BUREAU OF HIGHWAYS.

The total mileage of pavements in the Borough on September 30, 1912, was 765.801, compared with 756.254 at the close of the quarter June 30, 1912. It is divided among the various kinds of pavements as follows: Asphalt, 452.787; asphalt block, 29.311; granite, 136.131; Medina, 7.286; Belgian block, 16.982; trap rock, 1.009; cobble, 6.162; brick, 1.612; wood, 3.355; iron slag, 2.387; macadam, 108.779—765.801.

Pavements removed during the third quarter—Asphalt, 9.651 miles; granite, 5.436 miles; Belgian block, 2.076 miles; cobble, 0.170 mile, and several other classes of pavement.

Pavements laid during the third quarter—Asphalt, 23.333 miles; granite, 3.197 miles; asphalt block, 1.214 mile; iron slag, 0.055 mile; total laid, 27.799 miles; total removed, 18.252 miles; net increase, 9.547 miles.

Of the total number of streets to be improved, 50 were chargeable against "Repaving Bond Fund," and 32 were for asphalt, at a total cost of \$467,547.68. This compares with 26 contracts, amounting to \$482,605.14, during the second quarter. Four (4) were for asphalt block at a cost of \$116,465, and 10 for granite, at a cost of \$130,361.40.

Of assessment lists the office division completed 104, in duplicate, involving an amount of \$511,408.66. Ninety-four (94) were for regulating, grading, curbing, etc., at a cost of \$495,938.13; 5 for cement walks, at a cost of \$10,843.73, etc.

In addition, 48 lists were partially completed, and plans for new work numbered twenty-seven (27).

There were also 251 assessment lists in various stages of work: Miscellaneous plans, 4; profiles transmitted for Assessors, 56; fencing diagrams, 12; sets of specifications (5 copies each), 88; plans filed, 91; total, 251.

Final estimates and surveys—Final estimates made, 154; repaving contracts (line and grade), 55; grade and pave, 29; track grades, 10; grade lots, 3; miscellaneous surveys, 17; law surveys, 42.

Of preliminary estimates for original improvements 253 were prepared for local board consideration in the amount of \$2,254,418, as compared with 180 for second quarter costing \$1,017,627.

House numbers assigned, 1,640; inspections, 75; notices served to correct, 60; complaints of duplicate numbers settled, 7.

Work done by connection gangs—Granite on concrete, 4,078 square yards; granite on sand, 9,490 square yards; Belgian block, 1,496 square yards; cobble, 211 square yards; Medina, 241 square yards; brick, 80 square yards; iron slag, 57 square yards; wood block, 94 square yards; asphalt block, 436 square yards; macadam, 1,310 square yards; total, 17,493 square yards. By country gangs—Macadam repairs, 47,183 square yards; dirt roadway repairs (hand), 292,552 square yards; dirt roadway repairs (machine), 788,020 square yards; ash sidewalk repairs, 2,268 square yards; dirt sidewalk repairs, 3,299 square yards; miscellaneous paved gutters, repairs, 8,693 square yards; paved gutters, cleaned, 15,066 square yards; stone crushed, 2,108 cubic yards; streets sprinkled (water), 3,856 miles; streets sprinkled (oil), 1,541,728 square yards. Also other miscellaneous work performed by country gangs.

The force employed on repairs to country roads was—General Foremen, 1; Foremen, 24; Mechanics, 16; Laborers, 172; horses and trucks, 27; horses and wagons, 15; sprinklers, 18; carts, 11.

Miscellaneous work other than street repairs—Repairs to tools and equipments, repairs to bridges, miscellaneous trucking, grading, filling washouts, cleaning miscellaneous streets.

Complaints to the number of 2,690 were received and all given attention, and 1,989 satisfied. Of this number 979 were from the Police Department and 1,396 from citizens.

Municipal Asphalt Plant—Total plant product for quarter: 13,507 boxes wearing surface mixture, 125,615.10 cubic feet; 3,271 boxes binder, 31,892.25 cubic feet.

Work performed by street repair gangs—100,953.83 cubic feet wearing surface mixture laid; 22,746.76 cubic feet binder mixture laid.

The force employed at the plant is 1 Superintendent, 2 Foremen, 2 Engineers, 1 Automobile Engineer, 2 Stokers, 20 Asphalt Workers.

The force employed on street repairs made by the asphalt plant was 5 Foremen, 5 Engineers, 80 Asphalt Workers, 2 Laborers, 14 trucks.

Special and miscellaneous work at the plant—Repairs to plant, repairs to tools and equipment, building material, building dust collector, building roller shed, building tool shed, repair and paint workshop.

Work performed by opening gangs was 14,039.80 square yards of asphalt laid on 1,370 orders.

The force employed on the above was—Foremen, 2; Engineers, 2; Asphalt Workers, 27; Laborers, 1; trucks, 7.

Cement walks laid by permit and public contract:

Private contract—Number permits issued, 281; number permits carried over, 23.

Driveways—Number square feet sidewalk laid, 214,150; number linear feet curb laid, 276.

The Laboratory—Hydraulic cements, 536; asphalt pavement mixtures, 511; miscellaneous samples, 795; total, 1,842.

The contract work completed during the quarter is shown more specifically on the table attached to the report of the Chief Engineer, which I am submitting.

The Bureau of Highways received on special security deposits for the three months ending September 30, 1912, \$5,800, with refunds totaling \$5,600. On October 1 there was a credit balance of \$40,850; receipts over refunds, \$200.

For permits to open pavements for water, gas, sewers, electric light, telephone, etc., the sum of \$55,541.53 was received and credited to "Restoring and Repaving Fund," Code S. 99.

For vault privileges \$4,495.93 was received; credited to Sinking Fund.

Redemption of encumbrances seized, \$49.96, and credited to General Fund.

Repaving streets, amount received, \$14,583.65, and credited to C. P. B. 32.

The sum of \$1,857.37 was received and charged to S. A. 5, Street Improvement Fund.

BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES.

Complaints numbering 656 were received: Street Cleaning Department, 14; Bureau of Complaints, 20; mail, 117; office, 142; inspectors, 300; police, 63.

Permits issued—Building material, 347; crosswalks, 289; vaults, 11; vault repairs, 42; cement walks, 259; driveways, 100.

A total number of 3,687 permits were issued to the various corporations for street openings. Of this number 1,463 were to the Brooklyn Union Gas Co., and 936 to the Edison Electric Co.

About the same number of permits for stringing wires, placing lights in signs, and drawing cables, were issued, mostly to the New York Telephone Co., the Edison Electric Co., and the Flatbush Gas Co., which did not involve the opening of streets.

For further reference to the work of this division I submit detailed report of the Superintendent.

DIVISION OF SUBSTRUCTURES.

The duties of this division are: Accumulating all information obtainable by surveys and investigations as to the size, location and character of the structures under the streets and avenues of the borough, and making records of same on maps; assigning definite locations for new substructures, thereby reducing mutilations to a minimum.

Through the recommendations of the Engineer in charge of this division we have been instrumental in reducing pavement mutilations, also in preventing encroach

The number of basins built during the quarter was 125; three of these replaced basins abandoned on account of street widening proceedings, making a net increase of 122. This, added to the basins previously connected with the sewerage system (11,430), makes the total 11,552 on September 30, 1912.

On July 1, 1912, there remained on hand 40 resolutions for sewer improvements, amounting in estimated cost to \$1,642,900, for which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had, prior to that date, authorized the preparation of contract plans and specifications, and had further directed the resubmission of the matters when the preliminary work was done. Contract plans and specifications for 24 of these improvements, amounting in estimated cost to \$658,900, were completed and submitted. Plans for 5 of the improvements, amounting to \$79,100, are in course of preparation.

Ninety-three (93) reports upon sewer improvements, to precede paving and in response to petitions for sewers, were made. Forty-four (44) were to precede paving, the estimated cost of the sewer improvements required before paving being \$67,400, and 49 were for sewers petitioned for at a cost of \$160,450. The total mileage of sewers called for in these reports is 7.576.

During the quarter 2 petitions were received for construction of sewers by private contracts, plans and specifications for both of which were prepared and submitted.

Six resolutions of local boards, authorizing the construction of sewer basins, were received, aggregating a total estimated cost of \$1,400.

Statement and blueprints are herewith attached to the report of the Bureau of Sewers, showing contracts entered into during the quarter, contracts completed during the quarter, and contracts in progress which were uncompleted on September 30, 1912, with a summary showing the magnitude of the work carried on under the jurisdiction of the bureau.

Also attached to the report of the Bureau of Sewers will be found a detailed report of the Superintendent of the Division of Maintenance, showing work done and materials used in maintaining the sewerage system of the Borough:

OFFICE OF GENERAL BOOKKEEPER.

The General Bookkeeper has submitted to me a detailed report of the third quarter, showing accounting, for the department, of all moneys received by appropriation, transfer of funds, and all moneys expended for contracts, requisitions, supplies, etc.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

The work of the Topographical Bureau consists of preparation of surveys by "Field Force" for profiles in connection with improvements, and work performed by "Office Division" in the preparation of necessary maps, reports, etc.

The activities of this bureau are broad and general in scope, the bureau performing work and compiling data for the use of other departments of the City government, as well as for the bureaus under the jurisdiction of the Borough President.

Summing up, the duties of the Topographical Bureau may be defined as follows:

1. To make topographical surveys and computations, and to prepare maps, plans and profiles, sketches, etc., for altering the map or plan of The City of New York, and for acquiring title to streets, avenues, public parks, places, etc.

2. To mark on the ground, by means of monument stones, etc., the lines of streets, and to protect monuments in the streets when improvements are being made.

3. To prepare maps and technical descriptions for the Local Boards, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Corporation Counsel and Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of altering the map or plan of The City of New York and of acquiring title to streets, avenues, etc.

4. To prepare certificates of dedication for streets in which the City has an easement for the use of the public, and also statements of facts for submission to the Corporation Counsel in order that he can determine whether improvements may be made without instituting condemnation proceedings in the streets for which the statements of facts are submitted.

5. To furnish, when requested, reports on the legal status of streets, not only for the other bureaus of the borough government, but for the City departments, i. e., Street Cleaning Department, Taxes and Assessments, Bridges, Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, also for the public generally.

6. To connect the traverse lines, monumented street lines and monumented lines holding the triangulation stations to the several secondary stations or towers in this Borough.

7. To make surveys and prepare plans and profiles for all original improvements that are undertaken by the Bureau of Highways; to determine, for all contracts let by the Highway Bureau, the amount of excavation, fill, number of linear feet of curbing, number of square feet of sidewalk, number of cubic yards of concrete and the number of square yards of asphalt, and to furnish the contractors with line stakes and grade stakes, and monthly estimates of cost of preparing maps in street openings for use of the office of the Corporation Counsel. This statement shows the names of the persons employed in the preparation of the maps, the dates and days of the month so employed, and the number of hours occupied, in order that the cost items may be charged to the expense of the several street-opening proceedings indicated on the monthly statement.

A great deal of the routine work of the office, which took considerable time, such as the care and preservation of monument stones, the keeping of the detailed records of the office, the accumulation of records which had been missing, the numerous investigations necessary to make reports on the legal status of streets, the many replies, both oral and written, to inquiries as to the legal status of streets, etc., are not, and cannot well be, included in the report submitted by the Chief Engineer of the Topographical Bureau.

The "field work," which was required for and which is included in the maps and reports under the head of "office work," consists of chaining, line work, angular measurements, leveling and damage survey work, and the amount of this work, which was done as required during the quarter, is given below:

907,100 feet of chaining, 18,900 feet of precise chaining, 888,200 feet of approximate chaining.

19,000 feet precise line work.

36 angles measured.

46,759 feet profile for regulating, grading, etc. (original improvements for 39 streets).

101,419 feet line and grade stakes set (original improvements for 74 streets).

37,808 feet damage surveys for 12 streets.

Surveys for profiles for regulating, grading, etc., original improvements, affecting forty streets, were made (total 47,350 feet).

Line and grade stakes set, seventy-four original improvements, and covered 101,419 linear feet.

Damage surveys, in street opening proceedings, on twelve streets, representing 37,808 linear feet, were made.

Monument Lines Fixing Streets—Monument points set, 3; monuments re-referenced, 34; monuments reset, 32; monument covers set, 2; monuments found (not previously reported), 1; total, 72.

Fourteen maps were completed and forwarded to the Board of Estimate for adoption, showing change of lines of streets, closing, locating and laying out and change of grades.

Thirteen maps, or general sketches, for special reports, and copies of maps previously prepared and forwarded were made.

Six maps, showing encroachments on streets, were prepared for our Division of Encumbrances.

Streets and Street Openings—This work, in addition to furnishing a mass of oral information, consists in preparing statements of facts for submission to the Corporation Counsel. It requires an accurate search of all records in this and the other public offices, besides a thorough examination on the ground of the physical condition of each street.

Several statements of facts were forwarded to the Corporation Counsel. These statements furnish all obtainable information, documentary and physical, that tends to prove a dedication of each street to public use. The question of decision as to sufficient evidence of dedication without the necessity of condemnation proceedings is determined by the Corporation Counsel.

A number of maps were submitted to the Corporation Counsel in condemnation proceedings, consisting of rule maps, draft damage maps, final maps and amendments and additions for street opening maps.

The total number of rule maps were thirteen and comprised 42,625 feet, or 5.233 miles, of streets. There were also thirteen streets, covering fifteen draft damage maps, representing 1,135 plots, 2,842,769 square feet, or 1,421.385 city lots, and a total length of 5.233 miles. These maps are used by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to determine the amount of awards for lands and buildings taken in the opening of the streets.

Draft benefit maps, totaling thirty streets, comprising fifteen maps, and covering 4,536 plots, were made. These maps show the limits of assessment for opening a street, and give lot and block dimensions. They are forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, together with the "draft damage maps," for certification before the appointment of Commissioners, as required by resolution of that Board on March 26, 1909.

Final damage and benefit maps, covering thirty streets, and representing 541 sheets, were made and sent to the Corporation Counsel. The final damage maps are made in duplicate and final benefit maps in triplicate. These are the last maps for street opening proceedings. They are copies of the draft damage and benefit maps, with the additions of any modifications that may have been decided upon by the Commissioners' report, which is placed on file at the confirmation of each street opening proceeding.

There were fifty plans and profiles (original improvements) for regulating, grading, etc., covering 58,717 feet, or 11.12 miles of streets.

BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

The Superintendent reports on the work of his bureau during the third quarter on the number of applications filed for new buildings, their cost, and plans for alterations and repairs, etc.

Number of violations: Defective plumbing and drainage, 218; defective light and ventilation, 9; defective construction and material, 25; erecting and altering without permit, 655; insufficient means of escape, fire escapes out of repair, etc., 214; unsafe buildings, 54.

Notices issued during quarter ending September 30, 1912: To remove unsafe buildings, 1,096; of disapproval of plans, 54; to repair passenger elevators, 25.

Complaints regarding buildings, numbering fifty-one, were received, and upon investigation remedied except in some instances, where complaints were unfounded. These numbered twenty-six.

Passenger elevators to the number of 1,653 were examined, and only twenty-five were found to be not in compliance with the law.

Disposition of cases found not in compliance with the law: No grating under overhead machinery: Pending, June 30, 1912, 135; received since, 25; total, 160. Law complied with, 24; pending, September 30, 1912, 136.

Inspections of iron and steel numbered 9,543; construction inspections, 48,736, and applications for ordinary repairs made on construction slip blanks, 638; number of inspections disapproved, 279.

Iron and steel inspections: Beams, 4,001; columns, 1,831; lintels, 590; channels, 616; girders, 1,351; angles, 95; shoe plates, 485; trusses, 25; bases, 61; total, 9,255.

Thirty-two applications were for seventy-nine tenements, estimated to cost less than \$20,000, at a total estimated cost of \$725,000.

Thirty-four applications were for forty-one stores and two-families, at a total estimated cost of \$223,650; one office building, costing \$5,000; eighteen factories and workshops; total cost, \$263,100.

Four school houses, costing \$420,000; three churches, costing \$140,000.

Six applications for public buildings (municipal), hospitals, orphan asylums, homes, etc., at a total cost of \$310,500.

Sixteen for public buildings, places of amusement, hotels, lodging houses, etc., at a cost of over \$550,000.

Forty-six stables and garages, carriage houses, costing \$111,300; four warehouses and buildings, \$82,000; 133 for 319, at a total cost of \$1,066,020; twenty-six for railroad stations, platforms, ash storage, ash stations, walls, stock houses, etc., at a total cost of \$91,740; and various other structures.

Whereas, On the day of 1913, the Board, as the local authority of the City, adopted a resolution giving its consent to the modification in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by resolution approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, by contracts dated January 29, 1909, and August 2, 1911, respectively, by resolution approved by the Mayor January 19, 1912, by each of two contracts dated May 28, 1912, and by resolution approved by the Mayor July 16, 1912, and authorized the Mayor to execute and deliver a contract granting such rights in the name and on behalf of the City, which resolution was approved by the Mayor on the day of 1913.

1. Section 2. Subdivision Twelfth, of said ordinance of August 2, 1904, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Twelfth—The roadbed within the limits of The City of New York shall be watered daily by the Company, whenever the thermometer is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, if directed so to do by the President of the Borough of The Bronx. Provided, however, that the Company may apply to such roadbed such other dust palliative as may be approved by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the manner and frequency of such application to be also in accordance with the direction of the said President. If the Company shall so apply such other dust palliative then the Company shall not be required to water such roadbed, as herein provided. For any failure to comply herewith, the Company shall be liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day."

Section 2. This grant is subject to the condition that all the terms and conditions contained in the said ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen July 26, 1904, and approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by said resolution approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, by said contracts bearing date of January 29, 1909, and August 2, 1911, respectively, by said resolution approved by the Mayor January 19, 1912, by said contracts bearing date of May 28, 1912, and by said resolution approved by the Mayor July 16, 1912, except as herein modified and amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, and abide by, and perform all of the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.
