At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held January 12, 1887. Present—Commissioners Matthews and Koch. Absent—Commissioner Stark. On motion, Commissioner Koch was elected President pro tem. The minutes of the meeting held January 10, 1887, were read and approved.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 6139, respecting the application of the Old Colony Steamboat Company for permission to build a platform on land under water in front of the bulkhead owned by private parties, between Murray and Warren streets, North river. Referred to Executive Session.

The following communications were received, read, and On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit : From Thomas Costigan, Supervisor CITY RECORD—Requesting a list of subordinates, etc., in the Department. The President authorized to furnish said list, as requested.

From Comptroller of the City—Returning proposal of John Dunn for repairing Pier at West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, North river, without approval of the sureties, for the reason that James McAlarney has refused to qualify. The President authorized to notify John Dunn to furnish another surety thereto within ten days, in place of James McAlarney, who has failed to make qualify

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Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report. From New York Lighterage and Transfer Company—In reference to and agreeing to pay one-half the cost of replacing fender pile at bulkhead, foot of Seventeenth street, East river, damaged by the steam lighter "Cement Rock." The Engineer-in-Chief directed to replace said fender pile and report the cost thereof.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

From Engineer-in-Chief: Ist. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty. 2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending January 8, 1887. 3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6080, in reference to obstructions at the foot of One Hun-dred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove the said obstruction as recommended in his report. 4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6095, that the bulkhead at inner end of Pier 40, East river, and one-half of the bulkhead easterly of same, is in a dangerous condition and should be taken down and rebuilt from low water mark up at once. The President authorized to notify the lessees of said Pier to commence to make the necessary repairs to the bulkhead thereat, within ten days, in accordance with the terms and conditions of their lease, the work of repairing to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department. 5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6101—Dredging required at foot of East Eighteenth street, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for dredging thereat, as recommended in his report, to the extent of about 1,500 cubic yards. 6th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 5717 and 5877, that he had superintended rebuilding bulkhead between Piers 42 and 43, East river. 7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6134, that he had superintended repairing backing log on the north side of Pier at Eighteenth street, North river. 8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6034, that he had superintended driving piles at Pier north side of Pier at Twelfth street, East river. 9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6034, that he had made requisition for dredging at Pier 46 East river, and supervised the work thereat, which was done by the Union Dredging Co. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6102, reference to repairing bukkhead between Piers 18 and

river,

Report on Secretary's Order No. 6102, reference to repairing bulkhead between Piers 18 and 19, East river.

From John M. Smith, Dock Master—Recommending that a cleat be placed on the backing-piece at bulkhead south of Pier, new 38, North river. The action of Commissioner Koch in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and place a cleat thereat if necessary, was approved.
From Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master—Reporting holes in deck of Pier 7, East river. The action of Commissioner Koch in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, was approved.
From Eugene McCarthy, Dock Master—Reporting that dredging is needed in the slip adjoining bulkhead foot of Fourth street, East river, and in front of the bulkhead north of said street. The action of Commissioner Koch in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.
On motion, the claim submitted by Edward G. Ames, amounting to \$1,200.69, was referred to Commissioner Koch.

Commissioner Koch. On motion, the subject matter respecting the summons and complaint in the suit against John L. and D. S. Riker, for violation of Rule No. 4 of the rules and regulations adopted by the Department, was referred to Commissioner Koch, with power.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending January 11, 1887, amounting to \$27,132.96, was received, and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows :

It shall be the duty of each Dock Master to require and enforce the due observance of and compliance with such of the National and State laws, City ordinances, and the rules, regu-lations and orders of the Department of Docks as appertain to the use, care and custody of the wharf property of and about the City of New York, promptly reporting to the Board all violations and evasions of such laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders. Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of each Dock Master to make and transmit to the Dock Super-

intendent a daily report in writing of all vessels and water-craft that may be moored within the limits of his district, from which wharfage is accruing or may be due to the Corporation of the City of New York, giving a description of each vessel or water-craft, with its name and tonnage, the
