" F."--Surveying, Laying Out, and Making Topographical Survey of the New Part of the Twenty-fourth Ward.

(a) Triangulation— Twenty-fourth Ward.
(a) Triangulation— The duplicate measurements of the Eastchester and Unionport base lines were finished June 25, 1897. The measuring bars A. B. & Co. were tested by the comparator, the length of which had been previously determined by the United States Coast Survey, and the mathematical computations were commenced July 6, 1897. Additional observation towers were erected at Coudert on Clauson's Point, Zerger at old Ferry Point, and at High Island. It was found that the probable error of the Eastchester base is about one-millionth part of the whole length. The test for the Unionport base line is not finished as yet. A complete polygon of control, composed of the quadrilateral Dunwoodie, Hunter's Island, Jackson and Highbridge, together with interior points, Protectory and Given, each connected with the others, will be rigidly adjusted and determined as to latitude and longitude, and then referred to the Tenth avenue meridian. To this rigid system the secondary triangles will be connected, and, afterward, also the separate traverses which were made in the whole territory. 6,209 angle readings were taken for about 185 angles. The topographical survey for Divisions Nos. 1 and 2 is completed, and the survey of Divisions Nos. 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 10 and 11 is in progress.
Maps showing the progress of the work in the different divisions are kept up to date; 59 sheets of the size of 31 inches by 53 inches are in various stages of completion.
