WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending December 31, 1894.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections and reinspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police was 191,029, classified as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 3,458, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent, during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 466 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 225 permits to scavengers to empty privies; 8 permits to land rags (in bulk), under bonds, and 54 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending December 31, 1894, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,660. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

Air shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.
Alleys cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.
Apartments cleaned, disinfected or ventilated.
Areas connected with sewer, cleaned, disinfected, pavements of, graded and repaired.
Balusters of stairs repaired.
Basements cleaned and disinfected.
Business of lard-rendering, slaughtering, gut-cleaning, fat-rendering, storing bones, manufacturing fertilizers, smoking sausages, or storing rags discontinued.
Buildings cleaned or inclosed.
Ceilings cleaned, whitewashed or repaired.
Cellars cleaned, made water-tight, cemented, connected with sewer, ceilings plastered, doors repaired.
Cellars vacated as places of living or sleeping.
Cesspools disinfected, emptied, cleaned, filled, constructed, repaired or covered.
Chimneys repaired, extended, cleaned or obstructions removed.
Cisterns disinfected, emptied, cleaned or covered or provided.
Clothes-poles reset.
Coops cleaned, disinfected or removed.
Cows removed.
Dogs removed.
Drains cleaned, constructed, covered, repaired, removed, obstructions in removed, or connected with sewer.
Excavations cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, or connected with sewer.
Fences repaired or constructed.
Fire-escapes cleaned or obstructions removed.
Fixtures trapped and waste-pipes therefrom connected on outlet side of water-closet traps.
Flashings provided over woodwork of sinks.
Floors cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, cemented or connected with sewer.
Fowls removed.
Gas-mains and pipes repaired, and gas provided in dark halls and rooms.
Garbage and ash receptacles provided, removed, cleaned and disinfected.
Gutters (house or street) provided, repaired, cleaned, disinfected, obstructions in removed, connected with street sewer, street gutter or cesspool.
Halls cleaned and filthy or defective floor coverings removed.
House drains provided with running traps and fresh-air inlets.
Hydrants repaired, constructed, removed.
Housekeepers provided for tenements.
Ice-boxes connected with properly trapped, water supplied, open sinks.
Joints closed or calked with lead.
Leaders repaired, provided, extended, adjusted, connected with sewer, street, gutter, or privy vault.
Lodging-houses discontinued.

The minutes of the meeting held March 6, 1895, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, March 12, 1895.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I submit herewith a certified copy of chapter 69 of the Laws of 1895, entitled, "An Act to amend chapter three hundred and twenty of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled, 'An Act to provide for the location, acquisition, construction and improvement of additional public parks in the City of New York.'" The effect of this amendment to the Small Parks Act is to allow the City to issue bonds to provide for the acquisition of Mulberry Bend Park, St. John's Park and the East River Extension Park, in excess of the annual limit of one million of dollars, elsewhere contained in said act. Under an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, dated December 6, 1894, which I submit herewith, I have been heretofore unable to make payment of the awards due to property-owners, owing to the practical effect of the construction given to this limitation of indebtedness; and the passage of this amendment is to be welcomed as ending a condition fraught with great injustice to the owners of property in the condemned district, and as relieving the City from the embarrassment attending the management of many undesirable tenements. The amount of the awards (to which should be added \$62,015.40, for interest from July 19, 1894, to April 1, 1895), is \$1,476,557, and the costs and expenses of the proceeding have been taxed by an order of the Supreme Court, dated July 19, 1894, at \$45,498.60. The cost of making searches necessary for the protection of the City in paying these awards will be \$300. I offer the following resolution to authorize the issue of Consolidated Stock of the City of New York to the amount of this aggregate liability as aforesaid, viz., \$1,584,371.

Accepted by the City. Became a law March 4, 1895, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section ten of chapter three hundred and twenty of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, entitled, "an act to provide for the location, acquisition, construction and improvement of additional public parks in the city of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 10. For the payment of all expenses to be incurred, under the authority of this act, including the damages awarded and expenses incurred upon the acquisition of land and of estates and interests therein, and the construction of said parks, and the erection and furnishing of buildings therein, the comptroller of the city of New York shall issue, from time to time, bonds or stocks of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, to be payable from taxation and redeemable in not less than ten nor more than thirty years from the date of issue, in such amounts as shall be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act, and the mayor and comptroller are hereby authorized and directed to sign said bonds, and it shall be the duty of the clerk of the common council of said city to countersign the same and to affix thereto the seal of the said city. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate to be fixed by the comptroller, not exceeding four per centum per annum, and shall not be disposed of at less than the par value thereof. But no contract shall be entered into or liability incurred for the construction of any of said parks, or for the erection of any building therein, until the plans for such construction or erection, and in the case of a building an estimate of the cost thereof, shall have been prepared by the department of public parks, and submitted to and approved by the board of estimate and apportionment of said city. But no more than the sum of one million of dollars shall be expended or authorized to be expended in any one year under the provisions of this act; except that there may be issued in addition to said sum of one million of dollars in each year, such additional bonds or stocks as above-mentioned, of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, as may be necessary to pay the expenses of the construction, completion and acquisition of the land and of estates and interests therein, and of the construction of the parks hereinafter named and of the erection and furnishing of buildings therein, to wit: The park, commonly called Mulberry Bend park, being a tract of land bounded by Mulberry, Park, Bayard and Baxter streets, in the sixth ward of the city of New York; Saint John's park, in the ninth ward in said city, and the park commonly called the East river extension park, being the land bounded on the west by Avenue B, on the north and east by the

Harlem and East rivers, and on the south by East Eighty-sixth street, all in the city of New York.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

SIR—I have received your letter dated July 24, 1894, inclosing a certified copy of the order confirming the report of the Commissioners in this proceeding, and taxing their costs. You ask me to advise you what action should be taken by your department. The Park in question was acquired under authority of the Small Parks Act (chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887). The report, as appears by the order which was filed and served on the 26th day of July, 1894, has been duly confirmed. Under the statute it becomes the duty of the City, within four calendar months after the confirmation of the report, to pay the awards with lawful interest from the date of confirmation. The tenth section of the act provided for the payment of all expenses and awards out of the proceeds of bonds issued by the Comptroller of the City of New York. It thus becomes your duty to provide funds for the payment of the awards, expenses, costs, charges and disbursements, as established by the order of confirmation. I return herewith the certified copy of the order and a duplicate of the Abstract of Estimate and Maps.

Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication from you, under date of August 1, 1894, in relation to the awards and costs in the matter of acquiring Mulberry Bend Park. This Park was acquired under the authority of the "Small Parks Act," chapter 320 of the Laws of 1887, and the awards and costs in the matter amount to \$1,522,055.60. You state that by chapter 526 of the Laws of 1893, the entire cost of acquiring this property has been made a charge against the city. You also call my attention to the provisions of section 10 of the "Small Parks Act," of which the last sentence is, "But no more than the sum of one million dollars shall be expended or authorized to be expended in any one year under the provisions of this Act." And you request my opinion whether there is any authority of law to warrant the Comptroller in issuing bonds during the current year for the whole amount of these costs and awards, or in any way to provide for the payment of the whole of the aforesaid amount during the said current year. The provisions of chapter 526 of the Laws of 1893, referred to in your letter, do not even go to the extent of making the whole costs of the park a charge against the City except by inference. This statute is as follows:

"Section 1. The board of street opening and improvement, the comptroller, the clerk of assessments and collector of arrears of the city of New York are and each of them is hereby directed to cancel and discharge such assessments as have been or may be hereafter made for the making and laying-out of the park known as 'Mulberry Bend Park,' in the city of New York, and for the cost of property taken and used for said purpose."

The facts, therefore, are:

1st. Mulberry Bend Park has been acquired at an expense of \$1,522,055.60, a portion of which expense was assessed upon the adjoining property-owners by the Commissioners, the remainder being payable by the City.

2d. By chapter 526 of the Laws of 1893, the property assessed to pay for one-half of this improvement was relieved from this assessment and no other method of providing for the raising of the necessary amount representing this half of the expense was provided for.

The condition of affairs is, therefore, most embarrassing and perplexing, it being evident that the Legislature, in passing the Act of 1893, did not bear in mind the restriction upon expenditure contained in section 10 of the Act of 1887.

As under the present law the amount to be raised by you from the issue of bonds cannot exceed in any one year the sum of \$1,000,000, and as the entire expense of the acquisition of this park is payable in a single year and exceeds \$1,000,000, I cannot advise you that there is any authority of law to warrant the Comptroller in issuing bonds during the current year for the whole amount of the cost and awards, nor do I know of any way in which you can provide for the payment of the whole of the aforesaid amount during this current year.

NEW YORK, February 23, 1895.

MR. MAYOR—There ought to be established, with all convenient speed, a new market, at the upper end of the Island of New York, near Macomb's Dam Bridge. It ought to be on the bank of the Harlem river, accessible to boats from Long Island, Westchester and New Jersey, and accessible to as many people as possible. A very convenient situation would be to the northwest of the bridge, though it might be that some would prefer that it should be to the eastward. The bridge will make a new business centre in upper New York. The Huckleberry Railroad, which will soon cover many miles of streets in the annexed district, will bring the people of that region to the Macomb's Dam Bridge. The viaduct that extends from St. Nicholas avenue to the bridge will bring the people from the ridge that stretches from Manhattan street to King's Bridge, and that ridge is soon to be densely populated. The residents of Harlem, and of the new New York, west of Central Park, would, as a matter of convenience, by the Elevated roads, and by the new street car lines, for which applications have been made, go up-town to the new market. The tendency to concentration of business now seen in every branch of commerce would bring large dry goods and furnishing establishments in close proximity to the market, and the result would be that the bottom lands of the Harlem, now unproductive and uncalled for, would be brought into demand, with a large increase of the assessable value of thousands of lots. I would keep a large circle open at the ends of the bridge, and limit the street cars to One Hundred and Fifty-third street as their northerly terminus. That is not material, however, to the point of this communication. All this may have occurred to you before, but, as I have not seen the matter discussed in the press, I have taken the liberty of offering this suggestion. Yours respectfully, GEORGE M. VAN HOESEN.
