MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held at the Commission's Offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, January 16, 1907, at 10 a. m.

Present—President William F. Baker and Commissioners R. Ross Appleton and Alfred J. Talley.

The President, Mr. William F. Baker, presided.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Labor Class by striking from Part I. the title "Marine Stoker," and including the same in Part II. There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the Competitive Class, Part I., Group 11, by including therein, under the heading "Examiners," the title "Examiner of Sewer Claims." There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of Civil Service Rule XII., by changing clause 4 to read as follows:

"Where there is a vacancy of an emergency character in a position in the competitive class, and it is not practicable either to secure a person by certification from an eligible list or to conduct a non-competitive examination in the absence of such a list in time to meet such emergency, an appointment may be made without certification or examination, subject to the subsequent approval of the Commission, for a period not exceeding fifteen days; but successive appointments shall not be made under this provision."

There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of Civil Service Rule XV., by changing clause 12 to read as follows:

"Any person in the competitive service who shall have passed an examination for either appointment or promotion covering in its scope a higher grade or compensation than that of the position he holds, providing there are less than two other persons in the same grade, and if not otherwise disqualified, shall be eligible for promotion or advancement to such higher grade or compensation without further examination under this rule; and further, if any such person has obtained his original appointment as the result of an open competitive examination, and has been regularly appointed pursuant to the rules in force at the time, and shall have served continuously in the position held by him (or her) for not less than five years, and has, through promotion or otherwise, obtained a compensation of or higher than that fixed by these rules for the fifth grade, and providing further that there are less than two other persons in the same grade, shall be eligible for promotion or advancement to such higher grade or compensation without further examination under these rules."

Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, stated that the first half of the new paragraph met with the approval of his association, but that it was not certain that the second half, beginning with the words "and further, if any such person has obtained his original appointment as the result of an open com-

petitive examination," etc., was legal; and requested that the adoption of the second half of the amendment be laid over until after the revision of salaries and grades in the City government by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the suggestions of the special committee appointed by that Board for such purpose. The hearing then closed.

The public hearing which had been advertised on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Competitive Class, Part I., Group 11, by striking therefrom the title "Assistant Fire Marshal," and including the same in Part IV., Grade 3, thereof, was postponed until Tuesday, January 22, 1907, at 10 a. m., in order to give the Fire Commissioner an opportunity to appear before the Commission and express his opinion in the matter.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading, "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction," etc., by including therein the title "Egg Candler." There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meeting held January 9 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Labor Class, as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by striking from Part I. the title "Marine Stoker," and including the same in Part II.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Competitive Class, Part I., Group 11, as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by including therein under the heading "Examiners," the following:

"Examiner of Sewer Claims."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Municipal Civil Service Rule XII., as prescribed and adopted December 4, 1903, be and the same hereby is amended by changing clause 4 to read as follows:

"Where there is a vacancy of an emergency character in a position in the competitive class, and it is not practicable either to secure a person by certification from an eligible list or to conduct a non-competitive examination in the absence of such a list in time to meet such emergency, an appointment may be made without certification or examination, subject to the subsequent approval of the Commission, for a period not exceeding fifteen days; but successive appointments shall not be made under this provision."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Municipal Civil Service Rule XV., as prescribed and adopted December 4, 1903, be and the same hereby is amended by changing paragraph 12 to read as follows:

"Any person in the competitive service who shall have passed an examination for either appointment or promotion covering in its scope a higher grade or compensation than that of the position he holds, providing there are less than two other persons in the same grade, and if not otherwise disqualified, shall be eligible for promotion or advancement to such higher grade or compensation without further examination under this rule."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the non-competitive class, as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by including therein under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the New York and Brooklyn Truant Schools, and the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training Schools," the following:

"Egg Candler."

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following transfers be approved:

(75) John A. Hartnedy, from the position of Clerk (third grade), Tenement House Department, to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

(80) Louis A. Zimmerman, from the position of Court Stenographer (\$2,000 per annum) in the City Magistrates' Court, First Division, to a similar position in the Municipal Court, Fourteenth District, Borough of Manhattan. (Certificate issued as of January 9, 1907.)

(83) Francis J. Norton, from the position of Clerk (first grade) in the Department of Education to a similar position in the Department of Street Cleaning.

(87) William A. Meehan, from the position of Clerk (fourth grade) in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to a similar position in the Department of Finance.

(88) Benjamin Leff, from the position of Clerk (third grade) in the Tenement House Department to a similar position in the Department of Finance.

(91) Harry S. Arnold, from the position of Inspector of Electric Lighting and Conductors in the Department of Bridges to a similar position in the Board of Education.

(93) Carlton J. Barnes, from the position of Court Stenographer (\$2,000 per annum) in the City Magistrates' Court, First Division, to a similar position in the Municipal Court, Eleventh District, Borough of Manhattan.

(94) Thomas J. Gowan, from the position of Clerk (first grade) to that of Financial Clerk (second grade), in the Department of Finance, his name appearing third on the eligible list for the latter position.

(97) Jeremiah F. Sullivan, from the position of Clerk (third grade) in the Tenement House Department to a similar position in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn.

(100) James P. Hynes, from the position of Rodman in the Board of Water Supply to a similar position in the Bureau of Public Works, office of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

And that the following transfer be disapproved:

Archer W. Jagger, M. D., from the position of Medical Inspector in the Department of Health, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, to that of Coroner's Physician in the office of the Coroners of the Borough of Queens, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 10, in regard to the application of James Cummings for the position of Court Attendant (1772). It appeared that on account of an irregularity in the application the candidate was summoned to the office of the Commission to make a correction, when it was found that the application was not made out in his own handwriting as required by the rules; that when charged with having made a misstatement in that regard he denied the same, whereupon the application was rejected by the Chief Examiner. The action of the Chief Examiner was sustained.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 11, with reference to the letter of James F. Connor, a candidate for Inspector of Foods (Milk). It appeared that the candidate was permitted by a monitor to leave the examination without having received a paper on Report, and that he therefore requested permission to complete his examination. In view of the fact that the candidate's failure to complete his examination was due to an error on the part of an employee of the Commission, on the recommendation of the Chief Examiner it was ordered that the candidate be granted a special examination on the subject of Report only.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 10, with reference to the communication from Deputy Comptroller N. Taylor Phillips concerning the claim filed by Mr. H. C. Jordan for services rendered in October, 1903, in rating examination papers for the position of Tabulator. The Chief Examiner stated that his records showed that Mr. Jordan was engaged on that examination; that there was no record in the office of any payment having been made to him, however, and that it was probable that no account was rendered until after the 31st of December, 1903, when the appropriation for that year had been exhausted. The Secretary was directed to communicate the facts to the Deputy Comptroller.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner, dated January 10, returning the amended record of Captain McGlynn, forwarded by Police Commissioner Bingham, to be substituted for the original record furnished by him in the examination for Inspector. In view of the statement of the Assistant Chief Examiner that the candidate had already received credit for the commendation referred to in the amended record, the Secretary was directed to return the same to the Police Commissioner with a statement of the facts.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner, dated January 11, stating that on September 12, the date of the Patrolman's examination at the Grand Central Palace, Candidate No. 48 was permitted to leave the room after having filled out his preliminary sheet and before the memory test was read; that before he returned the memory test had been given and he did not hear it, and recommending that the candidate either be summoned to appear at the office and qualify in a special memory test to complete his examination, or that the three papers turned in by him be averaged. The latter recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated January 10, with reference to the cases of Walter M. Little and Peter H. Ward, Pavers in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, complaint against whose employment had been made to the Municipal Civil Service Commission in the first case and to the District Attorney in the second. The Examiner stated that Walter M. Little worked but one day after being appointed a Paver in the said Department on December 3, 1906, and was no longer on the pay-roll; that he had carefully investigated the case of Peter H. Ward, and both the voucher, who alleged that the candidate had been employed by him for fourteen months as a Paver, and Superintendent of Parks Morrison, of The Bronx, had reported that he was a competent Paver. The Examiner further stated that the person whose name was signed to the letter complaining of Mr. Ward's employment denied all knowledge of the same, and it was his conclusion therefore that the writer of the letter had used the name of another person in signing it. The papers were ordered filed.

The requirement of residence in the State of New York was waived in the cases of Miss Willa C. Noble, No. 55 South Fullerton avenue, Montclair, N. J., and Mr. Lemuel W. Famulener, No. 502 North Washington street, Bloomington, Ind., and their applications for the position of Bacteriologist were accepted.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Correction, dated January 15, transmitting a report on the complaint of the People's Security Company against the assignment of Mr. Charles Jamar, Inspector of Heating and Ventilating in that Department, to perform inappropriate duties, and stating that there was no such violation of law as the People's Security Company complained of. In connection with the report the Commission considered the statements of a representative of the People's Security Company to the effect that the work on the Tombs, for which Mr. Jamar was appointed, had long since been completed, and that he was at the present time using the title "Supervising Inspector" and devoting a large part of his time to supervising the repairs of the engines and boilers of the boats under the control of the Department. After due consideration of the matter the President was requested to communicate with the Commissioner of Correction and state that his report was unsatisfactory, and that unless the Commission was assured that Mr. Jamar had been assigned to duties strictly appropriate to his title it could not again approve his pay-roll.

A communication was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, dated January 11, returning with the approval of that Board, resolution of the Municipal Commission adopted December 19, 1906, amending sections 6, 7 and 8 of Rule XV. The papers were ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated January 10, amending the original request of that Department for an examination for promotion from Trained Nurse (male) to Supervising Nurse by asking that all Trained Nurses in the Department be admitted to the examination. The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the examination accordingly.

The appointment, without examination, of Mr. Edward J. White, of No. 321 West Forty-fourth street, Manhattan, as Egg Candler in the Department of Public Charities was authorized under the provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 6, at a compensation not to exceed \$250.

The leaves of absence, without pay, granted the following named employees in the Bureau of Sewers, office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, were approved,

it appearing from the doctors' certificates furnished that the same were allowed because of illness:

Stephen H. Dulan, Leveler, two months, from January 1, 1907.

Jason Mills, Inspector of Sewer Construction, three months, from January 8, 1907.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 8, renewing his request for the exemption of the position of Superintendent of Asphalt Repair Plant in his department. The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the matter, in accordance with Rule III., for Tuesday, January 22, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

The request of the Chamberlain for an examination for promotion to fourth grade Clerk in his office, was denied, without prejudice, however, to a renewal of the same at the next regular time set apart by the Commission for the holding of promotion examinations.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated January 10, requesting authority to appoint, without examination, Mr. Robert William Steed, of No. 114 Liberty street, New York City, to the position of Mechanical Engineer at a salary of \$3,600 per annum, and setting forth Mr. Steed's high qualifications for the work in view. The appointment was approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 5.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the emergency appointment of William Dilberger, No. 188 Baltic street, Brooklyn, as Office Boy in the Board of Water Supply, for seven days from January 10, be and the same hereby is approved.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated January 10, requesting that open competitive examinations be held for two grades of Inspectors; stating the need of the department for such eligible lists, and requesting, in view of the great demand for men of the character required in and around New York City, that the requirement of residence in the State of New York be waived for said examinations, and that the candidates be not required to have the certificates of two residents of The City of New York on their applications. After due consideration of the matter, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with open competitive examinations for Inspector of Masonry Construction, Board of Water Supply, and Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, Board of Water Supply, appointment from such eligible lists, when announced, to be for employment outside The City of New York only; and the Secretary is further directed, in the event of an inadequate number of applications being received from residents of the State of New York within the time specified for the receiving of applications, to readvertise the examinations and waive the aforesaid requirements.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for Rodman, Board of Water Supply.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to summon Mr. Joseph F. Donovan, Port Richmond, New York, for a non-competitive examination to qualify him for provisional appointment as Topographical Draughtsman in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated January 10, requesting approval of a leave of absence with pay, from November 17 to December 17, 1906, in the case of George Hoffman, Draughtsman, and a leave of absence with pay, from November 13 to December 13, 1906, in the case of William E. Crawford, Draughtsman; and requesting, further, that a leave of absence without pay, granted to Mr. Hoffman from December 17, 1906, to January 1, 1907, and a leave of absence without pay, granted Mr. Crawford from December 13, 1906, to January 2, 1907, be approved. The leaves of absence without pay were approved, it appearing from the certificates furnished that they were granted because of illness; but the Secretary was instructed to inform the Board of Education that there was no provision in the rules to authorize the Commission to approve a leave of absence with pay; that the matter of compensating said employees for the thirty days during which they were unable to serve because of illness was a matter to be determined by the department itself and the Comptroller.

The request of the Board of Education for authority to reinstate Mr. William J. Roach in the position of Attendance Officer in the Borough of Richmond, he having held that position until March 31, 1902, at which time the position was abolished, was denied, and the Secretary was directed to certify names from the list of Probation Officer to fill the vacancy.

The request of the Board of Education that the examination taken by Mr. Thos. A. Dillon on November 2, 1906, for promotion to the old sixth grade of Clerkship (\$2,500 per annum), be construed to have qualified him for promotion to the new tenth grade of Clerkship (\$3,000 per annum), was granted, the said examination being sufficiently broad in scope to have qualified the candidate for promotion to the latter grade, and there being no other persons at present in the grade with him to compete for such promotion.

The reassignment to duty of Miss Martha L. Curry, Playground Attendant in the Department of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, was approved, it appearing from the certificate furnished that her absence from November 1, 1906, was due to illness.

The reassignment to duty of Hugh McCabe, Gardener in the Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, was approved, it appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that his absence from November 2, 1906, was due to illness.

The request of Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor of The City of New York, for an examination for promotion from Inspector of Weights and Measures to Sealer of

Weights and Measures, in the Bureau of Weights and Measures of his office, was granted, and the Secretary was directed to proceed with the same at an early date.

The action of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, in rescinding the dismissal of Edward Monahan from the position of Gardener on January 7, was approved.

The leave of absence without pay, for three months from February 1, 1907, granted Mr. James Kearney, Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, was approved, it appearing from the certificate furnished that the same was granted because of illness.

A letter was presented from the President of the Board of Justices of the Court of Special Sessions, Second Division, requesting that the transfer of Miss Frances Leitch, Probation Officer, from the Magistrates' Court, Borough of Richmond, to his Court, be authorized. The President was requested to state that Miss Leitch was not eligible for such transfer at the present time.

A communication was presented from Charles A. Hirsch, No. 91 Division street, and George Rosenthal, No. 94 East One Hundred and Eleventh street, dated January 7, protesting against the action of the Commission in failing to place their names upon the preferred list for Temporary Clerk, by reason of their having been unable to produce a certificate from the Department in which they were employed, to the effect that their services had been satisfactory, in accordance with the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 2. The Secretary stated that it had been the custom in the office to require Temporary Clerks, at the termination of their employment in a Department to produce a certificate from the appointing officer that their services had been satisfactory, and in the event of no such certificate being forthcoming, their names were not placed upon the preferred list, but rather were restored to the eligible list from which they were originally appointed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to place the names of all Temporary Clerks upon the preferred list at the expiration of their service in any City Department, unless the head of that Department shall notify the Commission in writing that their services have been unsatisfactory; such ruling to take effect from the date of the promulgation of the new eligible list for Temporary Clerk.

A letter was presented from Mr. George W. Blake, publisher of "Democracy," requesting that his paper be designated to receive paid advertisements of civil service examinations. The request was granted.

The request of P. J. Tracy, Leveler in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, that he be permitted to compete in the examination for promotion from Rodman to Transitman, to be held February 1, was granted, he having produced a doctor's certificate to the effect that he was prevented by illness from competing in the examination for promotion from Leveler to Transitman, held December 17, 1906.

The request of Solomon Reswick, Rodman in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of The Bronx, that he be permitted to enter the examination for promotion to Transitman, to be held February 1, was denied, he being ineligible to compete for such promotion.

The request of Ernest H. Havermann, No. 1679 Monroe avenue, The Bronx, that he be permitted to compete in the coming examination for promotion from Axeman to Rodman, was denied, he being ineligible to compete for such promotion.

The request of Henry T. Krundieck, No. 182 Alexander avenue, The Bronx, that he be permitted to enter the coming examination for promotion to Transitman and Computer, was granted, he lacking but nine days of the requisite length of service in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The request of Charles Solomon, No. 1386 Prospect avenue, that his name be restored to the list of Transitman and Computer, was denied, it appearing that he accepted an appointment from that list in the Borough of Queens on July 27, 1906, which position he resigned on September 1, 1906, on being certified to the Borough of The Bronx for appointment from the list of Topographical Draughtsman.

The request of Mr. M. O. Sullivan, No. 263 Gold street, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list of Senior Clerk, was denied for laches.

A communication was presented from Mr. George M. Treiber, Secretary, Broadway Board of Trade, Borough of Brooklyn, transmitting, for the consideration of the Commission, a resolution adopted by that Board. The Secretary was directed to refer the communication and resolution to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for consideration, the matter being one over which the Commission had no jurisdiction.

The following requests for restoration to the eligible lists indicated were granted, the reasons given for making such requests being satisfactory to the Commission:

Dear Sir—In the matter of the communication of William H. Hornidge, as to conditions at the Ninety-ninth street station on the Third avenue line of the Manhattan Railway, I submit:

The general description of the conditions in Mr. Hornidge's communication is practically correct. The platform in front of the ticket office and waiting room is only 4 feet 6 inches wide, entirely too narrow to accommodate passengers who at times congregate at this point. The track in the rear of the station (which is a dead end one) should be removed and the station platform widened so that that portion of it in front of the ticket office and waiting room building, which is 60 feet long, be 6 feet in width. To accomplish this result, the following recommendation is made:

Recommendation.

That the Manhattan Railway cause the track at the rear of the south bound Ninety-ninth street station of its Third avenue line to be removed and the platform widened in front of the ticket office and waiting room building to not less than 6 feet.

Resolved, That the width of the sidewalks on both sides of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Third avenue to the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx, be and is hereby established at twelve (12) feet, and that all rights and privileges of abutting property owners to the use of any portion of the sidewalk for stoops, areas, etc., under the general ordinances be and are hereby restricted to a

width of not more than four feet in any case, under the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen. Which was referred to the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers.

To the Honorable President and members of the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—On the 27th day of August, 1906, this Department prepared an estimate for the current expenses for the year 1907, and forwarded the same to your Honorable Board and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Among the items of said estimate was one for Maintenance and Construction, \$572,445.

I am advised, that my predecessor in arriving at this amount eliminated every unnecessary item of expense, and only considered the ordinary maintenance required for the practical purposes of caring for our park system.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment fixed the appropriation in the sum of \$289,774.68. I have no knowledge of how the said Board arrived at this amount.

When it is considered, that the average amount per acre, viz., a little more than \$140, the smallest amount ever appropriated for the maintenance of any park system, was the minimum requested, I believed the estimate a reasonable one.

I, therefore, request that, for the ordinary expenses of maintenance of our park system, your Honorable Board grant an additional appropriation from the Revenue Bond Fund, of the sum of \$140,000.

With each recurring year, the area of park territory in The Bronx for public purposes has been very largely increased. Lands have been opened up and developed; new lawns were made; many new bath houses and comfort stations erected, all of which require care and attention. Several miles of new roads have been added during the past year.

The largely increased use of automobiles has very materially increased the cost of keeping our more important parkways in shape, and has rendered it absolutely necessary that Bronx and Pelham parkway be resurfaced throughout its entire length.

The athletic fields have been enlarged and improved, and material additions have been made to the golf links.

All of the above has rendered necessary increased appropriations.

When it is remembered that the item for maintenance is but a trifle greater than it was in the year 1900, you will readily see the necessity for increased appropriations.

In addition to this, there has been appropriated the sum of \$20,000 for the Care of Trees in City Streets. This evidently was intended for the care only of these trees during a period of six months. There should be at least \$20,000 additional for this purpose. The amount appropriated for the care of trees last year was entirely inadequate, when the vast number of trees in The Bronx is taken into consideration.

The item of music was also reduced from \$11,000 asked to \$9,000 appropriated. With each recurring year, the necessity for music in our parks becomes greater, and it is sincerely hoped that the additional \$2,000 may be granted.

In the item for Forestry Work, application was made for \$6,000, which was reduced to \$4,000 for some reason unknown to me, but I find that the sum asked for was, if anything, much less than that required for the large number of trees in our City parks, especially since the advent of the disease that is destroying vast numbers of our chestnut trees.

The small sum appropriated, viz., \$4,000, would go but a little way in the checking of this wholesale destruction, as it is imperative that the trees affected should be removed as speedily as possible. I therefore respectfully request that at least \$4,000 additional be appropriated for use this year.

In the item for Salaries of Engineers, the amount asked for was \$19,210, while the amount appropriated was \$16,030, which amount is insufficient for the payment of salaries for the whole year of the force now employed. The engineering force in this Department is at present barely sufficient for the prosecution of routine work, leaving little or no time for the surveying of the unmapped parks, the most important of which is Van Cortlandt Park, with its area of 1,132 acres. An additional sum of \$4,000 would enable us to employ a sufficient additional force, so that the work of completing necessary surveying and mapping could be completed at the earliest date possible, in order that the work of laying out a comprehensive system of park development may be proceeded with in the near future.

The development of park property throughout the Borough of The Bronx has, I believe, greatly increased the demands for, and sales of, property, and has been an important factor in the enormous growth of our borough, and has added materially to the increased valuation of real estate.

Appropriations for park maintenance have not kept pace with the large increase of developed property, and, when it is considered that we have a total of upwards of 4,000 acres of parks and parkways, it would seem necessary that additional appropriations be made by the issue of Revenue Bonds for this Department for the present year, and I believe the amount named—for Maintenance, Care of Trees, Music, Forestry Work and Engineers' Salaries—\$170,000, is absolutely necessary.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg to request that your Honorable Board will, pursuant to section 188 of the City Charter, request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$200,000, to provide for the deficiency between the sum actually required for the maintenance of parks, parkways, playgrounds, etc., in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, and the amount allowed for that purpose in the Budget for the current year.

The departmental estimate for 1907, as presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment containing a detailed account of expenditures necessary to be made for these items, was based upon the actual payroll expense and the cost, carefully estimated, of necessary supplies, and the work cannot be accomplished for the amount of the appropriations without a material reduction of the force resulting in a degree of maintenance which would be neither creditable to the City nor satisfactory to the public.

The actual deficit is shown as follows:

While the deficit thus shown exceeds the amount now asked for, I have in mind the fact that the demands upon this source of revenue make necessary an economic distribution of the funds at your disposal under this section of the Charter, but with this additional sum I am of opinion that, with careful management and a small

reduction of the force, where it can be done to the least disadvantage, fairly creditable results may be obtained.

For your better information, I beg to inclose a copy of the estimate showing in detail the expenditures necessary to accomplish the work required to be done under the appropriations above mentioned during the current year.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I herewith make application for the issuing of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of two hundred and fifty-four thousand six hundred and eleven dollars and twenty-five cents (\$254,611.25) to make up the deficiency between the sum granted by your Honorable Body for the maintenance of the Department of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens and the amount asked for in the Budget for 1907.

This Department was allowed by your Honorable Body for the year 1906 the sum of seven hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$770,000), of which seven hundred and sixty-eight thousand and eighty-six dollars and fifty-one cents (\$768,086.51) was expended for park maintenance, leaving a balance on hand of one thousand nine hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-nine cents (\$1,913.49).

For the year 1907 the amount allowed is but six hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars (\$665,000), or one hundred and five thousand dollars (\$105,000) less than granted for 1906, or one hundred and three thousand and eighty-six dollars and fifty-one cents (\$103,086.51) less than was actually expended during the year.

The increase of twenty-five thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven dollars and thirteen cents (\$25,827.13) in supplies is mainly for new rolling stock, sprinklers, etc., and road material.

The increase in the care of street trees, thirty-seven thousand six hundred dollars (\$37,600), should be allowed, as the present force, based on the allowance of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), is utterly insufficient to cope with the numerous demands made upon it.

The increase of eighty-eight thousand and ninety-seven dollars and sixty-one cents (\$88,997.61) for labor is needed to maintain the parks and parkways in their present satisfactory condition.

Shortage, 1907, compared with 1906, \$103,086.51.

I have been compelled during the month of August, 1906, to lay off about one hundred and thirty (130) men for lack of funds. I have made a further lay-off in January, 1907, of some one hundred and fifty (150) Laborers, Mechanics, etc., and about thirty-five (35) teams and carts, and a further reduction in the working force must be made unless additional funds are granted.

Stevenson, Commissioner, Department of Bridges, in communication under date of January 10, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,000,000, for the construction of the approaches to the Manhattan Bridge on both sides of the East river.

Adding engineering expenses, etc., leaves at present an available balance of about \$850,000.

The estimate, \$3,000,000 (submitted by the Commissioner of Bridges), is only to cover the cost of the construction of the approaches to the Manhattan Bridge on both sides of the East river; it does not include any allowance for the purchase of real estate nor the construction of terminals.

The available balance being insufficient to contract for the approaches which should be started in the near future, I would recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,000,000 for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of land required for the bridge over the East river between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, known as Manhattan Bridge (No. 3), and for the necessary expenses connected with the construction of the said bridge.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—I return herewith a communication addressed to the Hon. George B. McClellan, under date of December 3, 1906, by Thomas W. Hynes, relative to the compensation for Chaplains attached to the Raymond Street Jail, Brooklyn, New York, together with a report of the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics on said matter.

In order that said Chaplains may receive some compensation for the valuable services they have gratuitously performed during the year 1906, I would recommend that they be paid the sum of \$450 each from the appropriation account "Supplies and Contingencies," made for the office of the Sheriff of Kings County for the year 1906.

As, however, the available balance of said account is inadequate to provide for such disbursements, I would further recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment request the Board of Aldermen to take action for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds, as per the resolution transmitted herewith.

Sir—In the matter of a communication under date of December 2, 1906, relative to compensation of the Chaplains attached to the Kings County Jail, which was addressed to the Hon. George B. McClellan by Mr. Thomas W. Hynes, presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 7, 1906, referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report, and by you referred to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to submit the following report:

Mr. Hynes, in the communication under examination, calls attention to the services rendered by the three Chaplains attached to the Raymond Street Jail, who give their services gratuitously to the prisoners confined therein, and recommends that the City should show its appreciation of such service by granting a stated salary to each of these three Chaplains, suggesting that said salaries should be fixed at \$450 per annum each.

From an interview with the Warden of said jail it appears that a Protestant clergyman, the Rev. R. C. Bowen; a Catholic priest, Rev. Father Richard Foley, and Rabbi H. Veld, of the Jewish faith, are the three Chaplains referred to by Mr. Hynes.

Your Examiner is informed that services are held each Sunday in said jail both by the Protestant and the Catholic Chaplains; that on Tuesday nights there is a Protestant service and on Wednesday nights a Catholic service, at which said Chaplains respectively officiate, and that on Saturdays the Rabbi makes his regular stated call. Also that these three Chaplains call frequently during each week in response to the requests of prisoners of their respective faiths.

It further appears that while the said three Chaplains minister to the spiritual wants of the prisoners gratuitously, receiving no stated salary for such service, a small amount is paid them at the end of each year.

An examination of the books of the Department of Finance discloses disbursements charged against the appropriation account "Supplies and Contingencies," made for the office of the Sheriff of Kings County for the year 1905, as follows:

January 22, 1906—

Rev. R. C. Bowen.....	\$75 00
Rev. Richard Foley.....	75 00
Rabbi H. Veld.....	50 00

—said warrant being drawn for "services as Chaplain during 1905."

The Department of Correction is allowed ten Chaplains, of various religious faiths, at an annual salary of \$450 each, three of whom are attached to the Kings County Penitentiary.

In view of this fact and of the statements made by the Warden as to the good results of the frequent visits of the Chaplains to the prisoners under the Warden's care, the recommendation of Mr. Hynes that all three of these Chaplains should receive a stated salary meets with the approval of your Examiner, and the amount suggested for such salary, namely \$450 per annum, seems reasonable and proper.

As, however, no special appropriation for the salaries of Chaplains to the Kings County Jail was made in the Budget for 1906, and as the title of and number of incumbents in each position in the office of the Sheriff of Kings County is designated by the statute making said office a salaried one, namely chapter 705 of the Laws of 1901, it appears that the compensation of said Chaplains cannot be paid from the account "Salaries—General Administration" of said office.

Your Examiner would therefore recommend that services of the three Chaplains now attached to the Kings County Jail be paid for at the rate of \$450 per annum each from the account "Supplies and Contingencies," made for the office of the Sheriff of Kings County for the year 1906, and as the said account is manifestly insufficient for this purpose, the amount appropriated for said item in the 1906 Budget being but \$7,000, your Examiner would further recommend that the said account be replenished by proper action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, New York City, N. Y.:

My Dear Mr. Mayor—I desire to bring to your attention a matter of considerable importance, and with your permission, to offer a suggestion which I consider as pertinent to the subject in hand.

There are at the present time three chaplains attached to the Raymond Street Jail, in the Borough of Brooklyn, representing Protestant, Hebrew and Roman Catholic denominations. These chaplains, in ministering to the spiritual wants of the prisoners and in visiting them at frequent periods to offer words of comfort or advice, are giving their time and service gratuitously, and performing a work which is none too easy at best.

The influence which they are enabled to exert in many cases in reclaiming the unfortunate and fallen to a better life is in my judgment a positive contribution to the cause of public morals and decency.

During my connection with the Department of Correction I was in a position to understand intelligently and estimate properly the great good accomplished by those men.

It seems to me that, without putting a commercial value upon the clergymen's labors or imputing any mercenary motive in the work of reclaiming the sinner, the City should show some special evidence of their appreciation of their efforts and compensate them by the payment of a moderate salary, and I would respectfully suggest that the sum of \$450 per annum be appropriated for each chaplain officiating at this institution.

I respectfully commend this proposition to your serious consideration. If you are in sympathy with the idea, an expression from you to that effect would without doubt be of immense value in bringing about its accomplishment.

It is the wish of those advocating this movement that if your Honor concur, the initiative be taken by you so that the impetus to be derived from your valued support will be felt from the beginning.

Dear Sir—Pursuant to the instructions of the Grand Jury of this county for the January Term, 1907, I herewith inclose a copy of presentment filed by them in the Supreme Court, relative to the inadequacy of police protection in the Borough of Queens.

The Grand Jury of the County of Queens, having investigated conditions existing in said county with respect to the police protection afforded by The City of New York, do make the following presentment:

We find that the number of Patrolmen assigned to duty in Queens Borough is wholly inadequate to properly protect the lives and property of the citizens thereof, and, by reason of such inadequate number of Patrolmen, renders it impossible, in a great number of instances, to detect crime or apprehend persons committing crimes.

We find that the posts of Patrolmen cover a territory so great as to render it physically impossible for one man to do the work expected of him.

We find that the proportion of Patrolmen detailed to the Borough of Queens, as compared to the number detailed to the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, is wholly disproportionate and prejudicial to the rights of the citizens and taxpayers of Queens Borough.

We demand that the City authorities correct this evil and without delay grant to the Borough of Queens the police protection to which it is entitled.

"Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 12, 1906, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it."

In pursuance to regular notice, the Committee met on Saturday, January 26, 1907, at 10 a. m., at which meeting the following gentlemen were selected and engaged by the said Committee to serve as experts in their respective callings:

The indorsements of these experts come from the best and highest authorities in the building line in the City, from technical and practical societies, architects, engineers, builders and labor organizations, and are herewith submitted to the Board that they may be made a part of the records.

The Committee has also received, since the appointments of the Commission, a number of letters from various sources indorsing the Building Committee's appointments, which letters are also submitted.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on December 4, 1906 (Minutes, page 1507), the annexed resolution in favor of increasing contract of one M. J. Dady for work on Massapequa Pumping Station, respectfully

REPORTS:

That Deputy Commissioner Cozier and Engineer McKay of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, appeared before your committee and explained the reason and necessity for the resolution.

The contract for the work in question was awarded to Michael J. Dady, as the lowest bidder, at the sum of \$327,850, and provided for an additional five per cent. to cover the expense of any modifications and changes which might be made in the work.

It was thought that the pipe to be placed in the galleries would be of sufficient strength to resist the pressure of the earth, and would not require support. Experience in a section of similar work performed by another contractor demonstrated that this opinion was wrong. In that case, a very large percentage of the pipe was cracked by the pressure of the earth, in some places the pipe threatening to collapse, making substantial repairs and reconstruction necessary, and at a serious expense to the City.

To avoid this condition arising in the work in question, the Department determined that sheeting should be placed throughout the entire length of the trench, and braced so as to protect the pipe and ensure permanency of construction. The Department thereupon purchased the lumber for the purpose and instructed the contractor to place it in position.

This entailed considerable extra expense not provided for in the contract, and the additional five per cent. therein allowed was not sufficient to meet such expense, and in fact was not available, being required for other work in connection with the construction.

To meet this extra expense, after consultation with the Corporation Counsel, the Department has applied to this Board for an increase of the amount of the contract, in accordance with the provisions of section 39 of the Charter.

Your committee was of opinion that the resolution as presented by the Department was not sufficiently explicit, and the same has been modified to meet this suggestion.

Deputy Commissioner Cozier assured your committee that the installation of the system, so far as the same was in operation, had proved a success; and, when complete, promised to afford a very large supply of water to the Borough of Brooklyn.

Your committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following:

(SUBSTITUTE.)

Resolved, That under and pursuant to section 39 of the Greater New York Charter, permission be and the same hereby is granted to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, to increase the amount authorized to be expended with the written approval of the said Commissioner, under a certain contract between The City of New York and Michael J. Dady, dated August 16, 1905, for remodeling and extending Massapequa Pumping Station; such increase, however, not to exceed the sum of \$50,800 over and above the amount so authorized by said contract; the said sum of \$50,800 to provide for the furnishing and placing of one million two hundred and seventy thousand feet of lumber, board measurement, in the trench in which the infiltration gallery is constructed under said contract.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on December 31, 1906 (Minutes, page 1855), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of Corporate Stock, \$4,000, for reconstructing the bridge deck and floor of the Metropolitan Avenue Bridge over Newtown creek, Borough of Brooklyn, respectfully

REPORTS:

This matter, together with Nos. 1444 and 1445, has been actually in the Committee's hands for so short a time that it has not been able to make as thorough an investigation as it believes necessary. The six weeks' limit, however, expires to-day, and as additional time is required your Committee recommends that this matter be rejected at this time, so that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may repass it and return to this Board for further consideration.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) to provide means for the purpose of reconstructing the bridge deck and floor of the Metropolitan Avenue Bridge over Newtown creek, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

All milk sold at retail in said city shall hereafter be pasteurized or sterilized; provided, however, that the foregoing provisions shall not apply to the sale of milk at retail in sealed bottles, provided said milk is bottled in a sanitary dairy in The City of New York under the personal supervision of an inspector or inspectors of the Department of Health of said city, and provided further that all such milk so bottled shall be first tested and passed as wholesome milk by said inspector, and that said inspector shall place upon each bottle of said milk so inspected a stamp or seal so constructed that said bottle cannot be opened when so sealed without breaking said seal, and which said seal shall have printed or otherwise displayed thereon the words, "Department of Health of The City of New York," together with the name of the inspector who seals said bottles, and the word "inspected," followed by the date of inspection; and be it further provided that in all cases where such inspected milk is sold in bottles, the person or seller causing said milk to be so bottled shall pay to the City Chamberlain for the use of the Department of Health of said city, the sum of two cents for each bottle so inspected and sealed for the purpose of defraying the cost of stamps and the other expenses of said Department connected with the making of said inspection and stamping or sealing; and it is further provided that in case any inspector or said Department of Health shall fraudulently or negligently fail to perform his full duty in the making of said inspection so that he shall allow impure milk to be sold in such bottles by reason of such negligence or such fraud, such inspector shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and the offender shall also be liable to pay a penalty of fifty dollars; and be it further

Resolved, That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of the foregoing sections are hereby repealed.

405A. Selling certain drugs without a prescription. An apothecary or licensed druggist or licensed pharmacist or a person employed as clerk or salesman by an

apothecary or licensed druggist or licensed pharmacist, or any other person, who shall sell or offer or expose for sale, at retail, or give any opium, or any of its preparations, alkaloids or its derivatives, chloral or any of its derivatives, cocaine or any of its salts, eucaine or any of its salts, acetanilid, or any preparation, compound or mixture, containing any of the foregoing mentioned or described substances, except upon the original written order or prescription of a legally authorized registered physician, dentist or veterinarian, shall be guilty of a felony, punishable by imprisonment for not more than one year or a fine of not more than one thousand dollars, or both. A prescription or order authorized by this section shall be dated and shall be signed by the person giving the prescription or order, and shall contain the name of the person for whom prescribed, or if ordered by a veterinarian shall state the kind of animal for which ordered. Such written order or prescription shall be retained on file for a period of five years by the person, firm or corporation who shall compound or dispense the articles ordered or prescribed, and it shall not again be compounded or dispensed except upon the written order of the original prescriber for every subsequent compounding or dispensing.

Whereas, The said act has been once read and duly referred to the Committee on Codes of the said Assembly; and

Whereas, The sale and giving away of opium, chloral, cocaine and eucaine and other dangerous and deleterious narcotics and their derivatives has increased to such an extent as to seriously menace the health and welfare of the people of this City and of this State, by reason of the facilities afforded to persons addicted to such drugs to purchase and obtain the same, and

Whereas, The traffic in each of the said drugs is, under existing statutes, inadequately safeguarded and restricted, and thereby an incentive is furnished to those addicted thereto to obtain and use the same for other than medicinal purposes, it is the sense of this body; and it is hereby

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, in convention assembled, do hereby urge, recommend and request the Committee on Codes of the Assembly of the State of New York, to favorably report said bill or act to the Assembly to amend the Penal Code by inserting therein a new section to be section 405A, thereof, to read as hereinbefore set forth; and it is further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York do hereby urge, recommend and request, as a measure looking to the protection of the public health and safety, the Assembly and Senate of the State of New York to pass the said act and amend the Penal Code by inserting therein the said section 405A; and it is further

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be forwarded to the Committee on Codes of the Assembly of the State of New York, to the Assembly and to the Senate of the State of New York.

Which was adopted.

No. 1568.

By Alderman Dowling—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Circle Pharmacy Company to place and keep an ornamental post, surmounted by lamps, on the sidewalk near the curb in front of their premises, on Broadway between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided the dimensions of the said post shall not exceed 18 inches square at the base; the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the President of the Borough, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

The following proceedings were this day directed by Police Commissioner Theo. A. Bingham:

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
