Dear Sirs—In accordance with the direction contained in the following resolution adopted at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 31, 1913, I have the honor to transmit herewith the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1914:

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to forthwith transmit to the Board of Aldermen the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1914, for consideration and action thereon, in accordance with the provisions of section 226 of the Charter."

## BUDGET FOR 1914.

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, the total amount appropriated being:

One hundred and ninety-two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62) divided as follows:

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, to meet the debt charges of said City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and to meet direct state tax levied upon the City for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

One hundred and eighty-three million three hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and seventy dollars and ninety cents (\$183,345,370.90).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1913, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter:

Two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the assessments levied against the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06).

Fourth—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66).

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

(a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Regular Employees."

(b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Temporary Employees."

(c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Regular Employees."

(d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Temporary Employees."

(e) That no transfers shall be made from or to appropriations classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except to or from an appropriation classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles."

(f) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions" to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and Commissions."

(g) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden, or in cases where appropriations were made under the classification of "General Repairs," if, upon the written statement of the Department Head, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment finds that the repair work can be done more economically by departmental labor.

(h) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the title of the appropriation prohibits such transfer or when the appropriation is made conditional upon the purchase of some stated article or articles or for the payment of insurance or taxes, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the budget resolutions in the budget for 1914.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries Regular Employees."

(b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy Part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1914 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commission," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedule supporting any such appropriations or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.

(c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.

(d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled, "Salaries Regular Employees" and "Wages Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items or such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amounts consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation, which monthly amount, in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods order, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification, "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees" and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees" and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen and fourteen.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all departments of City and County Government, for which appropriations for food supplies have been made in the Budget for 1914, shall make an inventory on January 1, 1914, to determine the number of units of each article of food in stock either in stores or in the institution, and the cost value thereof, and shall thereafter keep an accurate record showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of all articles of food purchased in each month; that such departments shall keep an accurate record of the quantities of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates, such record to be entirely separate and distinct from the consumption of food supplies by employees or persons other than patients and inmates; and such departments shall keep an accurate record of the number of units of food supplies and the cost thereof consumed by the employees, such record to be entirely distinct from the record of food consumption by patients and inmates and such departments are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each month a statement on budget accounting forms to be submitted by the Comptroller showing the stock on hand at the beginning of the preceding month, the number of units and price per unit and cost amount of the supplies delivered to the department within the preceding month, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates within the preceding month, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by employees within the preceding month, the aggregate number of patients or inmate days within the preceding month, the aggregate number of employee days within the preceding month, the daily per capita consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost amount thereof by patients or inmates in the preceding month, the daily per capita consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost thereof by employees in the preceding month, and the total number of units consumed and the cost thereof within the preceding month, the stock on hand at the end of the month and such other information as may be required upon the budget accounting forms, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to administrative departments to which food supply appropriations have been made to be used in payment for meals of employees properly entitled to such meals by reason of overtime work.

Resolved, That all departments receiving appropriations for wearing apparel in the 1914 Budget shall make an inventory on January 1, 1914, to determine the number of units of each article of wearing apparel in stock or available for use in the institutions and shall keep a record thereafter of all wearing apparel purchased and delivered to the department; and shall keep a record showing the name of each patient, inmate and employee receiving wearing apparel, the character and cost of the wearing apparel issued to each employee, patient or inmate and a record showing in each case whether the wearing apparel issued was taken away from the institution or was returned to be reissued to other patients, inmates or employees; that such information shall be submitted by the Comptroller at the end of each quarter upon budget accounting forms furnished by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the several boards, departments, offices and bureaus of the City and County Government are hereby directed to keep records showing the number of units and the cost amount of stock on hand at the beginning of each quarter, the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total and cost of the number of units, the price per unit and the cost amount of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials purchased in 1914 and charged against appropriations made in this budget and such boards, departments, offices and bureaus are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the end of each quarter a statement of stock on hand, purchases, deliveries and consumption, with the number of units, cost price per unit and the cost amount of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials purchased, delivered and consumed within the quarter, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to appropriations for food supplies and wearing apparel.

—Be it further

Resolved, That nothing in the foregoing resolutions shall be construed as nullifying the resolutions preceding the so-called "cost data appropriation" for the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Department of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to send certified copies of the preceding resolution to each department, board, office and bureau of the City and County Government.

Resolved, That the following terms and conditions shall govern the administration of the cost data budget and supporting schedules for the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Street Cleaning, for the year 1914.

(1) The nature of all expenditures shall fall within the scope of the work classifications specified in the supporting schedules.

(2) The total cost allowances shown therein for any quarter shall not be exceeded within that quarter.

(3) The total allowance for capital investment shall not be exceeded during the year.

At the end of each quarter of the year there shall be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to the Department of Finance, a detailed statement of all the operations of the above mentioned bureaus and the cost thereof, together with a reconciliation schedule showing the relation between total costs of work and total expenditures, in such form as may be prescribed by the Board. Such reports, when made, shall show separately for each item cost the several elements that make up the item cost, including labor, vehicular transportation (hired and departmental), foreman, supervision, inspection, administrative supervision, materials, supplies, equipment and plant charges. At the same time requests for modifications of the remaining schedules may be presented for consideration and action of the Board, but no change shall be made in the work programme until first approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The quarterly reports of the Bureau of Highways shall show in detail the character and the quantities of the work done and shall include the names of the streets and the quantities of work performed on each street.

The quarterly reports of the Bureau of Sewers shall give the location of basins and sewers cleaned and the character and quantities of work performed for each location.

The quarterly reports for the Bureau of Street Cleaning shall contain the character and quantities of work done and shall include the names of the streets and the quantities of work done on each street.

At the beginning of each quarter the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning shall furnish to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Department of Finance schedules of work planned for the succeeding quarter.

The Board shall be notified in advance of the commencement and cessation for all regular work covered by the supporting schedules.

The quantity of any item of work performed in a given quarter shall not exceed or underrun by more than 10 per cent. the quantity specified for that item in the supporting schedules, without advance notification to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

That the positions and grades of positions and rates of compensation therefor appearing in the following schedules be established respectively in the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers and Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, for the number of incumbents specified therein.

## CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

## Fixed Charges and Contributions—

Care of Dependents in Private Institutions—  
Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

## Preamble—

All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

## A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:

- a. Food stufts.
- b. Clothing.
- c. Linen and bedding.
- d. Fuel.
- e. Magazines and newspapers.
- f. Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
- g. Other supplies.
- h. Salaries and wages.
- i. Professional services.
- j. Light.
- k. Forage and care of animals.
- l. Telephone.
- m. Printing, stationery and advertising.
- n. Postage and telegrams.
- o. Hospital and Sanitarium charges.
- p. Funerals.
- q. Recreation expense.
- r. Miscellaneous expenses.
- s. Expense for boarded-out children.

## B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:

- a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
- b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
- c. Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable, such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by

the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities, by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities of any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which pays any salary to, gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by, has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction except that for abnormal or atypical children a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in The City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution shall give to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care City or county funds are to be received within twenty-four hours after his arrival at or discharge from the institution.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting held in Room  
16, City Hall, at 3 o'clock P. M., on Wednesday, October 29, 1913.

Present—Ardolph L. Kline, Mayor; Douglas Mathewson, Deputy and Acting  
Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain; O. Grant Esterbrook, Acting President  
Board of Aldermen, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of  
Aldermen.

The Minutes of the meeting held October 8, 1913, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks,  
recommending a lease of a portion of the pier at the foot of West 41st street, Bor-  
ough of Manhattan, to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey:

October 2, 1913.

*Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking  
Fund:*

Sir—I beg to recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a  
resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of  
Docks of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of the following  
described property on the North River, Borough of Manhattan, The City of New  
York:

The south side of the pier at the foot of West 41st street, beginning at a line  
in said pier about 195 feet from the outer end (being the easterly line of the property  
leased to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey by an indenture dated June  
8, 1909) and extending inshore a distance of 158 feet, more or less, to the easterly  
end of said pier.

The lease is to commence on the first day of the month next succeeding the date  
on which the said lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and  
to be coterminous with the existing lease to E. E. Olcott for the outer 700 feet of  
the pier foot of West 41st street, North River, and the existing lease of the Central  
Railroad Company of New Jersey of 95 feet of said pier.

The rental is to be at the rate of \$1,195.80 per annum.

The lessee shall have the privilege of renewal of said lease upon three months'  
notice in writing to the Commissioner of Docks for a further term of ten years at an  
advance of 10% on the rental for the first term. The lease to contain a provision  
that it may be cancelled on three months' notice in writing if the Commissioner of  
Docks determines that the premises are required by the City for the prosecution of  
work according to any plan or plans for the improvement of the water-front now  
adopted or approved, or which may hereafter be adopted or approved, and pursuant  
to any existing or future law, or that the premises are required for the making or  
building of 12th avenue, or that the premises are required for terminal facilities and  
equipment thereof under the provisions of chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911, or any  
amendment thereof.

No structures of any kind shall be erected upon the premises without the consent  
in writing of the Commissioner of Docks. Any and all structures erected upon said  
premises under permit from the Commissioner of Docks shall be removed therefrom  
by the lessee within twenty-four hours after service of notice so to do, and in case  
of failure to remove within the time designated in such notice the Commissioner of  
Docks is authorized to remove said structures, but the lessee shall pay the cost of  
such removal and the storage thereof upon demand by the Commissioner of Docks;  
provided, however, that this covenant will not apply to any structures erected under  
and by any specific consent granted by this indenture.

In case the north side of the premises hereby leased are at any time made avail-  
able for use for wharfage purposes, the lessee shall pay additional rental therefor, to be  
agreed upon between the lessee and the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of  
the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and in case they are unable to agree the  
additional rental to be paid by the lessee shall be fixed as follows:

The Commissioner shall appoint a person to act in his behalf as Arbitrator and  
the company shall also appoint a person as Arbitrator, and the Arbitrators so appointed  
shall determine upon fair and reasonable amount to be paid as rental. In case the  
Arbitrators are unable within thirty days from the date of their appointment to agree  
as to the amount so to be paid as rental, they shall appoint a third person to act as  
Umpire, and if they are unable to agree within five days upon such Umpire, then, at  
the request of either of the parties to said lease, he shall be appointed by the Presiding  
Justice of the Appellate Division, First Department, and the decision of two of the  
said persons so appointed shall be conclusive and binding upon both parties to the  
lease.

When the rental is thus determined a lease shall be granted to said company for  
the right to collect wharfage on the north side of the premises hereby demised for a  
period coterminous with this lease. This lease shall contain the covenants and conditions  
contained in leases of wharf property then in use by the Department of Docks  
and Ferries. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease hereby recommended  
shall be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this  
Department. Very truly yours, R. A. C. SMITH, Commissioner of Docks.

*Memorandum in relation to proposed lease to the Central R. R. Company of N. J.,  
of 158 feet of inshore end of pier foot of West 41st street.*

The north side of the pier foot of West 41st street is not available for use owing  
to the structures maintained in the slip by the Consolidated Gas Company. The outer 700  
feet of the remainder of the pier is leased to E. E. Olcott for a term of ten years  
from November 28, 1904, at a rental of \$8,000 per annum, with privilege of renewal  
for a further term of ten years, expiring 1924, at a rental of \$8,800 per annum.

The 95 feet adjoining on the inshore end is leased to the Central Railroad Company  
of New Jersey at \$1,200 per annum, for a period coterminous with the Olcott lease,  
with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years, expiring 1924, at \$1,320 per  
annum.

The lease hereby recommended is at the rate of \$12.63 per linear foot, which is  
the same rate paid by the company for the 95 feet next westerly, and is about \$2  
per linear foot in excess of the rental paid by Mr. Olcott for the 700 feet at the out-  
shore end. Respectfully yours, R. A. C. SMITH, Commissioner.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the fol-  
lowing report and offered the following resolution:

October 27, 1913.

*To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—On October 2, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks requested the  
Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution approving of and consenting  
to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Central Railroad  
of New Jersey of 158 feet of the southerly inshore end of the pier at the foot of West  
41st street, North River, the lease to commence on the first day of the month next  
succeeding the date on which the said lease is approved by the Commissioners of the  
Sinking Fund and be coterminous with the existing lease to E. E. Olcott, for the outer  
700 feet of the southerly side of the pier at the foot of West 41st street, North  
River, and the existing lease of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of 95  
feet of the southerly side of said pier.

The rental proposed, of \$1,195.80 per annum, I consider reasonable.

Recommendation is also made for a further term of ten years at an advance of  
10% on the rental for the first term. The lease is to contain a provision that it may  
be cancelled on a three months' notice in writing if the Commissioner of Docks deter-  
mines that the premises are required by the City for the improvement of the water-  
front now adopted, or hereafter to be adopted, or that the premises are required for  
terminal facilities and equipment under the provisions of chapter 776 of the Laws  
of 1911, or any amendment thereof.

The north side of the pier is not available for use, owing to the structures main-  
tained in the slip by the Consolidated Gas Company. The lease is to provide that in  
case the north side of the premises is at any time made available for use for wharf  
purposes, the lessee shall pay an additional rental therefor, to be agreed upon between  
the lessee and the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of the Commissioners  
of the Sinking Fund; and in case they are unable to agree, the additional rental to  
be paid by the lessee shall be fixed by arbitration.

I concur in the terms and conditions proposed by the Commissioner of Docks,  
and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request. Re-  
spectfully, DOUGLAS MATHEWSON, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and  
consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Central

Railroad Company of New Jersey of the following described property on the North River, Borough of Manhattan:

The south side of the pier at the foot of West 41st street, beginning at a line in said pier about 795 feet from the outer end (being the easterly line of the property leased to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey by an indenture dated June 8, 1909), and extending inshore a distance of 158 feet more or less to the easterly end of said pier.

The lease to commence on November 1, 1913, and shall expire on November 28, 1914.

The rental to be at the rate of one thousand nine hundred and ninety-five dollars and eighty cents (\$1,995.80) per annum.

The lessee to have the privilege of renewal of said lease upon three months' notice, in writing, to the Commissioner of Docks for a further term of ten (10) years at an advance of ten per cent. (10%) on the rental for the first term, provided the lessees of the remainder of the pier avail themselves of the renewal clauses contained in their leases. The lease to contain a provision that it may be cancelled on three months' notice in writing if the Commissioner of Docks determines that the premises are required by the City for the prosecution of work according to any plan or plans for the improvement of the water-front now adopted or approved, or which may hereafter be adopted or approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, or that the premises are required for the making or building of 12th avenue, or that the premises are required for terminal facilities and equipment thereof under the provisions of chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911, or any amendment thereof. The lease to contain a clause that the lessees of the outer end of the pier shall have free access to the portion of the pier occupied by them during the term of this lease or any renewal thereof.

No structures of any kind shall be erected upon the premises without the consent in writing of the Commissioner of Docks. Any and all structures erected upon said premises under permit from the Commissioner of Docks shall be removed therefrom by the lessee within twenty-four (24) hours after service of notice so to do; and in case of failure to remove within the time designated in such notice, the Commissioner of Docks is authorized to remove said structures, but the lessees shall pay the cost of such removal and the storage thereof upon demand by the Commissioner of Docks; provided, however, that this condition will not apply to any structures erected under and by any specific consent granted by the lease.

In case the north side of the premises hereby leased is at any time made available for wharfage purposes, the lessee shall pay additional rental therefor to be agreed upon between the lessee and the Commissioner of Docks, with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and in case they are unable to agree, the additional rental to be paid by the lessee shall be fixed as follows:

The Commissioner shall appoint a person to act in his behalf as Arbitrator and the Company shall also appoint a person as Arbitrator, and the Arbitrators so appointed shall determine upon a fair and reasonable amount to be paid as rental. In case the Arbitrators are unable within thirty days from the date of their appointment to agree as to the amount so to be paid as rental, they shall appoint a third person to act as Umpire, and if they are unable to agree within five (5) days upon such Umpire, then, at the request of either of the parties to said lease, he shall be appointed by the Presiding Justice of the Appellate Division, First Department, and the decision of two of the said persons so appointed shall be conclusive and binding upon both parties to the lease.

When the rental is thus determined a lease shall be granted to said Company for the right to collect wharfage on the north side of the premises hereby demised for a period coterminous with this lease. The lease shall contain the covenants and conditions contained in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease hereby recommended shall be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, recommending an amendment to resolution, authorizing a lease of an extension to Pier (new) 39, North River, to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey:

October 9, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held June 25, 1913, a resolution was adopted approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, of an extension to Pier (new) 39, North River, at an annual rental of 27½ cents per square foot for the area of land under water covered by said extension, and, in addition, 5½ per cent. of the cost of construction of said extension, said area and cost to be as shown by the surveys and books of this department.

Owing to the large number of extensions to be built by this department on the North River out to the new pierhead lines, applications for which were filed prior to the receipt of the application of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, and therefore take precedence, it will not be possible for the department to undertake the work of extension for some months. The company desires to have the work begun at once as they are now in urgent need of the extension and request that the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be amended so as to permit the company to build the extension at its own expense.

I can see no objection to this and therefore beg to recommend that the aforesaid resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of June 25, 1913, be amended so as to provide that the company shall build, or cause to be built, at its own expense upon the land under water described in the resolution of June 25, 1913, an extension to said Pier (new) 39, North River, and that the charge of 5½ per cent. of the cost of construction of said extension be eliminated. In connection therewith, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 24, 1913.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On October 9, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to amend the resolution adopted June 25, 1913, approving and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey of an extension to Pier (new) No. 39, North River, by eliminating the charge of five and one-half per cent. (5½ per cent.) of the cost of the construction of said extension.

The Commissioner states that owing to the large number of extensions to be built by the Department of Docks and Ferries on the North River, applications for which were filed prior to the receipt of the application of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, it will not be possible for the department to undertake the work of said extension for some months. The company is desirous that the work shall begin at once and requests that the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be amended so as to permit the company to build the extension at its own expense.

I concur in the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks and have no objections to offer, and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held June 25, 1913, approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, of an extension to Pier (new) 39, at or near the foot of Houston street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, for a period coterminous with the existing lease of said pier, dated March 27, 1907, the term of which begins August 1, 1910, and expires August 1, 1920 be and the same is hereby amended by striking out the words: "the Department of Docks and Ferries shall build or cause to be built at the expense of the City upon the land under water above described, extension of said Pier (new) 39," and inserting, in place thereof, the words: "The Central Railroad Company of New Jersey shall build or cause to be built at its own expense upon the land under water above described, the extension of said Pier (new) 39; and eliminating the charge for the cost of construction by striking out the words: "and, in addition, 5½% of the cost of construction thereof."

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, recommending a lease of extensions to Piers 13 and 14, East River, Manhattan, to the New York Cuba Mail Steam Ship Company:

October 7, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company of the following described land under water:

Parcel "A."

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Board of Docks, October 26, 1900, where the same is intersected by the easterly side of Pier 13, running thence easterly along said established bulkhead line to the centre line of the slip between Piers 13 and 14; thence southerly along the centre line of the slip, 50 feet; thence westerly and parallel with said established bulkhead line, 97.44 feet to the easterly side of Pier 13; thence northerly and along the easterly side of Pier 13 to the point or place of beginning.

Parcel "B."

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Board of Docks, October 26, 1900, where the same is intersected by the westerly line of Pier 14, running thence southerly along the westerly side of Pier 14, 50 feet; thence westerly and along a line parallel with the aforesaid bulkhead line, a distance of 97.43 feet to the centre line of the slip between Piers 13 and 14; thence northerly and along said centre line of the slip, 50 feet to the aforesaid bulkhead line; thence easterly and along the said bulkhead line to the point or place of beginning.

The lessee shall build at its own cost and expense upon the land under water above described as Parcel "A," a lateral extension on the easterly side of Pier 13, East River, and upon the land under water above described as Parcel "B," a lateral extension to the westerly side of Pier 14, East River.

The lessee shall have the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of the lease upon the said lateral extensions, sheds for the protection of freight in transit.

The said lateral extensions, together with the sheds thereon and any and all structures erected under the provisions of said lease shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of this department, and shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of this lease.

The lease shall begin on the date the Chief Engineer of this department shall certify that said lateral extensions, respectively, without sheds, are completed and ready for occupancy, and shall expire as follows:

Parcel "A" shall expire August 1, 1916.

Parcel "B" shall expire October 1, 1916.

The lessee shall have the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years, from August 1, 1916, on Parcel "A," and for a further term of ten years, from October 1, 1916, on Parcel "B."

The rental for the first term of Parcels "A" and "B" shall be at the rate of twenty-seven and one-half cents (27½ cents) per square foot per annum, and for the renewal term ten per cent. (10 per cent.) advance, which area shall be shown by a survey by this department.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in the existing leases of Piers 13 and 14, East River. Yours respectfully,

In connection therewith, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 24, 1913.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On October 7, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company for the land under water for lateral extensions to Piers 13 and 14, East River.

The annual rental proposed is 27½ cents per square foot, and for the renewal term a 10 per cent. advance. The period for the lateral extension of Pier 13 is to be coterminous with the lease of the pier and expires August 1, 1916. The period for the lateral extension of Pier 14 is to be coterminous with the existing lease of the pier and shall expire October 1, 1916.

I concur in the terms and conditions proposed by the Commissioner of Docks and recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Board of Docks, October 26, 1900, where the same is intersected by the easterly side of Pier 13, running thence easterly along said established bulkhead line to the centre line of the slip between Piers 13 and 14; thence southerly along the centre line of the slip, 50 feet; thence westerly and parallel with said established bulkhead line 97.44 feet to the easterly side of Pier 13; thence northerly and along the easterly side of Pier 13 to the point or place of beginning.

Parcel "B."

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Board of Docks, October 26, 1900, where the same is intersected by the westerly line of Pier 14, running thence southerly along the westerly side of Pier 14, 50 feet; thence westerly and along a line parallel with the aforesaid bulkhead line, a distance of 97.43 feet to the centre line of the slip between Piers 13 and 14; thence northerly and along said centre line of the slip, 50 feet to the aforesaid bulkhead line; thence easterly and along the said bulkhead line to the point or place of beginning.

The Company shall build or cause to be built, at the expense of the Company, upon the land under water above described as Parcel "A," a lateral extension to the easterly side of Pier 13, East River, and upon the land under water above described as Parcel "B," a lateral extension to the westerly side of Pier 14, East River.

The lease shall begin on the date the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries shall certify that said lateral extensions, respectively, without sheds, are completed and ready for occupancy, and shall expire as follows: Parcel "A," August 1, 1916; Parcel "B," October 1, 1916; with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten (10) years at an annual rental of twenty-seven and one-half cents (27½c.) per square foot for the area of the land under water covered by said extensions, said area to be as shown by the surveys of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and for the renewal period of an advance of ten (10) per cent.

The lessee shall have the privilege of erecting and maintaining, during the term of the lease or renewal thereof, sheds for the protection of freight in transit.

The said lateral extensions, together with the sheds thereon, and any and all structures erected under the provisions of the lease shall be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries, and shall revert to and become the property of the City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease.

The lease shall provide that the lessee shall at all times during the term thereof keep and maintain all sheds or other structures erected or to be erected under the provisions of said lease in good condition and repair to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Docks.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in the existing leases of Piers 13 and 14, East River.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee relative to an issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$850,000, the proceeds to the amount of the par value thereof to be used for the construction of a pier at the foot of West 46th street, Borough of Manhattan:

October 6, 1913.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On September 8, 1913, the Commissioner of Docks requested the adoption, by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock in the sum of \$850,000 for the construction of a long pier at the foot of West 46th street, North River. In connection therewith we report as follows:

It is proposed to construct at this point a pier 1,000 feet long. This is part of the proposed plan for the development of the water-front of the North River.

On July 31, 1913, \$164,000 corporate stock was authorized for hard dredging in connection with the construction of this pier.

It is desired to have funds for the pier construction available at once that work may be started as soon as the dredging is completed.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of Section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding eight hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$850,000), the proceeds to the par value thereof to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the construction of a pier at the foot of West 46th street, North River.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following report of the Committee on Pending Transit Proposals of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment relative to the exchange of transfers between the New York Railways Company and the Municipal Ferry to Staten Island, Borough of Richmond, was received and presented at meeting held October 8, 1913, and referred to Committee:

New York City, October 1, 1913.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On July 31, 1913, your Board referred back to the Committee on Pending Transit Proposals and to the Commissioner of Docks for further consideration the proposal of the New York Railways Company to exchange transfers between its street surface line terminating at South Ferry and the Municipal Ferry to Staten Island, upon the basis of a division of a five-cent fare, three cents to the railway company and two cents to the City.

Your Committee has made a careful study of the probable financial results from a transfer arrangement as proposed, and has conferred with the officials of the New York Railways Company for the purpose of trying to secure for the City a larger percentage of the joint fare. As reported by your Committee upon July 10, 1913, the net loss from the operation of the Staten Island division of the Municipal Ferry for the year 1912 was \$279,436.11. An examination of the annual net loss for the entire period of municipal operation of these ferries indicates a steadily decreasing annual deficit due to increased traffic and to improved methods of operation. The traffic increase averaged under present conditions approximately five per cent. (5%) a year. It is reasonable to assume that the bringing of the Borough of Richmond within the five-cent fare zone would materially increase the percentage of traffic growth. As reported on July 10, a study of traffic made by the Engineers of the Public Service Commission and by the Department of Docks and Ferries indicate that not less than forty-seven per cent. (47%) of the entire Staten Island traffic would avail itself of the transfer privilege. Upon the basis of 1912 traffic, this would mean an added burden to the tax budget of \$170,000. It has been argued with considerable justice analogy between a Municipal Ferry operating between Richmond and Manhattan and Municipal Bridges connecting Manhattan and Brooklyn is strong. The advantages accruing to the entire City from cheap and easy interborough communication are substantial. The development of the Borough of Richmond is of importance, not only locally, but to the City at large. So long as a barrier of a ten-cent rate is imposed between the important business sections of the City and Richmond, it is not to be expected that the development of that Borough can progress rapidly.

The proposed contract with the New York Railways Company would permit persons living in Richmond to reach practically all parts of the Borough of Manhattan for a five-cent fare. It would mean that a wonderful stimulus would be given to business and to real estate all through Staten Island. The City is providing, from general taxation, money for the construction of municipal subways in every Borough of the Greater New York, except the Borough of Richmond. It is quite true that the taxpayers of Richmond are paying their proportionate share for these improved transportation facilities, and a contract with the street surface railways, as now proposed, would do much to give to Staten Island advantages which the new subway system is bringing to other Boroughs of the City.

In 1905 contract was authorized with the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, the operator of steam railroads on Staten Island, whereby commutation tickets were sold for passage over the railroads and the Municipal Ferry. The City agreed to accept \$1.25 for each commutation book, permitting two trips a day for each day in the month. A similar agreement was made at the same time for the issue of fifty-trip family tickets upon which the City was to receive \$1.25 and for school tickets upon which the City was to receive \$1. This agreement with the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company has been continued in force from year to year, and is still in effect. The average ferriage received by the City from persons purchasing these tickets is only a fraction over two cents.

Your Committee recommends, providing that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund concur, that the offer of the New York Railways Company be accepted, and that the Commissioner of Docks be authorized to enter into a contract with the New York Railways Company for the exchange of transfers upon the basis proposed.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Your Committee to which was referred at meeting held October 8, the communication from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of report of the Committee on Pending Transit Proposals, relative to the exchange of transfers between the New York Railways Company and the Municipal Ferry to Staten Island, Borough of Richmond, respectfully report:

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held October 9, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, on behalf of the Committee on Pending Transit Proposals, presented a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to enter into a contract with the New York Railways Company for the exchange of transfers upon the basis of a division of a five-cent fare, three cents to the Railways Company and two cents to the City, providing that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund grant their consent and approval. The resolution was ordered placed on the calendar for the meeting of October 16, 1913, and the Transit Conference Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Comptroller were appointed a Committee to confer with the Committee appointed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

At meeting held October 16, 1913, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the resolution presented by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, above referred to, subject to concurrence by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Your Committee after having conferred with the Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and with the Comptroller, and after having gone into the matter very thoroughly, are of the opinion that it would be for the best interests of the City that a contract with the New York Railways Company for the exchange of transfers, upon the basis mentioned, should be entered into, and recommend that the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 16, 1913, hereinabove referred to, be concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. A resolution to carry this into effect is hereto attached. Respectfully,

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at meeting held October 16, 1913, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the offer of the New York Railways Company contained in communication dated March 6, 1913, presented to the Board at a meeting held on said date, to exchange transfers between its street surface lines terminating at South Ferry and the Municipal Ferry to Staten Island upon the basis of a division of a five-cent fare, three cents to the railway company and two cents to the City, be and it is hereby accepted; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be and he is herein and hereby authorized to enter into a contract with the New York Railways Company for the exchange of transfers upon the above-mentioned basis; provided, however, that this authorization shall be null and void and of no effect unless and until consented to and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund."

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in the above action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and authorize the Commissioner of Docks to enter into a contract with the New York Railways Company as above set forth.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller stating that this matter had been investigated by the Comptroller personally and that he voted in the affirmative by the Comptroller's direction.

The Committee to which was referred a petition for the resumption of the ferry service between Wall street, Manhattan, and Montague street, Brooklyn, presented the following report:

October 15, 1913.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your honorable body held on July 30, 1912, there was referred to a select committee consisting of the Comptroller, Chamberlain and President of the Board of Aldermen a petition signed by various persons, praying for the resumption of the ferry service between Wall street, Manhattan, and Montague street, Brooklyn.

The Wall and Catherine streets ferries were discontinued on July 27, 1912. Previous to their discontinuance they were operated by the Union Ferry Company, which still operates the Fulton, Hamilton and South ferries. From the statements submitted by the company and examinations of the company's books by the Department of Finance it is apparent that the need for ferry service between Wall street, Manhattan, and Montague street, Brooklyn, has been materially diminished, and it is contended by the ferry company that the ferry for some time past has been operated at a substantial loss. This contention is undoubtedly correct as the most recent traffic and revenue figures obtained by the Department of Finance from the company's books show that less than 1,400 passengers were using the ferry daily. The monthly revenues were about \$4,919—while the monthly expenses about \$7,050—a deficit of \$2,131 a month. These figures are based upon the business of the Wall street ferry for the ten months' period ended August 31, 1911. The revenues were doubtless considerably reduced by the time of discontinuing service on July 27 last.

The following summary is indicative of the gradual decline in the traffic and receipts of the Wall street ferry:

Ordinarily in a situation similar to this, ferries may be operated under either of the following plans:

1. Municipal administration.

2. Subsidy payment to private operators.

The first plan would entail enormous expenditures by the City. Terminals would have to be acquired, ferry structures and boats purchased. In addition, there must be considered the probable deficit that would arise each year from the operation of this service; for it is apparent, from the examination of the company's books as previously referred to, that the demand for this ferry service is not sufficient to render it a self-sustaining proposition.

The second plan referred to in the foregoing schedule, contemplates the operation of the ferry upon a subsidy basis, that is, payments to the operator of such sums as will not only cover the deficiency (the cost of operation, etc., in excess of the receipts from ferriages), but permit of at least a reasonable return on, and an allowance for depreciation and reconstruction of the property essential to the operation of this ferry.

This course would result in the City assuming an obligation which would inure to the benefit of a very small proportion of the citizenship and at the same time constitute an unjust burden upon the taxpayers of the City. We therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the resolution submitted herewith, denying the petition for the reopening of the Wall street ferry and directing that the Commissioner of Docks proceed to utilize the property of the City located at the foot of Wall street, Manhattan, formerly used as a ferry terminal. Respectfully submitted,

Whereas, There was referred to a Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, Chamberlain and President of the Board of Aldermen, a petition praying for the resumption of the ferry service between Wall street, Manhattan, and Montague street, Brooklyn, which ferry was discontinued on July 27, 1912; and

Whereas, After careful consideration of the facts, as set forth in a report of the said Select Committee submitted on this date, it appears that the present need for this ferry is not sufficient to warrant the expense that the City must necessarily incur in the operation thereof; therefore be it

Resolved, That the resumption of the ferry service between Wall street, Manhattan, and Montague street, Brooklyn, be and he is hereby deemed inexpedient and not to the interest of the City; that the petition therefor is hereby denied; and, further, that the Secretary of this Commission be and he hereby is directed to communicate with the Commissioner of Docks requesting that he proceed at as early a date as may be practicable to make such use of the property owned by the City at the foot of Wall street, Manhattan, formerly used as a ferry terminal, as he may deem to be to the best interest of the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a renewal of the lease to the City, of the premises at the northwest corner of 67th street and 18th avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Education:

October 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Education in a communication to your Board under date of September 27, 1913, states that at a meeting of the Board of Education held September 24, 1913, a resolution was adopted requesting the Sinking Fund Commission to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of the renewal of the lease of premises situated on the northwesterly corner of 67th street and 18th avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied as Public

School 48, for a period of two years from September 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$2,100 and water tax, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

The Comptroller in a communication to your Board under date of June 23, 1911, recommended a renewal of this lease for a term of two years from September 1, 1911, at a rental of \$2,100 a year, the same as now asked, and said report was approved and renewal of lease authorized at a meeting of the Sinking Fund Commission held June 28, 1911.

The rental of \$2,100 a year is a trifle more than 8 per cent. of the appraised value by the Division of Real Estate of this Department.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, and it being the same as previously paid, and the City now being a hold-over tenant, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of the premises situated on the northwestern corner of 67th street and 18th avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied as Public School 48, for a period of two years from September 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions at an annual rental of \$2,100, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and make outside repairs; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service, and make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Margaret V. McNulty, No. 100 Prospect Park West, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a renewal of the lease to the City, of the premises situated at the northwestern corner of 67th street and 18th avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied as Public School 48, for a period of two years from September 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of twenty-one hundred dollars (\$2,100), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and make outside repairs; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service, and make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary; lessor, Margaret V. McNulty; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of premises at the southeast corner of 1st avenue and 108th street, Manhattan, for use of the Board of Education:

October 24, 1913.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Education in a communication to your Board under date of September 27, 1913, states that at a meeting of the Board of Education held September 24, 1913, a resolution was adopted requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of the five-story brick and stone building located on the southeasterly corner of 1st avenue and 108th street, designated as No. 2084 1st avenue, Borough of Manhattan, occupied as a supply depository, for a period of two years from December 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of either one or two years upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$6,000, the same as now paid, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

The Comptroller in a communication to your Board under date of October 20, 1911, recommended a renewal of this lease for a period of two years from December 1, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of either one or two years, at an annual rental of \$6,000, payable quarterly, the same as now asked, and said report was approved and renewal of lease authorized at a meeting of the Sinking Fund Commission held October 25, 1911.

The rent of \$6,000 a year is 10 per cent. of the appraised value by the Division of Real Estate of this Department.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just under the circumstances, and it being the same as heretofore paid, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of the renewal of the lease to the City of the five-story brick and stone building, 50 feet 5 1/2 inches by 90 feet on a plot 50 feet 5 1/2 inches by 95 feet, located on the southeasterly corner of 1st avenue and 108th street and known as No. 2084 1st avenue, Borough of Manhattan, used as a storage place for the apparatus of playgrounds, vacation schools and recreation centres, for a period of two years from December 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of either one or two years, at an annual rental of \$6,000, payable quarterly; the lease to contain a stipulation that no gasoline or automobiles shall be stored in the premises; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and to make outside repairs, including repairs to the roof; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service, and to make such inside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Mrs. Josephine J. Schnurmacher, No. 176 East 111th street, Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease to the City of the five-story brick and stone building, 50 feet 5 1/2 inches by 90 feet, on a plot 50 feet 5 1/2 inches by 95 feet, located on the southeasterly corner of 1st avenue and 108th street, and known as No. 2084 1st avenue, Borough of Manhattan, used as a storage place for the apparatus of playgrounds, vacation schools and recreation centres, for a period of two years from December 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of either one or two years, at an annual rental of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), payable quarterly; the lease to contain a stipulation that no gasoline or automobiles shall be stored in the premises; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and to make outside repairs, including repairs to the roof; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service, and to make such inside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; lessor, Mrs. Josephine J. Schnurmacher; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the hiring of premises at No. 771 Gravesend avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, to be occupied by the Board of Education for lecture purposes during the season 1913-1914:

October 24, 1913.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Education in a communication to your Board under date of September 27, 1913, states that at a meeting of that Board held September 24, 1913, a resolution was adopted requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the hiring of the hall at No. 771 Gravesend avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, over the Kensington Branch of the Brooklyn Public Library, for lecture purposes, for the season of 1913-1914, once weekly, at a rental of \$10 a night, including heat, light and janitor service, and to authorize the Comptroller to pay the rental of the same without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor.

The hall in question is located in a new two-story and cellar brick building, measures 33 by 50 feet, and has a seating capacity of three hundred.

The hall has a stage 10 by 12 feet, and three ante-rooms, 10 by 16 feet, 7 by 10 feet and 15 by 22 feet, and has steam heat, electric light, water and toilets. The regular charge per night when rented for social purposes is \$15. The hall has not heretofore been used for school lectures.

The owner is Mrs. Mary A. Weales, of 707 East 3d street, Brooklyn.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the hiring of the hall on the second floor of the two-story and cellar brick building, 771 Gravesend avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for lecture purposes, for use of the Board of Education, during the season of 1913-1914, for one night each week, at a rental of \$10 per night, said rental to include heat, light and janitor service and to be paid quarterly, and authorize the Comptroller to pay to Mrs. Mary A. Weales, of 707 East 3d street, Borough of Brooklyn, the said rental, upon a voucher drawn by the Board of Education, without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the hiring by the Board of Education of the hall on the second floor of the two-story and cellar brick building, No. 771 Gravesend avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for lecture purposes during the season of 1913-1914, for one night each week, at a rental of ten dollars (\$10.00) per night; said rental to include heat, light and janitor service and to be paid quarterly; and be it further

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay the said rental to Mrs. Mary A. Weales, 707 East 3d street, Borough of Brooklyn, upon a voucher prepared by the Board of Education without the necessity of entering into a lease.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Fire Commissioner turning over as no longer required premises No. 181 South 3d street, Borough of Brooklyn:

May 26, 1913.

*Honorable Commissioners of Sinking Fund Commission, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan:*

Gentlemen—The site and building of Hook and Ladder Company 104, located at No. 181 South 3d street, Borough of Brooklyn, were vacated at 8 o'clock a. m. this day, and are hereby formally surrendered to your Commission for disposal.

This was done at the urgent request of the Board of Education, who desire the site for school purposes, it adjoining a public school.

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of South 3d street, distant 155 feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Driggs avenue with the northerly side of South 3d street; running thence northerly and parallel with Driggs avenue 100 feet; running thence easterly and parallel with South 3d street 25 feet; running thence southerly and again parallel with Driggs avenue 100 feet to the northerly side of South 3d street; running thence westerly along the northerly side of South 3d street 25 feet to the point or place of beginning.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions, relative to the following assignments:

1. Plot of land located on East 73d street and East 74th street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, to the Board of Education.

2. Plot of land on First avenue between 67th and 68th streets, Borough of Manhattan to the Public Recreation Commission.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting and laid over at the request of the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, in order to ascertain what demand, if any, there was for the proposed assignments. The Chairman of the Finance Committee explained that since the last meeting he had been convinced that the proposed assignments were for the best interests of the City and he was ready to vote on both propositions.

Gentlemen—On September 10, 1913, the Board of Education adopted a resolution agreeing to accept the plot of land located on East 73d and East 74th streets and the East River, Borough of Manhattan, in lieu of the site heretofore acquired for a supply depository on First avenue between East 67th and East 68th streets, Borough of Manhattan.

The site above mentioned located between East 73d and 74th streets and the East River (Exterior street) was acquired by the City by deed dated July 10, 1906, and was leased by the City to the State Lunacy Commission in 1906 for a term of fifty years at a nominal rental, for the construction thereon of a reception hospital for the insane. This project has since been abandoned, and pursuant to chapter 678 of the laws of 1913 the State Commission in Lunacy, on behalf of the State of New York, has released to the City all the right and title of the State in and to said lease. It is proposed to assign this property to the Board of Education and to assign to the Public Recreation Commission the land on First avenue, from East 67th to East 68th streets, Borough of Manhattan.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution assigning to the Board of Education the following described property located in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York, bounded as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northerly side of 73d street, distant 423 feet easterly along the same from the intersection of the said northerly side of 73d street and the easterly side of Avenue A; and running thence northerly, parallel with the said easterly side of Avenue A, 204 feet 4 inches to the southerly side of 74th street; thence easterly along the said southerly side of 74th street, 257 feet 7 1/2 inches to the westerly side of Exterior street; thence southerly along the said westerly side of Exterior street, 205 feet 1 1/4 inches to the northerly side of 73d street, and thence westerly along the said northerly side of 73d street 239 feet 5 1/8 inches to the point of beginning.

—and that they assign to the Public Recreation Commission the following described property located in the Borough of Manhattan, City and State of New York, bounded as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of East 67th street with the westerly line of First avenue; running thence westerly along the northerly line of East 67th street, 300 feet; thence northerly and parallel with First avenue 200 feet 10 inches to the southerly line of East 68th street; thence easterly along the southerly line of East 68th street 300 feet to the westerly line of First avenue; thence southerly along the westerly line of First avenue 200 feet 10 inches to the northerly line of East 67th street; the point or place of beginning—such assignments to take effect upon the final delivery of the releases of the 73d street property, and that the Mayor be authorized to execute for and on behalf of The City of New York the release from the State of New York to The City of New York of all the right and title of the State in and to a certain lease dated April 15, 1907, letting and demising to the People of the State of New York, certain premises situated on the northerly side of East 73d street and southerly side of East 74th street and Exterior street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of fifty years from October 1, 1906.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease to the city of plot of ground on West 17th street, 287 feet west of 10th avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning:

October 24, 1913.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board, held June 11, 1913, a resolution was adopted authorizing a renewal of the lease to the city of the vacant lot, 25 by 103 feet 3 inches, located on the southerly side of West 15th street, 300 feet west of 9th avenue, Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, as a cart yard in connection with Stable "E," for a period of six months from September 1, 1913, at a rental at the rate of \$600 a year.

In a communication to your Board under date of October 4, 1913, the Commissioner says that he has been unable to secure a renewal of this lease, because the lessor, Thomas J. Dennis, held the property under a lease from the owner, which expired September 1, 1913, and he could not obtain a renewal thereof. The Commissioner further says that Mr. Dennis is the lessee of a vacant plot on West 17th street, near 10th avenue, and that in an emergency his Department was obliged to make use of this plot since September 1, 1913, for the storage of its carts. Mr. Dennis is now willing to sublet this property to the city for a period of one year from September 1, 1913, at the same rental as charged in West 15th street, viz., \$600 a year.

The lot occupied by the city in West 15th street, 25 by 103 feet 3 inches, is assessed at \$11,000, and the rent paid there was approximately 5½ per cent. on the assessed value.

The plot in West 17th street, which the Department of Street Cleaning is now occupying, and which it is proposed to be leased, is 50 by 92 feet. The assessed value of these two lots is approximately \$25,000 (the whole block is assessed as one parcel), and the rent of \$600 a year is 2½% of the assessed value and appraised value.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted June 11, 1913, authorizing a renewal of the lease of the vacant lot, 25 by 103 feet 3 inches, located on the southerly side of West 15th street, 300 feet west of 9th avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, be rescinded.

I also recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, and it being the same as previously paid for a single lot in West 15th street, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the vacant plot of land, 50 by 92 feet, described as follows:

—for use of the Department of Street Cleaning for a period of one year from September 1, 1913, at an annual rental of six hundred dollars (\$600), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments, and to have the right to terminate such lease at any time upon giving sixty days' previous written notice; lessor, Thomas J. Dennis; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Police Department, in a communication to your Board under date of October 3, 1913, requests a renewal of the lease of the premises No. 17 West 18th street, Whitestone, Borough of Queens, occupied as a station house for the 292d Precinct, for a term of one year from January 1, 1914, at a rental of \$1,000 a year, the same as now paid, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

Lessor, Mrs. Antonio Reitz, Whitestone, Queens. Respectfully,

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease to the city, of premises No. 2541 Cambreling avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals as a dormitory for the nurses of Fordham Hospital:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in a communication to your Board under date of October 8, 1913, requests a lease of the premises at 2541 Cambreling avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the nurses at Fordham Hospital. He states that every room in the present nurses' home is filled to its utmost capacity, and that additional accommodations are very much needed.

Lessors, Francis Ludford and Delia A. Ludford, 2539 Cambreling avenue, Borough of The Bronx. Respectfully,

Ludford, of the premises No. 2541 Cambreling avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, for a period of three years from November 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of three years upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of six hundred dollars (\$600) a year, payable quarterly; the lessors to pay taxes and water rates and to do whatever painting and papering is necessary to put the premises into fair and tenantable condition; the lessee to make all extraordinary inside repairs that it may deem necessary during the term of occupancy and to pay for heat, light and janitor service; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 147 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the storage of free floating baths at Rogers Basin, foot of West 22d street, Borough of Brooklyn, by the President of the Borough of Manhattan:

October 24, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The President of the Borough of Manhattan, in a communication to your Board under date of September 24, 1913, requests a renewal of the lease of the premises at the foot of 22d street, Borough of Brooklyn, known as Rogers Basin, for the storage of free floating baths, at the rate of \$1 a day for each bath, said rent to be paid only for the actual number of days each of the said baths is so stored in the Rogers Basin, said resolution to be effective as of July 1, 1913, the date of the expiration of the previous lease made under a resolution similar to the one above requested.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just and it being the same as heretofore paid, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay to the Dime Savings Bank of Brooklyn rental for storage space at the foot of 22d street, Borough of Brooklyn, known as Rogers Basin, for the storage of such of the Manhattan free floating baths as are stored by the President of the Borough from month to month, from July 1, 1913, to terminate July 1, 1914, at the rate of \$1 a day for each bath, said rent to be paid only for the actual number of days which the said baths are so stored in Rogers Basin, said payment to be made upon a voucher prepared and certified to by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, without the necessity of entering into a lease therefor. Lessor, Dime Savings Bank of Brooklyn, DeKalb avenue and Fulton street, Brooklyn. Respectfully,

rent to be paid only for the actual number of days the said baths are so stored, upon a voucher prepared and certified to by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, without the necessity of entering into a lease.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the payment of rental of rooms 1623-1627, inclusive, in the Park Row Building, for the months of November and December, 1913, occupied by the President of the Borough of Manhattan:

October 25, 1913.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works making application for the renting of space for the use of the Chemical Laboratory of his department, for the months of November and December, 1913. He has asked that rooms 1623 to 1627, inclusive, in the Park Row Building, Nos. 13-21 Park Row, Borough of Manhattan, be rented for this purpose, stating that it is impossible, owing to the incomplete state of the Municipal Building, to move the Chemical Laboratory at this time.

These rooms contain a total area of 784 square feet, and are being rented at the rate of \$2.02 per square foot, or \$132 a month.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:*

Gentlemen—Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum in The City of New York has presented to you a petition for the cancellation of certain assessments for public improvements affecting premises in the Borough of The Bronx, designated on the official tax map as Section 11, Block 3227, Lot 5, formerly known as Lots 5, 120 and 300.

This application is made pursuant to the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, which provides that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, upon the written certificate of the Comptroller of said City approving the same, may, in their discretion, and upon such terms as they may deem proper, by a unanimous vote cancel and annul all taxes, assessments and Croton water rents, and sales to said City of any and all of the same, which at the time said section became a law were, or might thereafter become, a lien against any real estate owned by any corporation, entitled to exemption of such real estate owned by it from local taxation under article one, section four, subdivision seven of the tax law, which was the actual owner of such real estate and entitled to such exemption, during the time when the taxes, assessments or Croton water rents, from which it seeks relief, accrued and became liens thereupon.

It appears from the petition submitted, which is duly verified, that the petitioner is a corporation incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, and is the owner in fee simple of the above described premises, having acquired the same on or about January 17, 1899, and November 20, 1903, that it has owned the above described premises continuously since said date and is still the owner thereof, and that the same now is and has always been exempt from local taxation, under said provision of the Tax Law, which was periods when the liens hereinafter set forth accrued. Said premises are used for educational purposes.

It appears from an examination of the Assessment Rolls that said property has been exempt from local taxation prior to 1909 and since, and the assessed valuation for the year 1913 is \$85,000.

It further appears from the records of the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears that the following assessments for local improvements were levied against said property and are now open and unpaid on the records of the Department, namely:

The records of said Division show further that at the time of the payment of the foregoing award to petitioner in the proceeding for "Opening Tee Taw Avenue, etc.", there were no open charges against the property affected.

The total amount involved as principal in the above assessments is \$9,145.66. The property affected by these assessments is located in the Borough of The Bronx, Kingsbridge road and Sedgwick avenue.

The treasurer, Stephen Farrelly, in response to a request, has submitted a financial statement for the last fiscal year, showing the total receipts from all sources to be \$171,552.20 (including balance of \$28,875.35 from preceding year) and the expenditures for all objects, \$142,122.32, leaving a balance of \$29,429.88.

It appearing, therefore, that the petitioner was the actual owner of the real estate in question and entitled to have the same exempted from taxation during the time when said liens, above mentioned, accrued and became a lien thereupon, I am of the opinion that the petitioner has presented a proper case for relief to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, and I would, therefore, certify my approval of the application of The Roman Catholic Orphan Asylum in The City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of such section of the Charter, and recommend the liens, above set forth, be cancelled upon the payment of \$10.

"\* \* \* That it is a benevolent corporation organized for the purposes of education, and it not organized for the purpose of private profit, nor is it engaged in the transaction of business for profit. \* \* \* That your petition is engaged in the education of children of both sexes from the age of about six to the age of about eighteen. That it provides a complete primary and secondary course of education from kindergarten to college, and that it has at all times since its incorporation had a number of pupils in attendance varying from 170 to 190 and now has approximately 180 pupils actually enrolled and in attendance. That a large majority of said children are between eight and sixteen years of age and are required by the laws of the State of New York regularly to attend school. That your petitioner provides instruction for such children which otherwise would have to be given by The City of New York at public expense. That the entire income of your petitioner has been applied and is now being applied to the necessary expenses of providing education for its pupils as aforesaid; that your petitioner has no surplus or other funds out of which said assessment can be paid and that unless it is relieved from said assessment your petitioner will have no means of paying the same, except by borrowing the required amount."

The total amount involved as principal in the above assessments is \$1,006.06. The property affected by these assessments is located in the Borough of Richmond, Wall street, Carroll place to Stuyvesant place.

The petitioner, however, through William G. Wilcox, Esq., its president, has submitted an offer to pay the principal of said assessment, as a condition to the cancellation of the accrued interest thereon.

As heretofore appears the Department of Taxes and Assessments has exempted that part of the lot used for church purposes and has assessed the part used as a parsonage, dividing the valuation as shown above, without making a physical apportionment of the lot on the tax maps.

Although the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have no power, under section 221A of the Charter, to cancel the foregoing assessments so far as they affect the part of the lot used as a parsonage by reason of the fact that such part is not entitled to exemption from taxation under article 1, section 4, subdivision 7 of the Tax Law, nevertheless the Commissioners have the power to cancel the proportionate part of each of such assessments against the part of the lot used for church purposes, such proportionate part to be determined by the relative valuations placed on the church and parsonage, respectively, by the Department of Taxes and Assessments. The valuation placed on the church property (\$28,000) is approximately 87 per cent. of the total valuation (\$32,250), and that on the rectory 13 per cent.

I would recommend, therefore, that each of the aforesaid assessments be cancelled to the extent of 87 per cent. thereof, upon the payment of a nominal consideration.

As to the remainder of each of such assessments found to be against the parsonage, viz., 13 per cent. thereof, I refuse to certify my approval of the application.

The total amount involved as principal in the above assessments is \$954.79. The property affected by these assessments is located in the Borough of Brooklyn, 26th Ward, New Lots avenue, between Schenck avenue and Jerome street.

The treasurer, W. L. Hopkins, in response to a request, has submitted a financial statement for the year ending April 30, 1911, showing the total receipts from all sources to be \$1,356.54, and the expenditures for all objects, \$1,701.96, leaving a deficit of \$345.42.

It appearing, therefore, that the petitioner was the actual owner of the real estate in question and entitled to have the same exempted from taxation to the extent hereinbefore set forth, during the time when said liens, above mentioned, accrued and became a lien thereupon, I am of the opinion that the petitioner has presented a proper case for relief to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, except as to that part of each of such liens which I have refused to certify for cancellation, and I would, therefore, certify my approval of the application of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church of the Town of New Lots to the extent I have herein indicated as proper, pursuant to the provisions of such section of the Charter, and recommend

that each of the assessments, above set forth, be cancelled to the extent of 87 per cent. thereof, upon the payment of the sum of \$10 and the balance of said assessments with accrued interest, provided that payment be made within sixty days from the date of the passage of the resolution authorizing such payment.

Petitioner has included in its application certain assessments against Lot 61, Block 2661, which is occupied as a parsonage, but in view of the fact that such lot is not exempt from taxation, except to the extent of the usual \$2,000 parsonage allowance, I refuse to certify my approval of the application so far as respects said Lot 61.

The records of this Department show that a portion of the church building erected on said Lot 1, to wit, the lecture room and the room adjacent thereto, on the first floor thereof, has been leased by the petitioner to the Board of Education of The City of New York, for use as an annex to Public School 23, for the period from April 1, 1913, to July 1, 1914, with the privilege of renewal for one or two years thereafter, at an annual rental of \$800.

It appears, therefore, that said Lot 1 is not used exclusively for carrying out thereupon the purposes of the petitioning corporation, within the meaning of said subdivision 7, section 4, article 1 of the Tax Law.

In view of this fact, in my opinion, the petitioner is not entitled to a total cancellation of the foregoing assessments against said Lot 1, but only to the cancellation of a proportionate part thereof, such proportionate part being based on the value of that portion of the property not leased, as compared with the value of the part leased. It being impossible to physically apportion the property, an equitable method of arriving at the respective valuations of the part rented and the part not rented would be to capitalize the yearly rent paid at 10 per cent., which would give \$8,000 as the value of the part leased, and deducting said sum from the total valuation of said lot, gives \$7,000 as the value of the part not leased. On this basis, the respective proportions are as follows: part leased, 53 per cent.; part not leased, 47 per cent. A fair adjustment of the matter, therefore, in my opinion, would be to cancel the foregoing assessments against said Lot 1, the principal of which amounts to \$379, upon the payment by petitioner of 53 per cent. thereof, or \$200.87.

The total amount involved as principal in the above assessments is \$379. The property affected by these assessments is located in the Borough of The Bronx, northeast corner of Forest avenue and East 166th street.

The pastor, Rev. A. M. Reoch, in response to a request, has submitted a financial statement for the year ending January 1, 1911, showing the total receipts from all sources to be \$2,406.82 and the expenditures for all objects, \$2,800, leaving a deficit of \$393.18.

It appearing, therefore, that the petitioner was the actual owner of the real estate in question (Lot 1), and entitled to have the same exempted from taxation during the time when said liens, above mentioned, accrued and became a lien thereupon, I am of the opinion that the petitioner has presented a proper case for relief to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, except as to the proportionate part of such liens which I have refused to certify for cancellation and I would, therefore,

Petitioner has included in its application certain installments against said Lot 29 for street improvements in the former Town of New Utrecht, levied pursuant to chapter 582, laws of 1893. These installment assessments were to be a lien only as levied and were to be collected with the general tax. The first installment was levied June 30, 1904.

I refuse to certify my approval of the application, however, so far as respects such installment assessments, for the reason that said Lot 29 was not acquired until May 9, 1905, subsequent to the levying of the first installment, the petitioner had due notice of the existence thereof, and presumably such assessments were an element affecting the value of the property when the same was bought; and furthermore, that at the time petitioner acquired the property, such charges had accrued, although not a lien.

The total amount involved as principal in the above assessments is \$3,452.23. The property affected by these assessments is located in the Borough of Brooklyn, 30th Ward, Benson avenue, Bath avenue and Bay 20th street.

Such financial statement also states that the new church, then in course of construction, would cost about \$125,000, on account of which the above balance of \$9,884.87 would be applied; and in addition that the church property had been mortgaged for \$65,000 with the possibility that an additional loan would be required before the church was completed.

It appearing therefore, that the petitioner was the actual owner of the real estate in question and entitled to have the same exempted from taxation during the time when said liens, above mentioned, accrued and became a lien thereupon, I am of the opinion that the petitioner has presented a proper case for relief to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, under the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, except as to the liens which I have refused to certify for cancellation and I would, therefore, certify my approval of the application of St. Finbar's Roman Catholic Church at Bath, Town of New Utrecht, to the extent I have herein indicated as proper, pursuant to the provisions of such section of the Charter, and recommend that the liens, above set forth, as the ones which may properly be cancelled, be cancelled upon the payment of \$10.

I am the owner in fee of certain property at Ruffle Bar, in Jamaica Bay, County of Kings and State of New York, more particularly described as follows: All that certain piece or parcel of land situate at Ruffle Bar, in Jamaica Bay, County of Kings and State of New York, beginning at a point at mean high water line on the easterly side of Ruffle Bar on the Raunt or Ruffle Bar Channel, which is distant seventy-five (75) feet northeasterly from the southeasterly corner of a certain piece or parcel of land which was heretofore, and on or about the 26th day of May, 1888, conveyed by Henry L. Schmeek and wife to August H. Van Ahn, Peter William Van Ahn and George Herman Van Ahn by deed dated May 26, 1888, and recorded in the office of the Register of the County of Kings, June 10, 1889, in Liber 1894 of conveyances, page 150, and running thence in a northeasterly direction and along mean high water line seventy-five (75) feet, thence in a northwesterly course two hundred and seventy (270) feet more or less to the centre of a ditch or dyke, thence running in a southwesterly course along the centre of said ditch or dyke and parallel or nearly so with the first mentioned course seventy-five (75) feet, and running thence in a southeasterly course two hundred and seventy (270) feet more or less to the point or place of beginning.

Subject to the restrictions in the said last mentioned deed.

This parcel of land being part of the premises granted to Henry L. Schmeek by letters patent by the State of New York and recorded in the Kings County Register's office in Liber 1781 of Conveyances, page 450, on December 27, 1887.

That on December 19, 1887, letters patent from the State of New York were issued to my predecessor in title, Henry L. Schmeek.

The land owned by me is now used for private residence. I have attempted to sell this property. The purchaser cannot get a policy of title insurance from any title company on the grounds that the City might have some claims upon the property, consequently this claim of the City is an apparent cloud on the title that has caused me and will cause me irreparable damages.

I in no way acknowledge that The City of New York or any one else has any interest in or title to said premises or any part thereof.

Wherefor I pray that The City of New York will grant, convey and release to me all rights, title and interest which the said City of New York may have in the parcel of land described herein.



Schmeek and Margaretha Tillotson for releases of the City's interest in premises on Ruffle Bar, and he refers me to his communications dated April 23, 1912, January 17, 1913, and July 21, 1913, relating to said petitions. He further states that the conclusions arrived at and set forth in those communications are applicable to the facts alleged in the present petition, and he certifies that any claim of title The City of New York may make constitutes a mere cloud upon the title of the petitioner in and to the premises for which a release is requested.

The object of such application is to obtain an order of the Court appointing three disinterested and competent freeholders, at least one of whom shall reside in the County of New York, and at least one of whom shall reside in the county, in which the real estate hereinafter described is situated, as Commissioners of Appraisal to ascertain and appraise the compensation to be made to the owners of and all persons interested in the real estate (as the term real estate is defined by said act) hereinafter described, as proposed to be taken or affected in connection with the construction of the dam and reservoir on the Bronx River, to be known as Kensico Reservoir, for the purpose of supplying The City of New York with an additional supply of pure and wholesome water, as provided for in said act.

The real estate sought to be taken or affected is situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant, Harrison and North Castle, County of Westchester, and State of New York.

All those portions of public highways situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant, Harrison and North Castle, which lie within the exterior boundaries of the real estate heretofore acquired by The City of New York for the construction of Kensico Reservoir and its appurtenances, shown and designated on the above entitled map filed in the office of the Register of the County of Westchester on the 7th day of October, 1913, as Map No. 2035, and is described as follows:

1. Road known as North Castle road, situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant and North Castle, beginning at a point in Kensico avenue near the

of the easterly end of Tarrytown road. Length, 0.1 mile.

8. Road known as Tarrytown road, situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in West Lake drive about 300 feet north of the northerly end of Lake View terrace and running in a northwesterly direction to a point in Columbus avenue where said Tarrytown road crosses Columbus avenue. Length, 0.54 mile.

9. Road known as Reynolds Hill road, situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in West Lake drive about 1,400 feet west from its intersection with Mile Square road and running in a westerly direction to a point in said highway where the same is intersected by the westerly boundary line of the property of The City of New York. Length, 0.45 mile.

10. Road known as State road, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point about 600 feet south of the easterly end of North Castle road and running in a northerly direction along the easterly shore of Kensico Lake (as the lake existed prior to 1907) to the southerly end of Mile Square road, and running thence in a northeasterly direction along Bear Gutter Creek, crossing substituted new road designated on the map herein referred to as Road A, just west of said creek; continuing in a northeasterly direction along said creek about 1,000 feet to a point in the first course of substituted new Road A. Length, 3.78 miles.

11. Road known as Hill road, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the State road and running in a southeasterly direction to a point in the westerly boundary of substituted new Road A. Length, 0.26 mile.

12. Road known as Mile Square road, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the State road near the northerly end of Kensico Lake (as the same existed prior to 1907) and running in a northerly direction to its point of intersection with a crossroad from Hillside and Valhalla to Armonk. Length, 1.6 miles.

13. Two crossroads connecting Mile Square road with the State road, situated in the Town of North Castle, described as follows:

First crossroad—Beginning at point in Mile Square road about 300 feet west of the second turn in the road and running south to the State road.

Second crossroad—Beginning at the second turn in Mile Square road and running in a northeasterly direction to the State road. Total length, 0.29 mile.

14. Road known as Middle Section road, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the State road at a Y opposite the southerly end of the first described road under No. 13, crossing substituted new Road A near the southerly end of Rye Outlet Bridge and running thence, in a easterly direction to Cooney Hill road, including both branches of the Y at its connections with Cooney Hill road and State road. 15. Road known as Cooney Hill road, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the State road about 900 feet north from the junction of the second described road under No. 13 and running in an easterly direction to the westerly side of substituted new Road A. Length, 0.25 mile.

16. Road known as Lake street, situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point in Post road and running in a westerly direction and then in a southwesterly direction to a point which is the beginning of substituted new Road T. Length, 0.52 mile.

17. Road known as Post road, situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point near its junction with Lake street, the end of substituted new Road T, and running in a southwesterly direction to a point at the beginning of substituted new Road V. Length, 0.3 mile.

18. Crossroad leading to Purchase, connecting Lake street with Post road, situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point in Lake street and running in a southerly direction to the beginning of substituted new Road X. Length, 0.2 mile.

19. Four portions of a road known as Pleasantville road, situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant and North Castle, described as follows:

First Portion—Beginning at the westerly end of substituted new Road P and running in a southeasterly direction and thence in a north-easterly direction to the easterly end of substituted new Road P.

Second Portion—Beginning at the southerly end of substituted new Road Q and running in an easterly direction, crossing the Bronx River, to the westerly side of a branch of a road from Pleasantville and Chappaqua.

Third Portion—Beginning at a point in the northerly end of substituted new Road R and running in a southeasterly direction, crossing substituted new Road R to a point in the taking line.

Fourth Portion—Beginning at the westerly side of road described under Parcel Z5, running in a southerly and then a southwesterly direction to the westerly line of Parcel Z5. Length, 0.86 mile.

20. Road known as King street, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at an angle in the State road about 500 feet southerly of Bear Gutter Creek, running in a southeasterly direction across substituted new Road A to the northerly side of the road to Armonk, and beginning again on the southerly side of the road to Armonk and running in a southerly direction to the easterly side of Parcel Z3 and the taking line. Also parcel on the southerly side of Parcel Z2, beginning at the taking line and extending in a southerly and then an easterly direction to the southerly side of King street, as relocated. Length, 0.34 mile.

21. Road known as Armonk road, situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the State road and running in an easterly direction to the westerly bounds of substituted new Road A. Length, 0.17 mile.

22. Crossroad (south of Pleasantville road), situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant and North Castle, beginning at the westerly end of said road at its intersection with the Pleasantville road and at the westerly boundary of the property of The City of New York and running thence in a southeasterly direction, crossing the Bronx River to a point in the State road where the State road crosses substituted new Road A. Length, 1.37 miles.

The real estate proposed to be substituted as public highways in place of the real estate now used for highway purposes, to be discontinued, is situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant, Harrison and North Castle, and is shown and designated on the above entitled map filed in the office of the Register of Westchester County on the 7th day of October, 1913, as aforesaid, as Parcels A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, P, Q, R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y.

Z1, Z2, Z3, Z4, Z5, Z6, Z7, Z8, Z9, Z10, Z11 and Z12, and is more particularly described as follows:

A.

Route A is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in Broadway about 400 feet north of the southerly end of property of The City of New York and running in a northeasterly direction, passing the easterly end of Route G, connecting with Parcels Z3 and Z4 and the road to Armonk; thence in a northwesterly direction, crossing Bear Gutter Creek and connecting with Parcel Z5; and thence in a northeasterly direction about 1,000 feet to a point in the State road. Being 60 feet in width and 4.54 miles in length.

B.

Route B is situated in the Towns of North Castle and Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in the North Castle road at the taking line and running in a southeasterly direction to a point in Broadway. Being 60 feet in width and 0.32 miles in length.

C.

Route C is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in Route G and running on a curve in a westerly direction; thence in southerly, easterly and westerly directions to a point in Route B near its point of beginning. Being 50 feet in width and 0.44 miles in length.

D.

Route D is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, a short connecting road beginning at a point in Route C and running on a curve to a point in Route B. Being 50 feet in width and 0.05 miles in length.

E.

Route E is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in Route G about 332 feet westerly from the centre of Route A and running in a southerly direction to a point about 300 feet northwesterly from the end of Route B. Being 50 feet in width and 0.40 miles in length.

F.

Route F is situated in the Town of North Castle, a short connecting road beginning at a point in Route E and running on a curve to a point in Route B. Being 50 feet in width and 0.03 miles in length.

G.

Route G is situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant and North Castle, beginning at the end of Route H and running in a southerly direction, connecting with Routes I and C; thence on a curve to the left to the westerly end of the Kensico Dam, crossing said dam and continuing in an easterly direction, passing the end of Route E to a point in Route A. Being 0.68 mile in length and 50 feet in width except that portion which crosses Kensico Dam, which portion is 22 feet in width.

H.

Route H is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in the taking line on Columbus avenue and running in a southeasterly direction, crossing Route M, connecting with Routes N, K and L, to the beginning of Route G and the junction of Route J. Being 0.99 miles in length and 50 feet in width, except that portion lying between Columbus avenue and Route M, which portion is 25 feet in width.

I.

Route I is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point near the junction of Routes J and G and running in a southerly direction to a point near the beginning of Route C. Being 50 feet in width and 0.12 miles in length.

J.

Route J is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, a short connecting road beginning at the end of Route H and running to the taking line at the northerly end of Kensico avenue. Being 50 feet in width and 0.05 miles in length.

K.

Route K is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in Route H and running in a southerly direction to the taking line at the northerly end of Prospect avenue. Being 50 feet in width and 0.05 miles in length.

L.

Route L is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, a short connecting road beginning at a point in Route H and running on a curve to a point in Route K in the taking line at the northerly end of Prospect avenue. Being 50 feet in width and 0.04 miles in length.

M.

Route M is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in Columbus avenue and running in an easterly direction, crossing Route H to Route N. Being 50 feet in width and 0.23 miles in length.

N.

Route N is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point in the taking line at the westerly end of Rutledge street and running in westerly and southerly directions, passing the easterly end of Route M to a point in Route H. Being 50 feet in width and 0.61 miles in length.

P.

Route P is situated in the Town of Mount Pleasant, beginning at a point near the sharp turn in the Pleasantville road and running on a curve to a point in Route K in the taking line at the northerly end of Prospect avenue. Being 50 feet in width and 0.15 miles in length.

Q.

Route Q is situated in the Towns of Mount Pleasant and North Castle, beginning at a point in the Pleasantville road about 150 feet east-erly from a corner in the taking line and running in a northerly direction, crossing the Bronx River; thence in an easterly direction to a point in the road from Pleasantville and Chappaqua. Being 50 feet in width and 0.36 miles in length.

R.

Route R is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the road from Pleasantville and Chappaqua about 200 feet north of its junction with the Pleasantville road and running in a southerly direction to another point in the Pleasantville road at the northerly end of Parcel Z7. Being 60 feet in width and 0.39 miles in length.

S.

Route S is situated in the Town of North Castle and is a short cut-off road in Cooney Hill road opposite the Y at the easterly end of Middle Section road. Being 50 feet in width and 0.07 miles in length.

T.

Route T is situated in the Town of Harrison, beginning at a point in Lake street about 200 feet northerly from the taking line and running in an easterly direction, touching Routes U, V, W and X, and thence in a northeasterly direction to a point in the road leading to King street. Being 50 feet in width and 0.05 miles in length.

U.

Route U is situated in the Town of Harrison and is a short connecting road beginning in Route T and running on a curve to Route V. Being 50 feet in width and 0.03 miles in length.

V.

Route V is situated in the Town of Harrison and is a short connecting road between Route T and Post road leading to White Plains. Being 50 feet in width and 0.07 miles in length.

W.

Route W is situated in the Town of Harrison and is a short connecting road beginning in Route T and running to a point in the taking line.

line on the road to Purchase. Being 50 feet in width and 0.03 miles in length.

X.

Route X is situated in the Town of Harrison and is a short connecting road beginning in Route T and running to a point in the taking line on the road to Purchase. Being 50 feet in width and 0.04 miles in length.

Y.

Route Y is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in Broadway and running in an easterly direction, crossing Route A to a point in the taking line. Being 50 feet in width and 0.07 miles in length.

Z.

Route Z1 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in King street where said street crosses the New York-Connecticut state line and running in a southeasterly direction along said state line to a point in the taking line. Being 50 feet in width and 0.30 miles in length.

Z1.

Route Z2 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in King street just east of the old line of King street and running in a southeasterly direction to King street. Being 50 feet in width and 0.09 miles in length.

Z2.

Route Z3 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the taking line just east of the old line of King street and running in a southerly direction to Armonk and running A across the road to Armonk and running thence in a southerly direction to a point in King street; also including a Y branch connecting with Route A. Being 50 feet in width and 0.16 miles in length.

Z4.

Route Z4 is situated in the Town of North Castle and is a triangular piece of land just east of Route A where Route A crosses the road to Armonk.

Z5.

Route Z5 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at the turn in Route A just north of Bear Gutter Creek and running in a southerly direction to Pleasantville road. Being 50 feet in width and 0.19 miles in length.

Z6.

Route Z6 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning on the other side of Pleasantville road opposite the northerly end of Parcel Z5 and running in a northerly direction to another point in Pleasantville road. Being 50 feet in width and 0.20 miles in length.

Z7.

Route Z7 is situated in the Town of North Castle, beginning at a point in the Pleasantville road about 800 feet north of the northerly end of Parcel Z6 and running in a northerly direction to the centre of Pleasantville road. Being 50 feet in width and 0.07 miles in length.

Z8, Z9, Z10, Z11 and Z12.

Routes Z8, Z9, Z10, Z11 and Z12 are situated in the Town of North Castle and are small strips of land on the side of the road from Pleasantville and Chappaqua north of its junction with the Pleasantville road.

Reference is hereby made to the said map filed as aforesaid in the office of the Register of the County of Westchester for a more detailed description of the real estate to be taken or affected.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall be deemed a breach of the above conditions of sale.
