I claim that I am a member of the Uniformed Force and that I am entitled to hold the office of Chief of Police of such Department, and that chapter 33 of the Laws of 1901, which purports to abolish the office of Chief of Police of The City of New York, and to end the terms of office of four Commissioners of Police, and concentrate his and their powers and functions upon a single Police Commissioner, is void and of no effect, because inconsistent with and in contravention of the Constitution of this State and of the United States.

Inasmuch as no attempt has been made to retire or remove me from the office of Chief of Police, in any manner prescribed by valid law, I am therefore entitled to hold that office, and enjoy all the powers and privileges incident thereto. I have been at all times, and am now, ready and willing to discharge my proper functions and duties as Chief of Police. As a member of the Uniformed Police Force of The City of New York I can only be removed from that force in the manner prescribed by law, and I hereby notify you that I am ready and willing to enter upon the discharge of such duties as may be properly and legally assigned to me as a member of that force.
