The estimate of the Department of Street Cleaning was taken up for consideration.  
Thomas S. Brennan, Commissioner, appeared and made a statement in explanation thereof.

A communication was received from the Tenth, Eleventh and Seventeenth Wards Taxpayers' Association relative to street cleaning, recommending a contract system, etc.  
Ordered filed.

Present—The Mayor, Comptroller, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.  
Absent—The President of the Board of Aldermen.

The estimate of the Health Department was taken up for consideration.  
Commissioners Wilson and Bryant appeared and made statements in explanation thereof.

The estimate of the Board of Coroners was taken up and considered.

The Comptroller presented the following:

Whereas, The public baths of the city are only open during the summer months, leaving the people for the balance of the year without free bathing facilities; and,

Whereas, The urgent requirements of the public health imperatively demand that the great City of New York should provide perennial baths for the poor and needy among the population; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to appropriate the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, and place the said fund at the disposal of the Commissioner of Public Works, to be used for the establishment of one or more perennial free baths, constructed on the plan of the "People's Bath" now being maintained by the Society for the Improvement of the Condition of the Poor, in Centre Market Place; the Commissioner of Public Works to use his own discretion in the location of the baths and whether it is advisable to use city property or purchase property for the purpose aforementioned.

Which was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works to report upon previous to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1892.

On motion, the Board adjourned to meet to-morrow at 11 o'clock A. M.

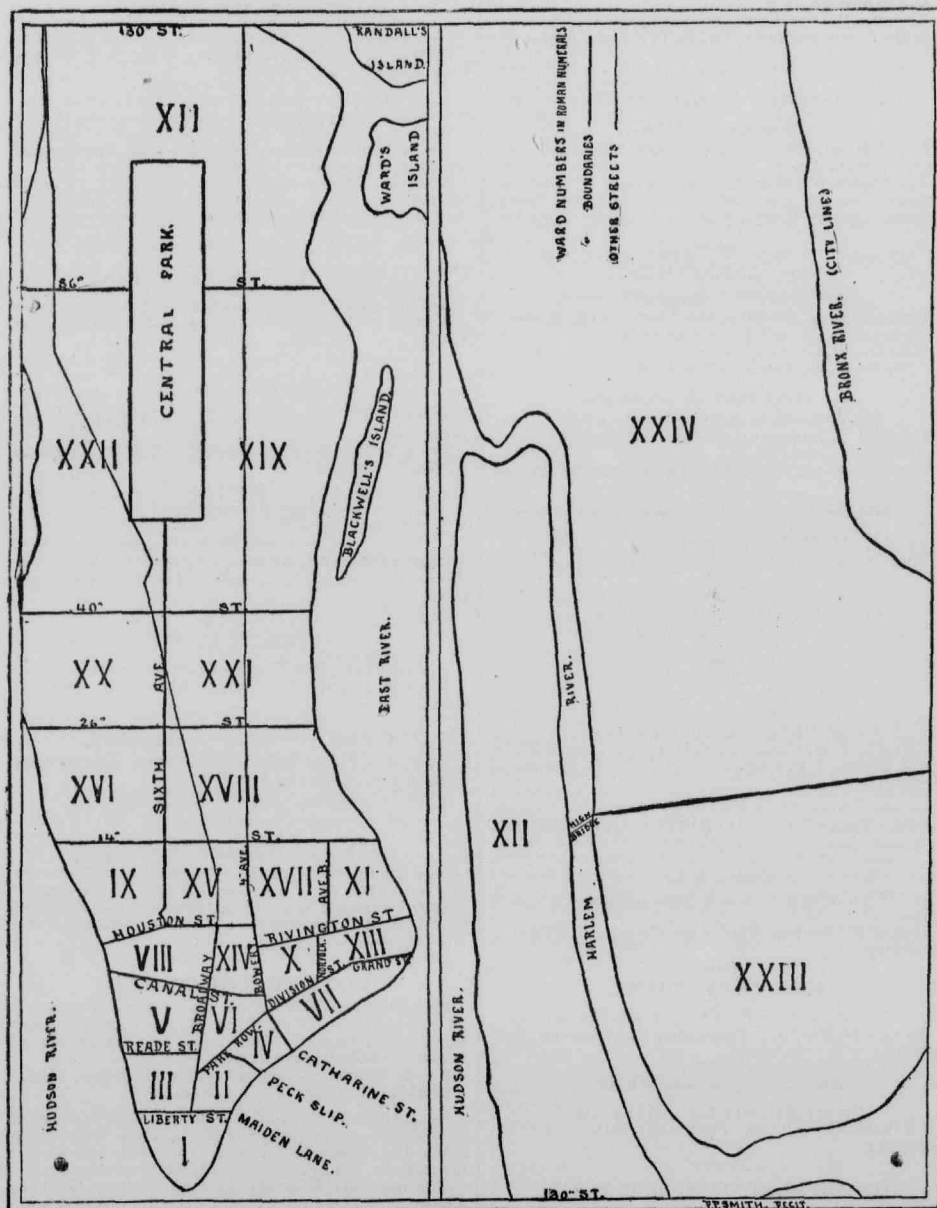

The 747 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.98, against 22.23 for the previous week and 19.59 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 79, 37, 73 and 55, against 78, 27, 61 and 52 for the previous week. Diphtheria increased between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, Third Avenue and Avenue B, between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, East and West, and above Eighty-sixth street, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere. Measles increased markedly south of Rivington street, east of the Bowery, generally decreasing elsewhere. Scarlet fever increased between Canal and Fourteenth streets, east of Broadway, between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, East, and between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, varying little or decreasing elsewhere. 32 of the 55 cases of typhoid fever were between Twenty-sixth and Eighty-sixth streets, East and West.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number, of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

So street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
