Requesting the issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$100,000, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Revised Charter, for the purpose of replenishing the Supplies Account for the current year.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to adopt a resolution vesting title in The City of New York to Robinson street, from Rogers avenue to Bedford avenue, Brooklyn, at as early a date as may be found feasible.

Requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, subject to financial ability, to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of the basement floor of St. John's German Lutheran Church, on the west side of Fulton avenue, north of 169th street, The Bronx, and the first and second floors of the Parish House in the rear of the church, as an annex to Public School 2.

Disapproving of Assembly Bill No. 1812, entitled "An act to amend the military law, directing the Adjutant-General to formulate and issue books of instruction for the drilling, parading, inspecting and schooling in the manual-of-arms of all boys of twelve years of age or over in the public schools of the State," and authorizing the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation, on behalf of the Board of Education, to take such action as it deems proper to secure the defeat of said bill.

Transferring D. Annette Wynne, Teacher, from P. S. 58 to P. S. 144, Brooklyn, to take effect September 1, 1911.

Transferring George K. Martin, Principal, from P. S. 49, Manhattan, to P. S. 6, The Bronx, to take effect September 1, 1911, and Leon W. Goldrick, Principal, from P. S. 144, Brooklyn, to P. S. 167, Brooklyn, to take effect upon assignment by the City Superintendent of Schools.

Changes in Compensation—Janitor, Public School 15, The Bronx, for the care of additional portable buildings, from \$480 to \$720 per annum, taking effect July 14, 1911; Janitor, Public School 66, Manhattan, for the temporary care of Public School 30, Manhattan, from \$200 to \$292 per month, taking effect June 16, 1911 (in order to get the building in proper condition); Janitor, Jamaica High School, from \$900 to \$1,080 per annum, taking effect July 1, 1911 (compensation made the same as all direct system schools); Janitors of all school buildings having baths, whether other activities are conducted in their school buildings or not, \$1 per session.

Granting permission to the General Organization of the Newtown High School to occupy the assembly room in the Newtown High School on the evening of June 23, 1911, from 7.30 to 10 o'clock, for an entertainment, with an admission fee.

Placing on record an expression of its sincere regret at the death of Mr. John H. Thiry, long a member of the Local School Board of District No. 41, and well known as the founder of the School Savings Bank, which has since been introduced in many countries of the civilized world.

Report of a Special Committee.

Mr. Greene, on behalf of the Special Committee appointed on June 14, 1911,

to prepare a minute in reference to the death of Hon. Hugo Kanzler, presented the following:

"It is with a deep sense of regret that the members of the Board of Education here stay their activities to record the loss of their lamented colleague, Hugo Kanzler, who passed to his long rest with startling suddenness on Monday, June 12. At the time of his death Mr. Kanzler was in his fifty-seventh year. He began his services as a member of the Board of Education on January 17, 1906, and was appointed a member of the Committee on Finance and on Elementary Schools. In January, 1910, he was made Chairman of the Special Committee on the Reports of the City Superintendent. Mr. Kanzler's services on those Committees, and as a member of the Board at large, was of high value to his associates. Uniting a punctilious regard for duty to high capacity, ever willing and painstaking industry, and anxiety to abridge routine, he labored assiduously and most helpfully for the best interest of the schools, and won in a very marked degree the confidence and the esteem of his colleagues. His attendance at Board and Committee meetings was constant and unremitting, and his kindly and buoyant temperament made service with him a pleasure. He has left behind him a memory which will long be a cherished possession of his associates, to whom the name of Hugo Kanzler will recall the impress of a strong and earnest but urbane and gentle spirit.

"JOHN GREENE, ABRAHAM STERN, R. B. THOMAS, Special Committee."

Mr. Greene moved that the foregoing be adopted, and that a copy of the same, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to the family of the late Mr. Kanzler.

The motion was seconded, and was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

In connection with the foregoing, the following was presented and ordered to be printed in the Minutes:

"City of New York, Department of Education, Local School Board, District No. 11.

"Mr. Hugo Kanzler, Commissioner of Education since January 17, 1906, and member of this Board for the past two years, died suddenly on Monday, June 12, 1911.

"By his marked talents and unselfish devotion to the interest of our public schools he won the esteem and admiration of all interested in public education in this City.

"This Board cherishes fond remembrances of his pleasing personality as well as his faithful and effective services as a member, and takes this opportunity to record its sincerest and lasting regret at his departure from this life while yet in the fullest enjoyment of his noble qualities as a man, citizen and public officer.

"Resolved, That this expression of our earnest sympathy be spread on our minutes, and that a copy of the same be forwarded to his bereaved family and also to the Board of Education.

The report of the Committee on Elementary Schools, submitted on May 24, 1911, and laid over, with resolutions attached thereto, providing for the dismissal of Michael E. 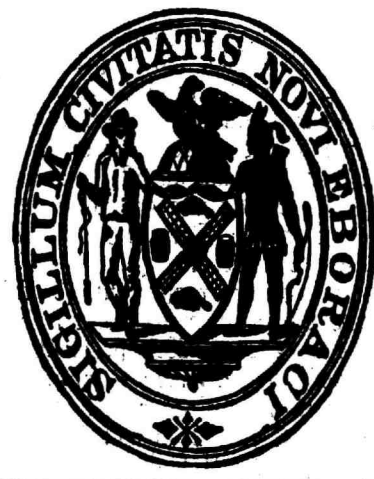
