Whereas, General William Tecumseh Sherman, a brilliant soldier, a true patriot and an honored citizen of this great metropolis, has answered his last roll-call after attaining more than the allotted age of three score and ten, nearly half a century of which was spent in the service of his country, in support of its flag, and to perpetuate its constitutional liberties; and

Whereas, In the death of General Sherman, the last of the great military leaders in the war of the Rebellion, every household in this city of his adoption, that he loved so well, and wherein he endeared himself to so many, feels a void as if the dread messenger had entered and summoned a member of its own family; and

Whereas, The brilliant military services of the late General Sherman form an imperishable era in the history of our common country, and his marvelous aptitude for leadership, his strategical acumen, his fatherly solicitude for the welfare of the common soldier and his departure from all previously accepted rules of war by marching hundreds of miles through a then hostile country after cutting himself off from his base of supplies, challenged the admiration of the powers of Europe and stamped him as one of the greatest military captains of all time; and

Whereas, "As Peace hath her victories no less renowned than War," so General Sherman in civil life united to a sunny disposition a heart that ever throbbed in sympathy with all that was good, true and patriotic, with a hand always outstretched to charity and with a mind innocent of malice, he, since his advent in this, the metropolis of the nation, made friends by the thousand and earned naught but the good will of every citizen; and

Whereas, Unborn millions of this great republic will reverence the memory of General Sherman, whose motto as a soldier was that the military power existed only to repel invasion, suppress rebellion and preserve order, and then when these results were achieved the warrior was again merged in the citizen, ready to resume military duty at the call of his country and in honor of her flag; and,

Whereas, In the wide-spread and sincere grief for the death of such a man as General Sherman, it becomes the bounden duty of the People and the Government of this municipality to participate properly in all ceremonies touching the final disposition of the remains and to indicate appropriately to the country at large the sorrow of the city, which he loved so well and in whose centre he died, at the irreparable loss sustained by the Republic of the United States; and, furthermore, to give proper expression of the sympathy we feel for the members of his family in their bereavement; be it, therefore,

Resolved, That, out of sorrow and respect for the memory of General William Tecumseh Sherman, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business and refrain from any secular employment on Thursday, the 19th day of February, 1891, that being the day set apart for the funeral ceremonies; that the public offices be closed on that day, except those specially required by law to be kept open; that the flags be displayed at half-staff on all the public buildings in this city; that the owners of private buildings and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor be requested to display their flags at half-mast on said day, and that a Special Committee of five members of the Common Council be appointed, with instructions to invite the co-operation of his Honor the Mayor and the heads of the several Executive Departments, to represent the City Government at the funeral of the deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be suitably engrossed, duly authenticated by the Corporate seal of the City, attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and transmitted to the family of General W. T. Sherman, as an additional evidence of respect for the memory and sorrow for the death of the illustrious soldier, ardent patriot and true citizen.

Whereas, The heroic naval officers who won undying fame in the late Rebellion have almost all, with the exception of one or two, gone to join the silent majority; and

Whereas, The late Admiral David Dixon Porter, who with Farragut and Foote, shared the glories of success in Southern waters—he alone of the trio lived to see the United States Navy in a fair way to be worthy of the Republic and its re-united people—lived to set his seal of approval on the highest improvement in naval architecture as embraced in the new steel cruisers of our navy, and which restores in a degree the United States to its proper supremacy on sea; and

Whereas, The death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, occurring almost simultaneously with the demise of General William Tecumseh Sherman, inflicts a double blow of sorrow on the nation; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of New York deplore the death of Admiral David Dixon Porter, and deeply sympathize with his family and the nation at the irreparable loss sustained.

The minutes of the meetings held January 27, 29 and 30, 1891, were read and approved.

William W. Rossiter appeared before the Board and requested that Pier, new 57, North river, the lease of which he purchased at public auction January 30, 1891, be appropriated to the sole use of the special kind of commerce carried on by steam transportation.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power vested in this Board by subdivision six of section six, chapter five hundred and seventy-four of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and section seven hundred and sixteen of chapter four hundred and ten of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, commonly called the "New York City Consolidation Act," as amended by chapter five hundred and seventeen of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-four, Pier, new 57, near the foot of Twenty-seventh street, North river, be and hereby is set aside for the sole use of the special kind of commerce carried on by steam transportation.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Department of Street Cleaning:

1st. In reference to the cleaning required to Pier 48, East river, and stating that the unclean condition of certain piers was occasioned by the practice of stevedores in depositing thereon refuse from cargoes. Notify the Dock Masters that they must compel stevedores to remove from the piers any refuse placed thereon.

2d. Reporting that one of their scows went aground at the dump, foot of Canal street, North river.

From the Finance Department—In reference to the substitution of sureties on the estimate of John Gillies for rebuilding Pier 43, East river, whereupon it was

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the substitution of John Fleming and Alfred J. Murray as sureties in the place of A. T. Morris and Joseph Cumings on estimate of John Gillies for building a new pier on site of Pier 43, East river, and for repairing the existing crib-bulkhead thereat, under Contract No. 365.

From Stephen A. Walker, attorney—Submitting on behalf of his clients the terms of sale to which they will consent to sell wharf property between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, North river.

On motion, the said offer was declined, and the following preambles and resolutions offered by Commissioner Cram were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, This Board, on the 24th day of July, 1890, adopted preambles and resolutions offering to purchase, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, the right, title and interest in and to the land, land under water and bulkhead rights between the southerly line of Twenty-sixth street and the centre line of the block between West Twenty-fifth and West Twenty-sixth streets, lying westerly of Thirteenth avenue, including the bulkhead westerly thereof on the Hudson river and riparian rights and privileges and the easement to collect wharfage and cramage at said bulkhead; and

Whereas, Stephen A. Walker, attorney-in-fact of those who are now seized of the premises conveyed by grant by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to Thomas Williams, Isaac E. Smitn and Ichabod S. Williams, dated the 2d day of December, 1858, has not notified this Board of their willingness to convey their respective interests in the said premises to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted July 24, 1890, although more than ten days have elapsed since the expiration of the time to agree to the same; and

Whereas, This Department deems it proper to acquire immediate title and possession to the premises hereinbefore described, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, and is desirous of acquiring the same for the purpose of carrying out the necessary improvement of the water-front in that locality; and

Whereas, It is deemed that no price can be agreed upon between the owners of the said property and this Department, for the purchase thereof; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York be and is hereby requested to institute legal proceedings for the immediate acquisition of said property, rights, terms, easements and privileges for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, as required by law in such cases made and provided.

From A. Skillman—Stating that the failure to complete the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river, is causing him considerable loss for demurrage. Notify John Delaney that unless he proceeds with the work of filling in, as provided in permit issued December 18, 1890, the Department will be compelled to establish a free dump thereat. Notify Mr. Skillman, that in consequence of the severe weather it has been almost impossible to secure filling.

From F. V. Greene—Requesting for the Committee appointed by the Mayor to examine into the subject of street cleaning certain data respecting dredging for the years 1882 to 1890, inclusive. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to furnish the information approved.

From Frank Fiandreau, lessee—Paying under protest rent for bulkhead northerly of the approach to Pier, new 47, North river, about three hundred and eight feet.

From The New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company—Requesting permit to repair the north side of Pier foot of West Twenty-second street. Permit granted.

From The New York and Baltimore Transportation Line—Requesting permission to drive four fender-piles on the south side of Pier 6, North river. Permit granted.

From The New York, Maine and New Brunswick Steamship Company—Requesting permission to drive oak fender piling on the end of Pier 49, East river. Permit granted.

From T. and A. Walsh—Requesting permission to dredge a portion of the land under water between Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets, East river. Permit granted.

From William H. Carter—Notice of lien for one hundred and forty-eight dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$148.89), against Fogg & Scribner, contractors for the construction of a bulkhead from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth street, Harlem river, under Contract No. 318.

From Brown & Fleming—Requesting permission to dredge under their dumping-board foot of Canal street, North river. Permit granted.

From The International Navigation Company—Requesting permission to dredge slip south side of Pier, new 43, North river. Permit granted, the said dredging to be done at their cost and expense.

From The Atlantic Dredging Company—Requesting an extension of two days to complete the work of dredging between Piers 10 and 12, East river, under Contract No. 363.

On motion, the time was extended to February 3, 1891.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending January 31, 1891.

2d. Reporting that the bulkhead between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, North river, is in a dangerous condition requiring rebuilding from low water up. Notify the owners that said bulkhead must be rebuilt and placed in proper condition as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

3d. Reporting that the work of filling in between East Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, is being carried on by private parties without a permit, and recommending that the filling be stopped and the persons violating the law punished. The Dock Master directed to stop said filling. Notify the contractor to appear before the Board, Thursday, February 12, 1891, at 11 A. M., to show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for violation of Rule One of the Rules and Regulations of the Department.

4th. Reporting that dredging to the extent of one thousand cubic yards will be necessary at the wharf in front of Castle Garden to properly accommodate the new fire-boat. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for dredging thereat as recommended in his report.

5th. In reference to building a new pile-driver and repairing the old scow of Pile-driver No. 5, and recommending that the work be done by the force of the Department.

On motion, said recommendation was approved and the following resolution unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of President Post and Commissioners Matthews and Cram:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to build with the force of the Department a new pile-driver, with adjustable ways and pile cutting attachment and also a new diver's scow, of size and dimensions similar to the other diver's scows now owned by the Department; both the pile-driver and the diver's scow to be used in constructing the bulkhead or river-wall under plans adopted for the improvement of the water-front; and that all the material for the said pile-driver and its engine, boiler, hammer, pile cutting attachment and other appurtenances, and all the material for the said diver's scow and its appurtenances, not now contracted for, or which shall not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

6th. In reference to the permit of E. A. Cruikshank & Co., agents of the Rhinelander estate, for permission to repair the bulkhead between Ninety-third and Ninety-fourth streets, East river. On motion, the permission given January 22, 1891, was continued, without prejudice to or in any manner affecting the rights of the City.

7th. In reference to filling in between West Twenty-eighth and West Twenty-ninth streets, North river.

On motion, the order issued February 27, 1890, directing the executors of Cornelius Ray, deceased, to make the streets and avenues, etc., between West Twenty-eighth and West Thirtieth streets, North river, was suspended for a period of thirty days from this date.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10649, in relation to the application of D. C. Newell for permission to build a bridge or platform on piles between Eighteenth and Nineteenth and Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, North river.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to D. C. Newell to build a platform in front of the bulkhead between West Eighteenth street and West Nineteenth street, North river, about eighteen feet wide, and in front of the bulkhead, for about one hundred feet north of West Nineteenth street, North river, about thirty-six feet wide; the said platforms to be built under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to be and remain only during the pleasure of this Board; provided, however, the said D. C. Newell shall agree in writing, within ten days after receipt hereof, to pay, as compensation for the use of the land under water to be covered by said platforms, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing when said platforms are ready for occupancy, and also agree to remove the said platforms whenever ordered to do so by this Board, at his own cost and expense.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10485, that he had driven two fender piles and repaired armature plates on south side of Pier, new 60, North river, at a cost of \$88.55. The Treasurer authorized to collect said amount from James McClenahan, lessee.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 10643, in reference to the application of Barth S. Cronin for an extension of forty days to complete the work of repairing Pier, new 57, North river, under Contract No. 341.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work to be done by Barth S. Cronin, under Contract No. 341, for repairing Pier, new 57, North river, be and hereby is extended to December 5, 1890.

11th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 10398, 10546, 10636 and 10652, that he had superintended filling and regulating of the southerly half of West Twenty-seventh street, North river, from the westerly side of Eleventh avenue to a point about seventy feet west of the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue; the extension to bulkhead between the transfer bridges and the coal sheds located between Alexander and Willis avenues, on the Harlem river; also the repairing of Piers, new 27 and 28, North river, and placing of a portable fence under rolling shutter at outer end of Pier "A," North river.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the month of January, 1891, amounting to \$11,639.95, and the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction Force for the week ending January 30, 1891, amounting to \$8,370.52, had been approved and audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to finish the work of completing Pier, new 29, North river, at the cost and expense of the contractor John Gillies, and the Secretary directed to notify the said contractor of the action of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans for the improvement of the Harlem river, from Madison avenue to McComb's Dam Bridge.

Commissioner Matthews, to whom was referred the subject-matter respecting the compensa-

tion to be charged T. & A. Walsh for the use of land under water for the purposes of a timber basin, between Ninety-ninth and One Hundredth streets, East river, reported that in his opinion the sum of one dollar and fifty cents per week should be charged therefor, the said amount to be paid weekly when due to the Dock Master of the District, commencing February 1, 1891.

On motion, the said report was received and adopted.

The President stated that he had an interview with Isaac N. Burdick, who was notified to appear this day to answer for violation of Rule No. 6 of the rules and regulations, and the explanation given being deemed satisfactory, he moved that further proceedings in the matter be dismissed, which was carried.

The Auditing Committee submitted an audit of sixteen bills or claims, amounting to \$7,524.63, which was approved and audited, and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

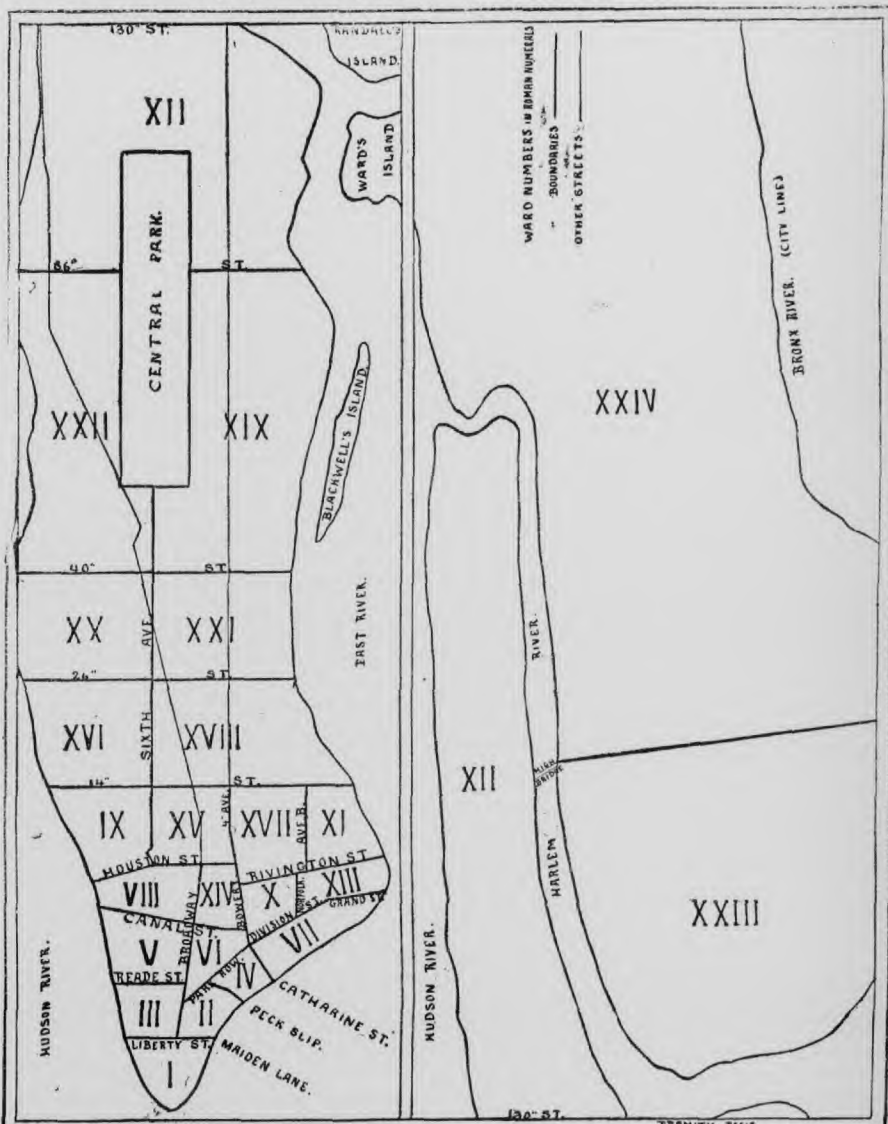

The 755 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.70, against 23.12 for the previous week and 24.18 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Diphtheria shows a decrease for the week and scarlet fever and measles an increase, the reported cases being 106, 178 and 462, respectively, against 121, 153 and 447 for the previous week. Diphtheria has decreased mostly between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, east, and in the lower part of the annexed district. The increase of scarlet fever is most marked on the east side of the city, being pretty well distributed, excepting between Eighty-sixth street and the Harlem river, where there has been a decrease. The increase of measles was mostly between Fourteenth and Eighty-sixth streets, on both sides of the city, the great increase in the First Ward being due entirely to cases reported from the Barge Office (immigrants).

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT
act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889),
which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in
the city, described in any grant of land under water,
from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing
covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to
pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets,
shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement,
the Common Council may, by ordinance, require
the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and
the expense thereof to be assessed on the property
benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed
shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving,
repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and
discharge such owner from any and every covenant and

of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and
assigns, to be released from the obligation of such
covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be

thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns
shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to
pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot
in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable
to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give
the following explanation of the operation of this act:
When notice, as above described, is given to the
Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or
lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are
forever released from all obligation under the grant in
respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in
front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assess-
ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the
Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made
thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants
can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is
authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and
when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be
paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire
and make their application to the Board of Aldermen
and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has
no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of
the Common Council to proceed with the pavement,
repavement or repairs.
