ANNUAL MEETING.

MONDAY, July 5, 1875,

The tax and assessment rolls having been finally submitted to the Board of Supervisors on this 1st Monday of July, being July 5, 1875, the undersigned, in the name of the Board of Supervisors, and as one of its acts, and by due virtue of law authorizes and directs the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, by themselves and such clerical assistance at their disposal, but without expense to the county, to cause to be properly estimated and computed the taxes under and by virtue of said rolls, and to cause

the said estimation and computation to be prepared, set down, and extended in the tax books, as required by section 25 of chapter 120 of the Laws of 1850, and to cause the items of said taxes to be carefully added, and to set down the amount of the same in the said books.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
CITY OF NEW YORK, June 17, 1875.

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112, of chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, herewith I transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the final estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 24th day of December, 1874, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, to wit: the sum of thirty-three millions nine hundred and fifty-six thousand four hundred and seventy-two dollars and twenty-three cents (\$33,956,472.23), which amount so estimated and certified as aforesaid the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is "empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York," except as provided by chapter 492 of the Laws of 1875, under the provisions of which said act the amount certified by the Comptroller, "as the amount of estimated revenues of the General Fund, including estimated receipts from interest on assessments in eighteen hundred and seventy-five, applicable to the reduction of taxation for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five," to wit: the sum of four million dollars (\$4,000,000), which said amount certified by the said Comptroller in his certificate thereof, herewith transmitted, the Board of Supervisors is directed to "deduct from the amount of the appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York," as aforesaid, "for the year 1875, instead of the amount of estimated revenues of the General Fund heretofore deducted by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the final estimate for the said year;" and also except as provided by section 2 of the same act, "instead of raising the whole amount of money required by section 3 of chapter 308 of the Laws of 1874, to be raised by tax in the year 1875, for the improvement of the Fourth Avenue, between Forty-fifth street and the Harlem river, now in progress in the City of New York, the sum of eight hundred and thirteen thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$813,767.50) only shall be raised by tax in the year 1875, toward the expense of the said Fourth Avenue Improvement."

CERTIFICATE OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

I, Andrew H. Green, Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, do hereby certify to the Supervisors of the County of New York that the aggregate amount estimated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-five, in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, is thirty-three millions nine hundred and fifty-six thousand four hundred and seventy-two dollars and twenty-three cents (\$33,956,472.23), and that a copy of the Final Estimate as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York is hereto annexed.
