

The report was received, and approved, and the Secretary directed to forward the same to the Sinking Fund Commission without delay.

A letter from Lieutenant-Colonel Camp, commanding Twenty-second Regiment, offering suggestions to the Armory Board, was received, and ordered filed.

A letter from F. Yoran, giving refusal to purchase the plot of ground bounded by Madison and Fourth avenues, Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, until September I, was received, and the Secretary authorized to notify Mr. Yoran of the acceptance of said refusal.

The Secretary was authorized and instructed, as soon as the estimate of the cost of the several armories adopted at this meeting has been filed with the Sinking Fund Commission, to make a proposition to F. H. Corsitt and J. D. Godwin for the purchase of the ground bounded by Ninth avenue and Boulevard, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, twenty-two lots in all; and to F. Yoran for the purchase of the ground bounded by Madison and Fourth avenues, Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, thirty-two lots in all.

All exavations in streets, removals and replacements of pavements or sidewalks, shall be done under and according to the directions of the Commissioner of Public Works. The said Company, in acting under this permission, shall be subject to so much of the provisions of article XLL, of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 as requires that one wire in each route shall be reserved for the use of the police and one for the fire-alarm telegraph, without charge to the City and County of New York. For each street opened and used by the Company, under this permission, for the purpose of laying therein its lines of electrical conductors or pneumatic tubes, it shall pay to the city a sum equal to one cent for each lineal foot of such street occupied.

SIR—There were 756 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 23, 1884, which is an increase of 99, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 63 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending August 16, 1884, was 658, which is 8.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,362,162.
