## WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending December 31, 1902.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 289,202, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspection.....	204,374
By the Division of Contagious Diseases.....	75,907
By the Division of Bacteriology.....	8,921

Total..... 289,202

The number of complaints returned was 7,947, classified as follows:

By the Division of Inspections.....	7,549
By the Division of Bacteriology.....	398

Total..... 7,947

The number of complaints received from citizens was 5,520, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,003 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 2,756 miscellaneous permits, under the Sanitary Code.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, 2D APRIL, 1903.

There were present—Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; Comptroller Edward M. Grout, and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon, Morris K. Jesup and John Claflin.

Edward M. Shepard and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel; Wm. Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present. The minutes of the last meeting, that of the 26th March, 1903, were read and it was moved that they be approved.

Ayes—The President, Comptroller, and Commissioners Langdon, Jesup and Claflin.

Letter of the Chief Engineer, reporting on complaint of the New York Steam Fitting Company, Nos. 137-141 Elm street, referred to him at last meeting, was read, in which he stated that orders had been issued for the opening of a roadway along the east side of Elm street from Howard to Grand, thus giving access to the building in question.

The President reported that he had had an interview with Mr. Buchanan, the President of the International Ironworkers' Association, with a view to getting him to release the rapid transit work from the sympathetic strike, but without success.

McDonald, the expense, up to the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars, for the removal and reconstruction of the vaults on the south side of Forty-second street, between Broadway and Sixth avenue, opposite the premises of A. McDonald, that such expense be deemed part of the cost of the Rapid Transit Railway, rental thereon to be paid by the contractor in all respects as if such expense had been originally authorized by the said contract for construction and operation.

Resolved, That the President be and he is hereby authorized to execute contract for telephone in the office of the Division Engineer of the Brooklyn Extension at Battery Park, and also one in the sub-office at One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Lenox avenue.

Ayes—The President, Comptroller, and Commissioners Langdon, Jesup and Claflin.

Nays—None. Carried.

Counsel reported that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company had executed its consent to the change of route at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Westchester avenue. The Comptroller was requested to write Douglas Robinson with respect to the possibility of acquiring the right-of-way there under resolution of the 26th instant.



The President announced a hearing on the proposal of Schmidt & Gallatin as to moving platform from Williamsburg Bridge south to Wall street, etc. Wm. N. Dykman, in their behalf, presented the following communications:

Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, New York, N. Y.:

GENTLEMEN—On January 22 we submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges, on behalf of the syndicate which we represent, a proposition for the installation and operation, by a corporation to be formed for that purpose, of a continuous railway train, or moving platforms, from the east end of the Williamsburg Bridge to the neighborhood of Hanover square.

This proposition has been referred to you, and is to be discussed at a public hearing to-day.

Under the terms of our previous proposition the City was to construct the subway and confer upon this company the privilege, at a nominal rental, of operating in said subway the continuous train.

In consideration of such nominal rental, it was proposed to charge for the transportation over the entire route only one cent during the rush hours and two cents at other hours.

We now desire to offer as an alternative proposition to that of January 22 as follows:

That the construction of the subway shall be undertaken by and at the expense of the company to be formed, and that the fares over the route shall be uniformly two cents at all hours.

We also agree, as part of such alternative proposition, provided the various surface, elevated and subway lines will co-operate with traffic arrangements that will permit of such course, to issue and accept transfer tickets to and from all such lines for a single fare of five cents.

We will also, either at once, or at such period as may be agreed upon, make a similar installation of a continuous railway train on the present Brooklyn Bridge and will agree to carry passengers for two cents across that bridge and thence to any point within the territory covered by the continuous train service, with the privilege, as in the first case, of a transfer to and from the co-operating lines at the uniform rate of five cents.

Our engineers have made a careful study of the Brooklyn end of that bridge and have prepared a plan which permits of a commodious terminal, extending to Tillary street, with ample room for the safe and comfortable forwarding of all passengers that may be delivered and received at that point.

In passing upon the alternative proposition, the continuous train should not be considered strictly as a through line, except so far as the residents of Williamsburg are concerned. For the great masses outside of that district the continuous train will provide, in the heart of the business section of Manhattan, what may be termed very properly a railway station two miles long, in which the continuous train service will act as the receiver and distributor of passengers coming from, or departing by, the other lines of transportation. As the platforms are in constant operation and require no waiting by passengers, it is erroneous to suppose that the use of the platforms will entail any of the discomforts and inconveniences which are ordinarily associated with a change of vehicles.

It is the opinion of the foremost engineers and railroad men that the continuous trains, or moving platforms, are destined to play an important part in the solution of the City Transit problem. Considering the one point alone that they can accommodate with seats, within the same track space, fourteen times the number of passengers that a trolley line can accommodate, their general adoption becomes only a matter of time. If we are authorized to proceed, it is evident that the City will not only save the construction of the proposed subway connecting the three bridges, but quite probably also the Maiden Lane tunnel.

As evidence of the good faith of the syndicate whom we represent in making the foregoing proposition, we stand ready to deposit a certified check or cash to such an amount as may be agreed upon; such check or cash to be returned to us, in case our proposition is not accepted, or if it is accepted, upon the filing of such bond as may be required of the company to be formed to insure the fulfillment of its contract with the City.

GENTLEMEN—With reference to our original proposition, dated January 22, 1903, which was considered at your meeting yesterday, and in reply to your inquiry, we desire to state that, should the City conclude to construct the subway, as provided in said proposition, and charge us as a rental a sum equal to four and one-fourth per cent. (4¼ per cent.) on the investment, the company to be formed will undertake to pay to the City such rental, the fares in such event to be uniformly two cents at all hours.

### BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

April 28, 1903.

Present—Messrs. William J. Fryer, Warren A. Conover, Cornelius O'Reilly, William C. Smith, Charles G. Smith, Charles D. Purroy and Walter Cook (Chairman).

Meeting called to order at 3 p. m.

Minutes, on motion, approved as read.

Appeal No. 94 of 1903, New Building No. 224 of 1903, northwest corner of Seventy-ninth street and Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan; Central Realty Company, per Harry B. Mulliken, appellant.

It is desired to place a pent house on the roof of the building in question covering about one-third of the area of the roof without having this pent house considered as a complete extra story.

The construction of the pent house will be as follows:

All the brick walls surrounding the pent house will be carried up to their proper heights.

The north and west enclosures will be of hollow terra cotta tile laid up in cement and covered with sheet metal.

The floor will be made of cement.

All sash, doors, frames and trim will be kalamein.

Proper skylights will be provided.

The highest point of the pent house will not exceed 150 feet from the curb level. No combustible material will be employed in the construction of the pent house.



The standpipe will extend into pent house with hose connection.

The entire pent house will be constructed absolutely fireproof.

Inasmuch as the highest point of this building will be kept within the 150 feet limit, I respectfully ask that this case be considered by your honorable Board and the modifications as above set forth be granted.

On motion, laid over, pending appearance of appellant.

Appeal No. 95 of 1903, New Building No. 143 of 1903, two buildings, 62 feet 5 inches and 145 feet 11½ inches north of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and 72 feet 6 inches from the east side of Locust avenue, The Bronx; Central Union Gas Company, by E. L. Spencer, Engineer, appellant.

The application of the law to the buildings proposed by the appellant, which are for experimental purposes and temporary use.

Mr. H. W. Alrich appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Appeal No. 96 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 13 of 1903, Nos. 310 and 312 East Eleventh street, Manhattan; Manders Bros., appellants.

On motion, referred to Acting Chief Purroy for examination and report with recommendation.

Appeal No. 97 of 1903, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 14 of 1903, No. 231 State street, Brooklyn; Ronalds & Johnson Company, appellants.

On motion, referred to Acting Chief Purroy for examination and report with recommendation.

Appeal No. 98 of 1903, New Building No. 271 of 1903, Nos. 34 and 36 West Houston street, Manhattan; W. G. Pigueron, architect and appellant.

The questions which the appellant desires to have passed upon are as follows, being objection No. 2 of the disapproval of April 17, 1903, to application 271 N. B., 1903, as follows: "Two pair of stairs are required." I respectfully request that this objection be removed for the following reasons:

1st. The area of the building does not greatly exceed the area of the buildings requiring one stairway.

2d. The building is entirely and perfectly fireproof, and one stairway in a fireproof building gives better egress in case of fire, than two stairways would in a non-fireproof building of the same size.

3d. The two elevators will be entirely of solid metal, there being no wood whatsoever in the construction of the elevators or any part of the shafts.

4th. The stairway and elevators are of ample size, and in addition to these means of egress, there is a very large fire escape in the rear of the building.

I respectfully ask that the approval be granted, that one stairway is sufficient.

Mr. W. G. Pigueron appeared before the Board.

On motion, laid over.

Appeal No. 99 of 1903, New Building No. 184 of 1903, No. 56 Barclay street, Manhattan; John B. Mooney, architect and appellant.

The structure as contemplated and as shown on drawings filed with the Bureau of Buildings, will consist of five (5) stories in height above curb, and a frontage of 96 feet on West Broadway.

Being triangular in shape and exceeding in some parts four times the mean width of base, the question is raised as to its stability under wind pressure as defined by the present Code.

The appellant avers that since the structure as designed does not exceed in height the immediately adjoining premises (No. 54 Barclay street), of which said contemplated structure becomes in some respects a part, owing to the fact that the said buildings have one wall in common (a party wall), and owing to said fact it becomes incumbent upon the owner of adjoining premises to take care of said wall if changes are made or adjoining building is removed at any time, and further, that since all buildings in the immediate vicinity are of at least equal height to said contemplated structure, and since outside of the above-mentioned objection said contemplated structure will in all cases comply with the Building Code governing the erection of fireproof warehouses, the appellant prays that said section or part thereof relating to wind pressure as technically defined in this case be waived.

The appellant further believes it can be shown that regarding the question of direct wind pressure on said structure same is practically nil in this case, as the possibility of direct air currents reaching same with a maintained pressure to the square foot is not possible, owing to the aforesaid surrounding conditions.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 100 of 1903, Alteration No. 392 of 1902, south side East Bay avenue, between Cabot and Dupont streets, The Bronx; Rock Plaster Company of New York and New Jersey, appellant.

The appellant desires to cover the entire length of the smoke flues inside the building (indicated in the accompanying drawing No. 9007A) with magnabestos, or equally good non-conducting covering blocks, applied on wire cloth, leaving an air space between the flues and the covering, and over this apply a layer of ½-inch asbestos cement, troweled to a hard, smooth finish, instead of lining the flues with fire bricks for a distance of only twenty-five feet, as called for by the Code.

The advantages to be gained by this method of insulation are, first, a great reduction in weight as compared with the 4-inch fire brick lining, and, second, a considerable saving in space, both very desirable features under the present circumstances. Another reason for our wishing to use this form of insulation is that we intend using the gases in an adjoining iron building for drying sand, so that it is to our advantage to prevent as much radiation from the flues as possible.

The appellant considers this method of insulation to be equally as good as that required by the Code, but should the Board not coincide with this view, he begs to state that the building is on the water front, outside the fire limits, with no other buildings in the neighborhood, and he respectfully requests that in view of the advantages and circumstances above set forth, his appeal be favorably acted upon.

Mr. F. A. Goetze appeared before the Board and filed plans.

On motion, approved.

Mr. Harry B. Mulliken appeared before the Board and requested a hearing on Appeal No. 94, which was granted.

On motion, approved on condition that there shall be no windows or other openings in the south and east walls of the pent house.

The Chairman presented and read a communication from Acting Chief Charles D. Purroy, inclosing report of test made on April 21 of the Columbia Fireproofing Company's materials, which was, on motion, ordered on file.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
