AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, June 3, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—The Comptroller (Hon. Edward M. Grout), Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Power and Windolph.

On motion of Commissioner Windolph, the regular order of business was suspended.

By the Comptroller—

Whereas, Application has been made to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the New York Telephone Company, in a communication under date of March 20, 1902, for permission to erect and maintain telephone poles and wires on property acquired by The City of New York in the Croton watershed and under the control of the Aqueduct Commissioners in the vicinity of Pine's Bridge, Westchester county, N. Y., or as more fully set forth in said application; and

Whereas, The subject matter of said communication having been reported upon to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Chief Engineer in a communication (Report No. 359) dated April 8, 1902, and by the Comptroller (to whom also said application of the New York Telephone Company was referred on April 29, 1902), and the Comptroller's report, as well as the report of Chief Engineer Hill, stated, among other things, that if the Commissioners decided to grant such application of said New York Telephone Company, certain conditions be imposed upon said telephone company; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners hereby agree to permit the New York Telephone Company to erect and maintain telephone poles and wires on the property of The City of New York as set forth in the communication of said company dated March 20, 1902, above referred to, provided, however, that said New York Telephone Company agrees, in writing, to remove at any time and at its own expense any poles or wires if ordered so to do by said Aqueduct Commissioners; and provided also, that said New York Telephone Company agrees, in writing, to make and maintain telephone connections with the Old Croton Dam gate house, with the Carmel gate or keeper's house, and with the East Branch Reservoir gate or keeper's house and to install and maintain telephone instruments free of charge in compensation for the above permission to erect and maintain poles and wires as aforesaid.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph—5.

By the Comptroller—

Whereas, Application has been made to the Aqueduct Commissioners by Williams & Gerstle, contractors, in a communication dated May 10, 1902, for an extension of time until November, 1903, in which to complete their contract for building the Muscote dam, on Croton river, at Muscote Mountain, in the towns of Somers and Bedford, Westchester county, N. Y., said contract being dated May 10, 1901; and

Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission, in Report No. 301, dated December 3, 1901, addressed to the Construction or Executive Committee of the Aqueduct Commissioners, stated that the progress of the work of building the Muscote dam was very slow; and in Report No. 322, dated January 20, 1902, certified that the work of building said dam was unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed; and

Whereas, Said Williams & Gerstle were notified to appear before the Commissioners at a meeting held February 18, 1902, to explain the cause of the delay of the work of building said dam, and said Williams & Gerstle did so appear and were heard in connection with said matter; and

Whereas, That, while the Aqueduct Commissioners are willing that due allowance be made to said Williams & Gerstle, contractors, for a period of three months, in consideration of the delay alleged by said contractors to have been caused in the construction of said dam by the action of the elements, still said Commissioners are not satisfied that the contractors have made diligent and reasonable efforts to complete said contract within the time fixed therein for the performance of the work, viz., July 1, 1902; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That an extension of time to October 1, 1902, be and hereby is granted to Williams & Gerstle, contractors, in which to complete their contract for building the Muscote dam, on Croton river, at Muscote Mountain, in the towns of Somers and Bedford, Westchester county, N. Y., provided their bondsmen shall, within ten days from the date hereof, enter into stipulations continuing their obligations for and during the completion of said contract under said extension of time, which is hereby allowed to them as further time for the performance of said contract; and be it further

Resolved, That if the rate of progress of the work of building said Muscote dam by said Williams & Gerstle between the present time and October 1, 1902, is not satisfactory to the Aqueduct Commissioners, and does not show the utmost diligence to make up for the past unreasonable delays, said Commissioners will not consider any further application from said contractors for an additional extension of time in which to complete the work under the contract above referred to; provided, however, that this resolution be without prejudice to any of the rights of the said Commission or The City of New York, as they now are or may be on October 1, 1902, but shall be deemed to be a mere act of grace to said Williams & Gerstle, and shall not affect any liability on their part now or on October 1 next existing.

Which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph—5.

The Comptroller moved that the Chief Engineer be directed to make, as speedily as possible, a complete inspection and survey of the work of Williams & Gerstle, contractors, for building the Muscote dam, on Croton river, at Muscote Mountain, in the towns of Somers and Redford, Westchester county, N. Y.; also an inventory of their plant, the number of men and teams said contractors have, and to repeat the same at monthly intervals from now until October 1, 1902; also to take photographs of the work at said dam as it progresses.

Which was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph—5.

The Commissioners then took up the consideration of the following communication of the Acting Chief Engineer, laid over May 27, 1902:

REPORT No. 377.

NEW YORK, May 27, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—On June 6, 1899, Chief Engineer A. Fetley submitted to you Report No. 76, dated May 22, 1899, recommending the building of a gate chamber 1,000 feet north of Jerome Park Reservoir and "to make in the design of the adjacent section of the aqueduct such modifications as may be rendered necessary thereby." This gate

chamber was proposed to take off four 48-inch mains east and west from the new aqueduct, for the purpose of supplying the City distribution directly from the aqueduct and also supplying the four affluent gate houses on the margin of Jerome Park Reservoir, in case the reservoir should require to be drawn off. Mr. Hill and myself have found that by changing the position of this proposed gate chamber and gate-house to a point directly north of the Jerome Park Reservoir it will require about the same expense to build, and it will make it unnecessary to build these pipes over the aforesaid 1,000 feet spoken of in the report and will be in a much better position for connection with the four gate houses above alluded to.

Therefore, I recommend that your resolution passed June 6, 1899, empowering him "to construct at a point about 1,000 feet north of Jerome Park Reservoir an additional gate house and to make in the design of the adjacent section of the aqueduct such modifications as may be rendered necessary thereby," be changed "to a point directly north of said reservoir," as shown on a plan herewith submitted, dated May 27, 1902. I also recommend that you empower the Chief Engineer to build a dry wall on the northwesterly, or Sedgwick avenue side of the reservoir, extending from Van Cortlandt avenue along the northwesterly boundary of the City's property to Sedgwick avenue, in such manner as to retain the embankment or slopes of the reservoir, and at the same time act as a permanent fence along said boundary line, and to so finish the embankment as to enable the City to enter from the south, or from the north, with teams to Gate House No. 2 and for general maintenance. This driveway or berm will also serve to check the flow of water which will fall on the embankments and therefore preserve the slopes. This wall and driveway are indicated on the above plan of May 27, 1902.

I also ask approval for a slight change in the core wall and the arrangement of the roads just east of the above proposed new location of Gate House No. 7, as shown on the above plan.

On motion of Commissioner Windolph, a recess was then taken.

AFTER RECESS.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph.

The minutes of stated meeting of May 27, 1902, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 14573 to 14579, inclusive, amounting to \$1,113.90.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph—4.

The Construction or Executive Committee referred back to the Commissioners the following report of the Acting Chief Engineer with the recommendation that it be the policy of the Commissioners to construct wooden post and rail fences on either side of highways constructed by the Aqueduct Commissioners wherever necessary, in the judgment of the Chief Engineer:

REPORT No. 372.

NEW YORK, May 16, 1902.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—In reporting on the complaint of Clarence McCord, Croton Lake, N. Y., dated May 1, 1902, and referred to the Acting Chief Engineer May 6, 1902, I would say that, owing to the boundary line fences of the taking for the New Croton Reservoir not having yet been constructed, it is possible for stray cattle along the present highways and along the new highways under construction to encroach, or trespass upon the McCord or other land in the valley.

The Division Engineer reports that hitherto everything has been done to satisfy McCord and to remove all cause for complaints, and that the contractors, who are responsible for breaking through the fences along the right of way of the new construction, have been notified to protect the adjoining property in not only the McCord case, but in others, and the Division Engineer believes that during the coming season they will have no cause for further complaint.

I have directed the Division Engineer to see that the Contractors repair and protect adjoining property by necessary gates or bars, so that there may be no damage caused, which damage, if done, would come against the contractors directly or indirectly against the City, and I think myself that everything will be protected so that Mr. McCord will have no reason for complaint hereafter. However, the Division Engineer reports that this is the first that he has heard of dissatisfaction from McCord.

This brings to your attention the question as to what will be your policy or desire in relation to fencing in the City's property on the New Croton Dam Division.

Which recommendation was approved and adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph—4.

The President stated that, in accordance with the direction given at the previous stated meeting, he had transmitted the following communication to the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

NEW YORK, June 2, 1902.

Hon. J. HAMPDEN DOUGHERTY, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

DEAR SIR—Section 25, chapter 490, Laws of 1883, provides:

"Upon the filing of the oath of the Commissioners of Appraisal in the manner provided in section nine of this act, the Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, as may be necessary, prepare and submit to the Aqueduct Commissioners and to the Counsel to the Corporation, forms of contract and specifications, and of bonds for the faithful performance thereof, for the doing of the work and the furnishing of the material required to be done and furnished by the said approved plan, or for the doing of such parts of said work, and the furnishing of such parts of said materials as may be from time to time required for that purpose. Said forms of contract, specifications and bonds shall be either approved or rejected by the said Aqueduct Commissioners, and shall be approved as to form by the said Counsel to the Corporation, and in case of the rejection of said forms of contract, specifications or bonds, the said Commissioner of Public Works shall prepare and submit in manner aforesaid other forms in the place thereof, until contracts covering the entire work and material required by said approved plan or plans to be done or furnished shall have been approved by the said Aqueduct Commissioners and by the Counsel to the Corporation. The said Aqueduct Commissioners being hereby given the exclusive authority to determine what provisions shall be embodied in said contracts, so far as may be possible, to save the City from loss, embarrassment and litigation by reason of any work done or supplies furnished thereunder * * * *"

Under the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated January 31, 1898, and Corporation Counsel Rives, dated May 7, 1902, it is substantially held that the Department of Water Supply, now the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, is the natural and logical successor of the Commissioner of Public Works of the former City of New York in regard to the preparation of plans, etc., of the Aqueduct Act.

Corporation Counsel Rives, in his opinion of May 7, 1902, addressed to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, holds as follows:

"I think also that the present Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity takes the place of the former Commissioner of Public Works in regard to the duties in question. * * * An amendment of the statute might be advisable which would relieve you of entirely unnecessary work, but until that amendment has been obtained it will be safe in my opinion for you to act in the preparation of plans, etc., for the Aqueduct Commission as the successor of the former Commissioner of Public Works."

In carrying out the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 and the amendments thereto, for the construction of the New Croton Reservoir and its appurtenances, it becomes necessary at this time for the Aqueduct Commissioners to prepare for the construction of fourteen highway bridge superstructures as follows, the locations of which are shown upon the accompanying maps and sheets 1, 2 and 3, June 19, 1900:

- Bridge A. Over Hunter's brook. Near New Croton Dam. Road No. 7.
- Bridge B. Over Croton river. Below Old Croton Dam. Road No. 12.
- Bridge C. Over Croton Lake. At Pine's Bridge. Road No. 18.
- Bridge D. Over Kisco river. Road No. 19. (Quaker Meeting House.)
- Bridge E. Over Muscoot river. Road No. 24.
- Bridge F. Over Croton river. (Wood's Bridge), Road No. 25.
- Bridge G. Over Cross river. Road No. 26 (Katonah).
- Bridge H. Over Cross river. Road No. 27 (Katonah).
- Bridge J. Over Beaver Dam brook. Road No. 27 (Katonah).
- Bridge L. Over Upper Plum brook. Road No. 31.
- Bridge M. Over Lower Plum brook. Road No. 32 1/2.
- Bridge N. Over Croton river. Golden's Bridge. Road No. 33.
- Bridge O. Over Croton river. Purdy's Station. Road No. 35.
- Bridge P. Over Croton river. Deen's Bridge. Road No. 36.

Pursuant to section 25, chapter 490, Laws of 1883, as construed by the said opinions of the Corporation Counsel, the Aqueduct Commissioners, by resolution instructing me so to do, hereby request you to submit to them forms of contract, specifications, with the necessary maps and plans, and bond, for the construction of the 14 highway bridge superstructures above mentioned.

As the Aqueduct Commissioners are anxious to proceed with the work of construction of these highway bridge superstructures, they hereby respectfully request you to transmit to them forms of contract and specifications, with necessary maps, plans and bond, above referred to, as soon as possible.

GENTLEMEN—I submit herewith the sum of \$157, received from Division Engineer Wegmann for rents on the Croton River Division, being \$7 in cash and a certified check for \$150, drawn by Oscar Miersch on the First National Bank of Purdys, N. Y., said check being for the full amount of rent due the City from said Miersch for parcel No. 491 from December 1, 1901, to June 1, 1902. Mr. Wegmann states in his letter of transmission that he accepted the check on the advice of Mr. H. T. Dykman and subject to the approval of the Aqueduct Commissioners. He also reports that Mr. Miersch requests permission to occupy the hotel on parcel No. 491 a short time longer, and agrees to pay the rent of \$25 a month in advance; but that said Miersch would respectfully ask the Commissioners to reduce the rent somewhat, if possible to \$15 or \$20 a month.

On motion of Commissioner Power, the communications were referred to the Construction or Executive Committee.

The Comptroller, under date of May 28, 1902, gave notice of the issue of warrants for the payment of vouchers not certified to by the Aqueduct Commissioners during the month of April, 1902, as follows:

—leaving a balance to the credit of the "Additional Water Fund" of \$219,006.05. Which was ordered entered upon the books of the Commissioners and filed.

Hon. John Guilfoyle and Mr. A. Mumford appeared in explanation of the appeal. On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the iron framing be filled in with three-inch burned clay blocks plastered on the inside.

Appeal No. 133 of 1902, matter of iron shutters, premises Nos. 1042 and 1044 Third avenue, Borough of Manhattan; referred to Chief Croker for examination and report May 27, 1902.

On presentation of report and on motion, duly made and seconded, appeal was granted.

Appeal No. 134 of 1902, Alteration No. 111 of 1902, premises No. 1364 Franklin avenue, Borough of The Bronx, John Zellwigger, owner; Thomas Riley, architect.

The lot is 25 by 145, main house 22 by 30, addition 16 by 17, all two story and cellar, built for one family.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 142 of 1902, New Building No. 1,680 of 1901, premises No. 210 Fifth avenue and No. 1132 Broadway, Messrs. John B. Snook & Sons, architects and appellants.

It is desired to make elevator inclosure of grill work backed up with wire glass in metal frames for first story and floors above; all other requirements of Appeal No. 44 to be complied with.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 143 of 1902, New Building No. 287 of 1902, premises southeast corner One Hundred and Fortieth street and Eighth avenue; Frederick C. Browne, Esq., architect and appellant.

To permit the omission of brick partition walls at the points checked on plans, for the reason that the requirements of the Building Code of partition walls not being further apart than 26 feet, if enforced in this case, would work serious injury to the practical planning of the building. It is respectfully submitted that the spirit of the law is observed in this case by the distribution of the partition walls in such a way as to subdivide the building into areas of moderate size between walls.

Mr. Browne appeared in explanation of the appeal.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 144 of 1902, New Building No. 875 of 1902, Nos. 50 and 52 Pine street, James B. Baker, Esq., architect and appellant.

Exemption is requested for all exterior windows from having iron shutters, this building being entirely fireproof and is provided with a 4-inch standpipe from cellar to twelfth story, with siamese hose connections placed on street, and has a 2½-inch hose nozzle and 80 feet 2½-inch linen hose on each floor; a watchman is stationed in the building day and night, Sundays and holidays, and all the surrounding buildings on sides and rear are of fireproof construction; and power on elevators at all times.

On motion, duly made and seconded, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report with recommendation.

Appeal No. 145 of 1902, New Building No. 1,622 of 1902, south side of Bergen street, 314 feet 7 inches from the west corner of Nostrand avenue, Brooklyn, Axel S. Hechmann, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is desired to modify section 31, as relating to partition walls in buildings exceeding 33 feet in width, as follows:

To substitute two 8-inch brick walls 7 feet 4 inches apart, being equally placed on a distance of 33 feet between party lines, instead of one 12-inch brick wall, as required by section 31. The two 8-inch brick walls being connected at both ends by walls form a stronger brace for beams and building than one 12-inch free standing wall would do.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 146 of 1902, New Building No. 294 of 1902, premises northwest corner Rivington and Allen streets, M. Bernstein, Esq., architect and appellant.

Where the span exceeds 26 feet between walls it is proposed to put up steel I. B. girders directly above partitions filled with 4-inch hollow fire clay blocks. The length of said girders on span is about 13 feet long, and as said span is so short it would be quite a hardship on the owner to make said space of brick walls, as they would lose space.

J. Bernstein, Esq., appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 147 of 1902, Alteration No. 232 of 1902, No. 245 Division street, M. Bernstein, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is proposed to raise front of old building 6 feet higher than approved by the Bureau of Buildings; said wall is 8 inches thick and is but 28 feet long and 38 feet high, and we intend to put in two 16 by 24 brick bonded piers laid in cement on each of first, second and third stories, and 20 by 24 inch piers in cellar, which will act as a buttress; also the new extension, which is built of 12-inch brick work, will brace said 8-inch wall considerably. There will actually be no extra weight placed on said 8-inch wall, as the above said brick piers carry the steel girders and suspension rods.

J. Bernstein, Esq., appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, appeal was laid over for one week, the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan being requested to furnish a detailed report as to the strength of the walls and the present condition of the structure.

Appeal No. 148 of 1902, New Building No. 226 of 1902, premises Nos. 358 to 362 East Eighth street, Messrs. Sass & Smallheiser, architects and appellants.

That the floor beams at the rear of the building be allowed to be supported on steel girders in lieu of brick partition wall, provided that a fireproof partition is erected on each story, to act as an additional fire stop between the two rear apartments.

Mr. Sass appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

To substitute a 10-inch No. 25 steel girder at rear of building spanning one room,

on all stories above first story, where span exceeds 26 feet in width, in place of an interior brick partition wall.

To build a wall at rear portion would interfere and encroach on the area space of the rooms at rear, as required by new Tenement House Act.

It is proposed to encase the sides of I beams girders with metal lath and plastered, also to construct the partitions above the girder of each story of 3-inch angle iron filled in between with 3-inch burnt clay blocks plastered on both sides, all doors in said partitions to be of wood covered with metal and made self-closing.

Mr. Kaiser appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the ends of the wooden beams, where butting against iron girders (in this partition under discussion), be covered with tin.

Appeal No. 150 of 1902, New Building No. 329 of 1902, premises east side of Park avenue, One Hundred and Twenty-ninth to One Hundred and Thirtieth street; Messrs. Gilbert Robinson & Son, appellants.

Appeal withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal No. 151 of 1902, No. 11 Fireproof Shutter case, premises No. 75 Ludlow street, Geo. Hassler, Esq., appellant.

On motion, duly made and seconded, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report.

Appeal No. 152 of 1902, New Building No. 196 of 1902, premises north side of One Hundred and Eighty-first street about 175 feet from the northeast corner of Audubon avenue; James M. Morton, Esq., appellant.

Appeal withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Appeal No. 153 of 1902, Alteration No. 573 of 1902, No. 84 Leonard street; J. Odell Whitenack, Esq., appellant.

That section 96 of the Code be modified to allow of elevator shaft being built of angle iron frame filled in with terra cotta blocks laid in Portland cement mortar and plastered on both sides, there not being sufficient room in the basement and cellar for a brick shaft on account of location of piers and columns of front wall, and closeness of stairs to front of building.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 154 of 1902, Alteration No. 251 of 1902, south side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street 121 feet east of Melrose avenue, Borough of The Bronx, Gustav Schwartz, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is desired to carry new extension up three stories, for the following reasons:

1. It would be a hardship for the owner if the proposed extension could not be built three stories in height, as the top story, without extension, could hardly be rented.

2. A lot of assessments are to come, and the property cannot be made to pay without this extension in rear.

3. As the law allows two story and basement to be raised, the owner respectfully asks the Board to grant the modification.

Mr. Schwartz appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 156 of 1902, Alteration No. 2086 of 1902, premises south side of Forty-seventh street, about 280 feet from southwest corner of Third avenue, Borough of Brooklyn; Pohlmann & Patrick, architects and appellants.

To raise present building 10 feet in height and build new frame story underneath.

Mr. H. Pohlmann appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 157 of 1902, New Building No. 1757 of 1902, premises south side of Maujer street, 93 feet 5 inches east of Bushwick avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, Roman Catholic Church of the Holy Trinity, by Thomas F. Wagner, attorney, appellant.

Permission is asked to erect a convent to be used as a living house by the Sisters, who are nurses and attendants in the St. Catherine Hospital adjoining. The applicant contends that the building to be erected is a convent and is exempt from any provisions of law requiring the building to be fireproof. The Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough of Brooklyn determines that the building must be fireproof, as an extension to the hospital.

Mr. F. J. Berlenbach appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 158 of 1902, New Building No. 141 of 1902, premises No. 682 Broadway; John W. Stevens, Esq., appellant.

Permission is requested to omit the channel beams now shown on plans at first tier of beams, the anchors at the ends of beams being sufficient for tension, and the channel as shown now tends to break the bond of wall.

Appeal No. 159 of 1902, New Building No. 113 of 1902, premises 543 Broadway; John W. Stevens, Esq., appellant.

Permission is requested to omit the channel beams now shown on plans at first tier of beams, the anchors at the ends of beams being sufficient for tension, and the channel as shown now tends to break the bond of wall.

Mr. John W. Stevens appeared before the Board in explanation of Appeals Nos. 158 and 159 of 1902.

On motion, duly made and seconded,

Resolved, That this Board respectfully suggests to the Superintendent of Buildings that he give further consideration to the question of channel beams in lieu of proper anchors (involved in Appeals Nos. 158 and 159), as upon the statement of facts before this Board this date presented by the appellant, it is the sense of this Board that the anchor system would be preferable from the structural point of view.

Appeal No. 160 of 1902, New Building No. 319 of 1902, No. 2169 Madison avenue; Chris F. Lohse, Esq., appellant.

It is desired to erect a coal pocket; the same will be made fireproof on the outside by covering same with corrugated iron or sheet iron. Said coal pocket will be located on Harlem river front and there is nothing else located on the east side of Madison avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to the river, so there will be no danger to any dwelling or house in case of fire.

On motion, duly made and seconded, referred to Chief Croker to examine and report, with recommendation as to locality.

Appeal No. 161 of 1902, New Building No. 347 of 1902, southeast corner of Third avenue and Thirty-third street; Geo. Fred Pelham, Esq., architect and appellant.

To substitute a 9-inch No. 21 and 10-inch No. 25 steel beam girder at front and rear portion of the building where the span exceeds 26 feet between the bearing walls in place of extending the interior brick partition wall at these portions.

Underside and sides of I beams girders wire lathed and plastered.

Mr. Kaiser appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 162 of 1902, New Building No. 239 of 1902, Nos. 109 to 115 West Forty-fourth street; G. A. Schellenger, Esq., architect and appellant.

The building will not exceed 150 feet in height from the curb to the top of the roof beams of the pent house or roof story.

The pent house or roof story will cover less than 50 per cent. of the area of the building, including stair and elevator bulkheads, about 49 per cent.

Such pent house or roof story will be constructed fireproof to comply with section 105 of the Building Law. All wood used in such story will be fireproofed in a manner satisfactory to the Superintendent of Buildings. The inclosing walls will be of brick.

It is desired to be exempted from the requirements of section 105 as to fireproofing of interior trim, etc., and outside window frames and sash of the lower portions of the building.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the floors are made of concrete instead of wood.

Appeal No. 163 of 1902, Fireproof Shutter case No. 12 of 1902, Nos. 2 and 4 West street, Battery Place Building; H. J. Hardenbergh, Esq., architect and appellant.

Fireproof shutters will be placed upon the windows in the north wall for three stories above adjoining property, but the appellant petitions that the windows above, viz.: from eighth to twentieth stories inclusive, be exempted from having shutter, upon the ground that they are unnecessary and that the building is to be erected fireproof according to the section 105 of the Building Code.

Mr. William E. Young appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 164 of 1902, New Building No. 1300 of 1901, No. 27 West Sixty-seventh street; D. N. B. Sturgis, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is desired to dispense with tie rods at the centre of the front tier of beams. For this purpose special girders are provided at the ends of the tiers constructed to resist lateral deflection. The beams are tied by 9-inch channels along the front wall and 1 3/4-inch tie rods at their opposite ends.

Mr. S. O. Miller appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, laid over.

Mr. Moore was then excused.

Appeal No. 165 of 1902, New Building No. 1564 of 1901, southeast corner Broadway and Forty-second street; Messrs. Marvin & Davis, architects; Bruce Price, Esq., consulting architect, appellants.

The construction of the walls of roof houses to be of 4-inch porous terra cotta blocks instead of brick. Mr. F. B. Marvin appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 166 of 1902 New Building, No. 316 of 1902, Nos. 14-16-18 East Thirty-first streets, Messrs. Buchman & Fox, architects and appellants.

It is respectfully requested that the requirements of the Bureau of Buildings that the building "should conform to all the requirements of section 105 of the Building Code as to fireproofing" be waived, on the ground that the building is not over 150 feet high.

Mr. Fox appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the floor is made of concrete and the wood trim fireproofed.

Mr. S. P. Barry appeared before the Board and presented a communication from Mr. John H. Duncan, requesting reconsideration of Appeal No. 136 of 1902.

On motion duly made and seconded, reconsideration was granted.

On motion, duly made and seconded, Appeal No. 136, under reconsideration, was laid over.

Mr. S. P. Barry appeared before the Board.

That portion of the appeal relating to the pent house was withdrawn by the appellant, with the request that the matter of the staircase only be reconsidered. Motion made to approve on conditions, lost on vote; denied.

Appeal No. 168 of 1902, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 13, of 1902, premises No. 56 Wall street, Henry Palmer, Esq., architect and appellant. On motion duly made and seconded, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report.

Appeal No. 169, of 1902, New Building No. 299 of 1902, premises No. 33 West Forty-fourth street, Messrs. Warren, Wetmore & Morgan, architects and appellants. We respectfully ask that we be permitted

1st. To build the front wall of half-story of iron frame of 4-inch I's filled in with 4-inch t. c. blocks, the entire exterior surface covered with 6 by 9 by 1-inch vitrified tile blocks anchored and set in cement. The wall supported on two 12-inch I's 31.5 pounds.

2d. And that we be permitted to build walls in second and third stories of brick 12-inch thick, as upper portion of building is used as a dwelling, and walls that receive loads calculated for a stable use are of required thickness, i. e., 16-inch.

Mr. Gray appeared before the Board.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 170 of 1902, New Building No. 219 of 1902, premises Nos. 84 to 90 Fifth avenue, Robert Maynicke, Esq., architect and appellant.

To modify the Building Code so that the exterior staircase (Appeal No. 137 of 1902 decided in favor of appellant May 28, 1902) may be used for the purpose of a fire escape to the building, and that it be considered as such; that no additional fire escape will be necessary for this building.

As this additional exterior staircase was added and placed in a position so as to give direct exit to the street, in lieu of the fire escape originally shown on the plans as located in the court, with exits through adjoining buildings, and in view of the fact that all the staircases in the building are inclosed with fireproof partitions with fireproof doors, and that the elevator shafts being inclosed on all stories with fireproof materials, and that the building is fireproof, and that the exterior staircase is of ample dimensions and constructed so as to give adequate and sufficient facility for the exit of a large number of people, the appellant prays for a favorable consideration. Mr. Julius Franke appeared before the Board and withdrew the appeal.

Appeal No. 171 of 1902, Alteration No. 887 of 1902, premises Nos. 540 to 550 West Fifty-eighth street, Bronx Architectural Company, architects and appellants.

Permission is requested for the changing of header in elevator opening, as shown on plans and described in alteration application.

The changing of the header will strengthen the capacity of beams, etc., and will in no way be a detriment to the construction of the building in weakening any part thereof, but will make floor space stronger.

Mr. F. Hammond appeared before the Board.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 172 of 1902, Alteration No. 734 of 1902, premises No. 32 East Fifty-first street, Charles Brendon, Esq., appellant.

The construction of a bulkhead or pent house on roof, as shown on drawings, and also a bay on first floor to be used in part as a pantry, to be constructed of 4-inch angle irons filled in with fireproof blocks, the outside being covered with tin. Particular attention is called to the fact that said walls of house are independent walls and sufficiently heavy to carry the additional slight load of this structure.

Mr. Charles Brendon appeared before the Board.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the side and rear walls are carried up in brick eight inches thick, laid in cement mortar.

Appeal No. 173 of 1902, New Building No. 82 of 1902, premises No. 101 Canal street, Max Muller, Esq., architect and appellant.

To allow the building to be constructed six stories 71 feet 6 inches to highest point of roof beams, with the walls in cellar 20 inches thick, in first, second, third and fourth stories 16 inches thick, and in fifth and sixth stories 12 inches thick, rear wall 20 inches thick in second and third stories and 16 inches from thence to top, front wall to be skeleton construction and will be extended to top in same manner as shown for stories below. All walls throughout, from bottom to top, to be laid in cement mortar.

The building is now in the third story, with thickness of walls as per approved plans, but all laid in cement mortar, which was a provision of the contract between the owner and the builders. The owner desires now to make the building six stories high without lining the present walls, but would build the 16-inch portion of the side walls four stories high, or as high as the Board may direct.

The building will be used for light manufacturing and salesrooms, and will not carry any heavy stock.

Mr. Max Muller appeared before the Board.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the fourth story side walls are made 16 inches in thickness and that the fifth and sixth story side walls are made 12 inches in thickness, all laid in cement mortar.

Appeal No. 174, of 1902, New Building, No. 347, of 1902, premises southeast corner of Third avenue and Thirty-third street, George Fred Pelham, Esq., architect and appellant.

To omit the portion of the interior brick partition walls at front and rear section where span exceeds 26 feet between bearing walls, and substitute a 10-inch, 25-pound steel girder at front and 12-inch, 31 1/2-pound steel girder at rear spanning one room.

To build and continue a wall at these portions would interfere and encroach on the area space of the room as required by the Tenement House Act; the plan of rooms as arranged are so figured that each room contains the lawful amount of floor area. It would, further, be a hardship to be compelled to build a wall, as same would necessitate a complete rearrangement of plans.

It is proposed to provide fire stop at centre of building as follows: At rear a 3-inch burnt clay partition supported on girder at each story, ends of wood floor beams to rest on angles bolted on each side of girders. Ends of wood beams butting against girders encased with tin.

At front girder provided with angles on each side for support of ends of wooden floor beams, same will have ends where they butt up against girder encased with tin, and 3-inch burnt clay partition provided.

All doors in fireproof partitions to be the J. W. Rapp's "Kelemine" method of fireproof doors, same to be made self-closing, all as shown on plans filed.

Mr. George Kaiser appeared before the Board.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the partitions marked "A" on plans, running from dumbwaiter to gable wall, be built fireproof above the first story.

Appeal No. 175, of 1902, New Building No. 287, of 1902, premises southeast corner Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Fortieth street, Frederick C. Browne, Esq., architect and appellant.

Permission is requested to omit the brick partition walls at places marked "A" on plans and to substitute girders of two 9-inch, 21-pound steel beams with spaces between beams, composing same filled in with brickwork (as shown on sketch).

Mr. F. C. Browne and Mr. M. J. Hackett appeared before the Board.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the partitions nearest to the proposed floor fire-stops, and separating the apartments, be filled in solidly between the studs with fireproof material.

Appeal No. 176, of 1902, New Building, No. 349, of 1902, premises southwest corner Avenue B and Fourth street, M. Bernstein, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is proposed to put up 12-inch, 31 1/2-pound I B's in front of rear of building where span exceeds 26 feet, said girders to have partitions of 4-inch hollow fire-clay blocks, and where doors open in said partitions they will be covered with metal.

If compelled to put up brick, we would have to support same above stores, which would be bad construction, as it would concentrate all the weight at first story ceiling.

Mr. J. Bernstein appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved on condition that the ends of the wooden beams butting against the iron girders be encased with tin, and also on the further condition that the partitions extending from little chimney around to the street gable wall be filled in solidly between studs with fireproof material on every story above the first.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for Quarter Ending December 31, 1901.

Honorable SETH LOW, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending December 31, 1901.

REPORT.

On the 31st day of December, 1901, the number of the Force of all grades (including those on probation) was 7,618.

Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 17,695 1/2 days; the sick time paid, 8,847 3/4 days, and sick time unpaid, 8,847 3/4 days. Total days' time of the Force was 678,092 days. Per cent of sick to full time, 2.61; for preceding quarter, 2.97.

Arrests.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 26,086; females, 5,987; total, 32,073. Number arrested for principal felonies, 3,235. Number discharged without trial, 1,102; number acquitted, 474; number convicted, 458; number sent to other authorities, 59; number died, 10; number pending, 1,132.

Lost Children.

An offence charged in the station house, at the time of the arrest, is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offence on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

Each applicant was examined as to his experience, qualifications and knowledge of steam boilers and engines. Of this number 4,003 passed a satisfactory examination, and were granted certificates, and 192 were rejected.

ARMORY BOARD.

New York, June 9, 1902.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The minutes of the meeting held April 11, 1902, were read and approved by the following vote:

On the request of Colonel Barnes, Commandant of the Twenty-third Regiment, N. G., N. Y., the Board listened to a statement from Major Hamilton, who presented a comparative estimate of the cost of lighting the armory of his organization with electricity and gas.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication from the Deputy Comptroller was received, transmitting a communication from Colonel Dyer, Commanding the Twelfth Regiment, N. G.,

N. Y., and the bill of Joseph W. O'Brien, for work done in the armory of the Twelfth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., without an order; this work was necessary in 1901.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the communication of Colonel Dyer, and the bill of Joseph W. O'Brien be referred to the Vice-Chairman for consideration and report, in connection with the bills for work done in 1901, heretofore submitted to him.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from the Deputy Comptroller, transmitting a notice of date April 25, 1902, from the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan, of a violation on the armory in course of construction on West Sixty-sixth street. The Secretary reported that, upon a closer examination, the Inspector of Buildings discovered that the work was not in violation.

Ordered filed.

Two communications, of dates May 5 and May 6, were received from the Deputy Comptroller, transmitting notices from the Superintendent of Buildings, in the Borough of Manhattan, of violations of the Building Law on the construction of the Seventh, Ninth, Twelfth, Twenty-second and Sixty-ninth Regiment armories.

A communication was also received from the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, transmitting similar notices from the Superintendent of Buildings as to the same violations of the Building Laws.

The Secretary of the Armory Board reported that he had examined the armories which the Superintendent of Buildings reported to be in violation of the Building Law, and made an estimate of the cost of such alterations as would be necessary to remove the same. He also examined the other armories of the N. G., N. Y., and found the following violations existing, viz.:

In the Borough of Brooklyn.

Fourteenth Regiment Armory—Doors on Fourteenth street side, also on Fifteenth street side and on Eighth avenue side, open inwardly instead of outwardly, as required by law.

Twenty-third Regiment—Doors on Bedford avenue side, also on Atlantic avenue side, open inwardly instead of outwardly, as required by law. There being only one exit from drill floor opening on Atlantic avenue, there is urgent need of another exit of the same size, placed on the opposite side of drill floor to open on Pacific street.

In the Borough of Queens.

Seventeenth Separate Company—Doors to open outwardly as required by law.

The Secretary further reported that a careful estimate of the cost of the alterations necessary to remove these violations, would in his opinion be \$8,800, for the Borough of Manhattan, and \$5,500 for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, and recommended that this work be done and that the violations be thus removed, as early as practicable.

Brigadier-General James McLeer offered the following:

Resolved, That the notices of violations on the armories, and the report of the Secretary be referred, as to Manhattan, to the Committee on Manhattan armories, namely, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith, and as to Brooklyn and Queens to the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries, transmitting plans and specifications for improving the site of the proposed armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, with an estimate of the cost of the same.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting a copy of resolution adopted on April 7, 1902, authorizing the lease of premises on Bathgate avenue, south of Tremont avenue, for a temporary armory for the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y.

The Secretary also transmitted a communication from the Rev. Peter Farrell, of date April 18, 1902, owner of said premises, declining to enter into the proposed lease, together with a report from the Engineer of the Finance Department, and a protest submitted by Michael Redmond, et al., against locating an armory at that point.

Mr. Redmond was present, and presented his protest in person.

The Secretary presented a communication from Rev. Peter Farrell, of date May 5, 1902, agreeing to the terms of lease for said site, and the construction of an armory building thereon, for the term of three years, at three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750) per annum.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby recommend the acceptance of the proposal of Rev. Peter Farrell, and requests the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in an authorization of a lease to the City of the premises on the west side of Bathgate avenue, 76.93 feet south of Tremont avenue, in the Borough of the Bronx, together with a two-story brick building to be erected thereon, 108 feet front by 129 feet 8 inches deep, for the use of the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y., for a term of three years, with the privilege of one or more years renewal at a reasonable increase, from year to year, commencing from the date of the completion of the proposed building, plans for which have been exhibited and approved by the commanding officer of the battery, at an annual rental of three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750), payable quarterly.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from the Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, transmitting a complaint from the Moquin-Offerman-Heissenbittel Coal Company, complaining in regard to their payments for coal delivered to armories. A similar letter was received by the Secretary to the Armory Board.

A communication was received from Joseph W. Irwin, applying for position of Inspector.

Communications were received from Mr. H. J. Hardenbergh, of date April 17, 1902, from Messrs. Vincent Colyer Griffith and A. D. F. Hamlin, of date April 21, 1902, accepting appointments as Advisory Architects by the Armory Board.

Communications were received from Colonel William G. Bates, commanding the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith, commanding First Brigade, N. G., N. Y., and Captain Oscar Erlandsen, commanding First Signal Corps, N. G., N. Y., giving approximately the sizes and locations of the various rooms required for their organizations in the proposed new armory building, to be erected on the southeast corner of Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue.

The Secretary reported that the Advisory Architects, Messrs. Post and Hardenbergh, had been furnished with surveys of the sites for the proposed armories for the Sixty-ninth and Seventy-first Regiments, together with the number and approximate areas of the rooms for the several organizations to be quartered therein, and advised that the Armory Board is desirous of progressing the plan of competition for designs.

The Secretary also reported that on April 16, in obedience to the resolution passed at the last meeting, plans and specifications for the proposed armory for the Second Naval Battalion, in the Borough of Brooklyn, had been transmitted to the Advisory Architects.

A communication was received from Consulting Architect George B. Post, acknowledging the receipt of plans and information relative to the Sixty-ninth and Seventy-first Regiment armories.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from Commander W. B. Franklin, commanding First Naval Battalion, for alterations to the U. S. S. "New Hampshire," to accommodate the Signal Division recently added to that organization by the Military Code.

The Secretary reported that he had examined the ship "New Hampshire," relative to the alterations for which Commander Franklin has made requisition and estimated the cost, in his judgment, to be \$2,200.

Colonel Bates, commanding the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., addressed the Board on behalf of alterations to the present quarters for his organization.

Brigadier-General George Moore Smith offered the following:

Resolved, That the matter of repairs to the Seventy-first Regiment quarters in the Lenox Lyceum, Fifty-ninth street and Madison avenue, be referred to the Committee on Manhattan Armories, namely, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Colonel Kip, of the Seventh Regiment, N. G., N. Y., appeared before the Board and advocated immediate action in regard to alterations and improvements to the steam heating plant in the armory of his organization.

On motion of the Mayor, the matter was referred to a committee consisting of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A motion to adjourn was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

NOTICES TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him, therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to The City.

The contracts must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by The City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
