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ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT.

The death of the Venerable Pontiff has caused universal sorrow, and justly so, because the world has been deprived of a most accomplished scholar and ecclesiastic, whose profound wisdom was ever effectually directed in the advancement of civilization, true knowledge, and the respect of law and order—essential elements for good citizenship and government. Death has stilled the heart whose sentiments ever were peace and good will unto all mankind, of whatever race or creed. It seems to me proper, therefore, to express the desire in this solemn hour for a brief session of this Board to-day, that we transact only the most important business, and thereafter adopt resolutions expressing our grief at the death of the aged and venerated Pontiff.

The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the stated meeting of July 14, 1903.

On motion of Alderman Wentz further reading was dispensed with, and the minutes were approved as read.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2218.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,

July 21, 1903.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 7, 1903, permitting the Cemetery Association of the Jewish Soldiers and Sailors of the Spanish-American War to acquire for cemetery purposes certain land in the Borough of Queens.

My objection to this resolution is that the site proposed in the resolution is in close proximity to the present pumping station at Spring Creek, from which a portion of the Brooklyn water supply is obtained. The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity also intends to construct an infiltration gallery along the pipe line near this pumping station, and such new construction would run directly along the boundary line of the proposed cemetery. The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the President of the Board of Health both oppose the approval of the proposed site on the ground that the location of a cemetery at the place selected would be a menace to the purity of the water supply.

I am in hearty sympathy with the object and plans of the Jewish Veterans' Association in respect to a cemetery, and I regret that it is impossible to approve the site at present under consideration.

The Committee on Affairs of Boroughs, to whom was referred on June 23, 1903 (Minutes, page 1040) the annexed petition of the Cemetery Association of Jewish Soldiers and Sailors of the Spanish-American War for a cemetery in the Borough of Queens, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the annexed resolution be adopted.

Petition of the Cemetery Association of Jewish Soldiers and Sailors of the Spanish-American War to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Your petitioners, the undersigned, are veterans of the military and naval service of the United States, who participated in the war with Spain and in the incidental war in the Philippine Islands, some of whom are at present engaged in the military and naval service of the National Government, and all your petitioners are residents of The City of New York.

There participated in said wars several thousand soldiers and sailors of the Jewish faith, as appears by the records of the War and Navy Departments of the United States, a great number of whom died in the service; a still greater number have been fatally stricken by diseases contracted in the service, as a result of which the muster roll of our dead is continually lengthening.

Because dead comrades are buried in scattered and isolated cemeteries in New York City and contiguous territory great difficulty is experienced in the preservation and decoration of the graves of the dead, in the holding of proper commemorative services for the departed and in the discharge of the many functions incidental to their interment. It is particularly desired to prevent unfortunate comrades from suffering the ignominy of burial in a pauper's grave.

The Cemetery Association of the Jewish Soldiers and Sailors of the Spanish-American War was duly incorporated, and its incorporators and directors are either officers or members of the Hebrew Veterans of the War with Spain, an association organized under the laws of this State, one of the paramount purposes of the formation of which was "to provide proper interment for and to perpetuate the memory of dead comrades."

The said cemetery association has complied with all the preliminary statutory requirements preparatory to making this application for the consent of this Honorable Board to the acquisition of the land hereinafter described for cemetery purposes, inasmuch as it caused to be published notice of its application to this Board in the manner required by the statute, as appears by the affidavits of publication attached to and made part of this petition.

The land to be used for the cemetery is situated in the County of Queens, Borough of Queens, City and State of New York, and is bounded and described as follows: Bounded on the north by the Old South road, on the east by Cedar lane (otherwise known as the road to Furman's Neck), on the south by the Conduit lands, formerly of the City of Brooklyn and now of The City of New York, which lands are commonly known as the Conduit or Conduit avenue, and on the west by land now or late of Elizabeth Levison; the said piece of land being more particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point in the southerly line of the Old South road distant seven hundred and thirty-nine (739) feet westerly from the southwest corner of the Old South road and Cedar lane; running thence easterly, or nearly so, along the said southerly line of the Old South road seven hundred and thirty-nine (739) feet to the southwest corner of the Old South road and Cedar lane; running thence southerly, or nearly so, along the westerly line of Cedar lane eleven hundred and fifty-eight (1,158) feet to a point formed by the intersection of the said westerly line of Cedar lane with the northerly line of the Conduit lands of The City of New York; running thence westerly, or nearly so, along the said northerly line of the Conduit lands about eleven hundred (1,100) feet to the easterly line of a piece of land, now, or formerly, of Elizabeth Levison; running thence northerly, or nearly so, partly along the said easterly line of the said piece of land and partly (and for the rest of the distance) along the easterly line of other lands now, or formerly, of Elizabeth Levison about one thousand (1,000) feet to the southerly line of the Old South road at the point or place of beginning, be the said several distances and dimensions more or less. The said piece of land has an area of about twenty-two acres, more or less.

The land aforesaid is not desirable for agricultural purposes because it contains sandy soil, and is unavailable for building or residential purposes because it is immediately opposite the Bayside Cemetery, the Chaari Zedeck and the Acacia Cemetery.

By reason of the foregoing facts petitioners desire to establish and maintain the said cemetery and so to embellish it that it will not only be an eminently fitting resting place for departed comrades, but also a crowning memorial to the valorous dead. To accomplish these ends it is intended that so much of the cemetery grounds as shall not be required for the interment of the remains of Jewish soldiers and sailors of the Spanish-American War shall be disposed of to persons and associations of the Jewish faith, and that the resulting proceeds shall be applied not only to the liquidation of the indebtedness which will be necessarily incurred in the acquisition of the aforesaid lands, but also to the preserving, improving and embellishing of the cemetery grounds and the avenues and roads thereof and to defraying the incidental expenses and liabilities of the cemetery association.

In view of these facts your petitioners respectfully ask that the consent of this Honorable Board be given to the taking by deed, devise or otherwise by the Cemetery Association of the Jewish Soldiers and Sailors of the Spanish-American War of the land aforesaid for cemetery purposes.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2341.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

It has been called to my attention that there is in the minds of some a doubt whether a bridge constructed upon the designs submitted by Commissioner Linden-thal for the Manhattan Bridge will not be more costly than a bridge built with wire cables. In this connection I ask your attention to the following extract from the minutes of the Commission of Experts of their meeting held March 5, 1903:

"The Commission unanimously decided that the use of cables made of steel links, as in proposed design, is not only desirable from a more positive determination of the stresses under all variations of loads, but also from the point of economy and of rapidity in erection."

You will perceive that this decision, which was unanimous, covers not only the question of economy but also rapidity of erection and the positive determination of stresses.

At the meeting of the Commission, April 16, the Commission gave a hearing to Mr. Hildenbrand, who presented his reasons for thinking that wire cables were preferable to eye-bar cables. This question was thus specifically brought to the attention of the Commission of Experts and was carefully considered by it. In its final report, dated June 29, 1903, the Commission, instead of confining itself to the statement that the Bridge Commissioner's plans were practicable, used this very strong language:

"In this final report we unanimously recommend the adoption and execution of the proposed design of the Manhattan Bridge as submitted to us by the Commissioner of Bridges."

The Commissioner informs me that there are "five or six bridge works that have plants for making eye-bars up to 10-inch size; two bridge works have plants for making up to 16-inch size (the American and Phoenix Bridge companies). No bridge works has, at present, a plant for 18-inch eye-bars, but these two companies could make them on their present plants. Two other bridge companies have stated that, if the amount of work justifies it, they are ready to have 18-inch plants put up within six months. The indications are for strong competition. The American Bridge Company has no monopoly; their only chance is as a competitor at the lowest price, like all other bridge works. There will be about 4,400 bars. The capacity of an 18-inch plant, running ten hours, is 60 heads, or 30 bars a day. Six months is regarded by the bridge companies as ample time for making the bars." The American representative of Krupp has asked for an opportunity to submit a proposition for the loose eye-bars, forgings and the like.

When the bids were opened for the construction of the Williamsburg Bridge, there was only one bidder for the wire cables. I know of no reason to suppose that there will be any greater competition at the present time for cables of wire construction.

In relation to bonds I need scarcely point out to you that the authorization of the bonds asked for does not mean their immediate issue. It is likely to be three years or more before they are all put out, and they will be issued only from time to time as the work progresses.

On the 17th instant I sent a certified copy of the so-called "dog ordinance" to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, asking whether it would undertake to enforce the ordinance according to its terms, and, if so, upon what conditions.

I have the honor to transmit to you herewith the reply of the society, dated July 14, 1903.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, New York, N. Y.:

Sir—Acknowledging the receipt of your favor of the 7th inst., enclosing certified copy of "An ordinance forbidding the presence of dogs in the streets, highways and public places of The City of New York, except under certain restrictions," adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 23, 1903, and approved by you July 6, I beg to inform you that this Society will accept the trust imposed upon it and will enforce the ordinance, provided the City will make an adequate appropriation to enable the Society to do so.

I have formulated an estimate of the cost of enforcing the ordinance for one year, including necessary equipment. This estimate amounts to \$76,800 for all boroughs. However, as this subject is a new proposition, and the annual cost can not be estimated with any great exactness until after the ordinance has been enforced for some time, I would suggest that the City appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to the Society, to be used between now and January 1, 1904, in the enforcement of the ordinance as far as possible.

I hope this suggestion will meet with your approval, so that the Society may make the ordinance immediately effective.

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board for further consideration an ordinance now in his hands (Int. No. 2206), entitled "An ordinance governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond."

No. 2206.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to whom was referred on June 16, 1903 (Minutes, page 1003) the annexed ordinance in relation to street openings for sewer connections, etc., respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond.

1. Openings of Street or Sewer—No person or corporation shall open or excavate any highway or place any encumbrances thereupon, or open any public sewer or private sewer leading into a public sewer, or any private sewer in a public street, or cause any of the above acts to be performed in the Borough of Richmond without a permit issued by the President of the Borough, or his duly authorized representative.

2. Application for Permit—Application for such permit must be made in writing to the President of the Borough, upon blank forms to be furnished by him, such form of application to contain a diagram of the location affected, with the dimensions of street surface to be disturbed.

3. Time—Work must be begun within twenty-four (24) hours from the time of issuance of the permit, and be prosecuted without unnecessary delay to completion.

4. Refilling Trenches—Excavations in public streets shall be refilled by the party by whom such excavation was made, but only under the supervision and at all times in the presence of a City Inspector specially assigned to the work by the Superintendent of Highways, whose duty shall be to see that each and every part of the filling shall be placed and thoroughly rammed in layers of not more than eight (8) inches in depth up to the level of the bottom of the street pavement. The street pavement shall be loosely and temporarily replaced by the party by whom the excavation had been made, but in such manner as, in the opinion of the City Inspector, shall be safe for travel.

5. Guarding—Any trench or opening or incumbrance upon the highway shall at all times be properly guarded for the prevention of accidents, and be properly lighted at night.

6. Rock Refills—Wherever rock is excavated not more than one-third of the total excavation shall be refilled with the broken stone, which must be in small pieces, and replaced in such manner, mingled with clean earth or sand, as to insure the thorough and compact filling of all spaces.

7. Tunneling—Tunneling under crosswalks and railroad tracks will not be allowed at any time. The bridge stones forming such crosswalks must be removed and placed out of the way of street traffic, being carefully relaid and thoroughly bedded when the work is completed.

8. Extent of Street Opening—At the intersection of cross streets not more than one-half of the width of the street shall be opened at one time; the other half shall remain untouched for the accommodation of traffic until the first half is restored for safe use.

9. Access to Hydrants and Mail Boxes—All work shall be so prosecuted as not to interfere with easy access to fire hydrants and United States mail boxes.

10. Pavement Restored by City—The full restoration of the pavement shall in all cases be made by employees of the Bureau of Highways or persons having contracts with the City, affecting said pavement, which make it their duty to restore the same.

11. Inspection Fees for Back Filling of Trenches—The fee for the inspection of the back filling of any trench in a City street or highway shall be as follows:

For trenches not more than four (4) feet in depth, or more than thirty (30) feet in length.....	\$2 00
For trenches over four (4) feet and under nine (9) feet in depth and not more than thirty (30) feet in length.....	3 00
For trenches over nine (9) feet and under sixteen (16) feet in depth and not more than thirty (30) feet in length.....	4 00
For trenches of greater dimensions than the foregoing.....	Special Charge.

12. Sewer Inspection and Fee—Every sewer connection shall be made under the supervision of a City Inspector of Sewer Connections.

The fee for such inspection will be \$3, which shall be deposited with the Department of Finance and credited to a special fund entitled "Sewer Inspection and Repair, Borough of Richmond."

13. Fees, Restoration of Pavements—Fees for the restoration of pavement shall be as follows, for areas less than ten (10) square yards:

For restoring granite or other blocks or brick on concrete foundation, per square yard	\$2 50
For restoring granite or other blocks or brick on sand foundation, per square yard	1 00
For sheet asphalt on concrete foundation, per square yard	3 00
For macadam, per square yard	80
For areas in excess of ten (10) square yards	Special, as may be determined by the President of the Borough or his representative.

14. Computing Area of Work—The area of surface to be repaved shall, in all cases, be computed by the President of the Borough or his representative, from the diagram in the application, as verified or corrected by comparison with the maps and records on file.

15. Uses of Moneys Paid—All fees for inspection and for restoration of pavements must be paid by the applicant in cash upon the issuing of the permit, and a receipt shall be given therefor. Regular return of the money shall be made to the Comptroller of The City of New York, who shall credit it to the special fund for "Restoring and Repaving Streets in the Borough of Richmond."

16. Special Uses of Streets and Charges—For special uses of the streets, permits may be issued, and the President of the Borough or his representative may require therefor as security deposit such sum or sum as may seem to him fair and just; such moneys to be deposited with the Finance Department to be drawn upon by the Comptroller upon order of the President of the Borough after proper completion of the work, payable to the party taking out the original permit, either in full or to the amount of such balance as may be left, if it shall be found necessary to use said deposit for purpose of repairing damages. In the latter event the amount retained shall be credited to the fund drawn upon for making the repairs.

In general such deposits shall be similar to the following:

No permit shall be given for over ninety (90) days without formal extension.

Moving steam roller over highway	25 00

17. Consent of Corporations—The applicant for a permit to move a building on or across streets where there are car tracks or overhead wire construction must obtain and file with the application the consent of the company affected.

18. Gutters Clear—Storage of building or other material on the streets will only be permitted on express condition that the gutters to the full width of three (3) feet shall be kept absolutely clear and free for the passage of water; such storage shall be limited to the frontage of the property mentioned in the application and to one-third of the width of the street.

19. Sidewalks Protected—Where any heavy teaming is necessary across sidewalks, either the flagstones shall be removed and a clean dry walk maintained, or the crossing shall be so thoroughly protected with heavy planking as to prevent injury thereto and present no obstruction to the safe use of the same by pedestrians.

20. Non-interference with Traffic, etc.—All work to be done must be carried on in such manner as not to unnecessarily interrupt business on the streets, or in any way interfere with existing sewers, piping, subways, tracks or other public conveniences or utilities already laid under authority.

21. Snow Removal—The person or corporation to whom a permit for street opening is granted must remove within twenty-four (24) hours all snow and ice that may fall or form upon the street within five feet upon either side of the opening, and keep the space free from snow and ice until the opening is properly refilled.

22. Competent Men—All work must be carried out by men competent and skilled in their respective duties, and full compliance must be given to all laws affecting the work or the employment of labor.

23. Penalties—Failure to comply with any of the conditions of this ordinance by any person or corporation, or failure to perform any of the above acts in the manner prescribed and directed by the President of the Borough, or his Inspectors or other duly appointed agents, will be punishable by the revocation of the permit for such work, the refusal to issue further permits to the offending party for any purpose whatever for a period not exceeding six months, or forfeiture of the temporary security deposits, or any or all of these penalties.

24. Taking Effect—This ordinance to take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Openings of Street or Sewer—No person or corporation shall open or excavate any highway or place any encumbrances thereupon, or open any public sewer or private sewer leading into a public sewer, or any private sewer in a public street, or cause any of the above acts to be performed in the Borough of Richmond without a permit issued by the President of the Borough or his duly authorized representative.

Sec. 2. Application for Permit—Application for such permit must be made in writing to the President of the Borough, upon blank forms to be furnished by him, such form of application to contain a diagram of the location affected, with the dimensions of street surface to be disturbed.

Sec. 3. Time—Work must be begun within twenty-four (24) hours from the time of issuance of the permit, and be prosecuted without unnecessary delay to completion.

Sec. 4. Refilling Trenches—Excavations in public streets shall be refilled by the party by whom such excavation was made, but only under the supervision and at all times in the presence of a City Inspector specially assigned to the work by the Superintendent of Highways, whose duty shall be to see that each and every part of the filling shall be placed and thoroughly rammed in layers of not more than eight (8) inches in depth up to the level of the bottom of the street pavement. The street pavement shall be loosely and temporarily replaced by the party by whom the excavation had been made, but in such manner as in the opinion of the City Inspector shall be safe for travel.

Sec. 5. Guarding—Any trench or opening or encumbrance upon the highway shall at all times be properly guarded for the prevention of accidents, and be properly lighted at night.

Sec. 6. Rock Refills—Wherever rock is excavated not more than one-third of the total excavation shall be refilled with the broken stone, which must be in small pieces, and replaced in such manner, mingled with clean earth or sand, as to insure the thorough and compact filling of all spaces.

Sec. 7. Tunneling—Tunneling under crosswalks and railroad tracks will not be allowed at any time. The bridge stones forming such crosswalks must be removed and placed out of the way of street traffic, being carefully relaid and thoroughly bedded when the work is completed.

Sec. 8. Extent of Street Opening—At the intersection of cross streets not more than one-half of the width of the street shall be opened at one time; the other half

shall remain untouched for the accommodation of traffic until the first half is restored for safe use.

Sec. 9. Access to Hydrants and Mail Boxes—All work shall be so prosecuted as not to interfere with easy access to fire hydrants and United States mail boxes.

Sec. 10. Pavement Restored by City—The full restoration of the pavement shall in all cases be made by employees of the Bureau of Highways or persons having contracts with the City, affecting said pavement, which make it their duty to restore the same.

Sec. 11. Inspection Fees for Back Filling of Trenches—The fee for the inspection of the back filling of any trench in a City street or highway shall be as follows:

For trenches not more than four (4) feet in depth, or more than thirty (30) feet in length	\$2 00
For trenches over four (4) feet and under nine (9) feet in depth and not more than thirty (30) feet in length	3 00

Hon. JAMES J. DEVLIN:

Sir—In our efforts during the past year to better the condition of the dependent ones in our charge, which I am pleased to see have proved in many ways successful, I discovered that the inmates of our Almshouses were sadly in need of something to occupy their time and thoughts. Of course, those able to work are employed, and I am not referring to them. But with few exceptions our inmates are not able-bodied or fit to work. The vagrants do not reach us. They wind up in the Workhouse, so that our population consists of feeble or sickly people. While many of them have led reckless or dissipated lives, there are not a few whom circumstances, through no fault of their own, have rendered penniless and homeless. As officials in the Department of Charities it behooves us to keep in sight and be guided by the meaning of the word charity. In short, "Do unto others as we would wish others to do unto us." Prompted by that feeling, I secured from Brother Leontine last summer the Protectors Band for Saturday afternoon concerts. I wish you could have seen the effect of that music upon those poor people. For the time being they were completely metamorphosed and forgot their surroundings. The music proved a bright spot in their existence and furnished them pleasant anticipations as well as recollections.

It seems to me, then, that in the arrangement that is annually made for furnishing open air concerts in the different parks of the City in the summer time our Department could be appropriately included, and I urgently request you to aid in bringing this result about, for I firmly believe that no concerts gave greater pleasure than did those we had last summer at Blackwell's Island.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby concurs in said resolution and fixes the salary of the position of Purchasing Agent in the Department of Correction at the rate of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800) per annum.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1903, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 28, 1903, transmitting the Budget for the year 1903, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1903, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1903 is ninety-seven million one hundred and nineteen thousand and thirty-one dollars and ten cents (\$97,119,031.10), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating three million seven hundred and twenty-three thousand and sixty-four dollars and fourteen cents (\$3,723,064.14), leaving ninety-three million three hundred and

ninety-five thousand nine hundred and sixty-six dollars and ninety-six cents (\$93,395,966.96), as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of three million seven hundred and twenty-three thousand and sixty-four dollars and fourteen cents (\$3,723,064.14), included in the Budget for County Charges and Expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1902 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for judgments and claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1903, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz.:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from city purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY AND STATE PURPOSES BY GENERAL RATES.

PERCENTAGE TO BE ADDED FOR DEFICIENCIES IN COLLECTION.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied thereof."

Your Committee has conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1903, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2 per cent.) of the amounts to be collected by taxation for State, city and county budgetary purposes be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted last year and almost exactly the figure which, having prevailed in The City of New York, prior to consolidation for over twenty years, has been found by experience to offset with substantial accuracy the deficiencies in the product of the tax resulting from vacated and modified assessments, uncollectable personal taxes, etc., etc.

THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes, and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven A of this article, other than for an organization tax, and as provided in chapter 37 of the General Laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for State, city and county purposes.

The assessment rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen July 6, 1903, show the following valuations by counties:

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax-rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$303.08 in the whole tax levy of \$77,632,663.94.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax-rolls of the City, State and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1903. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for flagging improvements in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

Fifth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is thirty-one thousand five hundred and twenty-seven dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$31,527.97); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is fifty-seven thousand four hundred and thirty-six dollars and seventy cents (\$57,436.70); the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is four thousand six hundred and thirty-six dollars and forty-three cents (\$4,636.43); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is twenty-nine thousand two hundred and forty-one dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$29,241.98).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1903.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of seventy-two million one hundred and twenty-nine thousand six hundred and sixty-one dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$72,129,661.08), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1903, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1903, amounting in the aggregate to ninety-seven million one hundred and nineteen thousand and thirty-one dollars and ten cents (\$97,119,031.10), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of three million seven hundred and twenty-three thousand and sixty-four dollars and fourteen cents (\$3,723,064.14), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-one million two hundred and sixty-six thousand three hundred and four dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$21,266,304.98), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication, dated May 28, 1903, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1903, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the Amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City, as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, and of any of the municipal and public corporations or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt, of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums, which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statements as follows:

First—The Budget, in detail, for the year 1903.

Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of county charges and expenses paid during the year 1902 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk, and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of sixty-three thousand six hundred and ten dollars and thirty-six cents (\$63,610.36), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1903, included in the Budget, and the further sum of four thousand nine hundred and forty-two dollars and two cents (\$4,942.02), paid during the year 1902 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, for county charges or liabilities of said county, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, amounting together to the sum of sixty-eight thousand five hundred and fifty-two dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$68,552.38), and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county, 2 per cent. of said last mentioned sum or one thousand three hundred and seventy-one dollars and four cents (\$1,371.04), which last stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of sixty-nine thousand nine hundred and twenty-three dollars and forty-two cents (\$69,923.42).

Sec. 7. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, for the year 1903, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of five billion four hundred and thirty-two million three hundred and ninety-eight thousand nine hundred and eighteen dollars (\$5,432,398,918), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 6th day of July, 1903.

Sec. 8. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said City are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1903, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.40552 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.41367 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.48129 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.48045 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.46693 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.47508 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 1.48859 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 1.49675 per centum.

Sec. 9. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,802.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioner of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land, in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-one thousand five hundred and twenty-seven dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$31,527.97), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successors; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of fifty-seven thousand four hundred and thirty-six dollars and seventy cents (\$57,436.70), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, under authority of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purpose, the sum of four thousand six hundred and thirty-six dollars and forty-three cents (\$4,636.43), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the flagging districts established by the Flagging Commissioners of said town; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the district of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of twenty-nine thousand two hundred and forty-one dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$29,241.98), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

The Vice-Chairman moved that this report receive immediate consideration.

Which was adopted.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree to accept said report and adopt said ordinance.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS AGAIN RESUMED.

No. 2358.

By Alderman Parsons—

Whereas, The Supreme Pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church, Leo XIII., has yielded his spirit to the Most High, thus rounding out nearly a century of existence, whose prevailing note was sympathy, sweetness and charity for all mankind. Dowered with masterful intellect, born to the purple, with nearly twenty centuries of hallowed traditions of his throne behind him, Pope Leo XIII. was ever the world's foremost advocate of enlightened doctrines of democracy and the resolute champion of the poor and oppressed upon earth. He witnessed in his lifetime some of the most stupendous wars, battles and sieges of history; saw the birth and development of the most marvelous inventions; was the friend and trusted adviser of nations, kings, nobles and law-givers, yet, withal, retained a serenely human love and affection for the humble, the abject and the lowly. Amid the pomp, pageantry and majesty of his high estate he ever remained a pleader for freedom, a meek, lowly apostle, living a simple, frugal, austere life, his benevolence, rectitude, his constant warfare for faith and morals, his sympathy for the oppressed, enslaved and downtrodden of all climes, all colors, all races and all creeds won for him the reverential respect of mankind. Throughout his long career he ever remained even as a little child. His unquenchable interest in and frequently expressed solicitude for the American people renders it singularly fitting that New York, the foremost city of the Western Hemisphere, should appropriately record its sorrow at his death;—therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, hereby and herein express our profound grief at the death of Pope Leo XIII., and ask that a copy of these resolutions, duly authenticated by the City Clerk and countersigned by the Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen, be transmitted to the Papal Secretary of State at Rome; and be it further

Resolved, That a committee of seven members be appointed by the President to co-operate with such committee as may be authorized to act for the Roman Catholic authorities of this City in the matter of holding memorial services; and be it further

Resolved, That as an additional mark of respect this Board do now adjourn.

Which was unanimously decided in the affirmative by a rising vote.

And the President appointed as such Committee Aldermen Parsons, John T. McCall, Tebbetts, Doull, Maloy, James and Leitner.

And the President then declared that the Board stood adjourned until Friday, July 31, 1903, at 1 o'clock p. m.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held at the office of the Board of Assessors, No. 320 Broadway, on Tuesday, July 14, 1903, at 10.45 o'clock a. m.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meetings, not yet approved, was dispensed with.

The assessment list for improvements in Long Island City, Borough of Queens, under the provisions of chapter 644, Laws of 1893, and the objections which had been filed against the same by attorneys for various property owners, and by owners in person, to wit:

In connection therewith the following communication of the Board of Assessors to the Board of Revision of Assessments, dated July 2, 1903, was read:

Office of Board of Assessors,
No. 320 Broadway,
New York, July 2, 1903.

To the Board of Revision of Assessments:

Gentlemen—The accompanying assessment list for various improvements in Long Island City, Borough of Queens, is transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments, for consideration of the recommendation hereinafter made by the Board of Assessors.

This assessment is to be laid under the provisions of chapter 644, Laws of 1893, and, as at present made up, amounts to \$1,925,214.39, as follows:

The total amount of "expenses" added to the contract price, including "lands acquired," is \$740,886.25.

The Act of 1893 conferred upon "The General Improvement Commission of Long Island City," which it created, authority to construct sewers, to open and widen streets, and to grade and pave streets. Under this authority the Commission proceeded to let contracts for various works of the nature indicated, carrying a total expenditure of \$1,184,328.14, with necessary expenses. The act also authorized the issue of bonds to provide money to meet the obligations assumed by the Commission, such bonds to bear interest at the rate of 4½ per cent. per annum. Up to the time of consolidation, funds to meet the interest were raised by taxation in Long Island City, and since consolidation, in the General Tax Budget of New York City.

Although the Act of 1893 authorized the General Improvement Commission of Long Island City to lay assessments against the property benefited by these improvements, no attempt was made to lay such assessments prior to consolidation; but, after consolidation, the Comptroller of The City of New York took up the work of ascertaining just what expenditure had been made by the General Improvement Commission for which the City should be reimbursed by an assessment. As a result of the investigation made, the Department of Sewers certified to the Board of Assessors the expenditures that had been made for the construction of sewers, and the Department of Highways certified the amounts expended for surface street improvements. These certificates aggregated \$1,502,341.12. As these certificates (with accompanying assessment lists and maps showing area of benefit) were received by the Board of Assessors they were forwarded to the Comptroller for his interest certificate, and from time to time the Comptroller made such interest certificates, the aggregate amount thereof being \$422,873.27, thus making up the aggregate of \$1,925,214.39 to be assessed.

The act provides that the Assessors shall first ascertain the aggregate amount of the assessment against each lot or parcel of land (of which there are about 15,250 within the district of assessment), and shall then give certain prescribed hearings to

objectors; and, after having made such corrections in the assessments as shall seem to them proper, they must then divide the assessment levied against each parcel into twenty equal parts or annual installments, and in each year thereafter for twenty years shall assess an amount equal to one of said annual installments, with interest, upon the lots or parcels of land benefited.

The Board of Assessors, under an opinion from the Corporation Counsel that it succeeds to the duties devolved by the act upon the General Improvement Commission, so far as the laying of the assessment is concerned, made up a tentative assessment, based upon the aggregate amount of \$1,925,214.39, and inserted in the "City Record," and in certain Long Island City papers as well, the advertisement required by the statute. In response to the advertisement between four and five thousand objections have been filed by and in behalf of property owners.

The Board of Assessors has not only given to these objectors the four hearings prescribed by the statute, but several others in addition, and has very carefully heard and considered the arguments advanced in support of the objections filed.

These objections are for the most part legal in their character, and set up the contention that the improvements for which the assessment is proposed to be laid were made without authority of law; that the bonds were not legally issued, in that they operated to increase the indebtedness of Long Island City beyond the constitutional debt limit; that no general map or plan of the improvement district was filed, as required by the act; that the act confers no authority upon the Board of Assessors, as the successor of the General Improvement Commission, to lay any assessment whatever for these improvements; that parts of said improvements were made in and upon private property, upon which the City had no right in law to enter; that the work was not petitioned for as required by the act; that the charge for interest and other expenses is illegal, etc. There are also objections to the effect that the amount proposed to be assessed is in excess of the actual cost of the work, that contracts were not let to the lowest bidders, that work called for by the contracts has not been performed, and that much of the work done was of an inferior quality. The argument is made also that this is a section of cheap lands, largely unimproved, and that it will not bear the assessment proposed to be laid upon it; that if the total amount of the proposed assessment is confirmed, the property, or much of it, will be abandoned, that tax values will be reduced, and the City in the long run the loser thereby.

At the hearings before this Board the City has been represented by Mr. George L. Sterling, Assistant Corporation Counsel, so that the Board has taken into consideration the rights of the municipality as well as the interests of the property owners.

After full and careful deliberation the Board of Assessors has reached the conclusion that the whole amount of this proposed assessment should not be laid upon the property deemed to have been benefited by these improvements. It seems clear to us that the entire interest charge of \$422,873.27 is not properly a part of the assessable cost, particularly in view of the fact that the delay of nearly ten years in laying the assessment has not been the fault of those to be assessed. After this deduction is made there will still remain \$1,502,341.12, which amount, we are convinced, is in excess of the benefit derived from the improvements, taking into consideration the character of the work and the value of the lands affected. We believe that this sum should be reduced by 40 per cent., making a net assessment of \$901,404.67. We have embodied these views in a resolution passed at a meeting of the Board held to-day, as follows:

"Resolved, That the assessment list for improvements in Long Island City, under chapter 644, Laws of 1893, and the objections heretofore filed to the assessment, be transmitted to the Board of Revision of Assessments, with the recommendation that it be reduced as follows: First, by deducting from the total amount of \$1,925,214.39 the sum included therein for interest, namely, \$422,873.27; second, by deducting from the remainder (\$1,502,341.12) 40 per cent. thereof, or \$600,936.45, leaving a total amount of \$901,404.67 to be assessed, such reduction to be made pro rata upon all the lots and parcels of land embraced within the district of assessment, taking as a basis of calculation the amounts shown against such lots and parcels of land in the assessment as now made up, amounting in the aggregate to the said sum of \$1,925,214.39."

This Board believes that the adoption of the suggestion herein made by the Board of Revision will lead to a more speedy collection of the assessment, that litigation will be avoided, that property owners affected will be satisfied with the assessment as so reduced, and that the City will have thereby placed itself in the position of having laid a just and equitable assessment—one certainly within the limits of benefits conferred.

We therefore suggest that the Board of Revision instruct this Board to revise the assessment upon the lines of the resolution we have adopted.

REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS, JUNE 29 TO JULY 4, 1903.

Communications Received.

From the Comptroller—Inclosing copy of a letter from D. J. Barry & Co., in regard to deposit made by that firm in December, 1902, such letter stating that, on an award of goods to the amount of \$114, a deposit of \$296 has been retained, goods, so far, not having been called for, etc.

Barry & Co., and stating that proposed arrangement is satisfactory to the Finance Department. Mr. Barry has deposited check for \$23.06 (25 per cent. of amount of unfilled contract), and the Comptroller is requested to release check for \$296.

From the Corporation Counsel—Stating that Mr. Justice Truax has appointed Drs. Wildman and Phelps as Examiners in Lunacy in the case of Patrick Fogarty, a prisoner, who is supposed to be insane. On file.

From Civil Service Commission—Certifying names of three persons as eligible for appointment to position of Boatman in Department. Candidates requested to call at Department office on July 2.

From Fire Department—Acknowledging receipt of letter in regard to protection from fire on Riker's Island, stating that an inspection had been made by the Deputy Chief of the Department, and that apparatus and equipment required will cost about \$7,095, which expense the Fire Department cannot at present incur. Also stating that two fire extinguishers, two axes and two six-foot hooks (costing about \$288) should be placed in each building by the Department of Correction.

The Commissioner of Correction regrets that the Fire Department is unable to give required protection. The Department of Correction will furnish the extinguishers, axes, etc., and requests further information in regard to these supplies, and where they should be purchased in order that they may conform to regulations of the Fire Department.

Application to be made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in request for appropriation for 1904; but, if possible, will try to make the increase during the present year.

From Lord & Hewlett, Architects—Transmitting specifications for alterations at Workhouse and Laundry and for steam plant at Workhouse corrected as required. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, milk, bread, etc., for week ending June 27, 1903, agreed with the specifications of the contracts. On file. Reports—Census, labor, punishments, etc., for week ending June 27, 1903. On file. DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for Week Ending Saturday, May 9, 1903.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor, in relation to the claim of J. W. Fiske Iron Works of \$1,605 for settees furnished in 1898 for recreation piers and stating that there is now before the Mayor a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on April 28, 1903, authorizing the purchase of settees for recreation piers without public letting. Report of Auditor transmitted, to the effect that the settees furnished by Fiske were required in a great hurry; that the State Prisons Commission certified that they could not be furnished from the prisons; that bids were received for same, and that the J. W. Fiske Iron Works were the lowest bidders and received the order; that they furnished the settees promptly and according to specifications, and that the claim is a just and fair one and should be paid.

From the Comptroller, in relation to ordinance proposed to be acted upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granting the Erie Railroad Company the right to construct and operate a double-track railway across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal street between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, North river, and requesting that the Commissioner of Docks be present at the hearing in this matter, to be held before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Friday, May 8, 1903. Comptroller advised that, in the opinion of the Department, the franchise from the Board of Aldermen, and the collection of any revenue by the Comptroller's office, should be only for that portion of the street above mentioned which is not within the jurisdiction of this Department, and that an opinion has been requested from the Corporation Counsel as to whether the jurisdiction of this Department includes Thirteenth avenue.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Transmitting bill for \$133.37 from the Title Guarantee and Trust Company for services rendered in searching the title to property formerly owned by Morris D. Barry at Pier, old 54, East river, and asking that requisition be drawn in favor of said company for same. Auditor directed to prepare requisition.

Second—Transmitting form of offer of purchase to be served upon the owner or owners of 282 feet of bulkhead easterly of Pier, old 52, East river, and stating that he does not consider the purchase price authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, viz.: \$17,000, to be sufficient. The Commissioner requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution authorizing and directing him to make and serve upon the owners of the bulkhead property easterly of Pier, old 52, East river, written offers for the purchase of same, as follows:

To Mathilda B. Brown, Agnes P. Brown, Jean Brown Jennings, Agnes M. Brown and Florence B. Lenthon, for the 130 feet of bulkhead extending easterly from the easterly line of the Gouverneur Slip Pier East, formerly known as Pier, old 52, East river, \$26,910.

Catharine Jane Prior, for the 100 feet of bulkhead commencing at a point 130 feet easterly of the easterly line of the Gouverneur Slip Pier East, formerly known as Pier, old 52, East river, and extending easterly of said point 100 feet, \$20,700.

To the Century Stearic Acid Candle Works, for the 52 feet of bulkhead commencing at a point 230 feet easterly of the easterly line of Gouverneur Slip Pier East, formerly known as Pier, old 52, East river, and running easterly a distance of 52 feet, \$10,764.

Third—Approving modified form of agreement for the purchase of property near the foot of Montgomery street, East river, from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, and agreeing to lease a pier to said company when the improvements at the locality are completed. Agreement ordered executed.

Fourth—Approving forms of lease to Thomas Ward, of property between Seventy-ninth and Eightieth streets, North River; to the Central Hudson Steamboat Company of Pier, new 24, North river; to the Union Stock Yard and Market Company and Weehawken Stock Yard Company of Pier foot of Fortieth street, North river.

Fifth—Stating that in his opinion the Charter compels the Department to advertise in the Brooklyn corporation newspapers contracts clearly relating to the Borough of Brooklyn, and that the award of the contract for the construction of Pier at the foot of Fifty-first street, Borough of Brooklyn, cannot stand owing to the omission to so advertise said contract. Contract No. 777 for building a new pier with appurtenances, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, Borough of Brooklyn, ordered readvertised in accordance with the above opinion of the Corporation Counsel.

Sixth—Approving form of advertisement for obtaining bids for dump privilege on the south side of West Ninety-seventh Street Pier, North river, and on the bulkhead south of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Harlem river, and requesting that no lease of the bulkhead at One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Harlem river, be granted until the pending litigation involving the ownership of same has been settled. Copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Docks on June 28, 1901, transmitted to Corporation Counsel, with request that he push to settlement as early as possible the compromise referred to in said resolution.

From the Commissioner of Bridges, requesting that the bulkhead and slip adjacent to Pier, new 32, East river, be placed at the disposal of the Department of Bridges, and that the Seaman's Church be moved from its present position to the southerly side of the slip adjoining Pier, new 31. Edmund L. Baylies, attorney for the Protestant Episcopal Church Missionary Society for Seamen, requested to advise the Department whether such removal would be agreeable to said society.

From the Department of Highways, requesting storage space for sand in the vicinity of Fourteenth street, East river. Notified that the bulkhead referred to is leased to Murray & Co.

From the Department of Health—

First—Transmitting complaint from W. V. Armstrong, as to the crowded condition of pier on the landing of the Iron Steamboat Company's boats at Coney Island. Mr. Armstrong advised that the overcrowding is the fault of the passengers in their endeavor to get on the boat before the gates are open; that the matter of the small outlet is one of administration for the steamboat company, and that they should confer with the Steamboat Inspection Bureau concerning the sailing of the steamers and as to other matters of complaint.

Second—Stating that there is no objection to the locating of a public bath as heretofore at the foot of Noble street, Borough of Brooklyn. Department of Public Works, Brooklyn, informed that a berth has been assigned for bath at the location mentioned.

From the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, again requesting the Department to dredge at Cromwell's creek, in the Borough of The Bronx.

From the President of the Borough of Richmond, requesting consent to the transfer of George W. Tuttle, Assistant Engineer, to his office. Transfer effected.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—

First—Stating that he could transfer much more conveniently six Foremen permanently than to make a transfer temporarily; that the combination can and bag carriers are obtained by said Department through public letting; that a description of same is on file at the office of said Department, the last price being \$12.50, and that they make the scrapers themselves. Requisition ordered prepared for six dozen scrapers to be obtained from the Street Cleaning Department, and the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requested to transfer three Foremen to this Department (giving the names of the persons transferred), subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Second—Requesting the temporary use of two or more tugs of the Department, to be called for at such time as may be necessary for the exigencies of said Department. The tug "Richmond" ordered to be placed at the service of the Street Cleaning Department whenever required, the cost of operating same to be charged to said Department and no towing orders to be issued while said tug is so engaged.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to the proposed purchase of certain properties in the Borough of Richmond for ferry purposes, in which he advises that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund disapprove the offers proposed by the Commissioner of Docks and substitute other offers in conformity with the valuation given by Mr. Kennelly, the appraiser, and that if said offers be not accepted that the Commissioner of Docks be authorized to direct the Corporation Counsel to institute proceedings for acquiring title to the properties in question; together with

communication from the Comptroller, transmitting two bills of Bryan L. Kennelly, amounting to \$250 each for services rendered in appraising property for terminal facilities for Staten Island ferry. Bills ordered to be paid, with the understanding that they complete the appraisals ordered by this Department whether of property for proposed ferry terminals or that of the present lessee under the existing lease.

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments, stating that the pier and bulkhead property on the North river, extending from the northerly side of Forty-first street to the southerly side of Forty-second street, designated on the tax maps as Lot No. 7, Block 1107, section 4, is assessed at \$90,000.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—
First—Stating that they have issued a certificate to the electrical contractor who installed the electrical work on Pier "A," North river.

Second—Transmitting bill for \$32.50 for expenses incurred in shutting off dead tap at premises No. 151 Eleventh avenue. Said Department subsequently canceled the bill.

From the American Syren and Shipping, requesting to be furnished with copies of the annual reports of the Department from the year 1892 to the last issue thereof. Advised that the Department has no back numbers.

From the American Sightseeing Coach Company, requesting permission to land their yacht "Clifton" at the West Twenty-second Street Pier or at the East Twenty-fourth Street Pier. Advised that they make arrangements with Mr. Olcott, the permittee of the Pier at West Twenty-second street, and that, if such arrangements cannot be made, to communicate further with this Department.

From Charles DeHart Brower, asking that the question of lines between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, East river, be presented to the proper authorities with a request for an authorization for such change in the plans as may be deemed proper. The Commissioner requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve change of lines between East Twenty-first and East Twenty-third streets, a technical description of which is as follows:

The westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place between East Twenty-first and East Twenty-third streets, East river, instead of extending in a straight line southerly from the southerly side of East Twenty-third street, as heretofore established, will begin at a point in the southerly side of East Twenty-third street, distant 378.86 feet easterly of the easterly side of Avenue A, and running thence easterly in the prolongation of the southerly side of East Twenty-third street 75 feet. Thence southerly in a straight line to a point in the easterly prolongation of the northerly side of East Twenty-second street, distant 31 feet easterly from the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place as established in 1888. Thence in a straight line still southerly to a point in the easterly prolongation on the southerly side of East Twenty-second street, distant 14 feet easterly from the westerly line of said marginal street, wharf or place. Thence still southerly in a straight line to a point in the westerly line of said marginal street, wharf or place, distant 174 feet southerly from its intersection with the southerly side of East Twenty-second street. Thence proceeding in the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place as heretofore established in 1888.

From the Buffalo Law Department, requesting information as to the conditions inserted in grants of land under water within the limits of Greater New York. Information furnished.

From C. Clayton Bourne, stating that Nicholas C. Cunningham threatens to libel his boats unless bills for wharfage north of the Pier foot of West Fifty-second street are paid, and asking what action should be taken in the matter, as the said wharfage has been paid to the Department. Notified that the matter is now being adjusted.

From Brotherhood of Submarine Divers, stating that the day's work of a diver is four hours or less, and that over four hours and less than eight hours is two days' work, and that a diver's pay is by the day and not by the hour. Informed that the Commissioner cannot change from the present method of paying divers by the hour.

From Abel Crook, stating that the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association is awaiting an opportunity for a conference with the Mayor in regard to the Fulton Market water front improvement. Copy of their letter forwarded to the Mayor, with suggestion that the matter proceed without the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association.

From the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company (received through the Comptroller), requesting to be relieved from the bond on the expired lease of the South Brooklyn Ferry heretofore held by the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company. Corporation Counsel requested to advise whether it would be proper for this Department to address a communication to the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company stating that they are relieved from their liability under the above-mentioned bond, all claims for rental against the said ferry company having been paid up to and including December 21, 1902, the date of expiration of said lease.

From the Consolidated Gas Company—
First—Stating that they are preparing to abandon the gas-holder on the block between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets and between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, on the North river, and giving suggestions as to the proper method of removing same from the premises. Engineer-in-Chief reported that contractor to whom gas-holder was sold has been notified to proceed with the work of removal substantially on the lines laid down by the chief engineer of the gas company.

Second—Requesting the exclusive use of the bulkhead at the foot of Forty-first street, North river, formerly occupied by Edwin M. Brown. Request denied, as Brown is occupying the premises.

From the Erie Railroad Company—
First—Requesting permission to sublease to the Crescent Ice Company a portion of the Pier foot of Forty-ninth Street, North river, consisting of 200 feet on the northerly side, inner end thereof. Granted, provided the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company and the sureties on their lease of said pier file written consent to said subleasing and agree that their liability under their bond is in no way impaired by reason of same.

Second—Stating that S. W. Driggs, of No. 278 South street, claims wharfage on boats berthed at the bulkhead adjoining Pier 47, East river, and that the Department Collector states that the wharfage at Pier 47, East river, is to be paid to the City, and asking to whom payment shall be made. Said company notified that the Department has taken title to Pier 47, East river, with about 148 feet of bulkhead adjoining, and that Driggs has nothing to do with the collection of wharfage at Pier 47, East river.

From the Fort George Coal and Lumber Company, requesting to be advised as to whether the material stored by the Department has been removed from the bulkhead at Sherman's creek, Harlem river, and as to whether said bulkhead has been repaired. Said company informed that the removal of Department's property from the leased area will be completed May 6, 1903, and that they may take possession of the premises on May 7, 1903, from which date rental will be charged.

From Charles F. J. Fleck, requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Piers, new 1 and old 1, North river, for a term of five years. Application denied, as the bulkhead in question is the only open piece of water front south of Canal street on the North river.

From T. H. Franklin, requesting a list of open docks on the East river below Grand street which are available for leasing. Notified that there are no wharves on the East river south of Grand street that can be leased, and that the Department does not know of any that will be available for leasing in the near future.

From M. J. Fenton, requesting permission to land the Liberty Island ferry boat at the Battery landing. Application denied.

From Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company, requesting permission to withdraw plans and specifications submitted by J. B. Snook & Sons, architects, for repairs to dock and shed at the foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, as John Monks & Sons will shortly submit plans for all iron construction. Plans returned as requested.

From the Hamburg-American Line, asking information as to the financial ability of Spearin & Preston, contractors, and as to their general ability to execute a large contract and the character of their work. Notified said company that Spearin & Preston have had several contracts with the Department, and have performed the work in a satisfactory manner; that said work has always been covered by an indemnity bond, and that the work formerly carried on by Spearin & Preston is now being done by George B. Preston, both of the original members of the firm having died.

From Keuffel & Esser Company, requesting to be allowed to substitute bond on their estimate for furnishing supplies under Class VIII. of Contract No. 760. Notified that the law does not permit this.

From the LeFranc Chlorozone Works, requesting to be advised as to how long they will be permitted to retain possession of premises occupied by them at No. 545 West Eighteenth street. Notified that there is every likelihood of the premises being required in about four months.

From A. Lynch, requesting permission to locate a runway and float on the north side of Pier, new 42, North river. Denied.

From John Kelly, requesting permission to deposit earth on the property bounded by One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, One Hundred and Fortieth street, Fifth avenue and the Harlem river. Application denied.

From the Long Island Railroad Company, requesting a reduction of the rental of 5 per cent. per annum on the gross earnings from the operation of the annex ferry between Pier 13, East river, and Long Island City. Denied.

From Robert McWilliams, requesting lease for ten years of the bulkhead and adjoining upland at the northerly half of block between One Hundred and Fourteenth street and One Hundred and Fifteenth street, Harlem river, for the purpose of maintaining a coal yard thereat. Advised that the Department is prepared to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that a lease be granted him of the following described property, viz.: The bulkhead on the East river, commencing at a point 111.8 feet northerly from the northerly side of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, extended, and running thence northerly a distance of about 111.8 feet to the southerly side of East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, together with the land in the rear of said bulkhead belonging to the City, extending inshore a distance of about 141 feet, more or less, to the westerly boundary of property owned by the City between the centre line of the block between East One Hundred and Fourteenth and East One Hundred and Fifteenth streets and the southerly side of East One Hundred and Fifteenth street. The lease to contain a covenant that in case, at any time, the City acquires the property upon the southerly half of the block between East One Hundred and Fourteenth and East One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, within the lines of the marginal street, wharf or place, as adopted by the Board of Docks October 13, 1887, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 19, 1887, and uses said property for the purpose of a marginal wharf, street or place, that then and in that case the City shall have the right to use and occupy a strip 20 feet in width extending from the centre line of the block between East One Hundred and Fourteenth and East One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, and extending back from the bulkhead line westerly a distance of 20 feet. The lease to be for a term of five years at an annual rental of \$2,000.

From Edward Miehlung, requesting to be advised as to the agreement under which Frank Boerum occupies the premises at Whitestone Landing dock, Borough of Queens. Informed that Boerum has maintained a boathouse at Whitestone Landing under permit from the Department since 1898, and that he is paying for the privilege \$25 per annum.

From the Maritime Association of the Port of New York, protesting against the erection of any shed on Pier 9, East river, and requesting to be given a hearing before action is taken upon any application for the erection of such shed. Said association notified that no such application has been received.

From Murray & Co., requesting permission to discharge sand on the bulkhead between Piers 11 and 12, East river. Denied, the property being now occupied by Mulry & Son under a permit from the Department.

From Maguire Brothers, requesting a berth between Fiftieth and Fifty-sixth streets, North river, in lieu of their present berth at Seventy-seventh street, North river, at the same rate as now paid, namely, \$2 per day. Notified that there is no room between Fiftieth and Fifty-sixth streets, North river, but that the permit for the berth at Seventy-seventh street may be renewed if they so desire.

From New York Shipbuilding Company, offering to furnish the Department with ferryboats if needed. Advised that consideration of the question of City ferryboats is premature at the present time.

From New York Telephone Company, offering to furnish telephone relief operators during the summer vacation, the expense of such relief to be borne by the subscriber.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, requesting certain modifications in the form of lease of the 42 additional feet of bulkhead between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets, North river.

From J. Edward Ogden Company, in relation to delay in approving sureties on Contract No. 775 for furnishing manila rope, by the Comptroller, and stating that the price of manila rope has advanced one-half cent per pound since the date of their bid, and that a further advance is imminent. Copy of letter forwarded to the Comptroller.

From Franklin Post, transmitting communication from James Logie, No. 52 Broadway, New York, asking information as to the proposed establishment of pier at Rossville, Borough of Richmond. Copies of reports of the Superintendent of Docks and the Engineer-in-Chief transmitted to Mr. Post, to the effect that the premises offered by Mr. James J. Winans are far more desirable in every respect than those offered by him.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, requesting their copy of lease to them of Pier at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river, executed by the Commissioner. Copy of said lease forwarded.

From the Phoenix Towing and Transportation Company, stating that the tug "Henry H. Stanwood" is not owned by them, but by C. A. Fox, No. 17 State street, New York. Mr. Fox notified that the repairs to Pier at foot of One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, damaged by said tug, will be made by the Department at his cost and expense.

From Ryan & Parker, suggesting a conference between the representative of the Corporation Counsel, Commissioner of Docks and themselves relative to the bill of the Department for work done between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, East river. Hearing fixed for Thursday, May 14, 1903, at 12 o'clock noon.

From the Underwood Typewriter Company, offering to furnish one new model No. 4 Underwood typewriter in exchange for one second-hand Remington machine and \$45 cash.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Canoe Club, to drive two piles and to extend for a distance of ten (10) feet the present platform at the foot of Bay Thirty-seventh street, Borough of Brooklyn, the piles to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

Department of Health, to erect on the West Thirty-ninth Street Pier, in the Borough of Manhattan, a small frame shed, about 12 feet high, to cover a space 12 by 15 feet, to be inclosed on two sides, for the temporary use of said Department, the shed to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, and this permission to continue not longer than April 30, 1904.

Bush Terminal Company, to extend sewer at the foot of Forty-third street, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted, as approved by the Department of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn.

New York House of Refuge, to change the location of the house at the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river, to a point near the gangway and float used by the boats of the New York House of Refuge in crossing to Randall's Island, the change to be made in accordance with plans submitted, and the said house to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, this permission to continue not longer than April 30, 1904.

New York Dock Company, to erect sheds on Piers Nos. 7, 34, 35 and 38, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the sheds to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, and to be erected in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

William Texter, to renew several piles at the Pier and bulkhead foot of Bay Thirty-eighth street, Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn, and to drive spring piles and place life lines thereat, said piles and life lines to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and to be kept within existing lines:

Atlantic Yacht Club, to make repairs to the breakwater at Seagate, Coney Island, Borough of Brooklyn.

Milliken Brothers, to drive two rows of piles and sink canal boats between same at Howland's Hook, Mariner's Harbor, Borough of Richmond, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted and to be kept within the bulkhead line.

Estates of Robert Goelet and Ogden Goelet, to make repairs to bulkhead, etc., between Forty-sixth and Forty-seventh streets, East river.

Henry Henjes, to repair the Pier and bulkhead at the foot of Bay Nineteenth street, Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn.

Estate of William Beard, to repair, when necessary, their docks in the Borough of Brooklyn for a period of twelve months, at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Department before the commencement of any repairs.

Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to make general repairs to their ferry and wharf property in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Department prior to the commencement of any work of repairs, this privilege to continue until the 1st of January, 1904.

Jordan L. Mott Iron Works, to repair fender piles and backing log on the easterly side of Mott Haven Canal, between One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Borough of The Bronx.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks:

John S. Egan, to maintain a swimming bath about 60 feet westerly of Corlears street, East river.

Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, to berth a public bath at the Pier foot of Noble street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than April 30, 1904:

A. E. Brooks, to occupy space 50 by 100 feet on the bulkhead foot of Twenty-fourth street, East river, for the storage of sand, compensation to be paid for the privilege at the rate of \$300 per annum.

O. J. H. Brooks, to occupy a space for the storage of sand north of Fifty-first street, North river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$300 per annum, the space occupied to be 50 by 100 feet.

William Cuff, to use and occupy a space 50 by 100 feet at the bulkhead foot of East One Hundred and Fourth street, Harlem river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$300 per annum.

Mrs. J. Goldberg, to maintain a news-stand at the foot of East Twenty-third street, East river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1 per month.

Captain John P. Roberts, to run a boat from the Battery wharf to Bedloe's Island hourly from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable monthly in advance, permit not to take effect until first payment is made.

Hartford and New York Transportation Company, to occupy the westerly half of Pier 33, East river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$50 per day.

Cobweb Yacht Club, to occupy space between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth streets, North river, for club house, compensation therefor to be at the rate of \$6 per month, payable monthly in advance.

Edmund P. Fitzgerald, to maintain a soda water stand with awning at the Battery Landing, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$1 per month.

The following permits were granted on the usual terms:

Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company, to repair break in suction pipe at the bulkhead near Pier, new 32, East river.

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, to repair the electric light subsidiary connection at the foot of East Tenth street, East river.

The following permit was revoked:

Thomas McLaughlin, to occupy space for storage purposes between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East river.

The specifications and form of contract for furnishing 3,000 cubic yards of sand and 7,500 cubic yards of broken stone, and for furnishing 10,000 barrels of slow setting and quick setting Portland cement, submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief were approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary was directed to have a sufficient number of proposal blanks printed, and the usual advertisement inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

The plans, specifications and form of contract for building a new pier on the East river, to be known as Pier, new 19, or Peck Slip Pier West, submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief were approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary was directed to have a sufficient number of blank proposals printed, but to withhold the advertisement of said contract until such time as the status of Pier, old 24, East river, is definitely settled, there being at the present time an injunction in force restraining the Department from removing the pier.

The Corporation Counsel approved forms of contracts (with form of advertisement therefor) No. 784, for dredging at the Peck slip section on the East river; No. 788 for ice; No. 785, for building Pier, new 20, East river, at the foot of Peck slip; No. 789, for dredging at the Cedar street section, on the North river, Borough of Manhattan, and Contract No. 790, for sprinkling the new-made lands on the North river, between Cortlandt and Gansevoort streets and between West Twenty-third and West Thirtieth streets, and on the East river, between East Eighteenth and East Twenty-fourth streets; also printer's proofs of Contracts Nos. 790 and 791, for piles.

The substitution of the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland as surety in the place of H. Debet Fricke and Benjamin Schroeder on the estimate of J. P. Hansen for painting the recreation piers at the foot of Barrow and West Fiftieth streets, under Classes I and II, respectively, of Contract No. 781; and of the American Bonding Company of Baltimore as surety in the place of T. B. Connors and T. D. Connors on the estimate of Neptune B. Smyth for painting the recreation piers at the foot of West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, East Third street, East Twenty-fourth street and East One Hundred and Twelfth street, under Classes III, IV, V and VI of Contract No. 781, respectively, was approved.

The City Record returned the advertisement of Contracts Nos. 782 and 768, as requested by the Comptroller.

All bids received under Contract No. 779, for furnishing and delivering and putting in place small cobble and rip rap stone, were rejected, the Commissioner deeming it for the best interest of the City so to do. The bids received were as follows, a representative of the Comptroller being present at the opening of same; and each bidder furnishing the security deposit required:

All bids on Class VII. of Contract No. 781 for painting and repairing the recreation piers along the North and East rivers in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn were rejected.

The Commissioner rejected all bids received under Contract No. 777 for building a new pier with appurtenances between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with section 1526 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Comptroller was requested to attach his certificates to Contracts No. 773 for building a Pier at the foot of East Forty-ninth street, No. 769 for towing, No. 783 for stationery and No. 760 for sundry supplies.

Bids were received and opened May 5, 1903, for dredging on the North river between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, Borough of Manhattan, under Contract No. 786, a representative of the Comptroller being present. Five estimates were received, each bidder furnishing the security deposit required (\$1,800), as follows:

Augustin Walsh, contractor, under Contract No. 773, for building the Pier at the foot of Forty-ninth street, East River, requested permission to proceed with the work. He was notified that the Comptroller had not attached his certificate to the said contract.

A credit account for wharfage was granted E. & J. Marrin.

The Auditor was directed to collect the sum of \$181 from the Department of Parks, being cost of services of two Department Divers, with the necessary help and appliances, detailed to the Department of Parks in examination of the Harlem River Driveway, at High Bridge, Borough of Manhattan.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to submit lists of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Male Cleaner and Female Cleaner, twelve of the former and sixteen of the latter being required for the operation of the recreation piers during the coming season.

The application of E. J. Collins, Ship Carpenter, for pay during the time he was idle through injuries received while in the service of the Department was denied.

To make necessary repairs to the outer northerly side of the East One Hundred and Twelfth Street Pier where damaged by the tugboat "Henry Stanwood" with scow in tow, on April 24, 1903, and report the cost for collection from the Phoenix Towing and Transportation Company, No. 17 State street, New York.

To prepare berth for public bath at the foot of Noble street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the Department of Public Works, Borough of Brooklyn.

To rebuild the ash dock on the easterly side of Blackwell's Island, cost not to exceed \$700, second-hand material to be used wherever possible, in accordance with request of the Department of Public Charities.

To renew sheathing on the coal dock on the easterly side of Blackwell's Island, the cost thereof not to exceed \$350, in accordance with the request of the Commissioner of Correction.

To raise the bulkhead at the end of Wallabout Canal, at Kent avenue or Hewes street, Borough of Brooklyn, 18 inches, in order to permit the Department of Public Works, Brooklyn, to repave the street, cost of said work not to exceed \$225.

To drive one pile at the Battery wall for berthing bath thereat, the cost of the work to be reported for collection from William A. Hall.

The Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company were notified to cease work of constructing two platforms, together with various sheds, houses, etc., on same, at North Beach, Bowery Bay, Borough of Queens, until a Department permit for said work has been obtained.

The Auditor was directed to report as to whether the rates charged for permits granted prior to January 1, 1902, and still in existence, are proper ones.

The bonds furnished by the purchasers of Lots Nos. 5 and 6 of old buildings, on the block between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river, were released, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported that said buildings had been removed in substantial accordance with the terms of sale.

The West Shore Railroad Company (New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessee) was directed to repair Pier, new 23, North river, and the ferry rack southerly of said pier, in accordance with the terms of the lease of the premises.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan was requested to have the asphalt pavement on West Twenty-fourth street, near the ferry, put in proper condition.

The Long Island Railroad Company was notified that in view of the steady increase of the receipts during the term of the lease recently expired, from the ferry between Pine street, Manhattan, and Long Island City, Borough of Queens, the Commissioner would not feel justified in recommending any reduction in the rental of 5 per cent. of the gross earnings for the renewal lease; said company was also requested to remit the sum of \$78.39, shown to be due the Department by their memorandum of April 29, 1903.

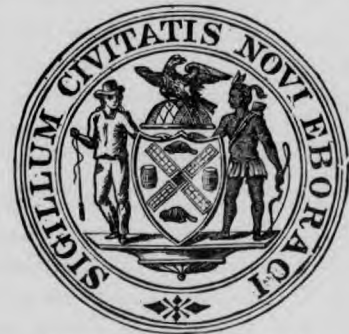

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE Ocean Electric Railway Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway in, upon and along certain streets and highways and bridges in The City of New York.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Ocean Electric Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following named streets and highways and bridges, all situated in the Borough of Queens, City and State of New York, set forth in the following description of route:

Beginning at the termination of the existing railroad tracks on Washington avenue, so-called, in Rockaway Park upon Rockaway Beach, in the Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens; running from thence in an easterly and southerly direction along Eastern avenue to the Boulevard; thence easterly along the Boulevard to Park avenue; and thence northerly along Park avenue to the existing right of way and railroad track of the New York and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company in what is now known as Hammels in said Fifth Ward of the Borough of Queens and City of New York.

Being a distance of about 9,430 feet or 1.8 miles.

And with the right or franchise to cross such other streets and highways and bridges (named and unnamed) as may be encountered in said route.

Section 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and highways and bridges to the con-

struction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railway is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and shall become the property of the railway company, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the said streets and highways and bridges, including equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which said plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. The valuation shall be based upon a fair appraisal of the property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

Fourth—The Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$500, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts from the route constructed under this ordinance, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$500. During the next term of five years an annual sum which shall not be less than \$1,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,000; during the remaining fifteen years of the term a sum of money not less than \$1,000 per annum and which shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority at least three months prior to the expiration of the first ten years of this franchise. The gross receipts to be computed in the manner provided in section 95 of the Railroad Law.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding said date of payment shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railway, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee agrees and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The railway and other structures constructed by the grantee, its successors or assigns under this ordinance, shall in all respects comply with the provisions of chapter 686 of the Laws of 1894, as amended.

Seventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall cause to be laid, under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, upon and along the public highway known as the Boulevard as hereinbefore described, a good and sufficient macadamized pavement of a depth of not less than eight inches, to extend from either side of the present macadamized pavement to the curb line on the north and south sides of the said Boulevard.

The grantee shall pay the entire cost thereof, together with the cost of the necessary inspection, and no cars shall be operated under this franchise over any part of the route hereby granted, until the said pavement is fully and completely laid.

Eighth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its suc-

cessors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Ninth—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York and North Shore Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Interurban Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Tenth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five cents between Far Rockaway, and any point westerly thereof.

Thirteenth—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than one hour, both day and night, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the City ordinances; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any of its lines within The City of New York between the hours of 12.30 and 4.30 o'clock a. m., each day between the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, and between 12 o'clock midnight and 6 o'clock a. m. during the balance of the year, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Fourteenth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fifteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Sixteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Seventeenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Eighteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets, and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, then a roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Nineteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York, by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Twentieth—If any of the streets and highways and bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise therein shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets and highways and bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway, and such right or franchise shall expire at the end of the term created by this ordinance as above set forth. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets and highways and bridges, nor as in any manner granting property or rights of any kind in or upon its lands now owned or occupied by it under any title, except only the public streets and highways and bridges in the usual acceptance of such terms, which are specifically referred to above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grantee shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments, and shall complete the construction of a single track railway upon all of the route hereby granted on or before July 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon the route above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1904, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such route or portion thereof, not then constructed from and after July 1, 1904, shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be

extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and The City of New York may recover the cost and expense of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the Ocean Electric Railway Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of two thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway, and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of two thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
