#### NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the Froceedings of the New County Court-house Commission.

MAY 15, 1874.

The Commissioners of the New County Courthouse met in the Comptroller's office, at 12 M., Friday, May 15, 1874.

The roll was called, the following Commis-

sioners being present, viz.: Wyllis Blackstone, John P. Cumming, and Smith E. Shaw.

The minutes of the meetings held May 9 and May 13, 1874, were read and adopted.

The Chairman presented sundry correspondence with the Janitor of the New County Court-house, under resolutions adopted by the Commission.

Which was ordered on file.

Commissioner Cumming presented a copy of the pay-roll of the employees in the New County Court-house, which had been obtained from the Comptroller's office.

On motion, it was ordered on file.

The Secretary pro tem. presented Volume IV, of Senate Documents for the year 1872, containing reports by Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, relative to the moneys expended for the erection of the New County Court-house.

Which was also enclosed up the

Which was also ordered on file. Commissioner Shaw offered the following pre-

amble and resolution:

Whereas, It is absolutely necessary for the proper performance of our duties as Commissioners of the New County Court-house, to have possession of said building and its apartments; and

Whereas, The Honorable the late Board of Supervisors, who have had said Court-house in their charge, have made no delivery thereof to the Commissioners of the New County Court-house; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Commission be instructed to demand from the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, or from the person or persons claiming to have charge of said building, possession of the same, and also to demand all keys belonging to said building.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the resolution.

be requested to communicate his official opinion to this Commission relative to the powers and functions which it possesses, particularly as to its right over the disposition of the rooms in the New County Court-house, and the care and maintenance of said building in its present unfinished condition. condition.

Whereupon, Commissioner Cumming moved to reconsider the resolution previously adopted relative to demanding possession of the New County Court-house from the person or persons claiming to have control thereof, which motion was adopted.
