47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 32 premises where contagious diseases where found, and have disinfected and fumigated 22 houses, 22 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 4 cases of small-pox were removed to hospital by Ambulance Corps.
