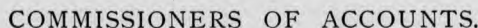

SIR—There were 756 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 23, 1884, which is an increase of 99, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 63 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending August 16, 1884, was 658, which is 8.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.12 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,362,162.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 209. Water from wells in the City of New York shall not be used for drink, in any tenement or lodging house, hotel, manufactory or building in which persons are living or employed, or in which there are offices, restaurant or saloon, except under and pursuant to the conditions of a permit, in writing, from the Health Department.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable jurors, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
