DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

TRANSACTIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES FOR WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1903.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor, transmitting communication of Charles Rau complaining of ferry service at Roosevelt Street Ferry. Secretary directed to transmit the statement of the ferry company in relation thereto.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Advising that the Department can, without action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, fill a vacancy in a position the salary of which has been fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subject to the Civil Service rules.

Second—Advising that the provision of the Greater New York Charter to the effect that not more than 2,000 copies of the report of any department shall be issued, applies to this Department.

Third—Stating that under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter there is a specific fund from which to pay for the acquisition of water front property, and that the cost of the 100 feet along the easterly line of the proposed new marginal street at the Chelsea Section cannot be assessed against the adjoining property owners.

Fourth—In relation to the request of W. J. Pollock for acquisition by the City of property leased by his wife on West Fourteenth street.

Fifth—Approving form of renewal lease of Pier, new 40, North river, to the Atlantic Transport Line.

Sixth—Stating that transfers and promotions from one class to another cannot be made by this Department without special authorization from the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

From the Comptroller—

First—Stating that the buildings between Eighteenth and Twentieth streets, North river, will be at the disposal of the Department not later than March 16, 1903.

Second—Transmitting opinion of the Corporation Counsel relative to the acquisition of Pier, old 47, East river, and adjoining bulkhead, from Mary Bell. Auditor directed to prepare requisition.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission, requesting that John Bottenek, Laborer, and William Hampel, Dockbuilder, be directed to report at the office of said Commission. So notified.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments, transmitting the assessed valuations of the following properties:

Block bounded by West Fifteenth and West Sixteenth streets, between Thirtieth avenue and the marginal street, \$450,000.

Easterly half of Pier 18, East river, \$45,000.

Westerly half of Pier 19, East river, \$32,000.

Bulkhead between Piers 18 and 19, East river, \$40,000.

From the Bureau of Buildings, in relation to unsafe buildings between Twentieth and Twenty-second streets, North river. Notify them that the structures will be sold and removed.

From the Department of Street Cleaning, stating that they will commence the dumping of ashes in rear of crib bulkhead, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem river, February 16, 1903.

From Board of Examiners, City of New York, in relation to the construction of frame ferry house by the New York and College Point Ferry Company, between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, East river. Notify them that the Department considers that it has jurisdiction, and suggests that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel.

Notify them that the bulkhead is leased to James Egan, who has given permission to the Erie Railroad Company to berth the barge "Buffalo" thereat.

From the Brooklyn Benevolent Society, transmitting copy of their application made to the Commissioners of the Land Office, asking that the grant made to the society south of Amity street, Borough of Brooklyn, be amended by granting an extension of time in which to pay the amount called for, and for the amendment of the terms of the grant so as to provide that the City in the event of taking the property shall pay in addition to the amount expended upon the property the cost of obtaining the grant. Corporation Counsel requested to oppose said application.

From the Brighton Beach Racing Association, notice of application to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water at Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Cornell Steamboat Company, requesting permission to erect a shed 25 by 70 feet on the southerly side of Pier foot of West Fifty-first street. The Commissioner recommended to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the approval of a lease to S. D. Coykendall of the southerly half of the Pier foot of West Fifty-first street, as extended out to the new pierhead line, for a term of ten years, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years, the lessee to have the privilege of erecting a shed 70 by 25 feet on the southerly side of said pier, the rental for the first term of ten years to be \$4,300 per annum; the rental for the renewal term to be 10 per cent. advance on the rental for the first term, the term to commence from the date of the completion of the extension to said pier, the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those in the form of lease now used by this Department.

From the Clyde Steamship Company, requesting dredging in the slips adjoining Pier 29, East river, and in the slip between Piers 33 and 34, East river. Notify them that Pier 29, East river, is not under the jurisdiction of this Department. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging in the slip between Piers 33 and 34, East river.

From Leshner, Whitman & Co., requesting permission to erect crib bulkhead and platform between Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets, East river. Denied.

From Edward Lauterbach, stating that his client, H. H. Rogers, declines the proposition for lease of franchise of ferry to Staten Island, as he considers it necessary to use both slips at the foot of Whitehall street and declines to pay the increased rental.

From C. H. Mallory & Co., requesting information as to when paving on bulkhead adjoining Pier 16, East river, will be commenced. Notify them that the work will be commenced as soon as the frost leaves the ground.

From the Citizens' Union, requesting to be advised as to why so many persons to whom ice-bridge privileges were granted during 1902 did not avail themselves of the privilege, and whether the Department requires a deposit on its leases. Secretary directed to reply.

From the Manufacturers' Association of New York, submitting plans of proposed improvement of Whale creek, Newtown creek. Notify them that a hearing will be held on Friday, February 27, 1903, at 12 o'clock noon.

From the New York Harbor Line Board, stating that application has been made by the Riparian Commissioners of New York to the Secretary of War for an extension of the bulkhead line on the Jersey shore of the Hudson river. Request notice of hearing.

From the North Side Board of Trade, requesting that a communication be addressed to the Chairman of the Committee of Rivers and Harbors, House of Representatives, approving the proposed improvement of the Bronx Kills. Secretary directed to comply with the request.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, accepting lease of 42 additional feet of bulkhead between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets, North river.

From the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, stating that, inasmuch as the City is not now in a position to give possession of property easterly of the present Whitehall street ferry terminal, they do not care to give the matter consideration.

From Capt. John H. Smith, stating that the damage to timber at One Hundred and Thirteenth street, Harlem river, was not caused by the tug "Anna J. Kipp." Notify him that the responsibility for the damage rests upon the tugboat.

From Simmons & Harris, requesting to be advised of any hearing or other proceedings to be hereafter held in connection with the proposed improvement of the Fulton Fish Market. Secretary directed to notify them.

From Terry & Tench Construction Company, requesting permission to construct a pile platform between Lexington and Third avenues, Harlem river, to take the place of the permit heretofore granted for the construction of dock thereat. Notify them that no action will be taken thereon until the rent due this Department is paid.

From the Commissioner of Immigration, complaining of interference with the Ellis Island ferry service by tugboats lying at the Battery Landing. Dockmaster directed to give the matter his attention.

From George M. Van Hosen, offering to sell to the City the dock at the foot of Twenty-fifth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Notify him that a personal examination of the premises will be made by the Commissioner shortly.

From the White Star Towing Company, in relation to the damage alleged to have been done by tug "Samuel E. Bouker," to West Ninety-seventh Street Pier. Notify them that the tug is responsible for such damage.

James E. Ward & Co., to replace two fender piles at the outer corner of Pier, old 16, East river.

Hartford and New York Transportation Company, to enlarge opening in the shed and to remove about 2 feet of the backing log for the purpose of enlarging gangway; also to place two scales westerly of Pier 33, East river, provided said company agrees to remove said scales and restore the premises to their former condition when so ordered by the Commissioner of Docks.

Continental Iron Works, to rebuild portion of old crib at foot of Quay street, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Inwood Realty and Dock Company, to repair old crib dock at the south side of Two Hundred and Seventh street, North river, in accordance with plans submitted.

Manhattan State Hospital, to drive piles at dock at Ward's Island and on the south side of Pier foot of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, Harlem river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Staten Island Water Supply Company, to place tide gauge at Bodine's creek, Staten Island, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

Central Vermont Railroad Company, to place three movable stake posts on bulkhead east of Pier, new 29, East river, and to spread canvas over same, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Sanitarium for Hebrew Children, to land at the outer end of Pier foot of East Third street, at the rate of \$1 for each landing.

New York and Jersey Railroad Company, to occupy spaces 80x80 feet and 40x65 feet, at and near the foot of Morton street, North river, together with the privilege of erecting a building and placing therein the necessary machinery for the construction of the North river tunnel, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2,300 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier of this Department.

New York Dock Company, to erect a shed 878 feet long by 160 feet wide on Pier 38, Atlantic basin, Borough of Brooklyn, provided said company files in this Department the customary agreement.

The following permits were revoked:

New York Yacht Club, for float on north side of East Twenty-third street.
Empire City Subway Company, to construct subsidiary connection to Pier 57, East river.

The specifications and forms of contract for painting recreation structures and for furnishing granite for bulkhead or river wall, were approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel, and the Secretary was directed to have a sufficient number of blank proposals printed and the proper advertisement inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

An extension of time to February 13, 1903, was granted on Contract No. 726, Class I, and an extension of time to February 11, 1903, was granted for the completion of Contract No. 752.

Form of Contract No. 766 was approved by the Corporation Counsel.

Printer's proofs of Contracts Nos. 768, 770 and 771 were approved by the Corporation Counsel.

The work under Contract No. 761 was commenced February 12, 1903.

The Work under Class I Contract No. 726 was completed February 13, 1903; under Contract No. 752, February 11, 1903; under Contract No. 739, February 10, 1903, and under Contract No. 758, February 7, 1903.

The consent of sureties to the extension of time on Contract No. 729 was filed. The Comptroller attached his certificates to Contracts Nos. 763 and 765.

Substitution of sureties on Contract No. 735 was approved.

The contractor under Contract No. 765 was ordered to proceed with the work.

The following estimates were received by the Department, February 13, 1903, for furnishing and delivering about 2,000 tons of anthracite coal under Contract No. 735, a representative of the Comptroller being present:

The bill from E. McLean Long, for inspecting material used in shed erected on Pier, new 12, East river, under Contract No. 741, was directed to be collected from the R. H. Hood Company, contractors.

The following orders were issued:

Thomas Quinn, services of double trucks with windlasses, at \$8 per day each.

F. W. Devoe and C. T. Reynolds Company, kerosene and paint, \$161.

John N. Robbins Company, steam steering cylinder for tug "Manhattan," \$20.

The title of Thomas C. Gaw was changed from Flagger to Watchman.

The names of Terence McCormack, Laborer, deceased, and Stephen Chisom, Dockbuilder, deceased, were ordered to be taken from the list of employees.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prefer charges against Samuel T. Munson, Roundsman, for incompetency, absence without leave and neglect of duty.

John Wilson, Dockbuilder, to whom hearings were given on February 13 and 19, 1903, was discharged.

The transfer of Charles E. Trout, Draughtsman, to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, was consented to.

James Riordan, Laborer, to whom a hearing was given on February 19, 1903, on charges of leaving his post without leave, was reprimanded and ordered reassigned to duty.

John F. Gately, Jr., having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for such position, was appointed Lumber Inspector on probation with compensation at the rate of \$4.80 per day while employed.

The Engineer-in-Chief was directed to supervise the work of erection of dumping board by Martin H. Healey on the Pier foot of West Thirtieth street.

The consignee and owner of the hay on Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street, taken from the sunken canalboat "Maria Dagwell," were notified to remove the same, and in case of its non-removal within five days, it was ordered to be removed by the force of the Department.

The Auditor reported that the cost of extending Pier 39, North river, amounted to \$33,268.53, making the annual rental \$1,663.43, and that the cost of extending Pier, new 24, North river, amounted to \$39,819.91, making the annual rental \$1,991.

No. 882, repairs to the bulkhead between South Ninth and South Tenth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, under permit granted the American Sugar Refining Company.

No. 969, repairs to the fender system, backing log, etc., of the bulkhead and platform at Quay street and Bushwick creek, Borough of Brooklyn, under permit granted Frank Cunningham.

No. 802, building of subways between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, East river, under permit granted the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, March 3, 1903, at 2 O'clock p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and the Chief Engineer.

The minutes of adjourned meeting of February 27, 1903, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 15004 to 15014, inclusive, amounting to \$726.21.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Commissioners received from the Construction or Executive Committee a communication of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, contractors, dated November 24, 1900, in relation to retained percentages on the contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam, with a recommendation that the communication be ordered filed and the Secretary directed to so inform said contractors.

Which was adopted and so ordered.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report:

REPORT No. 506.

NEW YORK, February 28, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Relating to the communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated February 18, 1903, returning bill for taxes for School District No. 8, Town of Yorktown, N. Y., amounting to \$84.60, and calling attention to the fact that a bill for the same school district, amounting to \$33.50, had been received by him from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on January 10, 1903, and was subsequently approved and returned for payment, and asking that the matter be investigated before payment was made, I beg to report that the bill of \$84.60 is for taxes on property acquired and under the control of the Aqueduct Commissioners, while the bill for \$33.50 is for land in Old Croton Lake, which is under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

NEW YORK, February 28, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I have received the following proposals for furnishing cast-iron special castings, to be delivered f. o. b. Croton-on-Hudson, N. Y., to be used for grooves and drains in Gate House No. 1, at the southerly end of the New Croton Dam:

From the J. W. Fiske Iron Works, 39 Park place, New York, \$1,369.

From the Coldwell-Wilcox Company, Newburgh, N. Y., \$469.

From John Fox & Co., 253 Broadway, New York, who bid a price of 5 1-2 cents per pound, which will amount to \$356.12; however, the castings cannot be made to a specific weight, and an increase of 5 per cent. in the weight will be allowed, which would make the maximum price of their bid \$373.89.

John Fox & Co. being the lowest bidder, I recommend that I be authorized to order the castings from them.

A communication was received from Deputy Comptroller Stevenson, dated March 2, 1903, transmitting certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment February 27, 1903, approving of the renewal of the lease of rooms in the Stewart Building, No. 280 Broadway, known as Nos. 206, 207, 209, 211, 213, 214, 215 and 216, for one year from May 1, 1903, at a rental of \$7,500; which was ordered filed.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated February 17, 1903, transmitting letter of Ray D. Lillibridge, dated February 16, 1903, requesting a photograph of the aqueduct; which was referred to the Chief Engineer for reply.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, dated February 28, 1903, returning tax bill of School District No. 7, Town of Yorktown, amounting to \$232.35, and stating that if the school trustees of the district have not complied with the provisions of the statute (chap. 185, Laws of 1893) requiring them to give written notice to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the increased assessment, the bill is illegal and payment thereof should be refused; also calling attention to the fact

that a tax bill for \$48.10 for the year 1902, for the same school district had been submitted to him by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and suggesting the advisability of conferring with that department before approving tax bills in order to avoid the possibility of duplicate payments therefor being made.

The Secretary was directed to ascertain from the Comptroller whether he had been notified of the increased assessment, in compliance with the statute, and was also directed to confer with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity as suggested by the Corporation Counsel.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
