

INCIDENT BRIEF - COVID-19 03/25/20

Incident Summary

NYC Emergency Management continues to coordinate with our partners at the City, State, and Federal levels as well as the private sector in response to COVID-19. As of March 24, 2020, there are **15,597** COVID-19 positive cases in New York City, an increase of **2,482** new cases from the previous day. Additionally:

- New York has increased its testing capacity to 16,000 a day as of Monday (3/23) from testing 1,000 people a day ten days ago.
- In accordance with the New York State Executive Order, every New Yorker must stay at home from work, unless they are an essential worker. More information regarding the New York State Executive Orders can be found here.
- 30,000 retired doctors and healthcare workers have volunteered to support COVID-19 healthcare service needs.

There are no specific vaccines or treatments available for this novel coronavirus, or any other coronavirus. However, medication and vaccine research continues.

Relief For Small Businesses

- The City will provide relief for small businesses across the City seeing a reduction in revenue because of COVID-19. Businesses with fewer than 100 employees who have seen sales decreases of 25% or more will be eligible for zero interest loans of up to \$75,000 to help mitigate losses in profit. The City is also offering small businesses with fewer than 5 employees a grant to cover 40% of payroll costs for two months (an average of \$6,000) to help retain employees. - The Small Business Administration (SBA) will offer Small Businesses impacted by Coronavirus (COVID-19) up to \$2 million in Economic Injury Disaster Loan Assistance (EIDL). Under the EIDL program the SBA makes loans available to small businesses and private non-profit

organizations in designated areas of a state or territory to help alleviate economic injury caused by the Coronavirus (COVID-19). Please click <u>here</u> to check your eligibility and apply.

- <u>Donate NYC</u>: The City of New York and its partners are committed to providing resources to those affected by COVID-19 crisis. DonateNYC, a program of NYC Department of Sanitation, has resources for individuals, businesses, schools, and agencies to give and receive donated items.
- HelpNow NYC: Help Now NYC has guidance on how New Yorkers can help those affected by COVID-19 through volunteering and donation opportunities. It also can connect New York State licensed medical professionals for potential surge staffing shifts in response to COVID-19.
 - New York Cares: If you are not a licensed medical professional, you can still help the COVID-19 response through New York Cares.
