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

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1. At any time before the first day of Septem-ber, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable there-for may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and before the first day of the cate of payment. Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chap-ter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws'of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assess-ment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein pre-scribed.
