Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM,

Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

SIR—The amount heretofore transferred by your Honorable Board from the appropriation for "Maintenance of Aqueduct and Reservoirs," to the account for "Alterations of the Aqueduct," under chapter 252, Laws of 1875, \$6,377.14, is not sufficient to cover the expenditures incurred on that work; and I would, therefore, request a further transfer from the same appropriation, to the same account, of the sum of \$422.55, which will cover all the liabilities incurred.

In view of the additional transfer made, and now requested, since my letter to you of November 15, ult., I would request that your Honorable Board transfer from the appropriation for "Lamps and Gas," for 1874, to the appropriation "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance," for 1875, the sum of \$7,000, in place of \$6,000, as requested in that letter.
