BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1913.

New York, July 1, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report for the three months closing June 30, 1913.

Department as a Whole.

The Trustees early in April addressed their request to the Municipal Civil Service Commission, requesting the appointment of Dr. George O'Hanlon as General Medical Superintendent under rule 12, paragraph 5, of the Civil Service regulations. A hearing in support of this request was held on April 16, when the President and two other members of the Board presented arguments in support of the request. Some weeks later the Trustees were informed that their request for authority to make this appointment had been denied. At the same time they were notified that a promotion

examination for the position of General Medical Superintendent open to Deputy Medical Superintendents who have served not less than one year in the position and who are otherwise eligible had been ordered.

At the urgent solicitation of the Board of Trustees, supported by many voluntary organizations, the Civil Service Commission abandoned the proposed change in the classifications of the position of Nurse under which it would have been necessary to take the Nurses engaged in Social Service work from the competitive class. So many special qualifications are required for the proper discharge of this work that great injury would have resulted to the service had the change been made in the classification.

The grade of Supervising Nurse at an annual salary of \$1,200 has now been established for one incumbent and it is proposed to appoint Miss Wadley to this position.

Arrangements have been made for a uniform treatment of all tonsil and adenoid cases in the hospitals of the Department, and it is hoped in the future to care for a larger number of these cases. Upon the advice of the experts engaged in the obstetrical service the Board has resolved to rescind the Department rule requiring the attendance of a Visiting Physician or his Assistant when an anaesthetic is given in certain cases in this service. Hereafter a member of the House Staff who has received instruction in anaesthesia and whom the Instructor in Anaesthesia for the hospital has certified as being properly qualified for this service will be allowed to take charge.

In view of the success attending upon the arrangement at Bellevue it has been resolved to appoint the General Medical Superintendent to full membership in the Medical Board of each of the Allied Hospitals.

Attention having been directed to the restricted character of the special diet in use at the hospitals, arrangements have been made to provide for a wider margin of food in cases where the building up of the patient renders this advisable. A combination of special and regular diet forms will be allowed if justified by the patient's condition.

An estimated deficit of \$56,836 due to the increased cost of foodstuffs and supplies and to the deductions made in last year's Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is reported and the Trustees have asked for the issuance of special revenue bonds in this amount.

The Board regrets to announce the resignation of Mr. Joseph McDonough, Purchasing Agent for the Department, which took effect on June 30. The demand for a rather more liberal salary than is allowed by the City for this important and responsible position would probably have made it possible to retain the services of Mr. McDonough.

The Trustees have been advised of the transference to their jurisdiction of a portion of Seaside Park, Rockaway, from the Department of Parks, and of the approval of the preliminary plans submitted by the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, for a hospital on this site. Dr. Goldwater, the Department's expert, has been asked to pass upon these plans and to represent the interest of the Department in their preparation.

The Trustees have accepted an invitation to be represented at the Hospital Conference of The City of New York. A request to change the title from that of Superintendent of Training Schools to that of Directress of Nursing or some similar title has had to be declined for the current year, but an attempt will be made later to make the change in the interest of uniformity.

A committee of the Board appointed to purchase three motor ambulances on a resolution of the Board of Aldermen permitting this to be done without public letting has decided in favor of one White gas car and two Lansden electric cars.

As far as may be possible, in conformity with plans already made, it will be the policy of the Department to install gas ranges in the kitchens of new buildings, for the sake of the greater cleanliness and comfort in the cooking.

Bellevue Hospital.

The lists of equipment required for the new surgical pavilions are now practically completed and the Board of Aldermen has been requested to consent to a change of wording in the original appropriation by which the funds then appropriated may be made available for "equipment" as well as "construction."

Pavilion L and M.

The architects report that the progress of construction of these pavilions during the past three months has been most satisfactory. The exterior of the building is completed and work is now confined to the interior. The floors are ready for the final coating of the composition flooring and the tile for the roof, loggia and balcony floors has been laid. All the terra cotta installations are completed and the rough plaster work is finished on all the walls and ceilings throughout the building. The final coating of smooth plaster is completed in the first, second and sixth floors, and on all the others this work is in progress. The painting of the outside sashes and balconies was begun during the past month.

J. T. Brady & Company, contractors for these pavilions, have been requested for estimates on flooring of plastic linoleum, tiling, and oak for these buildings, and the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, recommended that estimates be also taken directly from concerns supply such flooring. The opinion of the Corporation Counsel was asked concerning the authority of the Trustees to have this work given out under a special contract, deducting from the contract amount an allowance of 60 cents per square foot. The Corporation Counsel, however, advised that such a contract would not be legal. The architects have instructed the contractors to install plastic linoleum floors on the understanding that when certificates for payment are issued the architects would deduct amounts equal to the difference between the cost plus contractors profit of 15 per cent. and the amount allowed in the contract. Before approving this arrangement, the Trustees have asked the Corporation Counsel to state whether or not it complies with the objection raised by him.

John T. Brady & Company, the contractors, have requested an extension of time to May 1, 1914, giving as their reasons, stormy weather, the difficulty in securing structural steel and the condition of 29th st. during October and November, 1912. On the recommendation of the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, an extension of 145 calendar days was allowed them.

Pavilions I and K.

Progress upon operations on these new pavilions is reported by the architects as very satisfactory and that the first three parts are rapidly approaching completion. The exterior mason work of the three sections is nearly finished and the walls are completed to the cornice of the roof and all the roof arches as well as the passageway to the laundry extension and all terra cotta floor arches are finished. The piling for the fourth section is now completed and the concrete foundations have been laid and the cellars dampproofed. These cellars are entire completed and connected with those in the new boiler house and Pavilions L and M. The structural steel framework is entirely finished with the exception of one portion of Pavilion K which connects that building with Pavilions L and M. The cast iron bases for the columns in this section have been set and the structural steel for that part has been delivered and is ready for erecting. The iron stairways around the elevators have been built from the cellar to the roof and the work has been begun on the fire escapes on the south side of both wings. The iron framing on doors and windows on the north side has been completed in the two central sections. The installations of the plumbing work which includes the fixtures for hot and cold water lines has been completed in the first three sections and the fire mains as well as waste pipes and house drains are about half finished.

The conduits for electrical work are installed in two sections of the building from the floor to the roof and about half the interconnecting system is finished. In the other section this work is progressing and has now reached the second floor. The heating and ventilating, high and low pressure lines, as well as the return lines for steam pipes and branches for radiators, are completed in the entire building, with the exception of the last section. The heating coils throughout the building, including the laundry extension, have been placed and are now ready for a test. The non-conducting covering for all steam lines has been delivered and the work of covering these pipes is now in progress.

Certain changes in the plumbing work of these pavilions have been consented to by the Trustees who acted upon the advice of A. S. Webster, Consulting Engineer.

A change proposed in the laundry extension under construction in connection with those new pavilions which involve the resetting of certain doors and windows

and the installing of additional plumbing fixtures, the cost not to exceed \$1,000, has been approved.

The amount of insurance (\$94,000) placed upon these pavilions by the contractors, J. H. Parker Company, has been approved by the Trustees upon the advice of the architects.

Balconies and Roof Wards.

The architects report that during the past few weeks they have been checking and comparing the completed work on these balconies before finally accepting them. Except for a few minor details the balconies are finished.

A request for an additional extension of time on his contract for the erection of additional balconies on Pavilions A and B was made by J. M. Knopp, the contractor, in March and refused by the Trustees. In a communication dated June 12 he requested an extension up to and including June 21 on account of delays due to inclement weather and the character of this construction. On the advice of the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, that forty days would cover all the delays to the contractor from conditions beyond his control, the Board granted him this additional extension. Roof Wards A and B.

Complaint has been received from the architects of the slow progress made by the contractors, as practically no work has been done on the construction of the roof wards for the past three months although the material has all been delivered. Repeated efforts by the Trustees to have him proceed as rapidly as possible in order to have the use of these wards during a part of the summer months has been without avail.

Daniel J. Ryan, the contractor for the roof wards on these pavilions, made a request on April 30 for an extension to his contract time to July 30. On the advice of the architects and the Building Committee who investigated the situations alleged by the contractor, this extension was granted.

Future Constructions.

The next part of the new hospital which would naturally come up for construction is Pavilion G, the cost of which would be about \$450,000. As a balance of \$250,000 existed in the Bellevue Corporate Stock Building Fund, suggestion was made that \$200,000 belonging to the Gouverneur Hospital fund should be transferred, with the approval of the authorities, to the Bellevue Construction Fund, thus assuring a continuance of building operations at Bellevue. Such a procedure might be justified by the insufficiency of funds at Gouverneur to provide adequately for the erection of a dispensary building and Nurses' residence commensurate with the future needs of that hospital. While the matter was under debate by the Board of Trustees, information was received that the \$250,000 balance in the Bellevue fund would be recalled. The Board is therefore face to face with the fact that all building at Bellevue will be temporarily concluded upon the completion of the buildings now under way. This is a matter of much regret to the Trustees, who trust that the City's financial situation will soon be such as to justify a continuance of the original plan.

Reorganization of the Medical Board.

A communication from the Bellevue Medical Board, dated April 1, requested a conference with the Trustees for the purpose of presenting a plan to render more efficient the conduct of the medical and surgical service of the hospital. This plan proposes an enlargement of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board and clothes the new committee with the principles of the Board itself in dealing with the plan as outlined in the following proposition:

"The Executive Committee is to consist of one Physician and one Surgeon from each of the four divisions.

"In case any member of the Committee is compelled to be absent from any meeting, an alternate is to be designated to act in his stead.

"The members of this Committee and the alternates are to be elected by the Medical Board on nomination by the division. The term of service to be three years.

"The Executive Committee is to have the authority, supervision, and executive control over the management of the hospital, as has been heretofore exercised by the Medical Board.

"The Executive Committee is to meet twice a month.

"The Board of Trustees is to be asked to appoint a committee from their number to meet the Executive Committee every second month.

"The members of the Executive Committee on each division shall act as a Conference Committee for all appointments to that division, and shall confer with a committee of two from the Board of Trustees for that purpose.

"The Pathologist and the General Medical Superintendent of the hospital are to be members of the Executive Committee, with voting power.

"A quorum for routine business only is to consist of three members; otherwise five members are required to form a quorum.

"The existing published governing rules of the present Executive Committee are to be adopted as the rules governing the proposed Executive Committee, with the exception that section 15 concerning the order of business be amended to read in accordance with the above submitted plan, and also that section 5 be amended to read to include medical supervision and power over the out-patient department, the ambulance service, and the admitting service, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees."

This plan has been approved by the Trustees and has already been carried into effect.

A still wider reorganization of the entire medical service in the new hospital is under contemplation. The Board of Trustees has appointed a committee to confer with Mr. Henry S. Pritchett of the Carnegie Foundation concerning the appointment of an expert to draw up a scheme for a practical revision.

Medical and Nursing Service.

A plan looking to economy of time and labor of the nursing staff is under consideration. This would depend upon the adoption of a uniform system throughout the hospital for surgical patients, their aftercare, and the making of dressings.

An additional Nurse has been appointed to the orthopedic service in the Out-patient Department.

The service at the School for Midwives has increased to such an extent that it is necessary to have an additional Nurse.

Pathological Laboratories.

Upon the request of the Director of Laboratories it has been advised to ask for two Pathological Chemists at \$2,500 per annum to carry on the chemical work along research lines in blood and spinal fluids. This work has already been started in the laboratories. A request on the part of Dr. Norris for two additional Laboratory Assistants at a salary of \$750 per annum in order to perform Wasserman tests on all cases admitted to Bellevue has been given serious consideration by the Trustees. This request is reinforced by a similar one from Dr. Herman Biggs, Attending Physician to Bellevue and Expert for the Board of Health. Before requesting money for these positions it was resolved to see whether the Board of Health had available any funds which could be used for this purpose.

Fire Protection.

The Trustees have been in communication with Mr. H. F. J. Porter, Industrial Engineer, concerning the provisions that have been made to insure the safety of the patients and employees of the hospitals in case of a fire in the new buildings now under construction as well as the old buildings at Bellevue. Mr. Porter has been invited to make an inspection of the plans and of the buildings involved. This he has undertaken to do and it is probable that the Trustees will secure his assistance in further perfecting the arrangements already made.

The renewal of their contract with the Coker National Fire Prevention Engineering Company for another period of six months, beginning on July 1, is suspended pending a readjustment of the cost of this arrangement.

Miscellaneous.

The need for the repair of the refrigerating plant in connection with the present morgue raised anew the question of the readiness of the new morgue for occupancy. Action upon the repairs in question was deferred until the President of the Board could confer with the Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate on the likelihood of the Department of Public Charities obtaining sufficient funds to enable them to open and maintain the new morgue without further delay. The President reported that the officers of this committee were in favor of the Commissioner of Charities taking over the new morgue and that an application on his part for the required funds would receive their favorable consideration.

The General Medical Superintendent has been directed to continue in the Board's policy of installing mattresses in the new buildings of the Department as they are constructed, in so far as current funds will permit and to make provision for the necessary sums in the Budget for 1914.

The Commissioner of Public Charities directed the Pilots and Engineers of that

Department to make as little noise as possible with the steam whistles of their boats while in the vicinity of Bellevue.

The Board of Estimate has approved of the claim of Blake & Williams for \$1,050 for labor in operating the heating apparatus in the Pathological and Dormitory Buildings during the period from February 24 to April 7, 1911. The General Medical Superintendent has been directed to prepare a voucher in their favor for this amount.

Gouverneur Hospital.

At the suggestion of the Real Estate Bureau of the Department of Finance the Trustees have forwarded to the Board of Aldermen a description of the property situated at the corner of Front st. and Gouverneur slip intended for use as a site for the new dispensary building. A communication has been received from the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association to the effect that the new building should be devoted to dispensary purposes only and special provision should be made for a Nurses' residence. The plans for the building not having been completed, this communication was referred to the Building Committee for their consideration. The purchase of the site has been authorized at a price not to exceed \$45,000.

A communication from the President of the Park Department stating that his Department had received no corporate stock for almost two years, except for road building, and that he was obliged on this account to give up his purpose of improving a small park in front of Gouverneur Hospital.

An effort made by the Committee interested in the Tuberculosis Day Camp, operated in connection with Gouverneur Hospital, to have quarters constructed for a tuberculosis clinic on the second story of the new pier now under course of construction at the foot of Jackson st., has been vetoed by the new Commissioner of Docks and Ferries for various reasons. The problem, therefore, of the future location of this clinic is still unsettled.

Temporary repairs in the tiled floors of Gouverneur Hospital have been authorized to be made from the current maintenance fund while provision will be made in the next departmental estimate for the repair of the flooring in all the hospitals of the Department where it may be needed.

Medical Appointments.

Harlem Hospital.

Authority has been granted to readvertise for estimates for the construction of the new ward wing extension to Harlem Hospital. The plans for this hospital will be resubmitted as soon as corporate stock funds requested by the Trustees on December 27, 1912, has been approved.

Messrs. Luke A. Burke & Sons, contractors for the construction of the new Nurses' residence at Harlem have requested a six months' extension of time for the completion of their contract and have informed the Trustees that they expect reimbursements for delays between the award of the contract and beginning of the work. As the Board considers this unwarranted they have requested the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to the legal status of the contractors' contention.

It has been found necessary to run a tunnel to carry piping between the new Nurses' residence and the power house at Harlem Hospital. The bid submitted by Luke A. Burke & Sons for this purpose amounted to \$6,412, while the estimate of Mr. Freedlander, the architect, contemplating this change, was from \$9,000 to \$10,000. The money to accomplish this work will be asked for as a separate item in the corporate stock requirements. The Board has not yet been informed of the exact amount that will be needed for the equipment of the remodeled hospital, together with that for the ambulance house and power station, and has deferred action upon this until the exact amount shall be known.

A proposal to start an evening clinic at this hospital for syphilis and other genito-urinary diseases elicited a protest from an association of neighboring physicians. The Board has taken this under consideration, but in view of the inherent necessities of the cases, will probably decide to open the clinic if the material obstacles in the way can be relieved. One requirement would be that it would be open on the same evening that the dispensary is now open for the tuberculosis clinic, otherwise it would be necessary to provide additional employees. It has been decided to hold a tuberculosis clinic for children on the two days a week following the adult clinic.

The Trustees were unable to approve the recommendations of the Medical Board for a salaried Pathologist to be appointed for the clinical laboratory, but have approved the appointment of an additional employee for the care of the laboratory. It was also decided to provide for a salaried Admitting Physician by including this position in the Departmental Estimate for 1914. The appointment of a non-salaried Microscopist to the Dispensary has been approved.

The wards of the hospital have been painted by the employees of the Department. The premises at 115 and 117 W. 136th st. have been re-leased for one year from the 1st of May.

Provision will be made in the Departmental Estimate for 1914 for a new Clerk at \$25 a month to act as assistant in the information office of the Hospital.

The Trustees have received from Chas. E. Knox, Consulting Engineer, a report of the cost of the production of electric current at Harlem Hospital. This valuable report confirms their estimate of the great economy to be had by providing a power plant in connection with a large institution such as this.

E. Tymeson, appointed Assistant Physician to Out-patients (ear, nose and throat); Dr. M. D. Touart, Assistant Physician to Out-patients, resigned; Dr. Walter C. Hurwitz, Assistant Physician to Out-patients, resigned; Dr. Trevor C. Yates, reappointed Assistant Physician to Out-patients (tuberculosis night clinic); Dr. Charles G. Herbermann, Jr., appointed Assistant Surgeon to Out-patients.

Fordham Hospital.

Joseph Di Benedetto, the contractor engaged for the construction of a roof ward at Fordham, applied in March for an extension of time under his contract, and Mr. R. F. Almirall, the architect, recommended an allowance of fifty calendar days, because of the impossibility of proceeding rapidly with the work in the cold weather and rain. On the architect's recommendation this extension was granted.

The contractor's estimate of \$297 for widening five doors and making other changes in the roof ward was accepted by the Trustees.

The recommendation of the Medical Board for the appointment of a visiting Radiographer to be in daily attendance had to be denied by the Trustees on account of lack of funds.

In consequence of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel the Trustees were obliged to rescind their resolution of December 3 granting an extension on the time of the L. J. Wadsworth Construction Company; in its stead they adopted a certificate of overtime for filing in the office of the Comptroller.

The Auxiliary Committee of Fordham Hospital has applied for permission to

provide a Nurse in the Children's Dispensary for a period of five months and the Trustees have cheerfully accepted their assistance in this matter.

Once more the attention of the medical authorities at this hospital has been called to the defective histories that are prepared by members of the House Staff. When this subject came up before, it was made an argument for increasing the number of the staff, but despite the fact that this was done, little improvement has been effected and the Trustees are determined to insist upon a full and complete history in every case. To insure this result the General Medical Superintendent has been instructed to secure copies of a number of the histories and go over them in an effort to determine the reason for their deficiencies.

Medical Appointments.

Alpert, January 1, 1914, 2 years; Dr. Maximilian Frick, January 1, 1914, 2 years; Dr. Henry B. Eisberg, January 1, 1914, 2 years.

During the quarter ending March 31, 1913, 12,398.6 feet of vitrified pipe sewers from 8 inches to 30 inches in diameter, or 2.35 miles; 2,979 linear feet of concrete sewer, 29 inches by 40 inches in diameter, to 13 feet by 8 feet, or .56 miles, making a total of 15,377.6 linear feet built during the quarter, thus making the mileage of the sewerage system 323.1 miles; 21 basins were also built, which makes a total of 3,590 basins connected with the sewerage system.

During the quarter ending March 31, 1913, there were entered into 22 contracts, amounting to \$699,252.49.

The Topographical Bureau reports for the quarter, the preparation of 7 rule maps for 7 streets, 7 damage maps for 7 streets, embracing 169 plots, covering 554,103.97 square feet, or 221.64 city lots, 3 benefit maps, covering 318 plots, and 238 final damage and benefit maps.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices expended \$3,159.70 on supplies furnished to the several public buildings of the bureau for the quarter.

Of the petitions considered 40 were adopted and resolutions forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The Building Bureau reports that during the quarter plans and specifications were filed to the number of 196 for 256 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$7,144,766.

Of the number of applications received 36 were for other than frame dwelling houses, to cost less than \$20,000 each, estimated at a total of \$253,300; 25 for frame dwellings, estimated at a total of \$106,700; 8 stores at an estimated cost of less than \$15,000 each, to cost about \$34,200; 127 tenement houses over \$15,000 each to cost in the aggregate \$5,786,351, and 2 tenement houses costing less than \$15,000 each to be built for \$12,500.

There were 150 alterations to buildings, plans being filed amounting to an estimated cost of \$234,450. Work was begun on 176 new buildings during the quarter, and there were completed in the same time 219, leaving 632 new buildings in progress. Alterations were commenced on 110 buildings; alterations completed on 105 buildings, leaving alterations on 184 buildings in progress.

During the quarter there were 130 violations of the building law for defective plumbing; 4 for defective elevators, 350 for defective construction and material, 413 for erecting and altering without permit, and 181 for unsafe buildings. Notices were issued to remove violations of the law to the number of 1,113, to remove unsafe buildings 404, and to repair passenger elevators 4.

Complaints to the number of 363 were received, and, upon investigation, were remedied, except in 249 instances where complaints were unfounded, and in 114 cases notices were issued.

Passenger elevators to the number of 97 were investigated, and 4 were found not to be in compliance with the law.

Borough of Brooklyn.

Abstract of a duly advertised meeting of the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, held July 2, 1913, at 3.40 p. m.

The roll was called and the following members answered to their names:

Hon. Lewis H. Pounds, Commissioner of Public Works, presiding; Aldermen Molen, Kenney and Dunn.

On motion of Alderman Molen the minutes of meeting held May 28, 1913, were approved.

The Secretary presented resolutions initiating the following improvements:

No. 1437. To construct a sewer in Shore road, between 2d avenue and 95th street, and an outlet sewer in 95th street, from Shore road to Marine avenue, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

No. 1445. That the lots lying on the south side of 50th street, between 5th and 6th avenues, known as Nos. 24 and 25, Block 792, be enclosed with a board fence six feet high, where necessary, at the expense of the owner or owners of said lots. Estimated cost, \$70; assessed valuation, \$4,240; which on motion of Alderman Dunn was laid over.

No. 1404. To regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on 85th street, from 13th avenue to 14th avenue, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

No. 1450. To regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on 70th street, from 7th avenue to 8th avenue, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

No. 1436. To lay a preliminary or permanent pavement on 77th street, from Ridge boulevard to Shore road, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was amended to read as follows:

To lay a permanent asphalt block pavement on a 6-inch concrete foundation on 77th street, from Ridge boulevard to Shore road, which was unanimously adopted as amended.

No. 1438. To construct a sewer basin on 3d avenue at the east corner of 2d street, at the expense of the owner or owners of lots fronting on the portions of the streets draining into said basin. Estimated cost, \$200; assessed valuation, \$59,250, which, on motion of Alderman Kenney was denied.

No. 1432. That cement sidewalks be

laid in front of lot on the east side of 4th avenue, between Union and President street, known as No. 4, Block 955, at the expense of the owner or owners of said lot. Estimated cost, \$75; assessed valuation, \$5,000; which was amended to read as follows:

"That cement sidewalks be laid in front of lot on the east side of 4th avenue, between Union and President streets, where not already laid, in front of Lot No. 4, Block 955, at the expense of the owner or owners of said lot. Estimated cost, \$75; assessed valuation, \$5,000," which on motion of Alderman Kenney was unanimously adopted as amended.

No. 1452. To regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks, where not already done, on 12th avenue, from 49th street to 50th street, which was amended to read as follows:

"To regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on 12th avenue, from 49th street to New Utrecht avenue, where not already done," which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted as amended.

No. 1452. To lay a preliminary or permanent asphalt pavement on 12th avenue, from 49th street to 50th street, which was amended to read as follows:

"To lay a permanent asphalt pavement on a 6-inch concrete foundation on 12th avenue, from 49th street to New Utrecht avenue," which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted as amended.

No. 1453. That the lots lying on the west side of 7th avenue, between 20th and 21st streets, known as Nos. 41 and 42, Block 892, be enclosed with a board fence six feet high, at the expense of the owner or owners of said lots, which on motion of Alderman Molen was laid over.

No. 1431. To construct a sewer basin on 56th street at the north corner of 11th avenue at the expense of the owner or owners of lots fronting on the portions of the streets draining into said basin. Estimated cost, \$200; assessed valuation, \$88,580; which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

No. 1443. To grade a strip 10 feet in width along the westerly side of Lot 51, Block 917, located on the north side of 41st street, between 5th and 6th avenues, at the expense of the owner or owners of said lot. Estimated cost, \$375; assessed valuation, \$3,500; which on motion of Alderman Molen was adopted by the following vote: Yeas — Aldermen Molen, Kenney and Dunn; Commissioner Pounds voting No on the ground that it could not be legally done.

No. 1447. To open Bergen place, from Wakeman place to 67th street, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

No. 1362. That Lot 11, located on the southeast corner of 52d street and 9th avenue, and Lot 14, on the south side of 52d street, between 9th and 10th avenue, in Block 5639, be graded to the level of the curb at the expense of the owner or owners of said lots, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was denied.

No. 1375. To construct a sewer in 68th street, from the end of the existing sewer east of 2d avenue easterly about 58 feet, which, on motion of Alderman Dunn was laid over.

No. 912. To amend resolution of June 20, 1912, initiating proceedings to lay a preliminary asphalt block pavement on a 4-inch concrete foundation on 97th street, between 4th and Fort Hamilton avenues, by providing instead for a permanent asphalt block pavement on a 6-inch concrete foundation, so as to make the amended resolution read as follows:

"To lay a permanent asphalt block pavement on a 6-inch concrete foundation on 97th street, between 4th and Fort Hamilton avenues," which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

No. 1456. To regulate, grade and set cement curb where necessary on 76th street, from 6th avenue to 7th avenue, which on motion of Alderman Dunn was unanimously adopted.

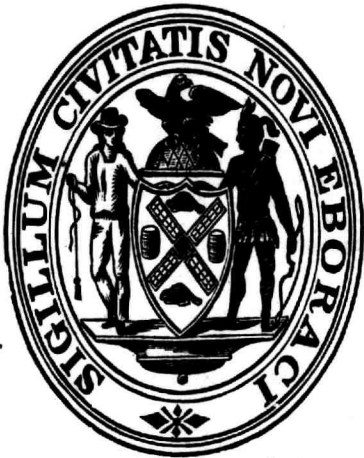

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1913, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first

part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Brooklyn City Railroad Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

"Brooklyn City R. R. Co. Map showing proposed extension in the route of the Brooklyn City R. R. Co. on Roebeling street, from Division to Lee Ave. in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, to Accompany the petition to the Board of estimates and apportionment. Dated May 13, 1913."

and approved by Z. E. Watson, Secretary and Treasurer, and C. L. Crabbs, Engineer, Way and Structures, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months, within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 1, 1924.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.
 (b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one hundred and ten dollars (\$110), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175).

During the remaining term expiring January 1, 1924, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175).
 The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentage of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this consent shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any other corporation or to any individual a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the route hereinbefore described, and the Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall consent to the construction and operation of any street surface railway by any such other corporation or individual which may receive a franchise therefor from the City, and which may necessitate

the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed or operated by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Should the City at any time during the term of this contract grant to any other corporation or to any individual the right of privilege to operate a railway upon the tracks of the Company on the route herein described, or any portion thereof, then the City shall, within thirty (30) days thereafter, give notice to the Company that such right has been granted, and of the name of the corporation or individual to which such right has been granted.

At the expiration of ninety (90) days after the giving of such notice, such individual or corporation shall have the right to begin the operation of cars upon the tracks of the Company upon the route, or any portion thereof, over which such corporation or individual may receive a right or privilege, and to use thereof the tracks, equipment, power and all other property of the Company which shall be necessary in the operation of the cars of such individual or corporation upon the tracks of the Company and shall have the right to continue such operation and to use such property until this contract or the right to use such property under the terms of the franchise or right granted said corporation or individual by the City, shall expire. Such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for the right to use such tracks, equipment, power and other property above described, such sum or sums as may be agreed upon in writing by such corporation or individual and the Company within said ninety (90) days, or in the event that such agreement cannot be reached within said ninety (90) days, such sum or sums shall be determined in the manner hereinafter provided for.

If the Company and such corporation or individual cannot, prior to the expiration of said ninety (90) days agree upon the compensation for the use of such tracks, then such compensation shall be fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner:

One fit and impartial person shall be chosen by the Company, one fit and impartial person shall be chosen by such corporation or individual, and the two so chosen shall choose a third fit and impartial person. The decision under oath of any two of said persons who shall be so selected shall be final and conclusive.

The compensation and expenses of the persons selected as arbitrators in the determination of such sum or sums shall be borne by the individual or corporation to which such right may be granted.

Within thirty (30) days after an agreement shall have been reached between said parties, or in case said agreement cannot be reached before the time specified herein, then within thirty (30) days after the determination of the arbitrators, as herein provided, should two of such arbitrators agree, the Company shall file with the Board a duplicate copy of a written agreement which shall specify the sum or sums which shall have been agreed to by the said parties or determined by said arbitrators, as the sum or sums which such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for said privilege. If the Company fails to file the same with the Board within said thirty (30) days, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine.

If either party fails to appoint an arbitrator, as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of a third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the expiration of said ninety (90) days, or if no two of said arbitrators so selected agree upon the sum or sums to be paid by such individual or corporation within sixty (60) days after they shall have been so selected, then such sum or sums shall be fixed by the Supreme Court upon the application of either party.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereof, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, the termination of this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street

railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Brooklyn, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—No wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed the Company shall provide two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. Such conduits shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City unless a rate of fare in excess of five (5) cents may be lawfully charged therefor.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of twenty (20) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-third—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues, the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30

next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers therein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted, may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City and the City shall have the right to take possession of the same at any time and in any manner. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-ninth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board, acting hereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheelguards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheelguards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its president or other officer to appear before the Board on a

certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirtieth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-first—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-second—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 5 and other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate seal to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.
