Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever re-quired by and under the supervision of the Comnissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or a certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York relative to acquiring title to an easement, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for sewer purposes, in a pascel of land extending from the westerly the amount of the security to be deposited. This the amount of the security to be deposited. security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion and is in all respects tair and without colusions or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contractions in the appointment of the contract of the tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
