### Minutes of Meeting Held Thursday, February 3, 1910.

Stated meeting, 3 p. m.

Present—Commissioners Stover, President; Higgins, Kennedy.

A representative of the Comptroller being present and the meeting open to the public, the estimate box was opened and all the bids or proposals which have been received pursuant to a duly published advertisement were opened and read, as follows:

Commissioner Stover offered the following:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond be and he hereby is authorized to cause plans, specifications and forms of contracts to be prepared for the following works in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Central Park, and when so prepared and the contracts shall have been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, to publish advertisements inviting proposals for the same.

1. Changes in electric feeder system and night light control.

2. For new electric fixtures throughout the main building.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Stover, Higgins, Kennedy—3.

Commissioner Stover offered the following:

Resolved, That the proposal of the lowest formal bidder for furnishing 400 corrugated galvanized iron panels for the American Museum of Natural History, for which bids have been this day received be forwarded to the Comptroller for his approval of sureties and when so approved that a contract for the same be entered into and executed by the President for and on behalf of this Board.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioners Stover, Higgins, Kennedy—3.

The President called attention to the matter of the salary of the Secretary of the Board as contained in the resolution adopted at the previous meeting, and to the necessity of changing the same to conform to the grade established for that position, whereupon Commissioner Kennedy moved to amend the resolution adopted on the 27th ult., appointing the Secretary of the Board at a salary of \$4,000 per annum by striking out said amount and inserting in lieu thereof the sum of \$4,800, so as to make said resolution read as follows:

Resolved, That Clinton H. Smith be appointed Secretary of the Park Board at a salary of \$4,800 a year to date from January 1, 1910, and that the President of the Park Board be empowered to appear before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and request the establishment of the grade of Secretary to the Park Board at \$4,000 a year.

## Orders Issued by the Board of Health.

Orders of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued under the supervision of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents in the various Boroughs, upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. These orders call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alterations, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within three days from the receipt of the order. If upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the order have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under sections 1172 and 1222, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

## Searches and Transcripts of Births, Marriages and Deaths.

Certified copies of the records of vital statistics as may be found to be on file in the Bureau of Records are furnished to applicants authorized to receive same, namely, interested parties, next of kin, legal representatives, etc., upon payment of the fee in such cases prescribed by the Board of Health. Written orders are signed by the Assistant Chief Clerk in the various Boroughs and issued to the Assistant Registrar of Records, authorizing the search and issuance of a transcript of the record, which, in accordance with the regulations of the Board, is authenticated by affixing the seal of the Department of Health, and attested by the signature of the Assistant Chief Clerk of the Borough. When search is made and the record is not found to be on file, an official certificate is issued to that effect.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contractor, partner, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the material set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
