Made 4 elbows for stove-pipe, 6 inch. Repaired roof of Kitchen, Feeble-Minded School, using 3 pounds solder. Repaired stoves in Orderlies' Dormitory, putting in 2 new door rings and slide for ash pit door. Recovered platform of stove in Pavilion F with 5 pounds zinc. Cleaned out range at Cottage and put up galvanized-iron smoke jack. Put 1 sheet of zinc in front of range in Stewards' Apartments. Altering stove-pipe in Fire-engine House, using 10 feet 6-inch pipe and 1 six-inch elbow. Covered platform with zinc in Pavilion G. Put up new scorchers stove in Waiting-room in Boat-house. Cleaned out range in Kitchen of South Hospital and put in new linings and set of rings and covers. Put wire mesh on window-frame at Main Kitchen. Cleaned out range in Steward's Apartments. Made tin pipe casing for Industrial School, using 25 sheets tin and 2 pounds solder. Repaired roof of Church, using 25 sheets of tin and 5 pounds solder. Repaired wire fences and repaired trough in Ward

28. Repaired 3 joints of stove-pipe in Pavilion F. Cleaned out stove-pipe in Quarantine 31. Made new cover for range in Ward 28. Made galvanized-iron smoke jack for Dormitory 2. Put up 2 stoves in Industrial School, using 42 feet of 5-inch stove-pipe and 4 five-inch elbows, 8 No. 6 screw hooks, 2 sheets of tin, 12 by 12 inches, and 10 feet of 6-inch earthen pipe. Put 4 new basket grates in range of Main Kitchen. Repaired stove in Waiting-room, city side, putting in new set of legs, damper ring for door, and used 8 joints of 4 1/2-inch pipe. Made sheet-iron heating drum for Dormitory 2, using 9 sheets of No. 24 black iron. Cleaned out range in Nurses' Dining-room. Made a 7-inch galvanized-iron smoke jack for Pavilion G. Repaired ventilator on roof of Nurses' Dormitory. Made 7 galvanized-iron soap boxes. Repaired roof of Gas-house, using 125 sheets tin, 7 pounds solder, 1 bag coal, 3 pounds of nails and 450 feet of old tin. Flashed 2 scuttles and chimneys on Pavilion G. Repaired roof of Engine-house, using 4 sheets of tin and 1 pound solder. Made 12 galvanized iron toilet boxes. Put new bottom in coal scuttle in laundry. Repaired grate of Hitchings heater in Dormitory 2. Put new Veto grate in stove in Wards 14 and 16. Put up 2 scorchers stoves in Greenhouse, using 78 feet of 6-inch pipe, 8 six-inch elbows, 2 offsets, 2 smoke caps and 4 sheets of tin. Repaired roof of bay window at Infants' Hospital, using 25 sheets of tin and 5 pounds of solder, 1 pound of nails, half bag charcoal and 12 slates. Put in 2 new scorchers grates, rests and pivots in Quarantine 31. Put in new scorchers grate and pivot in Quarantine 32. Made 2 tin funnels, 1 quart. Put up stove in Pavilions A, B, C, using 11 feet of 4 1/2-inch pipe, 3 four and one-half-inch elbows and 1 sheet of zinc under stove. Repaired trough in Ward 23. Cleaned hot water heater in Ward 14 and put in new grate. Put up a No. 21 scorchers stove in Greenhouse, using 36 feet of new 6-inch pipe, 2 six-inch elbows, 1 offset, 38 feet of old 6-inch pipe, 1 six-inch smoke cap and 3 sheets of tin. Put zinc under stove in Quarantine 33. Repaired leader pipe of Ward 15.

MISCELLANEOUS LABOR.

Put down 180 square feet of sodding on back walk, from Ward 25 to Ward 28. Put down 300 square feet of sodding from Ward 21 to Ward 24; 620 square feet of sodding at Industrial School. Excavated 1,250 square feet of old tar walk at entrance of Ward 22 and put down new walk, put 6 cart loads of coarse ashes in bed of walk, top dressed the walk with 2 cart loads of sand, rolled and finished same, 1,250 square feet. Put 60 feet of V. P. curbing for above walk. Repaired tar walks, putting in 270 square feet of patches, from Ward 21 to Ward 25, top dressed same with sand, rolled and finished. Put down 300 square feet of new tar walk in front of Industrial School, top dressed with 1 cart load of sand, rolled and finished same. Put down 650 square feet of new tar walk around waiting-room at boat-house, top dress with 1 cart load of sand, rolled and finished same. Repaired 180 square feet of tar walk, from Infants' Hospital to boat-house. Set 90 feet of 2-inch plank curbing at walk in front of boat-house. Put down 324 square feet of tar walk at entrance to main kitchen, top dressed with 1 load of sand, rolled and finished same. Set 54 feet of 2-inch plank curbing for same. Materials used for above walks, 22 barrels of tar and 26 cart loads of sifted ashes. Dug trench for Engineer to run steam pipe from Infants' Hospital to cottage, 165 feet long, 4 feet deep, 2 feet wide. Filled in same and put down sodding. Dug trench for Engineer from boiler-room to green-house, 168 feet long, 3 feet deep, 2 feet wide, to take out steam pipe. Filled in same. Tore down greenhouse to make way for new boiler-house, lumber and brick removed. Repaired walk on north side of Industrial School with 6 cart loads of sifted ashes. Put down 750 square feet of tar and ash walk from carpenter shop to cow stable. Carted 260 loads of ashes from gas-house dump to Wards 14 and 16, to fill in and grade yard, leveled and rolled same. Carted 245 loads of ashes from gas-house dump and the different boiler-rooms to fill in and grade yards at Feeble-minded School, leveled and rolled same. Repaired back yard at cottage with 10 cart loads of ashes. Repaired yards at Pavilions A, B and C with 18 cart loads of ashes, rolled and leveled same. Removed water-closet in yard to make way for new boiler-house, to foundation of Old Industrial School. Dug trench to connect water-closet with sewer, 16 feet long, 4 feet deep and 2 feet wide. Put down 14 posts for fence on north side of Feeble-minded School yard. Put up a new picket fence 105 feet long north side of School for Feeble-minded yard; got same painted by feeble-minded boys. Filled in two openings in sea wall, in front of Male Helpers' Dormitory, with 70 cart loads of ashes from dock and dump. Excavated and graded lawn at south side of Male Helpers' Dormitory. Sixty feet of stone curbing set at road crossing at entrance to Industrial School; also 50 feet of repairing to curbing done, resetting same. Sifted 32 cart loads of ashes at the different boiler-rooms during the quarter, and pumped 52 barrels of tar from tank at Gas-house. Cut down 4 dead trees. Excavated 360 feet long, 4 feet wide and 6 inches deep of old path to put down ash walk from back road to Stable; 180 feet long, 5 feet wide ash walk made at above. Two men 7 days packing ice during quarter. Cleaned up the different cellars during the quarter. Hauled lumber from dock to cellar of A, B and C and cellar of Ward 28. Cleaned up and edged the several walks and the dumps cleaned and leveled.
