MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, July 23, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held July 16 were approved.

John L. Pleines, of 4th st., near Warburton ave., Bayside, L. I., appeared, as directed, to explain certain statements in the experience sheet of his examination for Lay Sanitary and Tenement House Inspector. After consideration of the matter, it was ordered that the disqualification appearing against the candidate's name on the eligible list be removed.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated July 16, calling attention to the accommodations provided for the Commission in the new Municipal Building, and suggesting that, as the same appeared inadequate, other arrangements be made. The report was ordered filed.

On the recommendation of the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions in reports on the dates specified, the following promotion examinations were ordered:

July 16, 1913—Clerk, 3d Grade, Municipal Civil Service Commission, to be open to all Second Grade Clerks who had served not less than three years in the grade.

July 17, 1913—Clerk, 2d Grade, Municipal Civil Service Commission, to be open to all First Grade Clerks who had served for not less than two years in the grade.

On the recommendation of the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions in a report dated July 17, eligibility in the examination for promotion to Janitor.

Grade 2, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Manhattan, was extended to Foremen and Assistant Foremen under clause 19 of rule 15, and to Elevators under clause 17 of rule 15, in accordance with the request of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, in a communication dated July 11.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated July 16, recommending that the Commission grant the request of the Comptroller under date of July 14 that an examination be held to qualify Herbert L. Powers, a Bookkeeper at \$1,500 per annum in the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and Markets, for promotion to \$1,800 per annum, and that his increase in salary to \$1,800 be authorized pending the result of the promotion examination. It appearing that the said employee was the only person eligible for promotion in the bureau in which he was serving, the recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, dated July 17, with reference to the case of one William A. Rafferty, a Stable Foreman in the Department of Street Cleaning, who had been unable to appear for examination for promotion to the position of District Superintendent owing to the fact that he was confined to a hospital at the time by order of the Medical Examiner of the Department. The Secretary was instructed to request an opinion from the Corporation Counsel on the following point:

"Is the Medical Examiner of the Department of Street Cleaning a superior officer of the Department, and has he power of himself to communicate orders to the employees that must be obeyed as in the case of the Police and Fire Departments?"

A report was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, dated July 17, transmitting an anonymous communication, signed "One Interested," relative to the fifth question in Rules and Regulations, in the recent examination for promotion to Lieutenant, Police Department. The Secretary was instructed to transmit the communication to the Examiners rating the papers for whatever consideration it might deserve.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated July 16, relative to the request of the Secretary of the Department of Health, under date of July 10, for approval of the change of title of Jeremiah A. Miller, from Hospital Clerk at \$1,500 per annum, to Third Grade Clerk, and recommending that the request be granted under clause 5 of rule 6. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated July 16, relative to the request of the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, that the Commission approve the transfer of James Ferguson from the position of Attendant at \$1,050 per annum, to that of Inspector of Public Baths and Comfort Stations at the same salary, or if the transfer could not be approved without a promotion examination that such examination be arranged at the Commission's earliest convenience. The Examiner recommended that the request for approval of the transfer be denied for the reason that the positions appeared in different groups of the classification, and that the department be informed that, unless there were urgent reasons for the holding of a promotion examination, the request for same be renewed in September.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated July 15, relative to a communication under date of July 8 from James J. Ward, of 1681 Union st., Brooklyn, N. Y., a candidate in the examination for promotion to Lieutenant, Fire Department, held February 26, 1912, to the effect that a mistake had been made in his record in so far as it referred to the date of his appointment in the Fire Department. The Examiner recommended that the communication be filed for the reason that an amended record sheet had not been filed by the Fire Department. Recommendation adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated July 15, relative to the case of James J. Rooney, a candidate in the examination for promotion from the rank of Patrolman to that of Sergeant in the Police Department. It appeared that the said Rooney was appointed a Patrolman on May 31, 1894, in the then Long Island City; was dismissed on January 31, 1896, and reinstated by court order on July 25, 1898; was promoted to the rank of Roundsmen on September 27, 1905, which title was changed to Sergeant on April 19, 1907; that on April 15, 1908, he had been fined twenty days' pay, and on July 1 of that year had been reduced to the rank of Patrolman. The Examiner requested a ruling on the following points:

1. Should the seniority of service of Patrolman Rooney be computed from the date of his original entrance into the Police Department of Long Island City on May 31, 1894?

2. Should his service in the rank of Sergeant from September 27, 1905, to July 1, 1908, be considered in such service?

3. If it should be so considered, should points be deducted for the fine of twenty days imposed on April 15, 1908?

The Secretary was instructed to request an opinion from the Corporation Counsel on the points involved.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner, dated July 21, recommending that an open competitive examination be ordered for the position of Assistant Director, Bacteriological Laboratory, to fill a vacancy in the Municipal Sanatorium at Otisville, at \$3,000 per annum. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Assistant Director, Bacteriological Laboratory.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated July 15, relative to the request of the Secretary of the Department of Health, for approval of the increase in salary of Miss Mary Jillson to \$1,200 per annum, and in the event of an examination being necessary, it be limited either to the Stenographers and Typewriters assigned to the office of the Commissioner or to those receiving \$1,050 per annum throughout the department. The request was denied, and the Secretary was instructed to state that in the event of a promotion examination being ordered, under the rules it would be open to all 2d grade Stenographers and Typewriters throughout the department who might be eligible.

The following reports were presented from Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, relative to his investigation of the experience statements of candidates on the eligible lists specified:

The matter was referred to the Examiners, who rated the candidate's experience paper for a report as to whether the candidate had received more credit than that to which the result of the Examiner's investigation had shown him to be entitled.

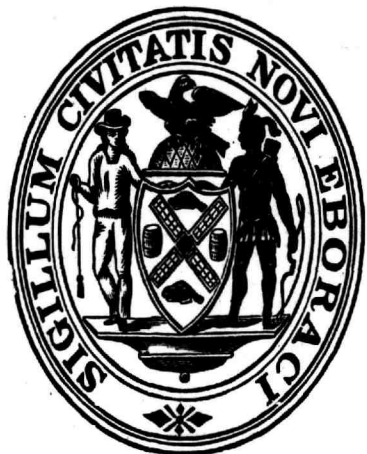

The City and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction, as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, as the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract for which bids are now invited will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five (95) per cent. of the aggregate sum arrived at by multiplying the estimated approximate quantities by the unit prices as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. FRANCHISE MATTERS.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held July 10, 1913, the following petition was received:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The petition of Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line respectfully shows as follows:

On the 10th day of July, 1912, The City of New York, pursuant to resolution of this Board, entered into a contract with petitioner whereby said City granted to petitioner a franchise to construct and operate a street surface railroad from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, in Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Station, in Brooklyn, via the Manhattan Bridge and certain streets in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Paragraph first of section 2 of said contract provides that the rights granted by the contract shall cease unless petitioner shall obtain and file with the Board, within six months from the date of the contract, consents in writing of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway, or, in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, shall, within said six months or within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine whether said railway ought to be constructed.

Paragraph fourth of section 2 of said contract provides that the rights granted by said contract shall cease unless petitioner shall commence construction of its railway within three months from the date upon which the consents of property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division confirming the determination of Commissioners appointed pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, provided, however, that the Board may grant an extension, not to exceed six months, of either of such periods.

Prior to the execution of said contract petitioner had obtained from the Public Service Commission for the First District a certificate

of public convenience and necessity under section 9 of the Railroad Law, and immediately on the execution of said contract petitioner applied to the Public Service Commission, pursuant to section 53 of the Public Service Commission Law, for an order permitting it to exercise its said franchise. Said application was opposed by the existing surface railroads of Manhattan and Brooklyn, but was granted by an order made on the 14th day of August, 1912.

Petitioner immediately began the construction of the tracks and equipment necessary to operation on the Manhattan Bridge. Said work was delayed by two temporary injunctions obtained by the existing railroads in Manhattan and Brooklyn, acting in concert, both of which were vacated, and such work was completed and operation commenced on the Manhattan Bridge on the 4th day of September, 1912.

Immediately on the execution of said contract petitioner set about obtaining consents of owners of property abutting on the streets in which it was authorized to operate its railroad, and prior to the 1st day of September, 1912, obtained the necessary consents as to Flatbush Avenue Extension, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and began the construction of its road from Manhattan Bridge to Fulton street. This construction was delayed by the refusal of the roads constituting the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system to consent to the installation of crossings over their tracks in Concord and Willoughby streets and Myrtle avenue, and by an injunction obtained by them to prevent such installation. This action on their part made it necessary for petitioner to commence a proceeding under section 22 of the Railroad Law to obtain the right to install such crossings. Said proceeding was commenced on the 10th day of September, 1912, was tried on the 12th day of September, 1912, and decided on the 9th day of November, 1912, such decision being in favor of the contention of petitioner, and on the 16th day of November, 1912, Commissioners were appointed in said proceedings, who made their report as to the manner of said crossings on the 26th day of November, 1912, and the same was confirmed on the 27th day of November, 1912.

Said railroad was put in operation to Fulton street in December, 1912, and is still in operation.

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company thereupon appealed from the judgment and various orders made in said proceeding, and said appeal was argued at the June, 1913, Term of the Appellate Division, Second Department, but has not yet been decided.

The petitioner proceeded diligently in obtaining consents of abutting owners, and did obtain a majority on Bridge street, Fulton street, 4th avenue, Atlantic avenue and 3d avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in addition to those obtained on Flatbush Avenue Extension, and filed copies of the same with this Board on the 9th day of January, 1913.

On the 30th day of January, 1913, this Board by resolution accepted said consents, and directed the attention of petitioner to the fact that construction of its road on said streets should be commenced on or before April 9, 1913, and completed on or before July 9, 1913.

On February 10, 1913, petitioner commenced a proceeding in the Appellate Division, First Department, under section 174 of the Railroad Law, for the appointment of Commissioners to determine whether its road ought to be constructed and operated in the streets in Manhattan in which it was authorized by its franchise to construct and operate, and on February 8, 1913, commenced a similar proceeding in the Appellate Division, Second Department, in regard to the streets in the Borough of Brooklyn as to which it had not obtained the necessary consents, to wit, through and along Rockwell place, between Fulton street and Flatbush avenue; Flatbush avenue, between Rockwell place and 4th avenue; and also between 3d avenue and Livingston street; Livingston street, between Flatbush avenue and Hoyt street; Hoyt street, between Livingston street and Fulton street, and diagonally across Fulton street, between Hoyt street and Bridge street.

In the Manhattan proceeding Commissioners were appointed on the 14th day of March, 1913, and made their report in favor of the construction of petitioner's road on the 8th day of May, 1913, and the same was confirmed on the 23d day of May, 1913.

In the Brooklyn proceeding Commissioners were appointed on the 7th day of March, 1913, and made their report in favor of the construction of petitioner's road on the 23d day of June, 1913, and a motion for the confirmation of the same was submitted to the Appellate Division on the 26th day of June, 1913, but has not yet been decided.

This Board by resolution adopted on the 10th day of April, 1913, extended the time of petitioner to commence the construction of its railway on Bridge street, 3d, Atlantic and 4th avenues, and Fulton st., between Flatbush Avenue Extension and Rockwell place, Borough of Brooklyn, the same being the streets as to which petitioner had obtained the consents of abutting owners, up to and including October 9, 1913, and the time of petitioner to complete such construction and place the railway in operation in said streets to the 9th day of January, 1914.

In the construction of its road in Brooklyn it will be necessary for petitioner to cross the tracks of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Companies in several places and to use their tracks in several streets. Said companies have stated openly that they will not consent to such operation, and, consequently, it will be necessary for petitioner to acquire such right in the manner provided in section 183 of the Railroad Law.

The streets in Brooklyn other than Flatbush Avenue Extension, as to which petitioner has procured the necessary consents, namely, Fulton street, between Flatbush Avenue Extension and Rockwell place; 4th avenue, between Flatbush avenue and Atlantic avenue; Atlantic avenue, between 4th avenue and 3d avenue; 3d avenue, between Atlantic avenue and Flatbush avenue, and Bridge street, between Fulton street and Flatbush Avenue Extension, are isolated, and it would be futile to attempt to construct and operate a railroad in them, except in connection with the streets as to which consents have not been obtained.

In view of the attitude of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Companies, it is obvious that a long litigation will ensue before petitioner can obtain the necessary trackage and crossing rights to enable it to construct and operate its road from its present terminus at Flatbush Avenue Extension and Fulton street to the Long Island Railroad Station.

Similar conditions exist in regard to Canal street and the other streets in Manhattan in which petitioner is authorized to operate its railroad, and which are occupied by tracks of the Third Avenue Railway Company and the New York Railways Company, or their subsidiaries.

The questions which will be involved in this litigation have never been passed upon by the Courts of this State, and for this reason the litigation will in all probability be carried to the Court of Appeals, making it impossible to foresee how much time will be consumed before a final adjudication can be had.

The determination of the Courts on these questions will be of vast importance not only to petitioner, but also to The City of New York and this Board, by ascertaining and fixing the power of the Board with reference to existing

railroad franchises throughout this municipality, and construing the limitations contained in the Railroad Law with reference to the use of tracks and equipment of existing railways.

Petitioner is ready and anxious to complete the construction of its entire road and put the same in operation at the earliest possible moment.

Wherefore, petitioner prays that paragraph fourth of section 2 of the said agreement between The City of New York and petitioner, dated the 10th day of July, 1912, be amended to read as follows:

The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized on or before the 9th day of October, 1914, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation on or before the 9th day of January, 1915; otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board; and provided further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company; and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceeding or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

First—That by two several contracts dated respectively February 1 and April 14, 1909, The City of New York granted to your petitioner a franchise to build and operate an electric street surface railroad, with its appurtenances, on certain streets and avenues in the 3d Ward of Queens Borough, New York City, N. Y.

Second—That in each of said contracts it is provided among other conditions that your petitioner is to pay the City, for the privilege of the franchise, certain annual payments divided into periods of five years at an increased ratio. In the contract of February 1, 1909, during the first term of five years, the annual sum to be paid is to be at least \$2,200, and is to be equal to 3 per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed that amount. In the contract of April 14, 1909, during the first term of five years, the annual amount to be paid is to be at least \$1,575, and is to be equal to 3 per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed that amount.

Third—That on account of the arrested development of that section of Queens Borough in which its railroad is operated, 3 per cent. of its gross annual receipts has been less than minimum payment required, and so much less than was anticipated by the parties to the contracts that the minimum payments called for by the contracts have been a hardship on petitioner.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this _____ day of _____, 1913, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Brooklyn City Railroad Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway as an extension to its existing railway with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company at or near the intersection of Roebeling street with Division avenue; thence in and upon Roebeling street to Lee avenue, and thence connecting with the tracks of the Company in Lee avenue.

And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Brooklyn City R. R. Co. Map showing proposed extension in the route of the Brooklyn City R. R. Co. on Roebeling street, from Division to Lee Ave. in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, to Accompany the petition to the Board of estimates and apportionment. Dated May 13, 1913."

and approved by Z. E. Watson, Secretary and Treasurer, and C. L. Crabbs, Engineer, Way and Structure; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months, within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 1, 1924.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one hundred and ten dollars (\$110), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred and ten dollars (\$110).

During the remaining term expiring January 1, 1924, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$175).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this consent shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any other corporation or to any individual a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the route hereinbefore described, and the Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall consent to the construction and operation of any street surface railway by any such other corporation or individual which may receive a franchise therefrom from the City, and which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed or operated by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Should the City at any time during the term of this contract grant to any other corporation or to any individual the right or privilege to operate a railway upon the tracks of the Company on the route herein described, or any portion thereof, then the City shall, within thirty (30) days thereafter, give notice to the Company that such right has been granted, and of the name of the corporation or individual to which such right has been granted.

At the expiration of ninety (90) days after the giving of such notice, such individual or corporation shall have the right to begin the operation of cars upon the tracks of the Company upon the route, or any portion thereof, over which such corporation or individual may receive a right or privilege, and to use thereof the tracks, equipment, power and all other property of the Company which shall be necessary in the operation of the cars of such individual or corporation upon the tracks of the Company and shall have the right to continue such operation and to use such property until this contract or the franchise or right granted said corporation or individual by the City, shall expire. Such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for the right to use such tracks, equipment, power and other property above described, such sum or sums as may be agreed upon in writing by such corporation or individual and the Company within said ninety (90) days, or in the event that such agreement cannot be reached within said ninety (90) days, such sum or sums shall be determined in the manner hereinafter provided for.

If the Company and such corporation or individual cannot, prior to the expiration of said ninety (90) days agree upon the compensation for the use of such tracks, then such compensation shall be fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner:

One fit and impartial person shall be chosen by the Company; one fit and impartial person shall be chosen by such corporation or individual, and the two so chosen shall choose a third fit and impartial person. The decision under oath of any two of said persons who shall be so selected shall be final and conclusive.

The compensation and expenses of the persons selected as arbitrators in the determination of such sum or sums shall be borne by the individual or corporation to which such right may be granted.

Within thirty (30) days after an agreement shall have been reached between said parties, or in case said agreement cannot be reached before the time specified herein, then within thirty (30) days after the determination of the arbitrators, as herein provided, should two of such arbitrators agree, the Company shall file with the Board a duplicate copy of a written agreement which shall specify the sum or sums which shall have been agreed to by the said parties or determined by said arbitrators, as the sum or sums which

such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for said privilege. If the Company fails to file the same with the Board within said thirty (30) days, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine.

If either party fails to appoint an arbitrator, as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of a third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the expiration of said ninety (90) days, or if no two of said arbitrators so selected agree upon the sum or sums to be paid by such individual or corporation within sixty (60) days after they shall have been so selected, then such sum or sums shall be fixed by the Supreme Court upon the application of either party.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof, in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted, for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Brooklyn, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—No wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed the Company shall provide two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. Such conduits shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City unless a rate of fare in excess of five (5) cents may be lawfully charged therefor. The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twentieth—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of twenty (20) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-first—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-second—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-third—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues, the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers therein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted, may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or

in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund herein provided for.

Twenty-eighth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-ninth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the roadway, heating and lighting, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board, acting hereunder, relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheelguards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheelguards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its president or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirtieth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-first—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property" to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-second—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 5 and other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Com-

mission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
