MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated September 10 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, transmitting a communication dated September 5 from the Police Commissioner accompanying a certificate from Police Surgeon Daniel J. Donovan to the effect that Sergeant Milton Woodbridge, who had made an appeal for a special examination for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant, had remained away from the regular examination under orders from him. The Examiner stated that in his opinion the candidate was entitled to a special examination for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant, in accordance with the decision in the matter of Tormey vs. Polk, and recommended that the Police Commissioner be informed that the Commission would accept applications for a special examination for promotion to the rank of Lieutenant from all persons legally entitled to the same under the said decision, provided such applications were made through the regular channels of the Police Department and filed with the Commission not later than October 1, 1913. The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated September 10 was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, transmitting a communication dated September 9, from Lieutenant Richard Gray, a candidate on the eligible list for promotion to the position of Captain, Police Department, requesting that he be given credit on the eligible list for a commendation received as Patrolman on December 24, 1902. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, dated September 11, relative to the request of the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx that the name of Joseph J. Lindon, whose name appeared third on the list for promotion to Rodman, grade B, Bureau of Highways, Borough of The Bronx, be certified for promotion to the position of Rodman at \$900 per annum. The Examiner recommended that the preferred list of Rodman, grade C, be certified and that the list for promotion be certified also to anticipate declination on the part of the person on the preferred list. The recommendation was adopted.

"In accordance with section 406 of the Charter, candidates must be plumbers who have served at least five years as such.

"Subdivision 3 of section 1573 of the Greater New York Charter (chapter 755 of the Laws of 1913) directs that the Examining Board of Plumbers shall examine in conjunction with the Municipal Civil Service Commission applicants for positions as Inspectors of Plumbing.

"The names of all candidates who file applications will be transmitted to the Examining Board of Plumbers in accordance with these provisions.

"The attention of candidates is drawn to the notice of the Examining Board of Plumbers printed below.

"Applications for examination must be made on a special blank, form B. Experience blanks will be issued with the applications and must be filed with them.

"Age limits, 21 to 50 years.

"Annual salary, \$1,200 per annum.

"Public notice is hereby given that in accordance with chapter 755 of the Laws of 1913 the Examining Board of Plumbers will examine in conjunction with the Municipal Civil Service Commission all persons who file applications for examination as Inspectors of Plumbing. In accordance with subdivision 5 of section 1573 of the Greater New York Charter, each person applying for examination will be charged a sum of five dollars, to be collected by this Board on the date designated by the Municipal Civil Service Commission for holding the practical test.

"All applications for examination are to be made to the Municipal Civil Service Commission in accordance with its advertisement on this date.

The form of advertisement was approved.

The applicant must also present a diploma or certificate showing that she is a graduate of a school for midwives registered by the Board of Health of The City of New York as maintaining a satisfactory standard of preparation, instruction and course of study, but the requirement

of a diploma shall not apply to any person who is now or heretofore has been authorized to practice midwifery by the said Board.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rents or other revenues for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the work to be advertised to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the seal in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
