Hon. J. EDWARD SWANSTROM, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Borough Hall, Borough of Brooklyn, New York City:

Sir—There is a proceeding now pending in the Bureau of Street Opening, in the Law Department, Borough of Brooklyn, for the opening of Remsen avenue, from Utica avenue to Canarsie Bay Park, in said borough. This proceeding was authorized by resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted the 17th day of May, 1899, and thereafter Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were appointed, pursuant to said resolution, on the 10th day of February, 1900.

On May 4, 1900, an act was passed entitled "An Act providing for the opening, laying out and improving of Remsen avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York," being Chapter 765 of the Laws of 1900. A copy of this act so far as it relates to the steps required to initiate proceedings to open Remsen avenue is enclosed herewith.

This being a special act relating to a special object, its provisions, so far as they differ from the Charter, undoubtedly supersede that statute, and the proceedings already taken under the Charter must fall.

I would advise that a resolution be presented to the proper Local Board rescinding the resolution of May 17, 1899, and that new proceedings be commenced as required by Chapter 765 of the Laws of 1900.

An Act providing for the opening, laying out and improving of Remsen avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York.

Passed without the acceptance of the city. Became a law, May 4, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York is hereby authorized and directed upon the petition of the Local Board of Improvements having jurisdiction of the opening and improvement hereinafter provided for, "to lay out, open and improve as a public street, Remsen avenue, as the same is laid out on the Commissioners' map of the late City of Brooklyn, and on the town Survey Commissioners' map of the County of Kings, as the same have been altered by the late Common Council of the said City of Brooklyn, commencing at a point at the intersection of Utica and East New York avenues, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, and extending in a southeasterly direction through Thirty-second Ward to Canarsie Park."

Section 2. Whenever the said Board shall determine by and with the consent aforesaid to act under the powers hereby conferred upon it with regard to said work, it shall cause a map or maps to be made showing the proposed improvement, and shall file said map or maps, duly certified by it, in the Office of the Register of the County of Kings and of the County Clerk of said county, and shall also cause a copy of said map or maps of such improvement to be filed in the Department of Highways, the Board of Public Improvements and in the Office of the Comptroller, as well as in the Office of the Tax Commissioners of New York, and thereupon said street or avenue shall be deemed to be laid out in conformity with said maps.

Section 3. The said Board or Department shall have the power to acquire the title in fee of the land within the lines of the street or avenue laid out, as provided in the preceding section, on behalf of the City of New York, and all proceedings in relation thereto shall be conducted by or under the charge of the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York.

Section 4. The proceedings to acquire the title in fee to the lands taken as herein provided shall be the same as those prescribed by law in the matter of opening streets in the City of New York, except that the Department of Highways, by the officer at the head of such department, shall make application in the name of the City of New York to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, in the Second Judicial Department, for the appointment of three Commissioners of Appraisal to ascertain and appraise the compensation to be made the owners of or persons interested in the real estate or improvements within the lines of said street or avenue laid out as provided by this act, and upon the confirmation of the report of said Commissioners the title to the lands taken for the said Remsen avenue improvement shall vest in the City of New York, as provided for in Section 6 of this act.

Meeting called to order at 3 p. m.

Minutes of meeting of the 9th instant read, and, on motion, approved.

Appeal No. 347, Alteration No. 1711 of 1902, No. 40 East Ninth street, Manhattan, Mr. Oscar Lowinson, architect and appellant.

Permission to build the extension in the rear to within 6 feet 2 1/4 inches from the rear of the lot. The extension is two stories and basement in height. The second floor is to be used as a dwelling for the lessee of the building. The remainder of the building is to be used for business purposes. The extension of the building to the east of this one, No. 42 East Ninth street, is built out to the line that it is desired to erect this one. It is of the same height. The extension was completed within the past year. The same is true of several like extensions erected on the same street during the past few years. Under these circumstances it appears to your petitioner that it would depreciate the value of the property and its producing capacity below that of its neighbors who were more fortunate in not having this objection brought against them. Also little will be gained in extra light as there is ample light and air now to the rear, and the projecting extension to the east would cast a shadow during the forenoon.

Mr. Oscar Lowinson appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 348, New Building No. 309 of 1902, south side of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, about 200 feet from Courtlandt avenue, The Bronx, Mr. Alexander Stevens, architect and appellant.

I respectfully request that the objection in reference to the thickness of walls be waived for the following reasons:

The main walls of engine-house are very slightly in excess of the limit and are to be laid up in cement mortar mixed one and two.

The walls at front where higher than the others, extend but a short distance and are well braced by roof.

The building above first floor carries no greater weight than an ordinary dwelling. The small feed house in the rear, where walls are shown to be 8 inches, is practically a separate building, and if considered as such would come within the regulations.

In the past permission has always been given to make three-story engine houses with 12-inch walls and the detached one story in the rear with 8-inch walls.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 349, New Building No. 553 of 1902, southeast corner Boston road and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, The Bronx, Bronx Architectural Company, architects and appellants.

I desire to omit brickwork between the columns in clerestory and construct the same of corrugated sheet iron secured to steel frame work.

2. "Floor construction must conform to section 106 of the Code as to arches between beams."

I desire to omit arches and to form the floors of cast iron or rolled steel plates 5-16 inch thick.

3, 4 and 5. "All interior columns must be fireproofed, as required by section 107 of the Code."

"Steel columns supporting wall at old retort house must be fireproofed. Section 107 of the Code."

"Cast-iron columns supporting walls must be double or fireproofed. Section 113 of Code."

I desire to omit fireproofing from all interior columns, owing to the nature of the general construction, which makes it more advantageous to have the columns uncovered.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
