Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on September 21, 1914, a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan suggesting that the Board recommend to the Board of Aldermen the naming and numbering of the new portion of Seventh Avenue between Greenwich Avenue on the north and its intersections with Varick Street on the south, was referred to the Committee

Numerous requests for the naming and numbering of this new street have been presented to the President of the Borough of Manhattan. These requests are practically unanimous in the suggestion that the name be "Seventh Avenue" or "Seventh Avenue South." This name to apply also to Varick Street as widened, and that the present name of Varick Street be abandoned. The Committee has considered this question carefully and believes that whatever name be given to the new street, the necessity for renumbering Seventh Avenue for its entire length should be avoided. This could be done either by retaining the name of Varick Street between its new southerly terminus at West Broadway and Greenwich Avenue, or by giving this new and widened street the name of "Seventh Avenue South," as has been suggested.

The strong preference of those who have addressed communications to the Borough President for the name of "Seventh Avenue" or "Seventh Avenue South," has been conclusive with the Committee. Varick Street formerly ended at Franklin Street, but has now been extended southwardly to West Broadway. This extension, however, is very short and consists in prolonging southwardly the westerly line of Varick Street, leaving an open triangular space at its junction with West Broadway. The new frontage thus created could properly be considered a part of the last named street, and numbers could be assigned to it corresponding with those formerly existing on the west side of West Broadway. It follows that the old numbering of Varick Street need not be disturbed, but that the same numbers could be used, although the street is designated "Seventh Avenue South."

While the Board of Aldermen is the statutory authority having control of street names and street numbering, this Seventh Avenue and Varick Street improvement was initiated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it seems proper therefore that the Board should make its recommendation to the Board of Aldermen; and we submit herewith for consideration by the Board a resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen the naming of this new street "Seventh Avenue South," and assignment to it of numbers extending from the northerly side of Franklin Street to

In view of these facts the Fire Commissioner does not want to dismiss him, but desires to inflict punishment on him by reducing his salary

\$500 per annum. The requested grade of position at \$1,000 per annum is not in accordance with the standard list of rates adopted heretofore by your Board. The appropriate rate would be \$1,050 per annum."

Gentlemen—On October 1, 1914, the Fire Commissioner requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grade of position of Deputy Chief, at \$3,000 per annum, for one (1) incumbent. The request was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades on October 9, 1914. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

The purpose of the request is to provide for an additional Deputy Chief in the Bureau of Fire Prevention. There is at present one Deputy Chief, at \$4,000 per annum. This Deputy is assigned to the Brooklyn and Queens Division. The scope of the work of the Bureau of Fire Prevention is so extensive it is impossible for all matters to be personally considered by the Chief of the Bureau. The appointment of a Deputy for the main office of the Bureau to take charge of the routine work would expedite the disposition of the many important problems which confront the Bureau. No increase in appropriation is involved, as the \$3,000 necessary will be provided by

eliminating a vacant position of Deputy Chief Inspector at that rate."

In view of the foregoing we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution

Hon. George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, City: Sir-We would respectfully request that authority be given this Department to purchase, without public letting, one automobile hearse to be used in connection with the burial of unclaimed dead for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, at a price not exceeding the sum of \$2,500.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$2,500 for the purpose of purchasing this hearse by a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen at its meeting on October 13, 1914, upon my request to the Board, dated August 28th. Permission to make the purchase without public letting was included in my original request; but I am today informed that it is necessary to make that particular the subject of a further letter. I am, therefore, repeating the request herein, and I should be glad if the necessary permission might be granted at the next meeting, as it is very desirabel to purchase the hearse and establish this service at the earliest possible

This Department has been notified by the State authorities to change its present arrangements and discontinue burial of these bodies in Potter's Field, Brooklyn, at once, as set forth in my letter of August 28th; so that on the present occasion the advantages of speed are added to those of cheapness in support of the private purchase, which, I understand, is favored by the unanimous experience of City department, and all the reasons which have customarily influenced the Committee on Public Letting to grant the desired permission in the case of automobile vehicles.

President of the Borough of Manhattan-Request for Rescindment of a Corporate Stock Issue, \$25,000, for the Construction of a Mezzanine Floor, Etc., in Washington Market.

City of New York, President of the Borough of Manhattan, Municipal Building, September 29, 1914. Hon. George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir-On June 19, 1914, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$25,000, to provide means for the construction of a mezzanine floor, stairways, freight elevators, railings and work incidental thereto, in Washington Market, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan. This resolution was concurred in by the Board of Aldermen at its meeting held July 7, 1914, and the resolution received the approval of the Mayor on July 16, 1914.

Pursuant to the authority granted by this resolution, this Department proceeded with the preparation of plans and advertised and received bids for the work. The contract, however, has not been let.

Recently considerable opposition has developed among the standholders in Washington Market to the contemplated improvements. I have made a very careful study of the situation and as a result am convinced that it would be unwise to attempt to carry out the improvements at this time. I, therefore, suggest that the resolution authorizing the corporate stock be rescinded.

Steps have been taken to have the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

No. 99B (G. O. No. 408)

Report of the Committee on Buildings in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance Regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and Other Systems of Piping.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on September 22, 1914 (Minutes, page 370), the annexed ordinance regulating the installation and maintenance in buildings of plumbing, water supply, gas and other systems of piping, respectfully REPURTS:

That, The Substitute Ordinance presented herewith has been prepared to meet so far as possible the criticisms that were brought out at a public hearing held October 8th. In addition to changes made to meet these criticisms, changes were made all through the ordinance in the language in consultation with the Corporation Counsel's office. These verbal changes do not change the substance of the ordinance, but are intended to make the provisions a little clearer and to eliminate unnecessary verbiage. In Section 1, the last paragraph was altered to meet the criticism that as previously

written it would not be clear what was intended by "fifty per cent. of the existing work." Section 4 of the ordinance as previously presented is entirely omitted, as its provisions are found to be sufficiently well covered in the Tenement House and Labor Laws.

Sections 7 and 8 of the previous draft were combined into one and now form Section 6 of the Substitute Ordinance. These provisions were very thoroughly dispractice in handling violation cases for the Bureau of Buildings.

The Committee recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and other Systems of Piping.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: Section 1. Rules: The plumbing and drainage systems, water supply pipes, gas piping, steam or hot water heating or power systems, refrigerating systems and other systems of pipes or apparatus for holding or conveying gases, vapors or fluids hereafter installed and maintained in or upon any building in the City of New York

of buildings; and it shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any such systems, piping or apparatus installed or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of

piping or apparatus installed or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules adopted hereunder.

Said rules, hereafter adopted, and any changes thereof, shall be published in the City Record on eight successive Mondays before they shall become operative.

Nothing herein contained or in the rules adopted hereunder shall require the alteration or reconstruction of any existing work that was lawfully installed, nor prevent repairs or the addition of new fixtures to existing work in conformity with the practice followed in the original installation, provided, however, that when such repairs involve the removal or alteration of more than one-half of the existing work

repairs involve the removal or alteration of more than one-half of the existing work affected by the repairs the rules in force at the time of such repairs shall apply.

Section 2. Shut-off Valves: Every building hereafter erected and also every existing building other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by one or two families and having not more than fifteen sleeping rooms, which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid shall have a conveniently accessible valve or other suitable device fixed to the supply pipes leading into the building at a place outside of the building, so arranged as to allow the supply to be shut off. Such valve or other device shall be so marked as to indicate the contents and purposes of the suuply pipe to which it is attached.

Section 3. Tests of Plumbing: It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any new system of plumbing and drainage hereafter installed in any building before the same has been tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in

any new system of plumbing and drainage nereatter installed in any building before the same has been tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules, to insure the tightness of the system, and until a proper and adequate water supply has been provided.

The superintendent of buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of plumbing and drainage that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are complied with shall issue a certificate to that effect.

Nothing begin contained shall prevent the inspection and test of part of a system. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the inspection and test of part of a system or the issuance of a partial certificate, nor prevent the use of such part of a larger system provided that such part constitutes by itself a complete system properly tested

and supplied with water.

Section 4. Tests of Gas Piping: It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any new system or an extension of an old system of gas piping in any building before the same has been inspected and tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules, to insure the tightness of the system. The superintendent of buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of gas piping that is ready for such exhibition and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are complied with, shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of existing systems of gas piping without further inspections. tion of test unless said superintendent of buildings has reason that defects exist which make the system dangerous to life or property.

Section 5. Registration of Plumbers: Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in the City of New York shall register his name and address at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in the Borough of the said City in which he performs work, under such rules as the said

Bureau may prescribe. No person, corporation or copartnership shall engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing of master plumber in the City of New York unless the name and address of such person and the president, secretary or treasurer of such corporation and each and every member of such copartnership shall have been registered as above provided.

Section 6. Enforcement; Penalties: This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions and the rules adopted thereunder. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance or of the rules adopted thereunder shall subject the owner, lessee or agent of the building or premises where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violation shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said Building Code.

Section 7. Existing Provisions Repealed: Section 141 and that portion of Sec-

tion 89 of the Building Code of the City of New York reading:

"Every building other than a dwelling house hereafter erected, and all factories, hotels, churches, theatres, school-houses and other buildings of a public character now erected in which gas or steam is used for lighting or heating shall have the supply pipes leading from the street mains provided each with a stop-cock placed in the sidewalk at or near the curb, and so arranged as to allow of shutting off at that point,"

-and all rules relating to plumbing or parts thereof in conflict with or so far as inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ORIGINAL. AN ORDINANCE regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and other Systems of Piping.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: Section. 1. The plumbing and drainage systems, water supply pipes, gas piping, steam or hot water heating or power systems, refrigerating systems and other systems of pipes or apparatus for holding or conveying gases, vapors or fluids, hereafter installed and maintained in any building in the City of New York shall conform to such rules and regulations, as may be provided for by law or may be found necessary for the protection of life or property, promulgated by the Superintendents of Buildings or other legally constituted authorities; and it shall be unlawful to use any such systems, piping or apparatus executed or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder.

Said rules and regulations hereafter adopted, and any changes thereof, shall be published in the CITY RECORD on eight successive Mondays before they shall become operative.

Nothing herein contained or in any rule or regulation promulgated hereunder shall require the alteration or reconstruction of any existing work that was lawfully executed, nor prevent repairs or the addition of new fixtures to existing work in conformity with the practice followed in the original installation, provided, however, that when such repairs involve changes to the extent of fifty per cent. of the existing work, or the addition includes any new vertical soil, waste or vent line, or new house drain, the rules and regulations in force at the time of such repairs or addition shall apply.

Section 2. Every building hereafter erected and every existing building other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by one or two families and having not more than fifteen sleeping rooms, which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid shall have the supply pipes leading into the building provided each with a conveniently accessible stopcock or other suitable device, outside of the building, so arranged as to allow of shutting off the supply. Such stopcock or other device shall be so marked or labelled as to clearly indicate the contents and purposes of the supply pipe to which it is attached. purposes of the supply pipe to which it is attached.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful to use any new system of plumbing and drainage in any building before the same has been thoroughly tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules and regulations, to insure the tightness of the entire system, and until a proper and adequate water supply has been provided.

The Superintendent of Buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being recussed with Assistant Corporation Counsel O'Brien, who has had very extensive quested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of plumbing and drainage that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found to be satisfactory and the test requirements are met shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the inspection and test of part of a system or the issuance of a partial certificate, nor prevent the use of such part of a larger system provided that such part constitutes by itself a complete system properly tested and supplied with water.

Section 4. In all buildings, occupied or used by both sexes, separate toilet facili-ties shall be provided for each sex, except where toilet facilities are provided for each separate family or household in residence buildings, or where private toilets are

attached to single rooms or suites of living rooms.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful to use any new system or an extension of an old shall conform to such rules as may be provided for by law or may be found necessary for the protection of life, health or property, and adopted by the superintendent supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with such rules

and regulations as may have been lawfully promulgated to insure the tightness of the system. The Superintendent of Buildings, shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of gas piping that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are met shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of existing systems of gas piping without further inspection or test unless there is reason to believe that defects exist which make the system dangerous to life or property. system dangerous to life or property.

Section 6. Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York shall register his name and address at the office of The Bureau of Buildings in the Borough of the said City in which he performs work, under such rules and regulations as the said Bureau may prescribe.

No person, corporation or copartnership shall engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber in the City of New York, unless the name and address of such person and the president, secretary or treasurer of such corporation and each and every member of such copartnership shall have been registered as above provided tered as above provided.

Section 7. The Superintendent of Buildings shall, each in his own Borough, enforce the provisions of this ordinance and of such rules and regulations made there-under by any lawfully constituted authority, provided, however, that after the com-pletion of any system of piping, apparatus or other work coming under the provisions of this ordinance which, when in use, constitutes a fire hazard the supervision of the same shall devolve upon the Fire Commissioner. same shall devolve upon the Fire Commissioner.

Section 8. This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code and any and every violation of the same or of the rules and regulations lawfully promulgated thereunder shall be subject to the same legal procedure and the same penalties and shall be prosecuted in the same manner as prescribed in the Building Code.

Section 9. Section 141 and that portion of Section 89 of the Building Code of the City of New York reading, "Every building, other than a dwelling-house, hereafter erected, and all factories, hotels, churches, theatres, school-houses and other buildings of a public character now erected in which gas or steam is used for lighting or heating, shall have the supply pipes leading from the street mains provided each with a stop-cock placed in the sidewalk at or near the curb, and so arranged as to allow of shutting off at that point," -and all rules and regulations relating to plumbing or parts thereof and all ordinances in conflict with or so far as inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are

No. 1004. An Ordinance Relating to the Proprietors, Managers, Clerks, Salesmen and Other Mercantile Establishments.

By Alderman Jacobson-AN ORDINANCE relating to the proprietors, managers, clerks, salesmen and other employees of stores, shops and other mercantile establishments. Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Subdivision XVII of Chapter 13 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances

of the City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section, to be section 533-a, to read as follows:

\$533-a. No proprietor, manager, clerk, salesman or employee of any store, shop or other mercantile establishment shall lay hands upon, or otherwise detain or annoy any person upon any street or in any public place with intent to cause such person to enter said store, shop or mercantile establishment or to become a purchaser of goods, wares or merchandise contained therein. Any person who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$10 or by imprisonment for not more than ten days, or by both such fine or imprisonment.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Which was referred to the Committee on Public Thoroughfares.

The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

to law as soon thereafter as oracticable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered untess, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to biders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
