BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Friday, June 28, 1901, at 11:00 o'clock A. M.

Present—John J. Lacey, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Maurice K. Holahan, President of the Board of Public Improvements.

On motion of the Deputy Comptroller, H. J. Stordis was appointed temporary Secretary, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The minutes of the meeting of June 17, 1901, were read and approved.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the assessment list and maps, two volumes, for Flatbush avenue improvement, Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, under chapter 101, Laws of 1899, and chapter 350, Laws of 1900, in ten installments, also the official map adopted by the Board of Assessors, showing the district of assessment in said matter, and the objections of Alfred E. Steers, Dellers H. Dwyer, A. J. Waldron, A. F. Clarke, Henry H. Rosenberg, Lewis E. Froude and others by Russell & Williams, attorneys; William Brown on behalf of Flatbush property owners; Archibald Froude Clark and others, within the assessment area of the improvement, and also copy of resolutions passed at meeting of the property owners in the ward affected by the assessment, filed by L. H. Froude, Acting Chairman of the Committee, also statements of William Clark and of Oscar Weissman in support of the assessment as apportioned, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 25, 1901.

The Deputy Comptroller presented the following communication from the Board of Assessors setting forth the facts in regard to the improvement of Flatbush avenue, viz.:

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS—No. 320 BROADWAY,
New York, June 25, 1901.

To the Board of Revision of Assessments:

GENTLEMEN—Chapter 101, Laws of 1899, created the Street and Sewer Commission of the Town of Flatbush, with power to make certain improvements in that town. The Commission, proceeding under the act, improved Flatbush avenue, the work being completed in 1892. In 1894 Flatbush became the Twenty-ninth Ward of the City of Brooklyn, and chapter 350, Laws of 1900, consolidating Flatbush and Brooklyn, carried over the provisions of the Act of 1899, and conferred authority upon the officials of Brooklyn to continue these street improvements. The act of 1900 provided that the assessment for Flatbush avenue should be laid in ten annual installments, beginning in 1899, each installment to be collected as a part of the annual tax. No steps were taken to lay the assessment until it was brought to the attention of the Board of Assessors early in 1900 by a letter from the Comptroller. It was found to be impossible to get the assessment ready in time for the tax levy of that year, and great efforts have been made to prepare it in time for that of this year.

The Board of Assessors, as successor of the previous Boards, is vested with power to fix the district of assessment. This it did on May 29, 1901, after notice of hearing as provided in the act. Objections to the area have been filed, on the ground that the assessment should be confined to the line of the street and to half the block at intersecting streets, whereas the Board has included some five or six blocks on each side of Flatbush avenue. Those objections are to be considered by the Board of Revision.

In thus extending the area the Board of Assessors proceeded upon the theory that Flatbush avenue is a main thoroughfare; that it was the first improved highway through the heart of the old Town of Flatbush, and that its improvement conferred a benefit upon the whole of the included area by opening up that territory and making possible the great development that has followed. This view is sustained by the provisions of the act itself, as it permitted the Street and Sewer Commission of the Town of Flatbush to fix any area that it might decide upon, even to include the whole town if they should consider it to have been benefited by the improvement. Mass meetings were held throughout the town in support of the proposed law, and had it been the intention to put the whole and irrevocably upon the line of the improvement a provision to that effect could easily have been put into the act. The Chairman of that commission has appeared before the Board of Assessors and argued in support of the area as fixed.

But aside from these considerations of general benefit there are certain features in connection with this improvement that make it different from the ordinary street improvement proceeding. For instance, a sum amounting, with interest, to \$50,000, was used for acquiring land to widen the street, thus making it to that extent a street opening proceeding, assessments for which are always spread over a large area. In addition to this land acquired by condemnation it is stated that much property was given by those along the line of the improvement, no charge being made against the assessment therefore.

The objectors have stated their objections very fully, and the Board has given them all the time they desired. None of the facts stated by them was unknown to the Board at the time the area was fixed. They were all fully considered, and the Board reached the conclusion that this was a matter requiring a departure from the practice of the Board, which is to assess the whole cost of a street improvement upon the line of the work, and to half the block at intersecting streets. Therefore, the action in this particular case is not to be taken as a precedent.

The actual work done on the improvement cost about \$200,000. Interest on the bonds issued, to date of maturity, and necessary expenses brings the total up to \$345,055.38 of which the city pays about \$17,000 on account of Prospect Park and Parade Grounds. The assessment on the line, as made up, amounts to about \$220 for a 20-foot lot; those lots within one-half a block from Flatbush avenue are assessed \$40 for 20 feet. The remainder of the territory is divided into three sections, paying respectively \$20, \$15 and \$10 for a 20-foot lot. As these amounts are to be paid in ten installments, it will be seen that the burden upon this outside territory is not at all heavy.

The Deputy Comptroller also presented the following communication from the Board of Assessors, together with copy of an opinion of the Corporation Counsel in regard to the assessment in question, viz.:

GENTLEMEN—I am directed by the Board of Assessors to transmit to you herewith copy of an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated June 25, 1901, in which he advises that, in the matter of the assessment for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, sent to you from this Board on the 24th instant, the power of confirmation rests with the Board of Assessors. Therefore, in view of this opinion, I have to request that the assessment list in question be returned to this Board.

To the Board of Revision:

GENTLEMEN—I have received your communication of June 14, 1901, which reads as follows: "Under date of April 20, 1901, you sent to this Board an opinion in relation to the assessment for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, under chapters 101, Laws of 1899, and 350, Laws of 1900. In that opinion you advised that the Board of Assessors has jurisdiction as to the laying of the assessment for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, and added, 'if any question should arise requiring in your judgment an opinion from this Board, a request therefor should be made and a prompt reply will be given.' We have said heretofore that this suggestion by asking you to favor us with an opinion as to whether or not the Board of Assessors has the right finally to confirm the assessment, in the face of objections, or upon it, in that case refer the matter to the Board of Revision of Assessments for final consideration. This act under which the assessment is laid contains this provision: 'The said Board of Assessors shall give notice to all concerned of a hearing by the said Board upon and in relation to such assessment, and the said apportionment shall not be made until after such hearing and all changes or corrections that may be deemed just shall have been first made; whereupon the said Board shall by resolution make and confirm such final apportionment.'"

"This assessment is to be laid in ten annual installments, and is to be collected as part and parcel of the annual tax. The act provided that the first installment should be laid in 1899, and no action was taken in that year; and the matter was not brought to the attention of the Board of Assessors until it was too late to prepare the necessary maps and assessments for, and apportion the same in time for the tax levy of 1900. The amount involved is quite large, and the Board of Assessors has been and is now anxious that the levy shall be made in time for this year's tax levy, and for that the assessment must be confirmed prior to July 1."

"Under these circumstances we take the liberty of asking you to favor us by an opinion in the question of jurisdiction herein referred to, at the earliest practicable moment."

In reply thereto I would say that in my opinion of April 20, 1901, referred to, I held that the Board of Assessors of the City of New York succeeded to the powers and duties of the Commissioner of City Works of the City of Brooklyn which were vested in him by chapter 101 of the Laws of 1899. One of the duties conferred upon the said Commissioner was that he should confirm the apportionment referred to in your communication. It is now your duty to make such confirmation, and this being so the provisions of section 344 of the Charter of the City of New York, which provides in substance that the Board for the Revision of Assessments, or a majority thereof, shall have and perform all the powers and duties relating to the revision, confirmation and confirmation of assessments specified in the various laws and ordinances relating to assessments in any part of the City of New York, other than assessments made by commissioners of any ward, by a court of record and other than those conferred by the Board of Assessors.

You ask for an answer to your question at the earliest practicable moment, and I shall not elaborate any further my reasons for reaching the conclusion indicated, except to say that under the charter of the City of Brooklyn as a rule assessments for local improvements were laid by the Board of Assessors and confirmed by the Common Council, but in the case now under consideration the assessment was confirmed by the Commissioner of City Works in the exercise of the Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioner of City Works, who were the successors of the commission authorized by chapter 101 of the Laws of 1899 and its amendments.

Holahan, composing the Board of Revision of Assessments, dated June 27, 1901, enjoining and restraining the said Board from confirming the assessment for the improvement of Flatbush avenue.

The Deputy Comptroller moved that in conformity with the advice of the Corporation Counsel and the request of the Board of Assessors above referred to, the assessment for the Flatbush avenue improvement with accompanying papers be returned to the said Board.

Which was carried.
