BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, February 16, 1909, at 3 o'clock. Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Farley, Sachs, Stern, O'Keefe, Robbins and Paulding, Trustees. Excused, Mr. Hebbert, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of February 9 were read and approved.

The following bills were presented for approval and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From February 7 to February 13, inclusive, thirty-nine operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, ten at Gouverneur Hospital, fourteen at Harlem Hospital and nineteen at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

In accordance with the rules a fire drill was held at Bellevue Hospital, Harlem Hospital and Fordham Hospital on February 13, and at Gouverneur Hospital on February 15, 1909.

In regard to the accident which occurred to a Bellevue ambulance on February 8, the matter has been investigated, and it is believed that the Driver of the ambulance was in no way to blame. Statements from both the Driver of the ambulance and Dr. Burke, the Ambulance Surgeon, are submitted herewith. It is suggested that steps be taken to collect from the railroad company for the expense of the repairs to the ambulance.

A letter from Ginn & Co. is submitted herewith, in which permission is requested to use plates of some of the pictures of the Children's Ward in Harlem and Gouverneur hospitals. These pictures appeared in the sixth annual report of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and it is desired to use them in the new book of the Gullick Hygiene Series, edited by Dr. Luther H. Gullick, of New York.

On February 13 Dr. William Polk requested that special Nurses be furnished for a patient, Mrs. Bush, in the Annex, one Nurse for day and one for night. This is a post-operative case, and approval for the appointment is requested.

A letter has been received from the Housekeeper, Miss Frost, requesting an increase in the salary of Frank McShane, who has been in the service of the hospital for nine years. The reason for the increase is additional work and length of time in the service. It is requested that he be promoted from the grade of \$300 to that of \$360.

A request is made for the placing of an extension to the house telephone in the main office of the General Medical Superintendent for use of his Assistants there.

On February 10 Dr. Pooley, Senior on the Second Medical Division, was taken ill with scarlet fever. He was sent to the Minerva Hospital, and it is reported that he is doing very well, the case being a mild one.

Your attention is called to the fact that the firm of John Wanamaker & Co., contractors to furnish screens for the new Nurses' Pavilion, requests to be allowed to furnish a screen in which a different corner from that specified is used. Samples are submitted herewith.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to take steps to collect from the railroad company the expense of repairing the ambulance damaged by a surface car.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the request of Messrs. Ginn & Co. in the matter of using plates of some of the pictures of the Children's Ward of Harlem and Gouverneur hospitals was referred to the General Medical Superintendent, with power.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of two Nurses (a day and a night Nurse) to care for Mrs. Bush, a patient in Dr. Polk's service, was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation of the Housekeeper that the salary of Frank McShane be increased from \$300 to \$360 a year was referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the installation of an additional interior telephone in the main office of the General Medical Superintendent was authorized.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in sending Dr. Pooley to the Minerva Hospital was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the offer of John Wanamaker & Co. to furnish screens with a different corner than that specified in the bid was referred to the General Medical Superintendent, with power.

With the approval of the Committee on Supplies and the Building Committee, the Assistant Superintendent was authorized to purchase the following articles and order the following repairs:

Mr. Paulding, for the Bellevue Hospital Conference Committee, First Division, recommended the appointment of Drs. Vosburgh and Elmendorf, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To reappoint Dr. Arthur S. Vosburgh as Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Surgeon to the First Division of Bellevue Hospital for the year 1909, and to appoint Dr. William Ten Eyck Elmendorf as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, First Division.

Mr. Sachs reported upon the unsightly appearance of the swill cans on the grounds at Harlem Hospital and suggested the erection of a corrugated iron shed in which they might be stored. On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, To refer this matter to the General Medical Superintendent for investigation and report.

Mr. Paulding of the Committee on Supplies recommended that the (1) bid of William R. Thompson on rubber coats at \$1.25 each be rejected, inasmuch as the bid seems to have been based upon an error, and that the goods be bought in the open market until the Board has another opening of bids; (2) that the offer of W. C. Heidecker on two old ambulances be referred to the General Medical Superintendent for investigation and report; (3) that the subject of beds ordered from Frank A. Hall be taken up by the General Medical Superintendent; and (4) that the bid of John F. Donovan on white castile soap (line 91) be rejected and the article bought

in the open market until such time as another opening of bids can be arranged. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendations of the Committee on Supplies were approved.

Mr. Paulding of the Committee on Officers and Employees recommended that a first-class Electrician and a first-class Plumber and a Junior Draughtsman be appointed for general institution work, and that the money needed for the salaries of the Electrician and Draughtsman be requested from the Board of Aldermen by an issue of Revenue Bonds. Provision has been made in the Budget of Bellevue Hospital for a Plumber and the amount of the salary should be transferred to General Administration. The Committee recommended that the request for a Messenger be denied; that no action be taken on the request of the Convalescent Relief Committee that Miss Wadley's salary be increased, and that a Stenographer be appointed until such time as the new Budget is fixed; that the request of Miss Goodrich be approved on the understanding that the wages of the two additional Helpers (Window Cleaner and Helper in the amphitheatre) be charged against the appropriation for the new Nurses' School, as suggested by the Acting Superintendent; that all other requests for increases in the salaries of the Helpers be denied, the Budget making no provision for such increases; and that the application of Thomas P. Farrell, Fireman, for leave of absence on account of illness be approved. The Committee further recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to establish the grades for which provision has been made in the Budget for 1909 and which do not exist at the present time. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendations of the Committee were approved.

Mr. Paulding recommended that the member of the House Staff sleeping at present in Pavilions A and B be continued in the building until such time as a permanent solution of the matter has been arrived at by the Board of Trustees, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was approved.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, February 23, 1909, at three o'clock.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From February 14 to February 21, inclusive, 52 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 12 at Gouverneur Hospital, 22 at Harlem Hospital and 17 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

Accompanying this report is a preliminary report from Mr. Ross regarding the condition of the fire equipment and fire service at Bellevue Hospital. It is recommended that prompt action be taken upon the reports and recommendations of Mr. Ross.

On February 17 the Night Superintendent, Mr. McHale, reported that on the night of the 16th the hose under Ward 30 was cut. The Night Watchman reported the matter to him and, when questioned, he resigned. The matter is still under investigation.

Regular fire drills were held at Fordham Hospital on February 18 and at Harlem Hospital on February 19.

In accordance with instructions from your Board, the matter of screens for the new Nurses' Home was taken up with John Wanamaker, and that firm has been authorized to make the proposed substitution, a written guarantee having been obtained that the screen to be furnished is not only equal but superior to the one specified.

Concerning the complaint of a patient, Clarence S. Rice, office boy of Paul T. Brady, the matter was referred to Dr. Bissell, on whose service the boy received treatment. Dr. Bissell was of the opinion that the boy had no grounds for his complaint. The matter was taken up directly with Dr. Clark, the House Officer mentioned, and accompanying this report is a letter from Dr. Clark denying the charges. It is believed that the complaint was unwarranted and groundless.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From February 21 to February 27, inclusive, 45 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 5 at Gouverneur Hospital, 14 at Harlem Hospital and 16 at Fordham Hospital, all of which the attending Surgeons or their assistants were present.

In the matter of Mr. Heydecker's offer for the old ambulances, it is believed that the ambulances in question are worth more than has been offered for them. As these cannot be sold except at public auction, it is recommended that such steps be taken as are necessary in order to dispose of them to the best advantage and in accordance with the law.

It is believed that an Assistant Architect for the Department is absolutely necessary in order to insure prompt attention to the plans and specifications. The entire work at present is in the hands of Mr. Jones, and were it possible for him to devote his entire attention to it the situation might be different. As it is impossible for him to do so, and as he is repeatedly called away to attend to the other duties of his position (rendering it impossible for him to turn out specifications and plans within even a reasonable length of time), it is recommended that an Assistant Architect be engaged, a man of sufficient knowledge and calibre to attend to the work now being done by Mr. Jones, namely, the drawing up of specifications and plans. It is further recommended that the plans and specifications for altering Wards 18 and 25, and for converting the lower floor of the Marquand Pavilion into an isolation ward for observation cases be placed in the hands of the Building Committee with power, if possible, to engage an architect immediately to complete the plans and specifications, in order that bids may be obtained and the work begun as soon as possible. The rooms for the house staff and the ward for observation cases are very much needed and the work should be begun at once.

A request from Dr. Douglas for two special Nurses to care for one of his patients was granted, and authority for the services of these Nurses is also asked for.

A letter was received from Mr. Lacombe, Chief Engineer of Light and Power, in which permission is granted to install some thirty temporary drop lights in the new Training School Building, providing the drop lights, when installed, prove to be safe for temporary use. His letter accompanies this report, and it is recommended that the matter be referred to the Building Committee.

Appended herewith is a letter from S. Trimmer & Son urging that they be allowed to fill the coal bins at Fordham and Harlem Hospitals to their full storage capacity, and that they be given an order to keep the bins filled hereafter. It is suggested that this matter be acted upon favorably.

Fred Rossman, now appearing on the payroll as Butcher at \$720, may, according to the revised Budget, be allowed but \$600. It is recommended that he be placed on the roll as Hospital Helper at \$720, in order to come within the Civil Service rules and at the same time continue at the present rate of pay.

The report of Dr. Charles Norris, Director of Laboratories, for the year 1908 is herewith submitted.

A report from Mr. Ross, in charge of the fire system of this Department, is herewith submitted, covering his inspection of the fire system and apparatus at Gouverneur Hospital.

Submitted herewith is a letter from the General Superintendent of Training Schools asking permission to appoint a woman Nurse to take charge of Ward 35 at a salary of \$720 a year, and it is recommended that authority be given for such appointment.

The General Superintendent of Training Schools has been conferred with regarding the fumigation of clothing of tubercular patients. There is a room available which (with a few slight alterations) could be made to serve as a fumigating room for the purpose mentioned, and it is recommended that authority be given to make the necessary alterations.
