

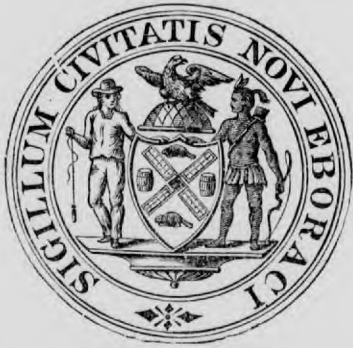

PETITIONS.

By Alderman Hartman—

Petition of the Morris Avenue Railroad Company for permission to lay rail-tracks and operate a surface railroad in Morris avenue and other streets north of Harlem river.

To the Honorable Common Council of the City of New York:

The petition of the Morris Avenue Railroad Company respectfully shows that your petitioner is a corporation duly organized under and pursuant to the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act for the construction, extension, maintenance and operation of street surface railroads and branches thereof in cities, towns and villages," passed May 6, 1884, for the purpose of constructing maintaining and operating a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars for compensation in the City, County and State of New York; and that the said railroad is proposed to be constructed, maintained and operated through, upon and along the surface of the following streets, avenues and highways in the City, County and State of New York, from and to the places hereinafter designated, to wit:

Commencing on East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, at or near Lincoln avenue, thence running through, upon and along East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, with single track to

North Third avenue; thence through, upon and along North Third avenue, with double tracks to One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street; thence through, upon and along One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, with single track to Lincoln avenue; thence through, upon and along Lincoln avenue, and across North Third avenue, with double track to Morris avenue; thence through, upon and along Morris avenue, with double tracks to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street; thence through, upon and along One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, with single track to Courtland avenue; thence through, upon and along Courtland avenue, with double tracks to One Hundred and Sixty-first street; thence through, upon and along One Hundred and Sixty-first street, with double tracks to and across Railroad avenue and the New York and Harlem Railroad to the westerly side thereof; thence through, upon and along Railroad avenue, West, with double tracks to Teller avenue; thence through, upon and along Teller avenue, with double tracks to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street; thence through, upon and along One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, with double tracks to Webster avenue; thence through, upon and along Webster avenue, with double tracks to the Kings-bridge road.

Also from tracks on Morris avenue at One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, through, upon and along One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, with single track to Courtland avenue; thence through, upon and along Courtland avenue, with single track to connect with the tracks at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.

Also, from Lincoln avenue at One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street through, upon and along Lincoln avenue with single track to One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street; thence through, upon and along One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street with single track to connect with track on North Third avenue.

And also from the tracks on North Third avenue, at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, through, upon and along One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, with single track to Lincoln avenue; thence through, upon and along Lincoln avenue with single track to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence through, upon and along One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to the place of beginning, together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turn-tables and suitable stands for the convenient working of the road.

The railroad proposed to be constructed, maintained and operated is intended to be operated by horse power or by some power other than locomotive steam power.

And your petitioner further shows that pursuant to provisions of the said act it is necessary that the consent of the Common Council of the City of New York be obtained by your petitioner to construct, maintain and operate and use the railroad for the construction, maintenance and operation of which your petitioner was incorporated as aforesaid.

Your petitioner therefore prays and hereby make application to the Common Council of the City of New York for its consent and permission to construct, maintain, operate and use a street surface railroad for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in cars through, upon and along the surface of the streets, avenues, and highways as above set forth and described, together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turn-tables and suitable stands for the convenient operation of said road.

## MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

LAW DEPARTMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,  
NEW YORK, July 13, 1885.

Hon. ADOLPH L. SANGER, President of the Board of Aldermen:

SIR—I desire to call the attention of the Board of Aldermen to the subject of an action now pending at issue in the United States Circuit Court (whither it was removed from the Supreme Court of this State), in which the city is plaintiff and the Fort Lee Park and Steamboat Company, a New Jersey corporation, are the defendants.

The action was begun by my predecessor, Mr. Whitney, in the summer of 1881, at the instance of the then Comptroller, and the object of the action was to restrain the defendants from operating a ferry from the foot of Canal street, from the foot of West Twenty-second street and from the foot of West Thirty-fourth street, to certain landing places on the shore of the Hudson river, opposite to the Island of New York, to wit: to a place called "Shady Side," opposite West Eightieth street; to a place called "Edgewater," opposite West One Hundredth street; to a place called "Pleasant Valley," opposite West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, and to a place called "Fort Lee," opposite West One Hundred and Sixtieth street, and back from the last-mentioned landing places to the points mentioned on the New York shore.

At the same time another action was brought against the parties who operated a ferry between One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Fort Lee, between which points a regular ferry had been established by the Common Council and was then operated by one Coffin, as lessee of the city. In this action a preliminary injunction was obtained by the city, and, after subsequent trial of the action upon the merits at Special Term, a perpetual injunction was obtained.

In the first-mentioned action a preliminary injunction was not sought, nor has the action yet been tried upon the merits, for the reason that, as no regular ferry between the points mentioned had been established by the Common Council and put into operation by a lessee of the city, great public inconvenience would be consequent upon an attempt by the city to tie up existing means of communication. To obviate this difficulty and also to enable the city in the present action to press its claim with more moral force, I desire to suggest that the Common Council, at its earliest convenience, should proceed to establish a ferry between the points mentioned, so that the same may be advertised and leased by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and an actual ferry placed in operation for the convenience of the public under the auspices of the city.

That being done it would be my desire to press the pending action in the United States Circuit Court to a speedy determination. I have been recently informed that the ferry suggested is now in actual operation by certain parties without the license of the city authorities, and my information is derived from Mr. Edward H. Coffin, the present lessee of the Fort Lee and One Hundred and Thirtieth Street Ferry, who doubtless will, if desired, place himself in communication with your Board.

I shall be glad to approve as to form any ordinance establishing the ferry which the Committee on Ferries and Franchises of your Board may prepare.

Mr. Osborne Macdaniel, of the Comptroller's Office, is also familiar with the subject matter of this letter.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 4, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,041.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 721.

During the past week 438 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 74 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 10 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 14 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, 237 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 59 visits were made, and 44 disinfections and 16 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 9.

The number of vaccinations performed was 300, of which 58 were primary and 242 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,050 pounds of meat, and 1,470 pounds of fish.

The number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 2.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 13,321 privies; 9,185 yards; 7,558 cellars; 10,189 garbage boxes, and 75 miles of street gutters.

The certificates of 451 births, 60 still-births, 259 marriages, and 809 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 4, 1885. This shows a decrease of 116 births and 4 still-births and an increase of 131 deaths and 72 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 120 deaths and 20 births, and an increase of 7 still-births and 79 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 6; diphtheria, 7; croup, 2; whooping-cough, 8; malarial fevers, 4; puerperal diseases, 2; heart diseases, 6; hydrocephalus, 4; convulsions, 7; direct effect of solar heat, 1; apoplexy, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; premature and preterm births, 2; drowning, 2; while the deaths from erysipelas increased 4; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 117; aneurism, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; meningitis, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis, gastro-enteritis and pericarditis, 8; Bright's disease, 1; cyanosis, 1; suicide, 3.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 126 were in institutions, 502 in tenement-houses, 169 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 18 were on the basement floor, 156 on the first, 183 on the second, 175 on the third, 108 on the fourth, 35 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 809 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 58 were stated to be single, 144 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 553 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 809; still-births, 60; bodies in transitu, 24; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 93 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 451 births, 259 marriages, 60 still-births, 809 deaths; 24 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 88 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 64 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 4, 1885, was 69.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.734, the mean humidity was 68, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 996, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.8 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 758 deaths and still-births, or 87.23 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 34; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 302; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 95; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran (undenominational), 147; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 14; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 11.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending June 27, 1885, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 3; Third, 8; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 19; Seventh, 26; Eighth, 24; Ninth, 17; Tenth, 23; Eleventh, 33; Twelfth, 85; Thirteenth, 15; Fourteenth, 23; Fifteenth, 17; Sixteenth, 23; Seventeenth, 34; Eighteenth, 26; Nineteenth, 106; Twentieth, 50; Twenty-first, 27; Twenty-second, 58; Twenty-third, 18; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The actual mortality for the week ending June 27, 1885, was 699; this is 64 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 139.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.02 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,397,061.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 21.29; Brooklyn, 25.79; Baltimore, 20.49; New Orleans, 31.33; Richmond, 24.96; Charleston, 39.78; Galveston, 23.40; Lowell, 16.01; Worcester, 13.50; Cambridge, 16.19; Fall River, 15.41; Lawrence, 11.42; Pittsburgh, 18.72. Monthly returns—Boston, 21.71; Washington, 23.28. AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 14th day of July, 1885, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, sections 56 and 184 of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. The slaughtering shall not be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Thirty-ninth street, nor north of said street without a special written permit from this Department; nor unless the same shall be done in buildings located upon the water-front.

Section 184. The business of slaughtering animals in the City of New York shall not be conducted south of One Hundred and Tenth street, unless the same shall be in buildings located upon a water-front, and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable thereat from boats, cars or transports; and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animals upon the premises, and no cattle, sheep, hogs or calves shall be driven in the streets of such city below One Hundred and Tenth street, except through Sixtieth street, and Eleventh avenue, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 350 of the Laws of 1883, and subject to the provisions of chapter 394 of the Laws of 1885; nor shall any fat, hides, hoofs, or entrails, or other refuse, parts of slaughtered animals, be transported in said streets; nor shall any buildings be erected or converted into or used as a slaughter-house or factory or place for fat-rendering, or for any offensive business growing out of slaughtering, such as fat-melting, hide-curing, gut-cleaning, bone-boiling, glue-making, etc., until the plans thereof have been duly submitted to the Board of Health and approved in writing by the said Board.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
