STATION-HOUSES.

The Inspectors of Police, in their reports at the close of the year, stated the condition of Station-houses and surroundings to be as follows:

First Precinct—Sanitary condition good. Front street and Old Slip, upon which the house faces, should be paved with asphalt pavement, because of the great noise made by ash carts passing to and from the public dump at foot of Old Slip during the night. The house requires painting inside and outside. The cope stones need resetting to prevent leaks in heavy rain storms. The iron screens should be repaired and newly fastened. It would be desirable to construct a partition on the top floor in order to separate the Roundsmen from the Patrolmen.

Second Precinct—Sanitary condition bad. The house requires painting inside.

Third Precinct (City Hall)—Premises not under direct control of this Department.

Fourth Precinct—Sanitary condition good, except that a small water-closet on the office floor should be disconnected and no longer used. The house should be painted and calcimined as soon as possible, the outside needing it badly.

Fifth Precinct—There are threatening cracks in the front wall, and the house needs painting throughout.

Sixth Precinct—Sanitary condition fair, Prison and dormitories in good condition. Painting is needed throughout the office floor.

Seventh Precinct—House very old and in bad condition. The Captain's room is unfit for occupation, and has not been used during the past year. It is questionable whether extended repairs would place the house in proper condition for the purposes of the force.

Eighth Precinct—Condition bad. A new house for this Precinct is in course of construction at Nos. 24 and 26 Macdougall street, and will be ready for occupation early in the year 1894.

Ninth Precinct—Condition bad in every particular. Lots Nos. 133, 135 and 137 Charles street have been purchased as a site for a new house, but leases upon the property will somewhat retard efforts to construct the new house at an early date. It is not expected that the proposed work will be finished until sometime in the year 1895.

Tenth Precinct—Sanitary condition good. House needs painting. The Prison wall is settled and cracked, and should be taken down and rebuilt.

Eleventh Precinct—Sanitary condition good, and entire house is excellent and in good repair.

Twelfth Precinct—Bad in every particular. Appropriation has been made for the purchase of a site for a new Station-house, but a suitable location has not yet been secured. Early steps will be taken, however, with a view to securing proper and healthful accommodations for the force of this Precinct.

Thirteenth Precinct—Good in every respect.

Fourteenth Precinct—Sanitary condition good, sleeping quarters fair, but the house is too small for the force required in this populous district.

Fifteenth Precinct—Sanitary condition bad. The roofs of the Prison and Lodging-rooms leak, and the house requires repairs and painting.

Sixteenth Precinct—Sanitary condition bad, dormitories overcrowded, and the house unfit for the proper transaction of Police business.

Seventeenth Precinct—Sanitary condition bad.

Eighteenth Precinct—Sanitary condition good, dormitories roomy and sufficient. House needs painting inside and out.

Nineteenth Precinct—Good in every respect.

Twentieth Precinct—Accommodations sufficient and sanitary condition good. Front and rear walls of house and Prison need painting.

Twenty-first Precinct—Sanitary condition fair, dormitories and other apartments inadequate. The partition dividing the Captain's room should be removed, the Matrons should be assigned the room now occupied by the Roundsmen in the rear of the sitting-room, and the Roundsmen should occupy a room on the third floor. House needs painting inside.

Twenty-second Precinct—House in good condition throughout, and adequate for all Police purposes.

Twenty-third Precinct—Sanitary condition fair, dormitories good and sufficient. The house needs painting inside, and the roof leaks in many places.

Twenty-third Sub-Precinct (Grand Central Depot)—Premises not under control of this Department.

Twenty-fourth Precinct—New house and in good condition. Several cracks in wall and ceiling should be filled. Painting and some small repairs needed.

Twenty-fifth Precinct—Sanitary condition fair, dormitories ample and in order. Some painting required.

Twenty-sixth Precinct—General condition good. A little painting needed.

Twenty-seventh Precinct—Sanitary condition good, dormitories excellent. House needs painting inside and out.

Twenty-eighth Precinct—New house, good in every respect. This house, located on the north side of One Hundred and Fourth street, 100 feet west of Third avenue, was formally declared open by the Board of Police on the 28th day of June, 1893, and the premises set apart for Police purposes. The new precinct for which this house was erected was taken from territory formerly in the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth Precincts, and is bounded as follows: Beginning at Sixth avenue and One Hundred and Sixteenth street, south to One Hundred and Tenth street, east to Fifth avenue, south to Ninety-sixth street, east to East river, to and around Ward's Island by way of Little Hell Gate, and to foot of One Hundred and Sixteenth street; thence westerly to place of beginning.

Twenty-ninth Precinct—Good and ample in all respects.

Thirtieth Precinct—New house, in every particular good.

Thirty-first Precinct—Station small, but in fair condition.

Thirty-second Precinct—First-class in all respects.

Thirty-third Precinct—In good condition, but too small for the force required. Premises near the Station-house have been leased for dormitories.

Thirty-fourth Precinct—Sanitary condition good. House badly in need of painting throughout.

Thirty-fifth Precinct—Sanitary condition good. House recently repaired and painted throughout.

Thirty-sixth Precinct—(See Harbor Police elsewhere noted in this report).

Thirty-seventh Precinct (river fronts)—Has temporary day quarters at Pier "A" and on Pier 41 (old), North river, ample for all necessary purposes.

House of Detention—Sanitary condition good. House needs painting.

BOARD OF SURGEONS.

The following tables show the sick time of the force by Precincts and Squads during the year, together with other results of the labor of the Surgeons of the Department.

The first table shows the time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disabilities and injuries during the year. It will be seen that the time actually lost was 46,861 days—3.40 per cent. of the total days' time of the force.

This is a decrease of 2,212 days sick time, and 0.26 per cent., from the figures for 1892.

The amount paid for sick time lost was \$77,042.33, a decrease of \$3,670.94. The allowances made for sick time lost during the year, by resolution of the Board of Police some time subsequent to recovery, aggregated the sum of \$1,554.81, making the total sum so paid \$78,597.14, a decrease of \$3,348.96.

On examination of the percentages of Precincts as compared with 1892, there will be found many changes in the figures.

The number of deaths above reported is seven in excess of 1892—the increase being in pulmonary troubles. The death rate (about 1.52 per cent.) is remarkably low and proves the great care shown in selecting material for the force as well as the excellent supervision maintained by the Surgeons of the Department.

APPLICANTS FOR APPOINTMENT.

The following table shows the number of applicants for appointment as Patrolmen examined by the Surgeons during the year, the number of re-examinations, and the number examined after appointment and before entering the service. The total number examined in 1892 was 984.

Elsewhere in this report will be found a table of arrests for a series of years, and comments thereon.

The number of arrests in that portion of the city covered by the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts, to which allusion has been made for several years past, was 22,207 during the year, or 25.67 per cent. of the entire number of arrests made. This is a decrease of 1.11 per cent. as compared with the arrests in the same district during 1892. The decrease in the number arrested in this district, as compared with the preceding year, was 424, while the increase in the total arrests was 1,990. These figures show, further, that the arrests in the Fourth Precinct were 2,116 less than in 1892, while the arrests in the three other precincts named were 1,692 greater.

An examination of the figures of arrests in the Fourth Precinct for the four years past will show a strange and unaccountable fluctuation.

In 1890 the number was 4,153; 1891, 9,225; 1892, 6,826, and in 1893, 4,710.

The arrests in the district north of the Harlem river numbered 1,677, an increase of 208 over the preceding year.

Notwithstanding an increase of 1,990 in the total number of arrests, there will be found a decrease of 353 in the number of females arrested.

Gambling.

The tables following, giving the number of arrests for gambling, keeping gambling-house, etc., and the quantities of gambling material (including money) seized, will be found of interest. The figures of 1890 and 1892 are added for purposes of comparison. It will be seen that the number arrested is 108 greater than in 1892, and 196 greater than in 1890. The increase is still greater over the number arrested in 1891, which was 358. The Police force has not in any sense failed to perform its full duty in the suppression of the evil of gambling. The large amount of cash seized is a striking feature of the figures given:

SANITARY COMPANY.

Bureau of Steam Boiler Inspection and Engineers.

The report of this Bureau shows the number of steam-boilers examined, tested hydrostatically, and their condition, together with the number of applicants examined as to their qualifications as engineers to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam-boilers and engines in the City of New York; also the amount of money paid to the Treasurer of the Police Pension Fund, collected from owners of steam-boilers for certificates of inspection, as provided for by chapter 437 of the Laws of 1885.

For the year there have been 7,096 applicants examined for engineers' certificates, to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam-boilers and engines. Each applicant has been examined as to his experience, qualification and knowledge of steam-boilers and engines. Of this number 6,566 passed a satisfactory examination and have been granted certificates, and 530 have been rejected.

Steam Boiler Casualties 1893.

April 12—A horizontal tubular boiler, registered as Boiler No. 5003, in the Elmwood flats, No. 69 West Ninety-third street, used for heating purposes and carrying ten pounds of steam pressure, which exempts it from the supervision of this Department, was considerably damaged by being burned from lack of water, occasioned by the automatic feed being out of order and the ignorance of the janitor as to the proper care of it.

April 13—An upright tubular boiler used as a heater in the hat factory of A. Herr, in rear of No. 75 First avenue, exploded from low water and incompetency of the person in charge of it. Being a heater it was not tested by this Department.

Shortly after 1 o'clock p. m., November 2, the steam boiler known as Boiler No. 1104, situated on the first floor of the feed mill of the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad stables, No. 533 East Fourteenth street, exploded and killed several people, shattered the building, and a section of the boiler was blown across Fourteenth street and crushed in the front wall of a tenement. The boiler is what is known as a “Lowe patent” of the horizontal style, similar to a multitubular cylindrical boiler, except that the bridge wall is built tight up to the bottom sheet with an internal combustion chamber in the front of the boiler, and has a water bottom. The products of combustion pass through two apertures, about the size of an ordinary manhole, into the combustion chamber, then through the horizontal tubes to the flue. It has a dome double riveted to the third or middle sheet, 2 feet in height by 2 feet 4½ inches diameter. The boiler is 18 feet 6 inches long by 4 feet diameter, iron shell ⅝ inch in thickness, tube sheets ⅝ inch, 46 3-inch tubes made of ⅝-inch iron; the longitudinal and transverse seams are single riveted. The boiler was made with 5 sheets, put together with ⅝-inch rivets, having two inch pitch, and was securely and amply braced by 22 two-inch wide by half inch thick iron braces from shell to head.

There are two transverse ruptures—the first is at the seam between the second and third sheets from the front at the rivet holes, and extended all around the boiler except about one foot, where it tore into the third sheet; the second rupture was at the seam between the third and fourth sheets, also at the rivet holes, and extended around the seam for about seven feet, then tore into the third sheet about five feet. The ragged parts of the third sheet were carried away with the dome.

The front part of the boiler, which was blown across the street, has a deep indentation on the under sheet of the water bottom, caused probably by striking against some hard substance of an irregular surface. In the centre of this concave pocket is a ridge bulged outward, and the bend is at an angle of forty-five degrees; it has neither a crack or flaw, which is evidence of the material being good, and it is not possible that a boiler plate, long in use as this has been, could be bent to such an acute angle while cold, consequently the only conclusion to be reached is, that the boiler was extremely hot and very low water in it.

The final conclusion reached as to the actual cause of the explosion is that the water was dangerously low, the safety valve not working, and an excessive pressure upon the boiler, and as the explosion occurred just at the moment the engineer opened the throttle valve to start the mill

in operation, that action drew the water that was in the boiler up and upon the overheated tubes and shell, giving a sudden and extraordinary increase of pressure, which the boiler could not withstand. The complete destruction of this boiler and the force necessary to carry a large section of it the distance this was taken, is another evidence of the extraordinary pressure which must have been in the boiler at the time of the explosion.

History of the Boiler.

This boiler was built in Bridgeport, Conn., in 1883, and was set up in this mill in April of that year, taking the place of a horizontal tubular boiler.

It was first tested by Warren Harrington, Boiler Inspector of this Department, on April 22, 1883, and was subsequently tested upon the following dates: April 22, 1884; April 22, 1885; April 22, 1886; April 22, 1887; April 20, 1888; April 20, 1889; April 22, 1890; April 22, 1891; April 22, 1892, and April 24, 1893.

It was subjected at each test to a hydrostatic pressure of 135 pounds to the square inch, and a steam or working pressure of 90 pounds allowed, and it was occasionally subjected to an internal inspection and test, when deemed necessary.

Record of the Engineer.

James Armstrong, the engineer in charge of the boiler and who was killed at the explosion, was first examined as to his competency and qualifications as an engineer on January 3, 1883, he previously having had three and a quarter years' experience as an assistant engineer at the works of the Manhattan Gas Company. He passed a satisfactory examination, and was granted a certificate to operate a two-horse Baxter boiler and engine for C. R. Trumbell, at No. 2 Bleecker street. His subsequent licenses were as follows:

January 30, 1883, for J. & J. O'Brien, at No. 397 Fourth avenue.
July 17, 1883, for A. & A. Johnson, at No. 457 Cherry street.
July 17, 1884, for A. & A. Johnson, at No. 457 Cherry street.
August 25, 1885, for Sweeney's Hotel, at Nos. 74 and 76 Chatham street.
November 10, 1885, for A. & A. Johnson, at No. 457 Cherry street.
October 21, 1886, for Murphy & Costello, at Fifteenth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

August 23, 1887, for A. & A. Johnson, at No. 459 Cherry street.
September 27, 1887, for Thomas Kilpatrick, at No. 1041 Fourth avenue.
January 30, 1888, he went in the employ of the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad Company, and was licensed to operate an upright tubular boiler and engine at the car stables, Nos. 18 to 22 Corlears street, for two days in each week, and, alternately, the boiler at the Fourteenth street plant, where the explosion occurred, and he has renewed his license on January 30 of each year since, the last license issued to him bearing date of January 30, 1893. He was classified as a second grade engineer from the time grades were established in this bureau, viz., 1884.

Inspection of Steam Boilers.

In consideration of the very great number of steam boilers in use in the City of New York, the continual increase of the same, and the number of years many of them have been in operation, the very few accidents occurring is a volume in favor of the legal supervision exercised by this branch of the service. It must be conceded, however, that many of the boilers now in use have become weakened by age, and less able to withstand the continuous pressure of steam required by the owners and allowed by this Department in consequence of the boilers being able to withstand the hydrostatic test provided by law. No allowance can be made under the present statutes for deterioration of metal, incrustation, corrosion, etc., etc., consequent upon long use, effects of bad water and neglect or carelessness on the part of indolent and negligent engineers, the limit of steam pressure required by the owner or user, is the pressure which must be certified to if the boiler will stand the necessary hydrostatic test.

Therefore, it would seem, for the better protection of life and property, that the law should be amended so as to remove any doubt as to the safety and security of the boiler, by providing for an internal as well as an external inspection, when in the opinion of the Boiler Inspector the condition of the boiler under inspection should warrant such examination, such inspection to be followed or preceded in all cases by the hydrostatic test; and the strength and security of the boiler should be determined by a series of calculations upon its various parts, and when the workmanship and material is found to be of good quality, a factor of (5) five should be used to determine the safe working or steam pressure to be allowed; and to enable such an inspection and test to be properly and completely done, provision should be made that such masonry, brick work or other covering to or upon such steam boiler or steam generator should be removed when deemed necessary.

Further provision should be made that would place every steam boiler or steam generator in use within the City of New York under legal supervision.

The competency of persons to operate steam boilers and engines can be determined and certified to, but carelessness and neglect on the part of those licensed to operate them, as well as the proper care of steam plants, cannot be readily discovered without a careful and intelligent inspection of boilers internally and externally.

Many steam users give but little heed or attention to their steam boilers, being apparently satisfied if they are getting all the power necessary to operate their machinery, and boilers are frequently forced to their extreme capacity, and when requisition is made by engineers for repairs, supplies, etc., to keep the boilers in safe and proper condition, they are put off until the annual inspection takes place, when the expense is multiplied because of defects not being remedied when first discovered, and very frequently lives and property are seriously jeopardized by such neglect. When we dwell upon the fact that there are upwards of eight thousand steam boilers in operation in the City of New York, every one a menace to life and property when not properly handled, it would seem to be the duty of the authorities to draw every safeguard around them. Therefore it is suggested that such alterations and amendments be made to the present law that would lessen to a minimum the possibility of casualties of this nature.

TENEMENT-HOUSE SQUAD.

The squad, consisting of one Sergeant, two Roundsmen, and forty-two Patrolmen, is detailed to the service of the Health Department of the city. They are paid by a special annual appropriation, though numbered among the regular uniformed Police force. The following schedule sets forth a portion of the work of this Squad. They are not exempted from the performance of Police duty when required by an emergency. During the year the Squad made 126 arrests, an increase of more than 100 per cent over the preceding year.

HARBOR POLICE.

On the 7th day of June, 1893, a contract was entered into with the Maryland Steel Company to build a steel twin-screw steamer for the use of this Department in harbor service. The contract price was \$52,500. The dimensions of the boat, as provided in the specifications, were: Length over all, 143 feet 6 inches; beam, 23 feet; depth amidships, moulded, 10 feet 6 inches; draught, loaded, 8 feet. The boat is to be lighted throughout by a complete electric system, including side lights and masthead lights. A search light of not less than 4,000 candle power is to be located on the roof of the pilot-house. The boat is to be heated, wherever heat is required, by steam. A powerful Worthington duplex fire-wrecking pump will be fitted in the upper engine-room, and ample fire apparatus will be supplied. The vessel will be propelled by two screws, driven by two separate inverted compound engines.

This valuable acquisition to efficient Harbor Police service will be ready for use early in 1894, and it is believed will prove of immense advantage in the performance of the work required in the protection of our harbor and river front.

The appropriations for 1894 include provision for one new steam launch, an accessory greatly needed.

The number of messages transmitted by telegraph and telephone during 1893, exceeded the number of the preceding year by some 5,591 messages, which is considerable when it is borne in mind that 1892 was a year of unusual activity in the Police Department.

It was during this year that a series of Columbian celebrations took place, which added materially to the business of the Bureau. Notwithstanding this fact there was an increase in the number of messages transmitted in 1893, showing that there is a natural and steady increase in this branch of the service.

TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

The First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Tenth, Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh Precincts, (Pier A and Pier 41, North River), Tombs Police Court, Chambers Street Hospital, Detective Bureau, No. 13 Wall street and the line to Brooklyn Police Headquarters, were connected by telephone with these Headquarters in the most approved manner (viz.: "Underground metallic circuits," "long distance transmitters," "bridging magneto call bells"). In addition to the above Precincts the Ninth and Nineteenth Precincts are in telephone communication with the Central Department. In connection with this system, which has been partly inaugurated during the past year, it would be futile to attempt to give any idea in this report showing to what extent the facilities have been increased for inter-communication between Central Department, Police Station-houses and other places which have been connected. Where the telephones have been introduced, they are considered to be an indispensable feature of the service. The number of connections made daily at the "Switch Board" by means of which Stations are enabled to communicate with one another, the transmission and receiving of telephone messages and the answering of inquiries of all kinds, made by citizens over the general telephone lines, has increased during the year, so as to require the closest attention of two operators, particularly during the day tours of duty.

During the year, nineteen (19) "Blake" transmitters, which have been in use in the Department for several years, were changed, and in their places "long distance transmitters" were substituted; metallic circuits were also substituted for "ground" circuits, giving the Department the most perfect system of telephonic communication known at the present time.

UNDERGROUND WIRING.

It having been finally determined that the Fire and Police Departments would be required to occupy jointly the subway conduits set apart for the City Department wires, the work of placing the Police wires underground, called for under a contract with the Standard Underground Cable Company, was begun; this contract provided wiring for a telegraph and telephone system, connecting the places heretofore mentioned, and the work was completed September 15. Regarding the underground system of wiring the results attained have been most satisfactory, the absence of electrical disturbances incident to stormy weather, "breaks, crosses, grounds, etc.," to which aerial lines are subject, being entirely removed where the wires have been placed underground.

During the year, eighty (80) miles of electrical conductors for the Police Telegraph and Telephone systems were placed underground, principally below Houston street; the work is being pushed as rapidly as possible in the upper portion of the city.

AERIAL WIRES.

Fifteen (15) miles of aerial wires were transferred from pole lines to places designated by the Board of Electrical Control, so as to allow the removal of poles.

SIGNAL-BOX SYSTEM.

The signal-box system which is in operation in the Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Precincts, has worked satisfactorily. The following will show the number of boxes in each Precinct, and the number of signals transmitted:

The above table shows an increase of over ten thousand (10,000) signals during the year, which can be attributed to two (2) causes: an increase in the population in these Precincts and to the increase of the force. Regarding an extension of the signal system so as to include the entire city, it is not necessary to make any comment at this time. In the Annual Report of this Department the subject has been fully treated.

EXCHANGES, BANKS, ETC.

The various exchanges, banks, institutions and other buildings, numbering 35, connected with these Headquarters, and with the several Police Stations, have given entire satisfaction; during the past year two (2) were added to the above number. The Federal Bank with the Twenty-first Precinct, and Lenox Library with the Twenty-fifth Precinct.

Where the improvements above mentioned have been introduced, the service has been most highly commended by those best qualified to judge—the officers of the Department, under whose observation they are constantly, and who are required to make use of them daily. During this year this improved service will be extended to as many of the other Precincts as the funds appropriated for the purpose will allow.

The fines amounted to \$15,664.65, which sum was paid into the Police Pension Fund, pursuant to law. The above figures show a very marked increase in every particular over 1892. The number of fines were 1,091 greater; the number of days' fine inflicted as punishment was 1,391½ greater, and the amount deducted as fines was \$4,631 more. It will be noticed, moreover, that the number of reprimands and complaints dismissed was very many less than for the preceding year. The decrease in the number of complaints dismissed and increase in number of fines, as compared with 1892, is accounted for by the fact that, in consequence of the onerous duties of the Police during the Columbian Celebration of 1892, the admirable manner in which the force conducted itself on that occasion, and the general commendation received, the Board of Police, on recommendation of the Superintendent, dismissed all pending complaints involving a penalty of five days' pay or less. The fact that the great increase in complaints made is confined entirely to neglect of duty and violation of rules, and that, notwithstanding the increase of force, the more grave offenses have not increased, is excellent evidence that the supervising officers of the Department are earnest and active in the discharge of their duties.

The above figures show that the number of pawn shops and liquor saloons (licensed) is steadily increasing, and the number of cheap lodgings furnished somewhat greater than in 1892. The number lodged in the cheap dormitories in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts was 2,485,652, a decrease of 223,772 from the preceding year. Adding the station-house lodgings (127,503), to total above given for the year, we find a grand total of 4,351,642, an average of 11,922 persons per night, an increase much less than might have been expected in a period of great business depression.

From the above figures it will be seen that the receipts of the Pension Fund (including balance on hand) for the year 1893 were \$98,526.69 greater than that for the year 1892, and the disbursements \$53,987.94 greater, and the amount of cash on hand \$44,538.75 greater. The number of members of the force retired during the year was two less than in the preceding year, and the aggregate amount to be paid these retired officers is \$10,700 less. The pensions granted to widows and orphans in 1892 amounted to \$8,160, and in 1893, the amount granted was \$6,900, a decrease of \$1,260.

In the report for 1892, the sources of income of the Pension Fund were fully set forth and explained.

For the year 1893 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated the sum of \$50,000 to account of the Pension Fund to cover a probable deficiency. That amount is still in the City Treasury, no part of it having been necessary to meet the demands upon the fund. Under the provisions of chapter 529, Laws of 1893, two per cent. was deducted from the monthly salary or compensation of members of the force. This act went into effect on the 1st day of June, 1893, and the amount deducted for the remainder of the year and paid into the Pension Fund was \$61,898.61. For this reason the sum appropriated by the said Board was not needed. It is believed that the deduction made, pursuant to the law stated, together with other sources of income, will suffice for the payment of pensions for many years to come and that extraordinary efforts to maintain the fund will not be required.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The appropriations for 1893 and 1894, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the purposes of conducting the business of the Police Department, are given so that information can be had at a moment's notice by all interested in the matter. Salaries are paid monthly to the members of the force at the following rates per annum, subject to deduction for lost time by reason of sickness, absence, with or without leave, and fines :

BUREAU OF ELECTIONS.

The following schedules show some portion of the work performed by the Bureau of Elections during the year:

The number of Election Districts in the city in 1893 was 1,142, an increase of five over the preceding year. The same number of election officers in each Election District were appointed, no change in the law having been made in this particular. The number of Inspectors, Poll Clerks and Ballot Clerks who resigned, were removed or failed to qualify was considerably less than in 1892. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assess-

ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

The nature and extent of the improvement hereby intended is the acquisition of title in the name and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York for the use of the public, to all the lands and premises, with the buildings thereon and the appurtenances thereto belonging, required for the opening of a certain street or avenue, known as St. Mary's street, from St. Ann's avenue to Southern Boulevard, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, being the following-described lots, pieces or parcels of land, viz.:

Beginning at a point on the eastern line of St. Ann's avenue, distant 588.97 feet northerly from the intersection of the eastern line of St. Ann's avenue with the northern line of East One Hundred and Forty-first street.

1st. Thence northerly along the eastern line of St. Ann's avenue for 51.38 feet to the southern line of St. Mary's Park.

2d. Thence easterly along the southern line of St. Mary's Park for 173.91 feet to the western line of Crimmins avenue.

3d. Thence southerly along the western line of Crimmins avenue for 61.38 feet.

4th. Thence westerly for 173.91 feet to the point of beginning.

PARCEL "A."

Beginning at a point in the western line of Beekman avenue, distant 629.67 feet northerly from the intersection of the western line of Beekman avenue with the northern line of East One Hundred and Forty-first street.

1st. Thence northerly along the western line of Beekman avenue for 94.30 feet to the southern line of St. Mary's Park.

2d. Thence westerly along the southern line of St. Mary's Park for 304.15 feet to the eastern line of Crimmins avenue.

3d. Thence southerly along the eastern line of Crimmins avenue for 61.38 feet.

4th. Thence easterly, deflecting 102 degrees 10 minutes 00 seconds to the left, for 169.01 feet.

5th. Thence easterly, curving to the right on the arc of a circle tangent to the preceding course, whose radius is 77.05 feet for 84.27 feet.

6th. Thence easterly for 70.97 feet to the point of beginning.

PARCEL "B."

Beginning at a point in the eastern line of Beekman avenue, distant 594.70 feet northerly from the intersection of the eastern line of Beekman avenue with the northern line of East One Hundred and Forty-first street.

1st. Thence northerly along the eastern line of Beekman avenue for 63.71 feet to the southern line of St. Mary's Park.

2d. Thence easterly along the southern line of St. Mary's Park for 789.86 feet.

3d. Thence easterly, deflecting 6 degrees 27 minutes 49 seconds to the left, for 734.80 feet to the western line of Southern Boulevard.

4th. Thence southerly along the western line of Southern Boulevard for 60 feet.

5th. Thence westerly, deflecting 90 degrees 17 minutes to the right, for 742.08 feet.

6th. Thence westerly, deflecting 6 degrees
