

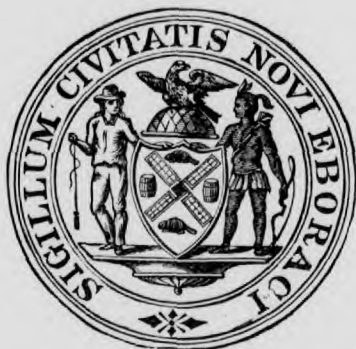

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Oct. 24, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Brown Brothers & Co. to lay an asphalt-block pavement in Hanover street, from Wall street to Exchange place, the stone-blocks now there to be taken up and carted to the Rutgers Slip yard, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 13, 1885.
Approved by the Mayor, October 19, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the National Horse Show Association of America to occupy the south side of Twenty-seventh street, between Fourth and Madison avenues, and adjoining Madison Square Garden, extending eleven feet from the curb, and to erect a temporary structure thereon, the same to be removed immediately after the horse show to be held in the Madison Square Garden during the first week in November, 1885.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 13, 1885.
Approved by the Mayor, October 19, 1885.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Frank Ferguson to place and keep a booth on the sidewalk, near the curb, at the northwest corner of Fifty-third street and Seventh avenue, provided such booth shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public, nor exceed four feet square and about seven feet high; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

In Board of Aldermen, October 20, 1885, taken up, reconsidered, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Whereas, The All-wise God has taken, by death, from a station of usefulness and influence, his Eminence Cardinal Archbishop John McCloskey of this city, within which he had labored a lifetime for the good of the community and the advancement and extension of religious influence and observance; and

Whereas, It is becoming and proper, when a man of the position and well-doing in the community of his Eminence passes away in death, that public recognition of his services should be had, and the regret at his loss should receive public expression; therefore be it

Resolved, By the Common Council of the City of New York, that the people of this metropolis, in the demise of his Eminence the Cardinal, have lost a citizen and a prelate who, from his early life, had moved and ministered among its citizens, setting an example of purity, earnestness of purpose, warmth of charity and religious devotion which has won for him the respect and reverence of all classes and the attachment and love of the members of the Church of which he was so eminent and illustrious a representative. His good works, through years of labor, are too many to enumerate here, but not the least among them was the completion of the splendid and marble edifice which adorns and adds grandeur and beauty to New York's most magnificent avenue—St. Patrick's Cathedral. Other tributes to his memory, either in their establishment or their development, under his wise and fostering care and advice, are the great educational institutions at Fordham, at Mt. St. Vincent, at Manhattanville—convent and college—and the seminary at Troy. To the same influence and cherishing attention, and to the same extent, the public owe the many charitable institutions which, throughout the diocese of New York, care for the infant and the foundling, receive and educate the orphan, remove from scenes and examples of sin and depravity, and afford a home to and instruct and protect youthful and homeless wanderers in the streets of the city, nurse and minister to the sick, injured and disabled, and give a roof and maintenance to the aged. These grand achievements are, in themselves, an enduring monument to his name and memory, while the profound sorrow of his fellow-citizens attests their appreciation of his noble life and of his services to the community.

Resolved, That these resolutions be entered in the minutes of the Board, and that an engrossed copy, signed by the Mayor of the City and the President of this Board and duly certified by the Clerk of the Common Council, be presented to his Grace, Archbishop Corrigan, now the spiritual head of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New York.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held October 21, 1885.

Present—Commissioners Koch and Matthews.

Absent—Commissioner Stark.

The minutes of the meeting held October 15, 1885, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, laid on the table, to await action, as stated, to wit:

From J. W. Dikeman, Jr., and others, employees in the Department—Requesting the Board to allow them car fare. Referred to Executive Session.

From Andrew Dettinger—Requesting permission to continue in possession of Pier foot of West Fifty-first street, North river, as now held by him from the Department, from November 1, 1885, till April 1, 1886, at the monthly rent of \$20.00, payable in advance, he to collect and return the wharfage therefrom, and to continue until November 1, 1885, at the same rate he now pays. Referred to Executive Session.

From A. P. Hutchins—Reporting that while docking the schooner "Kate E. Morse," on the morning of October 15, at Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, North river, she was damaged by an iron projecting from the said pier. Referred to the President for examination and report.

From Simon Stevens, attorney—In reference to the purchase of wharfage rights etc., on East river, easterly of Old Slip and including interest in Piers 12, 13 and 14 East river. Referred to Executive Session, and the President directed to advise Mr. Stevens that the Board will confer with him in respect thereto, on Wednesday, October 28th instant, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Counsel to the Corporation—Inclosing form of contract for repairing the hull, engine and machinery of the tug "Manhattan," with his approval as to form indorsed thereon.

From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to and stating that, owing to the sand obstructing the bulkhead at East Sixty-second street and the Pier at East Eighty-sixth street, East river, it is impossible to clean the said premises; and also stating that where a pier or bulkhead is leased that it seems to him the premises should be kept clean by the said lessees. The President directed to reply thereto.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Reporting that the sluiceways at Randall's Island are in need of decking over in order to make good landings. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report, and repair if necessary.

From Carrigh, Fraleigh & Co.—Requesting permission to remove backing-log at outer north-east end of Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, and agreeing to sheath the deck between the present string-piece and side of pier at their own expense. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From C. H. Mallory & Co.—Requesting permission to cut gangways on Pier 21, East river. Permission granted, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From D. Whipple—Requesting permission to drive ten piles at Pier 14, East river, to replace those decayed. The action of Commissioner Stark in issuing a permit therefor, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, approved.

From Garret L. Schuyler & Co.—Requesting permission to drive two piles at the bulkhead between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets, East river. The action of the Treasurer in issuing a permit therefor, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, approved.

From Theodore F. Tone—Requesting the Board to dredge at Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river. President directed to advise that the Engineer-in-Chief has been instructed to make requisition for dredging thereat to a depth of twelve feet at mean low water.

From Warren Rosevelt, for Arnold & Bernheimer—Requesting permission to drive about twelve piles, and put on new deck and new backing-logs, and dredge in front of bulkhead between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river. Permission granted, the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From David Milliken & Co., and others, merchants and manufacturers, doing business near the East river water-front, between Sixty-third and Eighty-sixth streets, East river—Requesting more wharfage facilities in said vicinity, and also requesting dredging at Seventy-third and Seventy-fifth streets, East river, to enable vessels to discharge cargoes at the said premises. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report as to the dredging required at the said premises in order to accommodate the said parties, and the subject-matter in reference to more wharf facilities referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending October 17, 1885.

3d. Reporting repairs required to Pier foot of West Seventeenth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair the said pier approved.

4th. Reporting that there is a dangerous hole at the inner end of Pier foot of Little West Twelfth street, North river, and also reporting that one of the fender-piles near outer end is broken; also reporting that three fender-piles are loose on the southerly corner, and three spring-piles require fastening on the southerly side of the Pier at West Thirteenth street, North river, and that the deck of pier needs patching. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make the said repairs at the premises in question approved.

5th. Reporting that two fender-piles on the south side of Pier, new 43, North river, are loose, and also reporting that the backing-log is rotten and should be renewed for a length of about 10 feet. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to do the said work approved.

6th. Reporting that a new cast-iron cover is required for the silt basin at foot of Barrow street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the said work.

7th. Reporting that there are several holes in the sheathing of Pier at foot of West Fifty-fifth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair said pier approved.

8th. In reference to and recommending that the old mud-scows owned by the Department be sold without reserve as to price, at public auction, at as early a date as possible. The recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief adopted, and the Secretary directed to make the necessary arrangement for the sale of the said scows at public auction.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4762, as to the dredging required at the dumping-board at Pier 12, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for dredging thereat to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4724, as to the dredging required at Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to make requisition for dredging thereat to a depth of twelve feet at mean low water.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4745, as to the dredging required at Pier, new 57, North river. Referred to Executive Session.

12th. Recommending that six fender-piles be driven at platform recently erected at inner southerly end of Pier, old 33, North River. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to drive piles at the said premises.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4726, that he had repaired windows in Dock Master's office on Pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street, North river, and also furnished the said office with two tons of coal.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4755, that he had repaired the platform at bulkhead between Sixtieth and Sixty-second streets, East river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4756, that he had repaired Pier at West Thirty-fourth street, North river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4757, that he had repaired Pier foot of Eighteenth street, North river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4758, that he had replaced the portion of fence around the dangerous part of Pier at Thirty-seventh street, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4765, that he had repaired Pier No. 7, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4774, that he had repaired Pier, old 54, North river.

20th. Additional report on Secretary's Order No. 4679, that he had repaired Pier, old 33, North river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3667, in reference to repairing Pier at West Seventeenth street, North river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4763, that he had repaired Pier foot of Twenty-fifth street, East River.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4764, that he had placed two additional spring-piles on each side of Pier at East Twenty-sixth street, East river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4771, that he had repaired Pier at One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4775, that he had repaired the bulkhead north of Pier, old 54, North river.

26th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4779, that repairs had been made to Pier at Thirty-eighth street, East river, in accordance with report on Secretary's Order No. 4719.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4782, that he had repaired Pier at Little West Twelfth street, North river.

28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4783, that he had repaired Pier foot of Thirteenth street, North river.

29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4784, that he had repaired Pier 41, East river.

30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4785, that he had repaired Pier foot of West Seventeenth street, North river.

31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 4583, that he had supervised the dredging in Cromwell's creek, between the drawbridge at Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, Harlem river.

From Joseph L. Liscomb, Dock Superintendent:

1st. Reporting that the runway on Pier, old 23, North river, should be closed and the string-piece replaced. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to replace the string-piece at the said premises approved.

2d. In reference to the claims against the tugs "Wm. G. Oler" and "Wm. H. Bentley," and enclosing information in respect thereto. The said matter to be further investigated.

3d. Reporting that on October 17, 1885, Henry A. Fisher, of No. 410 East Sixty-second street, used horse on the bulkhead between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river, without using a platform to protect the surface of the said bulkhead, and also reporting that on the same date Murray & Reed, No. 39 South street, and G. W. Powe & Co., No. 66 South street, discharged sand on the bulkhead between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, North river, and between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river, respectively, without using a canvas to prevent the said sand from falling into the water. Penalty of \$5 imposed upon Henry A. Fisher for violation of Rule 7, and a penalty of \$25 imposed on Messrs. Murray & Reed and G. W. Powe & Co., respectively, for violation of Rule 8, and the President directed to notify the parties to call and pay the amount of the penalty imposed upon them to the Treasurer of this Department within five days, or the claims will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that the fastenings of the spring-piles at the outer and upper corners of Pier 41, East river, are broken, and one of the piles are gone, and also reporting that there is a hole in the deck on the upper side of the said pier. The action of the President directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make the repairs required thereat approved.

2d. Reporting that there is a bad hole in the deck on the lower side of Pier 37, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair.

From Joseph F. Sharkey, Dock Master—In reference to illegal filling at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, East river.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master—Recommending that spring-piles be placed on the outer end of Pier north of Bloomfield street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to place spring-piles thereat.

From George W. Wanmaker, Dock Master—Reporting that a portion of the backing-log on the bulkhead between Piers, old 35 and 36, North river, is broken, and the cleats require refastening. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the said work.

From Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master—Additional report in reference to Pier 12, East river, under the dumping-board. President directed to send copy of his reports to his Honor, the Mayor, and J. S. Coleman, Commissioner Department of Street Cleaning, and the President directed to instruct Dock Master Thompson not to permit the storing of any bones, rags, etc., on said pier.

From Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting that there are a few small holes in the deck of Pier at West Fortieth street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair.

2d. Reporting that the iron sheeting in the upper outer corner of Pier foot of West Forty-sixth street, North river, is broken, and is dangerous to vessels landing thereat. The Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the said work.

From John Callan, Dock Master—Reporting that he had stopped dumping on the water-front between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, Harlem river.

Commissioner Matthews, the Treasurer of the Board, presented his report of receipts for the week ending October 20, 1885, which was received, read and ordered to be placed on file and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full on the minutes, as follows:

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 3810, submitting specifications for repairing Piers at Little West Twelfth street and West Seventeenth street, North river, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by President Koch, was adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief for repairing Piers at Little West Twelfth street and West Seventeenth street, North river, be and hereby are approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements, inviting bids for doing the said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, submitting specifications for plumbing, gas-fitting and steam heating for building on Pier "A," North river, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by President Koch, was adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for plumbing, gas-fitting and steam-heating for building on Pier "A," North river, be and hereby are approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements, inviting bids for doing the said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The Secretary stating the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction force for the half month ending October 15, instant, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$3,276.49, had been approved and audited, and that he had forwarded the same, together with the proper requisitions for the amounts, to the Finance Department for payment, his action was approved.

The President, to whom was referred the communication from Kurzman & Yeaman, attorneys for Alfred E. Beach, requesting permission to build crib-bulkhead, etc., at certain lots on Ward's Island, East river, reported thereon, and recommended that the said request be denied.

On motion, the report was received and adopted, the communication taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file, and the President directed to advise the said parties of the action of the Board.

The President, to whom was referred the communication from A. Barber & Son and others, objecting to platform and scales located on Pier 37, East river, reported thereon and recommended that the Mutual Benefit Ice Company be notified to remove the said platform and scales on or before November 15, 1885.

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted.

Commissioner Matthews, to whom was referred the application of John A. Bouker, requesting permission to erect a dumping-board on the Pier at East Seventy-third street, East river recommended that the said application be granted on condition that the said work be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, and to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board, provided that the said Bouker pay as compensation for the use thereof the sum of \$7 per week, commencing Monday, October 26, 1885, and also provided that the said Bouker agrees that the dumping-board erected thereat shall revert to the City, when he ceases to use the same.

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted, the communication taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file, and the President directed to notify Mr. Bouker and Dock Master Joseph F. Sharkey of the action of the Board.

The President, to whom was referred the application of The New York Horse Manure Company, requesting permission to use the Pier and approach at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, North river, reported thereon in favor of granting the same, to remain during the pleasure of the Board, provided the said company pay for the use thereof the sum of \$50 per week, payable in advance.

On motion, the report was received, the communications taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by the President, was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York Horse Manure Company to use and occupy the Pier and approach at the foot of West Forty-fourth street, North river, during the pleasure of the Board, and to erect thereon a dumping-board and scales, provided they pay as compensation for the use thereof the sum of \$50 per week, payable in advance, commencing Monday, October 26, 1885; and also, provided that the said company agree not to require any repairing or dredging during the term of their occupancy of the said premises, and that they agree to keep in proper repair and restore the pier in the same condition it is at the time the said parties take possession thereof.
