DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1906.

Statement of Work Performed by the Department of Parks of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, During the Three Months from April 1 to June 30, 1906.

During the quarter beginning April 1 and ending June 30 an unusually large amount of work was done. Over two thousand shade trees were purchased and planted. This work comprised portions of Prospect, Bushwick, Winthrop, City, Bedford, Linton and Fort Greene parks. Preparatory to the planting tree holes were excavated and filled

with topsoil, and the lawns and plantations where the soil had become exhausted were recovered with good rich topsoil. The Rocky Pass, in Prospect Park, was entirely reconstructed, covered with topsoil and planted with over seventeen hundred shrubs. The rose garden and the flower garden were likewise greatly improved, over twelve hundred cubic yards of rich soil having been spread in these two places, and a large number of new rose bushes, evergreens and shrubs planted. The floral display in both gardens was exceptionally fine and greatly admired.

Work along the lake front where portions of the bank had collapsed was continued, and the restoration of the shoreline is progressing in a satisfactory manner.

Repairs were made to the roadways where necessary, and the work of resurfacing large portions of the park drives with Hudson river gravel was begun and is being pushed as rapidly as conditions will permit.

About eighty thousand square feet of sods were purchased and laid during the quarter just past.

A large force of men was organized to improve the condition of the park trees. The same were pruned, cleaned and freed from insects wherever encountered. Over one hundred large forest trees which died during the last two severe winters were cut down and made into cord wood.

The cycle paths on the lower end of the Ocean parkway, between Coney Island creek and the Ocean have in the course of years settled in some places almost two feet below the established grade. Work was begun in May to restore the original grade. Over two thousand cubic yards of topsoil were delivered and spread, and the borders of the roads and cycle paths were sodded. This work is now in condition for planting next fall or the coming spring, when it is expected that four hundred shade trees will be set out.

All the parkways and roads under the jurisdiction of this Department were carefully looked after and overhauled; repairs were made wherever necessary, the gutters were cleaned, the weeds cut and the roadways kept in a clean and well sprinkled condition at all times.

Highland and Sunset parks, two parks of considerable size, as yet unfinished, were well taken care of. The flower garden in the former received numerous additions of new healthy plants, and the floral display was enjoyed by a great throng of visitors.

All the smaller parks were carefully attended to. The trees and shrubbery were looked after, considerable amounts of sodding and seeding were done, and the parks kept in attractive condition.

The new nursery in Forest Park begun last year was practically completed during the quarter just closed. About three thousand young and vigorous trees were purchased and planted. Some four thousand flowering shrubs were set out to be used later in the various parks of the system. Over sixty thousand plants were taken from the green-houses and set out in the different parks and public places. The roadways were rolled, cleaned and otherwise put in first class condition. The golf grounds were carefully looked after, the grass cut, the greens rolled and watered and the course is now in excellent condition.

A special appropriation of twenty thousand dollars having been granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the care and preservation of the street trees, the work was started and has progressed in a very satisfactory manner. A force of men under the supervision of a trained arboriculturist was set to work in each of the boroughs looking after complaints regarding trees. Several hundred applications to have trees pruned and sprayed have been attended to.

The work of spraying to guard against the ravages of insects was started early in June, and is still being carried on with vigor. A new spraying apparatus was purchased and is being used with much success.

A contract was let for the laying of a cement sidewalk on Prospect Park West, from Fifth to Fifteenth street, at a cost of four thousand three hundred and eight dollars and twelve cents (\$4,308.12). This work has been begun, and it is expected that same will be completed by August 1, 1906.

The shelter houses lately constructed at Fort Greene, Irving square, Bushwick and Cooper parks have been accepted and opened to the public.

The boathouse in Prospect Park, the athletic building on the Parade Ground, and the golf house at Forest Park are practically completed, except the interior furnishing, such as lockers, etc., a contract for which has been let. This work should be finished by September 1, and the building thrown open to the public.

A contract has been awarded for an approach to the new boathouse. This work, now under way, is to be finished early in the fall.

Music.

Sunday, June 3, the opening concert of the season was given by the United German Singers, assisted by the Twenty-third Regiment Band. This concert was attended by thirty-five thousand people. Concerts will continue in Prospect Park on Saturdays and Sundays during the summer months, and the concerts in the smaller parks will begin on July 1, 1906, and be given during the season.

Revenue from Parks and Parkways.

During the three months from April 1 to June 30, 1906, inclusive, the sum of six thousand one hundred and thirty-seven dollars and thirty-nine cents (\$6,137.39) was received from rents of houses and revenue from park privileges and bay windows, which amount was turned over to the Hon. Patrick Keenan, City Chamberlain, for deposit to the credit of the Revenue Fund.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application to the office of the President, Board or Department, at which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be obtained there.
