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BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

Board of Armory Commissioners, }
New York City, July 31, 1905. }

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 2 o'clock, p. m., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Printed copies of the minutes of the meetings held June 12 and June 19, 1905, were presented and adopted.

A representative of the Comptroller was present, and in response to advertisements in the CITY RECORD, of date July 18, 1905, bids and proposals were received for repairs and alterations to armories in Manhattan and Brooklyn, as follows:

A communication was received from the Deputy Comptroller, of date July 5, 1905, advising the Armory Board that on July 30, 1905, \$50,325.59 was deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Armory Board.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by that Body, at a meeting held July 14, 1905, concurring in the resolution of the Armory Board, and authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$9,817.50, for an alteration to the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

Ordered filed.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by that Body at a meeting held June 26, 1905, authorizing a sale of the buildings and appurtenances thereto erected upon the property acquired by the City as a site for an addition to the armory of the Thirteenth Regiment.

Ordered filed.

The Secretary reported the receipt of a lien against Ryan & McFerran, contractors for the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, by Clifford L. Miller & Co.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

A communication was received from Messrs. Hunt & Hunt, architects for the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory Building, requesting the action of the Board in relation to certain proposed changes in that armory, and the Secretary presented the following report of the Committee on Armories:

"The City of New York, July 6, 1905.

"The Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Chairman, Board of Armory Commissioners:
"Dear Sir—The Committee on Armories begs to report that, at a meeting held July 6, 1905, the following subjects were considered:

"Floors in the hallways and renovating Armorer's rooms in the Eighth Regiment Armory. The Committee estimates the expense to be \$3,000 and recommends that the floors be repaired.

"The Committee also recommends that a particular estimate, with a description of the work, be presented to the Board, for new boilers and repairs to the heating apparatus in the Seventh Regiment Armory.

"That the Secretary be directed to report as to the cost of an engineer's estimate of the necessary work for a new drill floor, together with the cost of foundations, for the Fourteenth Regiment Armory.

"With regard to the elevator service in the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory, the Committee deem it unwise to change the plans and specifications at the present time, and with regard to the proposal to make the changes as indicated on Drawings 104, 105 and 110, covering the erection of platforms for seats and necessary alterations to heating and lighting apparatus, etc., the Committee does not look with favor upon the same at the present time.

"The Committee recommend that the wagon entrance to the drill floor in the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory, at an expense of four hundred and sixty-nine dollars (\$469), and that the change in the size of the colonel's and officers' rooms, in the same armory, as recommended by the architects, at an expense of four hundred and ninety-three dollars, be made, the total cost of these changes being within the appropriation for said armory.

"With regard to the lockers, gas fixtures and furniture, as well as the finishing of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, as recommended by the architects, at a total cost of \$139,186, the Committee suggests that this expenditure be considered by the full Board.

—be authorized by the Armory Board, and that the James D. Murphy Company be directed to do the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from Elliott Bigelow, Jr., Captain, Second Company Signal Corps, requesting the assignment of the armory now occupied by Squadron 6, N. G., N. Y., to the use of his organization, when vacated.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens.

The Secretary reported that, pursuant to a resolution of the Armory Board adopted June 12, 1905, the survey map or plan of the site for an enlargement to the armory site for Squadron "C," had been filed in the offices of the Registers of the City and Counties of New York and Kings, and a true copy thereof in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby recommend the acquisition by purchase of the plot beginning at a point on the northerly line of President street 100 feet westerly of the westerly side of Rogers avenue; thence in a northeasterly direction 255 feet 7 inches and parallel with Rogers avenue to a point on the southerly line of Union street; thence in a northwesterly direction, distance 121 feet 6 inches, along the southerly side of Union street; thence in a southwesterly direction 255 feet 7 inches to the northerly side of President street; thence in a southeasterly direction along the northerly side of President street 121 feet 6 inches, to the point or place of beginning, for an addition to the armory plot for Squadron "C," N. G., S. N. Y., in accordance with the provisions of sections 134 and 135 of the Military Code and amendments thereto, and does hereby request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to purchase said site, at the price heretofore agreed upon, namely, thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500), which amount is hereby appropriated by the Armory Board, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board recommends the leasing of the premises now occupied as an armory by the Seventeenth Separate Company, Flushing, in the Borough of Queens, known as No. 140 Amity street, being about 75 by 179 feet in size, from James V. Graham, the owner, at a rental of fifty dollars (\$50) per month, for June, July and August, and two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) monthly thereafter, at the option of the Armory Board; lighting and heating the buildings upon said premises during the term of occupancy by said Seventeenth Separate Company, as well as the water charges, but not for the use of other tenants, to be provided for by the City; and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same, and the Comptroller authorized to execute the lease.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Acting President of the Board of Aldermen was excused upon request.

A communication was received from Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects for the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory, transmitting specifications and prints of material and labor to be furnished in connection with the erection of oak wainscot, doors, trim, etc.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby authorize the alteration and improvement to the armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by the architects, at an expense not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), that the amount be and is hereby appropriated for the purpose, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur in the same, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds to provide funds therefor; and that the Secretary be authorized to advertise for bids and proposals for the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary presented applications and affidavits, on account of work at various armories, with certificates of the architects and Inspectors, and the Acting Mayor offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to John Kennedy & Son, contractors, the sum of \$41,820, as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the erection and completion of an armory building for Troop "C," N. G., N. Y., on Bedford avenue, extending from President to Union streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Pilcher, Thomas & Tachau, architects, the sum of ten hundred and forty-five dollars (\$1,045), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the preparation of plans and specifications and the supervision of the construction of an armory building for Troop "C," N. G., N. Y., in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to the Kenny Electrical Manufacturing Company the sum of four hundred and eighty-two dollars (\$482), as per accompanying voucher, for labor and materials in running conduits between switchboard and motors, and between switchboard and Edison service, in the armory of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as per resolutions of the Armory Board at meetings held February 14, 1905, and June 19, 1905.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby approve the bill and expense of Lord & Hewlett, architects, for professional services in re additional labor and material in running conduits between the switchboard and motors, and between switchboard and Edison service, in the armory of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the amount of twenty-four dollars and ten cents (\$24.10), and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur and the Comptroller authorized to pay.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to the Fleischmann Realty and Construction Company, contractors, the sum of ten thousand nine hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$10,965), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the erection and completion of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory Building, Thirty-fourth street and Fourth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to the James D. Murphy Company, contractors, the sum of thirty-one thousand two hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-four cents (\$31,251.64), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the erection and completion of an armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., on Lexington avenue, Twenty-fifth street to Twenty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Messrs. Hunt and Hunt, architects, the sum of \$781.29, as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for professional services required in the preparation of plans and specifications and the supervision of the construction of an armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to James McFerran, contractor, the sum of \$12,325, as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for the erection and completion of the Second Battalion Naval Militia Armory, First avenue, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Thomas Dillon & Sons, contractors, the sum of two thousand seven hundred and twenty-five dollars and fifty-one cents (\$2,725.51), as per accompanying voucher, on account of his contract for furnishing materials and labor required in alterations and repairs to the Eighth Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to pay to Lord & Hewlett, architects, the sum of three hundred and eight dollars and twelve cents (\$308.12), as per accompanying voucher, on account of their contract for the preparation of the plans and specifications, and the supervision of the construction of an armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects for the new Seventy-first Regiment Armory, transmitting detailed estimates of the approximate cost of proposed furniture and fixtures in that armory, as follows:

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from Messrs. Lord & Hewlett, architects, of date June 21, 1905, suggesting certain changes in the wire glass for the roof of the main skylight of the armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, and in the 3-8-inch thick glass called for in the vertical windows of the drill shed.

After discussion, the Armory Board disapproved of the change.

Colonel Bates, Commanding the Seventy-first Regiment, N. G., N. Y., addressed the Board, relative to the question of lighting fixtures and lockers for the new armory of his organization.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, to which was referred the plans and specifications for the addition to the armory of the Thirteenth Regiment, H. A., N. G., N. Y., prepared by Walter E. Parfitt, architect, approving the said plans.

Brigadier-General McLeer offered the following:

Resolved, That the plans and specifications and estimate of cost, as submitted by the architect, Walter E. Parfitt, for the proposed addition to the Thirteenth Regiment Armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be accepted and adopted, and that an appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) be and is hereby made for the erection of the building; that the Secretary be directed to transmit this resolution with the plans and specifications to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for their concurrence, and to authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the amount.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary reported that, of the several bids received at this meeting for Item No. 1, as advertised, for alterations and repairs to the Seventh Regiment Armory, the bid of Neptune B. Smyth, No. 1123 Broadway, in the amount of \$1,641, was the lowest, and was in form.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

Resolved, That the bid of Neptune B. Smyth, No. 1123 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for Item No. 1, alterations and repairs to the Seventh Regiment Armory, amounting to the sum of sixteen hundred and forty-one dollars (\$1,641), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work; that the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence and to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved, the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected, and the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Acting Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary further reported that, of the three bids presented for Item No. 2, alterations to the new Seventy-first Regiment Armory, that of the Fleischman Construction Company, No. 170 Broadway, for \$22,675, was in form and was the lowest.

The Secretary stated that the estimated cost of this work was \$9,817.50, including the architect's fees.

The bids were referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx, and the Secretary was directed to notify the committee and those interested to meet at the Mayor's office, on Thursday, August 3, 1905, at 11 o'clock a. m.

The Secretary further reported as to the Item No. 3, that of the two bids received, the bid of John Kennedy & Son, \$45,800, was the lowest, and in form.

The Secretary stated that the estimated cost of this work was \$31,869.91, including architect's fees.

The bids were referred to the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, to meet on Thursday, with the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A motion to adjourn until Monday, August 7, 1905, at 2 o'clock p. m., was adopted.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, April 11, 1905, at 2 p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis and Chief Engineer Smith.

In the absence of the Secretary, Frank H. Warder was designated Acting Secretary.

Minutes of April 7, 1905, were read and approved.

The Construction Committee returned to the Commissioners the following report of the Acting Chief Engineer:

Report No. 1182.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

Gentlemen—In connection with the construction of the Cross River Reservoir and Croton Falls Reservoir it will be necessary to provide an office building for the accommodation of the engineers of the Katonah Division. No existing building near the site of the work is available and suitable for this work, and so I have had drawings prepared for an inexpensive frame office building to be built on lands of the City near the site of the Cross River Dam in Katonah.

Four local builders were requested to bid on the work, and three bids were received as follows:

Daniel Carpenter, Ossining, N. Y.....	\$3,000 00
W. H. Fowler, Katonah, N. Y.....	3,650 00
W. J. Daniel, Katonah, N. Y.....	4,350 00

This work should be completed in from about 60 to 80 working days, and I have estimated its cost at between \$2,500 and \$3,000.

I therefore recommend that the Chief Engineer be given authority to engage Daniel Carpenter, of Ossining, N. Y., to erect an office building for the Katonah Division for the sum of \$3,000.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

The work to be done is to fill in with suitable material, as hereinafter described, the area behind the new bulkhead wall extending from a line 48 feet south of the southerly side of West Sixteenth street and perpendicular to the bulkhead line, northerly along the bulkhead line a distance of about 740 feet to a line at right angles to the bulkhead wall and 105 feet north of the northerly side of West Eighteenth street.

The filling will extend from the rear of the bulkhead wall or coping easterly a distance of about from 40 to 100 feet to the bank excavated in the recent dredging.

The filling will be brought to a grade level with the top of the coping of the bulkhead wall and will extend inshore on a regular grade to the top of the ground at the adjacent or inshore bank.

It is estimated that the area outlining the above-described limits will create a basin to be filled in, under this agreement, whose cubical contents in net void space is equal to 40,000 cubic yards.

Bidders will state in writing a lump sum price, which they agree to pay for the privilege of filling in the area between about West Sixteenth and West Eighteenth streets, as above more fully described, and being the basin calling for the filling of a void space estimated at about 40,000 cubic yards.

Should the Commissioner of Docks deem it to be the best interest of the City, he may extend the southerly limit of this fill southerly a distance of about 567 feet to a point at the southerly side of West Fourteenth street. Should the limits of the fill be extended southerly to this new line, a basin will be created in addition to the above-described basin, whose cubical contents in net void space will be equal to about 37,000 cubic yards.

In the event of this extra filling being ordered by the Commissioner of Docks, it will be estimated at the same proportional rate as is received for the void space in the first section, whose southerly limit is about 48 feet south of the southerly side of West Sixteenth street, the prices on this first or northerly section being the prices on which the bids are to be tested.

In the estimated amount given, the amount in cubic yards is arrived at without placing any allowance for shrinkage, settlement, swelling of the material or penetration into the mud.

All the filling shall, unless otherwise directed, be placed directly in the rear of the bulkhead wall and carried from the bulkhead wall toward the shore until the same has been carried out at the finished grade for a distance of about 40 feet from the face of the bulkhead wall, at which time, if so directed by the Engineer, the filling shall be started at the bank and carried outshore toward the bulkhead wall or close row of piles.

All material must be dumped and filled in only in such manner, at such points and in such order of procedure and at such times and seasons as may, from time to time, be directed, and the work of filling in may be entirely suspended for such periods of time as may be directed by the Engineer. The purchaser shall have no claim for damage or for any allowance from the purchase money on account of such suspension of the work.

All directions shall be given by the Engineer, and wherever the word "Engineer" is used in these specifications it refers to and designates the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department of Docks and Ferries, or such officer or employee as may be designated by him.

Rip-rap stone coming directly on or against the bulkhead wall must be deposited carefully in such manner as will not injure the same.

All the filling, except as otherwise specified herein, shall be of ashes, cellar dirt, broken stone, etc., entirely free from garbage or any organic matter objectionable in the opinion of the Engineer.

At any section of the bulkhead wall the filling shall be brought up level with the under side of the backing log of the bulkhead wall at such section, and no higher, unless otherwise directed.

The filling shall be commenced within five days after the date of the receipt of a notification from the Engineer that the work, or any part of it, is ready to be begun, after which not less than 300 cubic yards per day shall be placed, and the whole amount of the filling called for to bring the above-described basin up to grade shall be completed within 135 days from the date of the receipt of said notification. At the expiration of this time this agreement shall be considered closed unless a further extension of time shall be given by the Commissioner of Docks. If at any time during the progress of the work it shall be deemed necessary to order the suspension of the whole or any part of the filling, the time for completing said filling shall be extended as much as it may have been delayed by such suspension.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
