SIR—The Board of Health of the Health Department of the City of New York respectfully submits the following report for the three months ending September 30, 1875, with the vital statistics of the city for the same period:

THE SANITARY BUREAU.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases:

The number of complaints received from citizens during the three months ending September 30, 1875, was 1,581, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period granted, under instructions and authority of the Board, 981 permits to vessels to discharge cargoes upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,310 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for that purpose; 18 permits to remove and transport manure; and 109 permits were granted to land rags (in bulk) under bonds.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers of the Sanitary Company of Police during the quarter ending September 30, 1875, was as follows: Cattle, 12 carcasses; calves (cases), 17 carcasses; calves (bobs), 19 carcasses; lambs, 25 carcasses; beef, 2,287 pounds; veal, 708 pounds; poultry, 3,911 pounds; fish, 23,650 pounds; sheep, 25 carcasses; cattle feet, 1,600 pounds; calves' heads, 8; hogs, 1 carcass; corned beef, 122 pounds; and mutton, 9 pounds.

The following statement gives the amount of work performed by the Vaccinating Corps, for the purpose of preventing the spread of small-pox, during the quarter ending September 30, 1875:

The amount of vaccine virus gratuitously furnished for use in public institutions, etc., was 1,637 quill slips.

The amount received for the sale of vaccine virus and deposited with the City Chamberlain, was \$368.31.

Vaccinations were performed during the last three months by house to house visitations. The visits to public schools and institutions have been discontinued. During this period vaccine virus has been gratuitously furnished to all physicians of the city applying for it.

The Disinfecting Corps was engaged in the disinfection of houses infected with contagious diseases, and the removal of patients and dead bodies therefrom. Also, in the disinfection of privies and street-gutters in the crowded tenement house districts of this city, as follows:

Since the last quarterly report, the number of cases of small-pox admitted to the Riverside Hospital has considerably diminished, a very marked falling off occurring during the months of August and September. Not only has the number of cases diminished, but the percentage of deaths is proportionably less. The death-rate for the three months ending July 31 was 27.19 per cent., being but a fraction less than that for the previous three months, while the death-rate for the month of July alone was only 23.1 per cent.; and for the months of August and September, 21.53 per cent.

The good effects of vaccination in modifying the death-rate are daily seen in the hospital. Of the total number of patients treated during the last five months, 96 were children one year old or under, who had not previously received the full benefits of vaccination, of which number 58 or 60.41 per cent. died, while the percentage of deaths of the unvaccinated at all ages was about 48, and that of the vaccinated was 21. Nearly all of them were persons who had been vaccinated in infancy, and had neglected revaccination.

During the three months ending September 30, 1875, nine thousand two hundred and thirty-eight (9,238) permits were granted for burial. During the same period four hundred and fifty-five (455) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; five hundred and fourteen (514) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; eight hundred and thirty (830) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; three hundred and forty (340) searches of the records were made; and ninety-eight (98) transcripts of the records of deaths, thirty-eight (38) of marriages, and thirty-three of births from said records were issued. There were three thousand five hundred and seventy-four (3,574) registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand one hundred and eight (6,108) children were born during the same period. The birth-rate during the summer quarter, as far as the registered births are in evidence, was equal to 23.04 per 1,000 inhabitants. Though there were 589 more births registered in the summer than in the spring quarter, the estimated deficiency in the birth returns amounts to nearly 30 per cent. of the total number born alive. This deficiency occurs chiefly in classes of families whose ignorance and want of professional attendance prevent the existing laws from discovering and registering these uncertified births.

The death-rate in the summer quarter was equal to 34.93 in the 1,000 living inhabitants annually. This does not vary essentially from the mean rate of mortality in the corresponding months of the previous four years, even without allowing for the large increase of population by annexation and otherwise. There was a greater number of deaths from diphtheria and small-pox in the summer of 1875, than in the average of the previous four summers, but less from measles and scarlatina. Puerperal diseases were less frequent and fatal than in the average of the past four years, and generally the city was unusually free from fevers. The excessive prevalence of acute pulmonary diseases which had been recorded in the winter and spring did not wholly cease until mid-summer. This excess during the three months ending September 30th, amounted to nearly 20 per cent. above the average proportion of these causes of death. The chief peculiarity of the summer mortality consisted in the persistent prevalence and fatality of diphtheria and small-pox.

The mean temperature was nearly identical with the average temperature of the corresponding period of the past twenty years; the mean for the quarter being a little above 71 degrees Fahr. The rainfall in July and August was excessive, amounting to between 14 and 15 inches depth of water. The summer ended with as favorable a condition of the public health as that which marked its beginning. Diarrhoeal diseases were less prevalent than usual at the beginning of autumn, and with the city nearly free from small-pox after six months of organized efforts to apply the preventive resources of hospital seclusion and gratuitous vaccination. This result has re-affirmed the necessity and value of both of these sanitary measures.

ORDERS OF THE BOARD, SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

The orders of this Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of the premises complained of. During the three months ending September 30, the number of orders issued by the Board was five thousand one hundred and seventy-seven. Of this number sixteen hundred and fifty-nine were issued under the first sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, by the terms of which, the party served is allowed three days in which to demand a hearing by the Board of the testimony which may be presented to show that the order should be modified or revoked. In cases where no hearing has been asked for, and the orders have not been complied with, final orders in the original or amended form, to the number of four hundred and nineteen, have been issued, and the Board has directed the attorney to commence action for non-compliance with such orders. All other written orders in number three thousand five hundred and eighteen, have been issued under

the second sub-division of section 14, chapter 74, Laws of 1866, and are of a peremptory character, requiring that the nuisance be abated within five days, and if not complied with, directing the Sanitary Superintendent to enforce the same without further notice, unless the Board shall elect to commence a suit for penalty in lieu of the execution of the order by its officers or agents.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 30th day of November, 1875, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 100 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Section 100. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep, or cause to be kept, such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet of any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removals from the stalls shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between 10 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board regulating such removal within said hours.
