

APPROVED PAPERS

Approved Papers for the week ending February 21, 1891.

Resolved, That an improved iron drinking-fountain be placed on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No. 1306 First avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Received from his Honor the Mayor, February 17, 1891, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That an improved iron drinking-fountain be placed on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No: 611 Hudson street, near the northwest corner of West Twelfth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Received from his Honor the Mayor, February 17, 1891, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof; also that crosswalks be laid at or near each intersection with every intersecting and at each terminating street or avenue, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Received from his Honor the Mayor, February 17, 1891, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became

Resolved, That One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from Third avenue to Courtland avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged full width, where not already done; that the carriageway be paved with granite-block pavement, from the crosswalk near the westerly intersection of Third avenue to the crosswalk near the easterly intersection of Courtland avenue, and that a crosswalk of two courses of bridge-stone, with a row of paving-blocks between each course, be laid at or near each of the four intersections with Melrose avenue; the entire work to be done on the established lines and grades, using the present flag and curb stones where not worn or broken so as to be unfit for use, and relaying the present crosswalks at Third and Courtland avenues, if not on the established grade, using new bridge-stones where the present stones are unfit for use, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Lewis Fullwood to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No. 9 City Hall place, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works said permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That Sixty-seventh street, from Avenue A to the westerly line of Exterior street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, and retaining-walls with parapet be built to properly sustain and maintain the street at the established grade and line, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That Croton-water pipes be laid in Bristow street, from a point two hundred and ten feet south of Jennings street to Stebbins avenue, as provided in section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Resolved, That gas-pipes be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Jerome avenue to McComb's Dam road, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Approved by the Mayor, February 17, 1891.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Prospect avenue to Rogers place, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Approved by the Mayor, February 17, 1891.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Daniel Bergen to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No. 181 Tenth avenue, on the northwest corner of Twenty-first street, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Approved by the Mayor, February 17, 1891.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to M. Barber & Nephew to place and keep a platform scale, not to exceed seven by fourteen feet, in Market Slip, as shown in the annexed diagram, said scale to be constructed flush with the pavement in the slip, so as to be no impediment to the free uses thereof by the public, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 3, 1891. Received from his Honor the Mayor, February 17, 1891, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the sidewalks on the south side of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, from Amsterdam avenue to Western Boulevard, be flagged full width, where not already done, and that the flagging and the curb now on the sidewalks be relaid and reset where necessary, and that new flagging and curb be furnished where the present flagging and curb are defective, as provided by section 321 of chapter 410, Laws 1882, as amended by chapter 569, Laws of 1887, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted adopted,

Whereas, General William Tecumseb Sherman, a brilliant soldier, a true patriot and an honored citizen of this great metropolis, has answered his last roll-call after attaining more than the allotted age of three score and ten, nearly half a century of which was spent in the service of his country, in support of its flag, and to perpetuate its constitutional liberties ; and Whereas, In the death of General Sherman, the last of the great military leaders in the war of the Rebellion, every household in this the city of his adoption, that he loved so well, and wherein he endeared himself to so many, feels a void as if the dread messenger had entered and summoned a member of its owa family : and

a member of its own family ; and Whereas, The brilliant military services of the late General Sherman form an imperishable era

he endeared himself to so many, feels a void as if the dread messenger had entered and summoned a member of its own family ; and Whereas, The brilliant military services of the late General Sherman form an imperishable era in the history of our common country, and his marvelous aptitude for leadership, his strategical acumen, his fatheffy solicitude for the welfare of the common soldier and his departure from all previously accepted rules of war by marching hundreds of miles through a then hostile country after cutting himself off from his base of supplies, challenged the admiration of the powers of Europe and stamped him as one of the greatest military captains of all time ; and Whereas, " As Peace hath her victories no less renowned than War," so General Sherman in civil life united to a sunny disposition a heart that ever throbbed in sympathy with all that was good, true and patriotic, with a hand always outstretched to charity and with a mind innocent of malice, he, since his advent in this, the metropolis of the nation, made friends by the thousand and earned naught but the good will of every citzen ; and Whereas, Unborn millions of this great republic will reverence the memory of General Sherman, whose motto as a soldier was that the military power existed only to repel invasion, suppress rebellion and preserve order, and then when these results were achieved the warrior was again merged in the citizen, ready to resume military duty at the call of his country and in honor of her flag ; and. Whereas, In the wide-spread and sincere grief for the death of such a man as General Sherman, it becomes the bounden duty of the People and the Government of this municipality to participate properly in all ceremonies touching the final disposition of the remains and to indicate appropriately to the country at large the sorrow of the city, which he loved so well and in whose centre he died, at the irreparable loss sustained by the Republic of the United States ; and, furthermore, to give proper expression of the sympat

Whereas, In the death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, the country has lost a loving son, and its flag an intrepid defender ; and Whereas, The heroic naval officers who won undying fame in the late Rebellion have almost all, with the exception of one or two, gone to join the silent majority ; and Whereas, The late Admiral David Dixon Porter, who with Farragut and Foote, shared the glories of success in Southern waters—he alone of the trio lived to see the United States Navy in a fair way to be worthy of the Republic and its re-united people—lived to set his seal of approval on the highest improvement in naval architecture as embraced in the new steel cruisers of our navy, and which restores in a degree the United States to its proper supremacy on sea ; and Whereas, The death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, occurring almost simultaneously with the demise of General William Tecumseh Sherman, inflicts a double blow of sorrow on the nation; therefore be it



The 755 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.70, against 23.12 for the previous week and 24.18 for the corresponding week of 1890. Diphtheria shows a decrease for the week and scarlet fever and measles an increase, the reported cases being 106, 178 and 462, respectively, against 121, 153 and 447 for the previous week. Diphtheria has decreased mostly between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, east, and in the lower part of the annexed district. The increase of scarlet fever is most marked on the east side of the city, being pretty well distributed, excepting between Eighty-sixth street and the Harlem river, where there has been a decrease. The increase of measles was mostly between Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets, on both sides of the city, the great increase in the First Ward being due entirely to cases reported from the Barge Office (immigrants).
