The 1,012 deaths represent a death-rate of 28.33, against 29.64 for the previous week and 29.42 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 184, 190, 36, 21 and 0, against 190, 210, 50, 18 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 431 against 468. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Sixth, Thirteenth and Fourteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Ninth, Seventeenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth, Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twentieth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth Ward. Fourteen of the 21 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 2 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported. pox was reported.
