

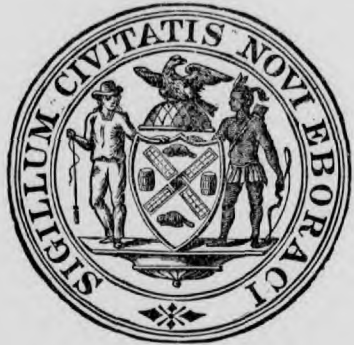

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 5, 1892—ADJOURNED MEETING, 10 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Gallup (President pro tem.), Straus, Tappen.

The minutes of the meetings of June 29 and 30, July 5, 7, 13, and 25, were read and approved.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting the action of said Board as follows:

1st. Preamble and resolutions approving the specifications for the work of improving Castle Garden as an aquarium, and adjacent grounds, and authorizing the issue of bonds to the amount of \$125,000 for doing the work. Filed.

2d. Preamble and resolutions approving the plan for the improvement of the extension of East River Park, and authorizing the issue of bonds to the amount of \$125,000, for doing the work. Filed.

3d. Preamble and resolutions providing by transfer the sum of \$4,813.55 to meet the expense of the opening of the new wing of the American Museum of Natural History during the remainder of the year. Filed.

From Graydon Johnston, offering carp and gold fish for sale.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, the purchase of four hundred fish at an expense of \$70, including packing and transportation to the Central Park, was authorized by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Straus, Tappen—3.

From John Peirce, applying for an extension of time on his contract for building the north wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art on account of delays, etc. Referred to the Building Committee of the Trustees of the Museum and the Architect for their recommendation.

From Andrew A. Smith, applying for permission to erect oriel windows on two proposed buildings on the north side of Eighty-seventh street, one hundred and seventy-five feet east of Central Park.

Commissioner Gallup offered the following:

Resolved, That the consent of this Department be and the same hereby is given to the erection of two oriel or projecting windows on the proposed building of Andrew A. Smith, on the north side of East Eighty-seventh street, one hundred and seventy-five feet east of Central Park, the projections not to extend more than one foot beyond the building, as shown on a plan filed in this office by A. B. Ogden & Son, architects.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Gallup, Straus, Tappen—3.

From H. C. Carrel, submitting amended drawings for porte cochere for the Casa Alemeda, on Sixty-third street, between the Boulevard and Columbus avenue, and asking the consent of the Department to the erection of the projection. Referred to the Landscape Architect for report.

From Roundsman Thomas McAviney, applying for an extension of his leave of absence to April 1, 1893.

On motion, the application of Roundsman McAviney for an extension of his leave of absence was granted without pay.

From Robert D. Tape, applying for permission to erect a carrousel and swings in Crotona Park. Filed.

From Matthew Colford, relative to the cost of repairs made to the Westchester side of City Island Bridge. Filed.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, the pay of laborers employed on the Washington Bridge was fixed at \$2 per day, to take effect August 15, 1892, by the following vote:

On motion of Commissioner Gallup, the matter of resurfacing the roads in Central Park was referred to Commissioner Straus, with power.

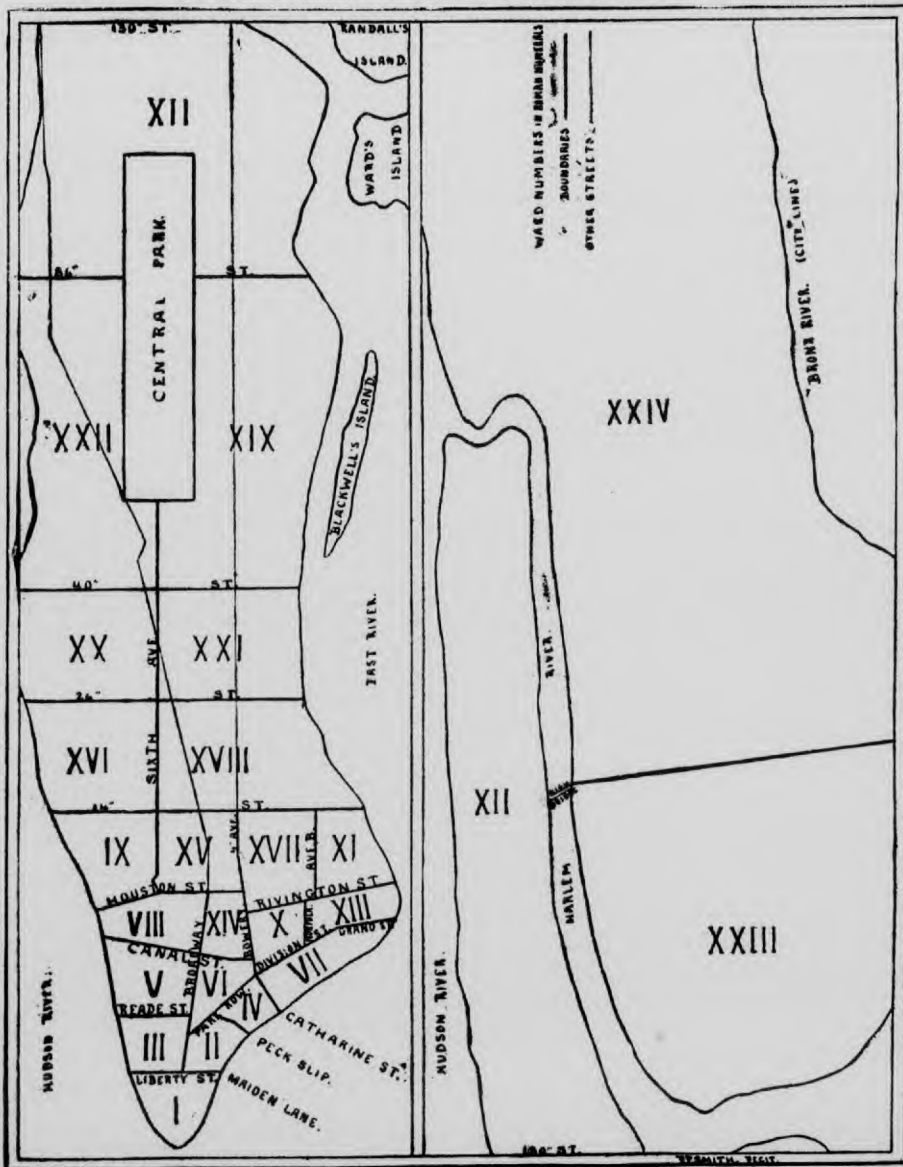

The 853 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.26, against 33.61 for the previous week and 31.08 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 47, 115, 55, 30 and 20, against 55, 163, 46, 29 and 7 for the previous week, a total of 267 against 300. Diphtheria increased slightly between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets West, and above Eighty-sixth street, decreasing generally elsewhere. Measles increased slightly between Canal and West Houston streets, but decreased elsewhere. The increase noted in scarlet fever was almost entirely between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets West, a decrease being the rule elsewhere where any change occurred; 9 of the 30 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street, and 15 of the remaining 21 were above Fortieth street; 17 of the 20 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street, and 12 of the 17 were between Canal and West Fourteenth streets. The case in the First Ward was reported from Quarantine.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 210 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 210. It shall be the duty of every undertaker having notice of the death of any person within the City of New York of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, Asiatic cholera, measles, or any

other contagious disease dangerous to the general health of the community, or of the bringing of the dead body of any person who has died of any such disease into such city, to give immediate notice thereof to this Department. And no undertaker shall retain or expose, or assist in the retention or exposure of the dead body of any such person except in a coffin or casket properly sealed; nor shall he allow any such body to be placed in any coffin or casket unless the body has been thoroughly disinfected and wrapped in a sheet saturated with a proper disinfecting solution and the coffin or casket be immediately and permanently sealed; nor shall he assist in the public or church funeral of any such person.
