objected to it as too high. Application was made to the Court to discontinue the proceedings, and that this application has just been granted. He also presented a communication from the Cooper Company, owners of said site, of date December 1, 1902, offering to sell to The City of New York, for armory purposes, the plot of ground situated in the Borough of Brooklyn, on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, bounded by President and Union streets, and running along the north side of President street about 380 feet, and running along the south side of Union street about 280 feet, for the sum of forty-three thousand five hundred dollars (\$43,500), said sum to include the expenses heretofore incurred and payable said company on account of the condemnation proceedings already had in reference to said property.

The Committee appointed by the Armory Board on this site reported verbally in favor of accepting this offer and of the selection and purchase of this site, and the Mayor offered the following:

Whereas, The plot of land on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, has been selected by the Armory Board as a site for the proposed armory for Troop "C"; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have concurred in the acquisition of said site by a resolution adopted November 20, 1901; and

Whereas, The amount awarded by the Commissioners of Estimate appointed in condemnation proceedings, namely, \$56,000, was considered by this Board excessive and the proceedings were abandoned, in accordance with a resolution adopted at a meeting held August 14, 1902; and

Whereas, The Committee on Armory Sites have made a re-examination and believe \$43,500 to be a reasonable price, including the expenses heretofore incurred in condemnation proceedings, and have received an offer from the Cooper Company to sell this plot at \$43,500, including such expense, they do hereby recommend its purchase at that price; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby recommend the acquisition by purchase of the plot on the easterly side of Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, heretofore selected by this Board and surveyed as a site for an armory for Troop "C," N. G. N. Y., in accordance with the terms of sale now offered by the owners, the Cooper Company, under date of December 1, 1902, amount \$43,500, including the expenses heretofore incurred and payable to said Company, on account of the condemnation proceedings already had, and does hereby request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to purchase said site, in accordance with the provisions of section 135 of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to concur in this resolution and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment therefor.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from R. I. Brown's Sons, No. 3428 Third avenue, of date November 29, 1902, offering for sale certain lots shown on an accompanying map, located between Third avenue and Lafontaine avenue, north of One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, for an armory site.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from Brownell & Patterson, No. 71 Wall street, of date November 13, 1902, offering for sale to the Armory Board a plot extending from Canal place to Park avenue and 241 feet 3 inches from One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Secretary presented an application for payment to Luke A. Burke, contractor on account of his contract for materials and work in the erection and completion of the First Battery Armory, on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Luke A. Burke, contractor, the sum of \$4,200, as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for materials and work required in the erection and completion of the armory building for the First Battery, N. G. N. Y., on the southerly side of Sixty-sixth street, 150 feet east of Columbus avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented an application for a payment to William Werner, for repairs and alterations to the armory of the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. N. Y. Which was referred to the Committee on Armories in Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from Dean Emery, of date December 4, 1902, relative to a proposed armory site, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories in Manhattan and The Bronx.

The selection of the armory site for the Second Battery, N. G. N. Y., was called up, and in the absence of a Committee report it was laid over.

A communication was received from the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for the Borough of Brooklyn, of date December 6, 1902, addressed to the Armory Board, and transmitting a communication from the Assistant Engineer in Charge of Lighting in the Borough of Brooklyn, suggesting a better scheme of lighting the armory of the Thirteenth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

Messrs. Clinton & Russell presented a communication, transmitting plans for the proposed new Seventy-First Regiment armory, to be erected at Thirty-fourth street and Park avenue, with an estimate of the cost of the building.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

Colonel Jarvis, commanding the Eighth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., appeared before the Board and renewed his request for an armory in the Borough of The Bronx, stating that the prosperity of the organization was, in a measure, dependent upon such a move.

The Mayor suggested that the Armory Board should go into Committee to consider the plans of the proposed Seventy-first Regiment Armory, now before the Board.

A motion to adjourn was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, Acting Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, presented a written report recommending

1st. That the names of all persons employed in Bellevue Hospital be placed upon one roll, and that the roll now known as the "Central Office" roll be dispensed with.

2d. Reporting upon the condition of the wards, linen room and grounds of Bellevue Hospital.

3d. Reporting upon the unwillingness of Magistrates to commit in cases of intoxication.

Moved, seconded and carried that a circular letter to Magistrates upon this subject be prepared.

4th. Calling attention to the condition of the interior telephone service in Bellevue Hospital, and recommending that every ward in the hospital be connected by telephone, and that a new switchboard be provided at the earliest possible date.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Board of Trustees approve of this recommendation of the Acting Superintendent and request him to proceed in having the improvements made.

5th. Enclosing recommendations from Mr. Samuel Jones, Supervising Engineer, that a new galvanized iron tank be put in the cellar under the medical bath room, and that the floor of the bookkeeper's office be lowered so as to have at least 2 feet 6 inches head room.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Acting Superintendent be instructed to obtain estimates on the cost of carrying out these recommendations.

6th. Calling attention to the delay in getting ambulance calls to Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham Hospitals and recommending that the Police Department be requested to erect a separate and distinct line for these hospitals.

Moved, seconded and carried that action be taken in accordance with the request of the Acting Superintendent.

7th. Making certain recommendations in regard to salaries at Bellevue Hospital.

Moved, seconded and carried that these be referred to the President with power.

8th. Recommending the purchase of five chandeliers for the Emergency Hospital.

Moved, seconded and carried that the above recommendation be approved.

9th. Approving of an increase in the salary of William J. Culleton, Clerk at Harlem Hospital, from \$300 to \$480 per annum.

Moved, seconded and carried that the same receive the approval of the Board of Trustees.

10th. Indorsing the request of Miss Jessie A. Stowers, Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital, that a telephone be placed in the operating room of that institution.

Resolved that this request be granted.

11th. Calling attention to the soot from the electric light works in East Twenty-eighth street.

Moved, seconded and carried that a letter be written by the President of this Board to the Board of Health requesting them to take action in the matter.

12th. Transmitting a complaint of the doctors concerning the work going on in the amphitheatre while classes are in progress.

Moved, seconded and carried that the Acting Superintendent be informed that the work of the contractors must not be interfered with, but that they be requested to make as little noise as possible during the hours in which classes are going on.

Communications.

In response to a communication concerning telephone service in Bellevue Hospital, it was moved, seconded and carried that a letter be written to the Comptroller recommending that the private telephone in the apartments of the Superintendent be discontinued after this year.

A communication inclosing minutes of the meeting of Wednesday, November 12, 1902, was received from the Committee of Inspection of Bellevue Hospital.

Moved, seconded and carried that the same be placed on file.

A letter was received from Messrs. Renwick, Aspinwall & Owen protesting against the action of the Board in holding them responsible for deficiencies in the work on the staircase.

On motion the matter was left in the hands of the Secretary.

A communication was received from Messrs. Renwick, Aspinwall & Owen, architects, inclosing specifications, together with an estimate from Williams & Gerstle, the contractors having in charge work on the elevator shafts at Bellevue Hospital, announcing that the Building Department requires the extension of the elevator shaft through the roof of the main building. The architects recommended that \$836, the amount of the estimate submitted by Williams & Gerstle, be accepted by the Board, the same being in their opinion a reasonable estimate.

Moved, seconded and carried that the proposal of Williams & Gerstle to extend the elevator shaft through the roof of the main building as per instructions of the Building Department be and hereby is accepted.

A communication was received from William Paul Gerhard, Sanitary Engineer, inclosing a preliminary report upon the present condition of the plumbing at Bellevue.

A communication from Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, architects of the new Harlem Hospital, was received and ordered referred to the Committee on Buildings.

A communication from the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital, inclosing minutes of the meeting held on December 1, 1902, was received, approved and ordered placed on file.

A communication from Renwick, Aspinwall & Owen, architects, relating to the specifications for alterations in the Emergency Hospital, and submitting proposal of Williams & Gerstle, to effect the same, was received, and on motion it was resolved that the same be approved.

Another communication from Messrs. Renwick, Aspinwall & Owen, relating to the work on the elevator shaft, was received, and it was moved, seconded and carried that the secretary write a letter urging them to push the work with all possible speed.

A circular letter from J. W. Stevenson, Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, asking what issues of corporate stock would be required by this Board during the coming year, was received.

Moved, seconded and carried that action be deferred for the present.

A communication from the Honorable Homer Folks, Commissioner of Public Charities, recommending that the Chemist of the General Drug Department be given authority to make inspection of the drugs belonging to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, was received, and on motion it was

Resolved, That—the consent of the Commissioner of Charities having been given thereto—the Chemist of the Department of Public Charities be and he hereby is designated as consulting chemist of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals without salary; his duties being to make chemical analysis of samples of drugs, food and other supplies when so requested by the Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and to submit to him a report thereon, and to inspect, once a quarter, the various drug stores and places where drugs are distributed or kept in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and to submit to this Board a report as to their condition and needs.

A letter from N. Taylor Phillips, Secretary of the Sinking Fund Commission, inclosing copy of a resolution extending the lease of the premises No. 518 East One Hundred and Twentieth street to a period of eighteen months from November 1, 1902, was received and ordered placed on file.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that the Committee on Street Cleaning of the Board of Aldermen will hold a public hearing in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, on Thursday, January 8, 1903, at 2 o'clock p. m., on the subject matter of the following resolution:

Whereas, The kinds and quantities of ashes, refuse and trade wastes accumulating in the City are such as to be beyond the authority of the Department of Street Cleaning to dispose of under the law governing that Department and the appropriation made to it for carrying on this work; and,

Whereas, Those who pay taxes ought, to the fullest extent possible and practicable, be relieved from the embarrassments thus occasioned; therefore,

Resolved, That our Committee on Street Cleaning be and it is hereby requested to confer with the Department of Street Cleaning in relation thereto; to make a thorough examination of the law and practice governing the removal of refuse, and to hold public hearings for

the purpose of receiving suggestions, etc., pertaining to this matter.

Resolved, That said Committee shall, after such investigation, prepare a suitable ordinance; or, if necessary, an appropriate bill for introduction in the Legislature as will tend, if adopted, to bring needed relief to the greatest possible extent.

Resolved, That in the preparation of such ordinance or legislative bill the Committee shall take into careful consideration the advisability of requiring adequate compensation to The City of New York, through the Department of Street Cleaning, for receiving and disposing of such ashes and trade wastes as are not required to be made under the present provisions of the Charter (section 534) relative to the subject.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
