COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in
Room 16, City Hall, at 12 o'Clock Noon on Thursday, March 28, 1918.

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Alfred J. John-

The minutes of the meeting held March 14, 1918, were approved as printed in the
CITY RECORD, March 26, 1918.

Dock Department—Proposed Amendment to Resolution Authorizing a Lease to
the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company of Extension to Pier 42, North River,
Manhattan.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, March 6, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking
Fund:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held Novem-
ber 13, 1907, a resolution was adopted approving lease to the Royal Mail Steam Packet
Company of Pier 42, North River, and ninety-four feet of bulkhead southerly, for a
term of ten years commencing August 7, 1910, and expiring August 7, 1920, with
privilege of two renewals of ten years each, expiring August 7, 1940.

Under date of July 1, 1913, the then Commissioner of Docks recommended that a
resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving and con-
senting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Royal Mail
Steam Packet Company of an extension of Pier 42, North River.

“The lease shall be for a period co-terminous with the existing lease of said
pier, dated December 6, 1907, the term of which begins August 7, 1910, and ex-
pires August 7, 1920, with privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each.”
(See Mins. of S. F., 1913, p. 987.)

The resolution which was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund
on that date, however, approves the lease for a period terminating August 7, 1930.
This is evidently a mistake, as the original lease expires August 7, 1940, and the

recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks also specifies August 7, 1940, as the
date of termination of the lease of extension.

Will you please, therefore, have the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking
Fund of July 7, 1913, amended so that the lease of the extension shall commence
February 19, 1914, and shall expire August 7, 1920, with privilege of two renewals of
ten years each, the annual rental for the first term to be at the rate of 27½ cents per
square foot per annum, and for each rental period an advance of ten per cent. on the
rental over the preceding term? Respectfully yours,

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report:

March 8, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On July 1, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks requested the Com-
missioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Com-
missioner of Docks of a lease to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company of an ex-
tension to Pier, new, No. 42, North River, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York,
the Commissioner's request stating, in part:

“The lease of said extension shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer
of this Department shall certify that said extension is completed. The lease shall
be for a period co-terminous with the existing lease of said pier, dated December
6, 1907, the term of which begins August 7, 1910, and expires August 7, 1920, with
privilege of two renewal terms of ten years each.”

The report of the Comptroller to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under
date of July 10, 1913, states, in part:

“The leases of said extensions shall commence on the date the Chief Engineer
of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall certify said extensions are com-
pleted; the leases to be for a period co-terminous with existing leases of said
piers.”

The resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated July 17, 1913,
reads, in part:

“The lease of said extension shall commence on the date that the Chief Engi-
neer of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall certify that the extension is
completed, and shall be for a period co-terminous with the existing lease of said
pier, dated December 6, 1907, the term of which commenced August 7, 1910, and
expires August 7, 1920, with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten (10)
years, at an annual rental of twenty-seven and one-half cents (27½c.) per square
foot for the area of land under water covered by said extension, said area to be
as shown by the surveys of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and for the
renewal period from August 7, 1920, to August 7, 1930, at an advance of ten (10)
per cent.”

In view of the evident mistake in the wording of the resolution, which provides
for a rate of rental only to August 7, 1930, while it was obviously the intent to provide
for the termination of the lease August 7, 1940, I recommend the adoption of the at-
tached resolution complying with the request of the Commissioner of Docks under
date of March 6, 1918. Respectfully, CHARLES L. CRAIG, Comptroller.

After discussion, the matter was referred back to the Commissioner of Docks.

Street Cleaning Department—Lease for, of Premises at 1290 Intervale Ave.,
Bronx.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following reso-
lution:

March 19, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a com-
munication to your Board under date of February 6, 1918, states that the premises
now occupied by that department at 1159 Southern Boulevard, Borough of The Bronx,
at an annual rental of \$420 under a lease which expires May 1, 1918, are very un-
satisfactory, and requests that new quarters at No. 1290 Intervale Avenue be leased
in place thereof for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental of
\$480. This rental was subsequently reduced to \$420 a year.

In the 1918 Budget the sum of \$420 was provided for the renewal of the lease of
the present quarters, which is the same rental as asked for the new quarters.

The premises proposed to be leased consist of a store approximately 14 feet by
40 feet, with three rear rooms, one 14 feet 4 inches by 12 feet, and two each 8 feet
by 12 feet 3 inches, making a total area of 927 square feet, at a rental of \$420, which
is at the rate of 45.2 cents per square foot, together with the use of cellar, about 14
feet by 24 feet.

The quarters under consideration are the northerly part of a one-story building
located on a parcel 33 feet 6 inches by 73 feet and irregular.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City property is located about five blocks away on Jennings Street,
between Prospect and Union Avenues, and consists of four two-story frame buildings,
which were acquired as an addition to Public School No. 40, and which would not be
suitable for the purposes of a Street Cleaning Station.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use
or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

For rental comparison, the adjoining and similar store premises in this same
building rent for \$480 a year.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu
of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund
adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the store, three rear rooms and cellar of the
premises 1290 Intervale Avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department
of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental
of \$420, payable quarterly; the lessor to put the premises in tenable condition satis-
factory to the Department of Street Cleaning, pay taxes, assessments and water rates,
make outside repairs, widen the front door of the demised premises, if required, and
furnish and install gas and electric light fixtures; the lessee to furnish heat, light and
caretaker and to make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary during occupancy.
Lessor, T. R. Building Company, Inc., 3228 Decatur Avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

City from the T. R. Building Company, Inc., of the store, three rear rooms and cellar of
the premises at No. 1290 Intervale Avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the De-
partment of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual
rental of four hundred and twenty dollars (\$420), payable quarterly; the lessor to put
the premises in tenable condition satisfactory to the Department of Street Cleaning,
pay taxes, assessments and water rates, make outside repairs, widen the front door of the
demised premises, if required, and furnish and install gas and electric light fixtures; the
lessee to furnish heat, light and caretaker, and to make such inside repairs as it may
deem necessary during occupancy; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be
for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 416 E. 64th
St., Manhattan.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following reso-
lution:

March 20, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a com-
munication dated March 13, 1918, requests the renewal of the lease of the premises
occupied as a Section Station at 416 East 64th Street, Borough of Manhattan, for a
period of one year from April 1, 1918, at the same rental and on the same terms and
conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease is made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

April 1, 1912—April 1, 1915, \$420 a year, Mar. 13, 1912.
 April 1, 1915—April 1, 1916, \$420 a year, Mar. 3, 1915.
 April 1, 1916—April 1, 1917, \$420 a year, Feb. 18, 1916.
 April 1, 1917—April 1, 1918, \$420 a year, Feb. 8, 1917.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is on the north side of East 66th Street, between First Avenue and Avenue A, occupied as P. S. No. 183.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease compared with other rents in the vicinity is as follows: Premises occupied by the City consist of two adjoining stores, with three rooms in the rear of each, and comprise a total floor area of 1,420 square feet; at the rental of \$420 a year, the rate is about 30 cents per square foot. A single similar store with rear rooms at No. 412 E. 64th Street is rented for \$300 a year. The floor area is 700 square feet. The rate per square foot is therefore about 43 cents.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease, to wit:

Of the lease of two single stores 10 feet by 40 feet each, with three rooms in the rear of each 8 feet by 10 feet, 9 feet by 10 feet and 14 feet by 10 feet, together with front basement space 23 feet by 30 feet, in building No. 416 E. 64th Street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of one year from April 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$420, payable quarterly; the lessor to keep the premises in good and tenantable condition and repair, and pay taxes and water rates; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service. Lessor, Louis Tekulsky, No. 188 St. Nicholas Avenue, Manhattan. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of a renewal of the lease to the City, of the two single stores, with three rooms in the rear of each, together with front basement space, at No. 416 East 64th Street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of one year from April 1, 1918, at an annual rental of four hundred and twenty dollars (\$420), payable quarterly; the lessor to keep the premises in good and tenantable condition and repair and pay taxes and water rates; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service; lessor, Louis Tekulsky; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said lease fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 483 E. 142d St., Bronx.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

March 11, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated February 6, 1918, requests a renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a section station at 483 East 142nd Street, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at the same rental and under the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

May 1, 1908, to May 1, 1911, \$480, Apr. 1, 1908.
 May 1, 1911, to May 1, 1914, \$480, Feb. 15, 1911.
 May 1, 1914, to May 1, 1915, \$480, Mar. 25, 1914.
 May 1, 1915, to May 1, 1918, \$480, Apr. 7, 1915.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is at 141st Street and Willis Avenue, and is occupied by the Department of Education.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

As this property is on a residential side street, there is no opportunity to make comparison as to rents. Stores on the avenue are held at a much higher rental.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the store floor and front half of basement of the premises 483 East 142nd Street, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$480, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service and to make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Mrs. Sarah O'Brien, 481 East 142nd Street, Borough of The Bronx. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of a renewal of the lease to the City of the store floor and front half of the basement at No. 483 East 142nd Street, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental of four hundred and eighty dollars (\$480), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish light, heat and janitor service and to make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary; lessor, Mrs. Sarah O'Brien; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said lease fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 876 Forest Ave., Bronx.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

March 16, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated February 14, 1918, requests a renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a Section Station at No. 876 Forest Avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at the same rental and under the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for a renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under a lease made as follows:

May 1, 1913, to May 1, 1918, \$540 a year, April 2, 1913.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is at 998 Forest Avenue and is being used by the Fire Department.

There is no property in the neighborhood now under lease to the City that is in use or that could be made available for this purpose.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the locality, is as follows:

Store at 871 Forest Avenue, which is larger than the premises now leased by the City, rents for \$540 a year, which is at the rate of 36 cents a square foot. These premises, however, have not the advantages of the present leased premises, inasmuch as the yard space, which is included in said lease, is reached by an arcaeway instead of through the store.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease upon the same terms and conditions.

Of premises at 876 Forest Avenue, consisting of store 21 feet by 60 feet, with front basement space 12 feet by 40 feet, and rear yard space 22 feet by 30 feet, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$540, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water

rates and make outside repairs during the term of the lease; the lessee to furnish heat, light and caretaker and make such inside repairs during occupancy as it may deem necessary. Lessors, William Ferber and Jacob M. Ferber, 699 East 161st Street, New York City. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of a renewal of the lease to the City of the premises consisting of the store with front basement space and rear yard space at No. 876 Forest Avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of three years from May 1, 1918, at an annual rental of five hundred and forty dollars (\$540), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and make outside repairs during the term of the lease; the lessee to furnish heat, light and caretaker and make such inside repairs during occupancy as it may deem necessary; lessors, William Ferber and Jacob M. Street Cleaning Department—Proposed Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 403 Butler St., Brooklyn.

This matter was on the calendar of meetings held January 31, February 14, 28th and March 14, 1918, and laid over.

Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at 42-46 Hamilton St., Manhattan.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated January 16, 1918, requested the renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a stable at 42-46 Hamilton Street, Manhattan, for a period of three years from April 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

On February 18, 1918, in a further communication he called attention to the fact that while there is a provision in the present lease for a three years' renewal, the landlords were unwilling that the renewal lease should contain such a provision, but that they were willing to make a new lease for five years, which he has recommended.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows: Ten years from date of occupation, \$7,000 a year, Sept. 28, 1904.

April 1, 1915—April 1, 1918, \$7,000 a year, Mar. 24, 1915.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is at the southeast corner of Monroe and Market Streets, occupied as P. S. No. 177.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the vicinity, is as follows: There is no other property of similar character in the vicinity with which comparison may be made; the premises consists of two large stables, one of which was erected for the City by the owners according to plans and specifications furnished by the City, the owners also asphalting the yard for the department.

There is no other suitable or adaptable premises in the neighborhood. When the present lease was made the assessed valuation was \$60,000. Now the assessed value of the premises is \$50,000, to which figure the owners procured a reduction shortly after the present lease was made. The rental is therefore 14 per cent. on that value. The property was appraised in 1916 by two outside appraisers at \$65,000 and \$75,000; on these values the rent is about 10-8-10 per cent. and 9-3-10 per cent., respectively.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

The rental is high, based on the assessed valuation, but suitable and adaptable premises cannot be hired in the station section before the expiration of the present lease.

As the work of the Street Cleaning Department must be carried on for the protection of the public health, and there seems to be no other place available at present, the terms must be submitted to for another year.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the renewal of said lease for one year upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease, except as to the provisions for renewal, to wit:

Of the premises known as Nos. 42-46 Hamilton Street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of one year from April 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$7,000, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay all the taxes and assessments and make such outside repairs as may be deemed necessary by the Department of Street Cleaning; the lessee to pay for water used on the premises and to make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessors, Philip F. Collins, Helen Collins, John E. Collins, Elizabeth I. V. Murphy, Annie F. A. Leland, as General Guardian for Genevieve K. Collins, and Hugh J. Christie, as Receiver, 78 Monroe Street, Manhattan. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of a renewal of the lease to the City of the premises known as Nos. 42-46 Hamilton Street, Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning for a period of one year from April 1, 1918, at an annual rental of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay all taxes and assessments and make such outside repairs as may be deemed necessary by the Department of Street Cleaning; the lessee to pay for water used on the premises and to make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary; lessors, Philip F. Collins, Helen Collins, John E. Collins, Elizabeth I. V. Murphy, Annie F. A. Leland, as General Guardian for Genevieve K. Collins, and Hugh J. The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the neighborhood, is as follows:

The premises occupied by the City consist of 700 square feet, and at the rent of \$300 a year the rate is 43 cents per square foot. Naval Training Camp, Pelham Bay Park, New York, N. Y., February 15, 1918.

Hon. J. P. HENNESSY, Park Commissioner, Borough of Bronx, New York, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—The land recently obtained from the City of New York for the establishment of a temporary training camp for Naval Reservists is not capable of holding the entire 10,000 men without undue crowding. Furthermore, should the barracks be erected as close together as would be necessary, a number of fine trees would have to be sacrificed, which could easily be spared if more space was left between the buildings.

On behalf of the Navy Department, I am, therefore, again approaching you with a request for additional land. The site chosen to hold this increased number is to the eastward of the City Island Road, directly across from the land now occupied, and would extend from the roadway leading into the large white house on the extreme southern end of the property northward as far as the road. It may possibly be necessary to move slightly a portion of the walk used by the tent colonists, but this expense would be borne by the Government.

The Government has no wish to in any way interfere with the tent colony aforementioned or to request any of the land occupied by that colony or used by the members of it.

It is understood that this additional land, if obtained, will be subject in all respects to the same conditions as were entered into between the City and the Government in the original loan of the present camp site.

In view of the urgency of this matter, it is requested that your reply be expedited in every possible way. Very truly yours,


