

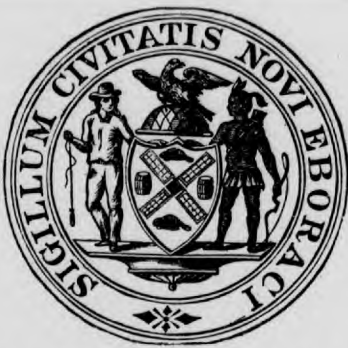

Quarterly Report.

The Secretary presented the Quarterly Report of the Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1879, which was approved and ordered forwarded to his Honor the Mayor.

Resolved, That the plan (259a) for light and ventilation of alteration and addition of tenement house No. 51 Oak street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, Laws 1879, chapter 504, by E. Otto, on condition that light shaft be made 7 feet by 2 feet, and rear hall bedrooms and small rooms in basement have windows opening directly on yard, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 264) for light and ventilation of the proposed tenement house on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, seventy-five feet east of Sixth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws of 1867, chapter 908, and Laws of 1879, chapter 504, by John E. Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 6, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,609, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 721 tenement-houses, 125 private dwellings, 62 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 54 stores and warehouses, 68 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 public sewer, 1 dock, 14 lodging-houses, 1 tripe-boiling establishment, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 3 manure dumps, 26 sunken and vacant lots, 2 pounds, 1 bone house, 1 uninhabitable dwelling, 56 yards, courts and areas, 54 cellars and basements, 98 waste-pipes and drains, 162 privies and water-closets, 25 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 5 cesspools, 2 piggeries, 2 smoky chimneys, 24 other nuisances, together with 64 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 572. During the past week 145 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 105 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

237 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 34 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 30 houses, 30 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,407 privies, 93 yards, 113 cellars, 408 garbage boxes, and 69 miles of street gutters.

One case of contagious disease was removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 482 births, 52 still-births, 131 marriages, and 530 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 6, 1879. This shows a decrease of 100 births and 9 marriages, and an increase of 13 still-births and 38 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 66 births and 43 marriages, and an increase of 3 still-births, while the number of deaths was the same. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased, 1; measles, 2; scarlatina, 4; diphtheria, 6; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 2; inanition, 7; cancer, 9; heart diseases, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; apoplexy, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from croup increased 9; whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; alcoholism, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 18; bronchitis, 6; aneurism, 2; convulsions, 8; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 9; Bright's disease and nephritis, 17; premature and preterm births, 5. The mortality from rheumatism and gout, pneumonia, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, meningitis and encephalitis, and surgical operations was the same as that reported for the preceding week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 184 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 239 under two years; 266 under five years, and 29 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 13 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 50.19 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 74 were in institutions, 297 in tenement houses, 150 in houses containing 3 families or less, 1 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 108 on the first, 165 on the second, 107 on the third, 42 on the fourth, 17 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 528 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents. 57 were stated to be single, 116 married, 50 widowed, and the condition of 307 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 530; still-births, 52; bodies in transitu, 31. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 67 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 482 births, 131 marriages, 52 still-births, 530 deaths, 31 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 33 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 6, 1879, was 71.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.849, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 800, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.13 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 531 deaths and still-births, or 91.24 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 216; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 68; Greenwood (undenominational), 37; Lutheran (undenominational), 81; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 27; Evergreen (undenominational), 36; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 7; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending August 30, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 2; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 24; Eighth, 21; Ninth, 19; Tenth, 22; Eleventh, 22; Twelfth, 44; Thirteenth, 16; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 33; Eighteenth, 26; Nineteenth, 87; Twentieth, 36; Twenty-first, 29; Twenty-second, 47; Twenty-third, 13; Twenty-fourth, 8.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 30, 1879, was 518; this is 35 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 61 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.49 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,099,920.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 18.40; Brooklyn, 22.63; St. Louis, 13; Baltimore, 20.10; Boston, 17.96; Cincinnati, 13.97; New Orleans, 20.06; San Francisco, 13.13; Richmond, 19.50; Charleston, 28.28; Dayton, 5.62; Erie, 16.71; Lowell, 18.58; Worcester, 22.84; Cambridge, 25.03; Fall River, 25.80; Lawrence, 25.94; Lynn, 23.01; Springfield, 19.86. Monthly returns—Providence, 20.13; New Haven, 17.4; Lansing, 14.14; Yonkers, 15.60; Salt Lake, 22.15; Chattanooga, 31; Plattsburgh, N. Y., 22.67.
