

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 26, 1886:

June 26, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,018.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 535.

During the past week 306 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 93 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There were issued to remove manure from stables in the City, 12 permits.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 13 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 101 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 128 visits were made, and 40 disinfections and 15 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 7.

The number of vaccinations performed was 792, of which 165 were primary, and 607

There were seized and condemned 6,440 pounds of meat, and 46,000 pineapples, 35 water-melons, 52 cans of canned goods.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 37, the number of analysis of same made, was 1, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed, was 6, the number of arrests made was 1.

The certificates of 604 births, 62 still-births, 200 marriages and 637 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 26, 1886. This shows an increase of 43 births, 7 still-births, and 14 deaths, and a decrease of 28 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 37 births and 13 marriages, and a decrease of 2 still-births and 41 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 3; croup, 8; whooping-cough, 6; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; pneumonia, 5; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 2; drowning, 5; while the deaths from measles increased 4; erysipelas, 3; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhœal diseases, 52; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 2; heart diseases, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5. The number of deaths from broncithis and cirrhosis and hepatitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

The ages of 199 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 238 under two years, 282 under five years, and 33 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 52 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 44.27 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 134 were in institutions, 366 in tenement-houses, 122 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 131 on the first, 154 on the second, 103 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 627 were stated to be residents of New York City and 10 non-residents; 72 were stated to be single, 165 married, 69 widowed, and the condition of 331 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 637; still-births, 62; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 69 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 604 births, 200 marriages, 62 still-births, 637 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 134 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage and 62 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 26, 1886, was 68.4 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.911; the mean humidity was 87, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 916, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.35 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 614 deaths and still-births, or 87.84 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 12; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 250; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 110; Greenwood (undenominational), 45; Lutheran (undenominational), 101; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 9; Evergreen (undenominational), 27; Woodlawn (undenominational), 12; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 11.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending June 19, 1886, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 16; Second, 0; Third, 3; Fourth, 5; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 11; Seventh, 27; Eighth, 12; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 26; Twelfth, 81; Thirteenth, 18; Fourteenth, 11; Fifteenth, 3; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 42; Eighteenth, 30; Nineteenth, 115; Twentieth, 40; Twenty-first, 45; Twenty-second, 47; Twenty-third, 19; Twenty-fourth, 10.

The actual mortality for the week ending June 19, 1886, was 620; this is 78 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 16.2 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.42 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,437,687.
