AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), for the purpose of providing means for improving, permanently bettering and equipping the Richmond County Court House. Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment July 7, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000), for the purpose of providing means for improving, permanently bettering and equipping the Richmond County Court House, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

August 23, 1905, the Board of Aldermen having failed to pass upon the proposition within six weeks after the same was received, either by an affirmative vote or by a failure of a majority of all the members of the Board of Aldermen to vote against the same, therefore, in accordance with the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the proposition is deemed to be passed.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
