Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported upon the communication received from the architects relative to the cost of laundry machinery and equipment, under date of May 24, and recommended that authority be requested to use an unencumbered balance of \$20,000, which is available in “C-BH-10,” in addition to the sum of \$50,000 which was appropriated specifically for the laundry machinery. This recommendation was adopted.

It was resolved to appoint Dr. Joseph W. McCready as Assistant Physician to Out Patients (nose and throat), and Dr. Michael H. Barsky as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients at Harlem Hospital.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Committee on Officers and Employees, reported upon the request of the International Union of Steam Engineers received at last meeting, and recommended that the Stationary Engineers in this Department receive two weeks’ vacation, provided no extra help will be required therefor. This report was approved.

The President submitted a list of bids received on May 26 for the supply of meats (lines 1 to 18), and butter (line 771). Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, it was resolved that the lowest bid should be accepted in each instance, namely, that of Conron Brothers Company and J. D. Stout & Company, respectively.

The bids received on May 26 for the supply of furniture for the men’s dormitory (lines 8 to 12, inclusive), were presented, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, the lowest bid was accepted and a contract awarded to Louis S. Gimbel accordingly.

The bids received on May 26 for the enlargement and enclosure of the balconies of Fordham Hospital were also presented, as follows: Benedetto & Egan Construction Company, \$21,634; Wexler & Nickisch, \$22,550; J. M. Knopp, \$23,335; John H. Parker Company, \$23,950.

In connection therewith, a communication was received from the architect, R. F. Almirall, dated May 31, recommending the acceptance of the lowest bid. In accordance therewith, it was resolved to award a contract to the Benedetto & Egan Construction Company.

Bids received on May 26 for the installation of a fire alarm system at Harlem Hospital were also presented, as follows: Phillips Manufacturing Company, \$1,157; T. Frederick Jackson, Inc., \$1,492; Gamewell Fire Alarm Telegraph Company, \$1,758.25; Frederick Pearce Company, \$1,900. On the suggestion of the Building Committee, it was resolved to refer these bids to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for recommendation.

The President reported that he had attended the public hearing held by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in regard to the requests of this Department for corporate stock to be issued during the year 1911, and that he had urged that the sum of \$35,000 be included in the Budget for the purpose of constructing roof wards at Fordham Hospital to meet the overcrowding in that institution, particularly in the maternity service, and had also urged that the sum of \$10,000 be appropriated for the construction of a Children’s Ward at Gouverneur Hos-

pital, and that both of the requests had been tentatively granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building Committee, recommended the acceptance of an estimate amounting to \$250 received from the Yorke Manufacturing Company for connecting the refrigerator in the Children's Ward of Pavilions A and B with the rest of the brine system. The recommendation was approved.

Communications.

A communication dated May 25 was received from the P. J. Carlin Construction Company relative to the claim amounting to \$1,050 which Blake & Williams had filed with them at the suggestion of the Trustees. This communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication dated May 18 was received from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, assigning to the Department of Correction two old ambulance horses named "Willie" and "Jerry," stationed at Harlem Hospital.

A communication dated May 23 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approving the plans, etc., for grading a portion of the grounds at Bellevue Hospital and constructing a tennis court thereon at a cost not exceeding \$850.

A communication dated May 23 was received from the Board of Health, forwarding copies of section 189 of the Sanitary Code prohibiting the use of a common drinking cup or receptacle for drinking water in any public place. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent to comply with the requirements of these ordinances.

Reports dated May 25 were received from L. J. Frees, General Inspector of Construction, relative to the progress of the work of the new Bellevue Hospital.

Communications dated May 25 and 29 were presented from the Department of Finance relative to the violation by the contractor for vegetables of the specifications of his contract. Reports thereon were submitted from the General Storekeeper and from the contractor in question, and the communications were referred to the Committee on Supplies and General Medical Superintendent.

A communication dated May 9 was received from the General Medical Superintendent, stating that the piping at Fordham Hospital, which is placed under ground, is constantly giving out, and that the Supervising Engineer has recommended that new piping laid in trenches be installed at once at an estimated cost of \$1,600 or \$1,700. A report was also received from R. F. Almiral, dated May 20, approving the suggestion, but stating that it was not necessary to execute the work at the present time. The question was referred to Mr. Farley and Mr. Drummond.

A communication dated May 29 was received from the Catholic Chaplains at Bellevue Hospital, requesting an increase of salary. Referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees and Mr. O'Keefe.

Unfinished Business.

Consideration was given to the applications received for the place of Assistant Medical Superintendent, and after discussion, it was resolved to appoint, subject to the approval of the Civil Service Commission, Dr. Walter H. Conley to the place of Assistant Medical Superintendent at a salary of \$3,500 and maintenance.

New Business.

It was resolved to request permission from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to flush the grounds of the hospitals and to spray the lawns, at the same time promising as economical use of water as possible.

It was resolved that the hours of breakfast for the house staff in the various hospitals of the Department should be fixed at from 7.30 to 8.30, and that breakfast should not be served after that hour without permission from the Superintendent. Adjourned.
